Groton Area offers CNA class

Brittany Hubbart, Groton Area School's Science/Health Science teacher, has been teaching a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) class in Groton Area High School. This is the first time such a class has been offered including the option for the students to take the test that would qualify them for work in various health care facilities. All five students taking the class for certification passed and now are qualified to work in nursing homes or similar care facilities.

Two seniors, Shaela McGannon and Camryn Kurtz, and three juniors, Ashley Johnson, Karlie McKane, and Kayleigh McGannon, are the five students that are now certified. There were thirteen students enrolled in the CNA class this semester including those in both the certification and noncertification routes.

The cost for taking the class for certification includes sixteen hours of working in a

nursing home plus a tuition fee of \$450. "For many students, there are options to have the cost of the certification coursework and test covered," Hubbart explained.

"Right now we work with Sun Dial in Bristol, and to a lesser degree, Avantara in Groton," she explained. "Any student enrolling in this course can do so free of charge. The added cost is only for those who take the test to become certified CNA's."

"This is the first time that a CNA class has been taught in Groton," Hubbart added. "All of the information that is taught is good for anyone to know, and the skills that have been learned will be useful their entire lives."

The CNA class in Groton is a one semester class. "We study medical terminology, work on the mannequins, and get to do some procedures on the cadaver," she listed. "We already offer Gateway to CNA, Medical Terminology, and Introduction to Sports Medicine. Next year we plan to add the following health care classes: Introduction to Sports Medicine II and Health Care Career Exploration."

"The students especially like the advantages of learning all of these complicated terms," Hubbart smiled. "Once you learn the meaning of parts of a word, you can apply that knowledge to other words which are similar in spelling."

"Being certified as a CNA makes these students more marketable in the future," she said. "There are very few other high schools in South Dakota who offer programs similar to this one in Groton."

"One of the important advantages of having Toni, a synthetic human, in school is for the students to learn the location and identification of body parts by working on the cadaver," Hubbart stated. "It gives our students real world experience while still in high school."

"Groton is also the only South Dakota school that has Toni, the SynDaver," she said. "Right now Toni is in Florida for refurbishing, an annual necessity for cleaning and repairing. Having Toni available in the classroom for the students to work with is a huge benefit for those going into nursing."

Groton school board discusses school hires, coaching agreements, more

A handful of hires and a new elementary science curriculum led topics of discussion at Monday's Groton Area School District Board meeting.

The board approved two resignations and more than three new hires, though one of those hires is a familiar face in the district.

The board approved hiring Mary Johnson as middle school reading and social studies teacher for the 2024-2025 school year. Johnson served in that position at the district before, leaving in 2018.

Other hires include Jennifer Kunze and Aleshia Ambright as special education paraprofessionals at \$15.33 per hour.

The board also hired summer OST staff, including Leah Jones, Mckenna Tietz, Emma Davies, Drake Peterson and Gavin Englund at the

She could always make more, I might have thought—if my unformed jellied brain had not been enthralled with living.

Much of what Grandma was came from her mother. I knew her as Grandma Joachim. I would visit my great-grandmother almost daily when the school day was done. She made "Russian Tea" from the chamomile that grew around the tiny trailer house that was her home. She made cookies for me while I paged through picture books filled with somber faces I would never know. Yet their blood runs through my veins.

The highlight of the visit was the nickel that she would pull from her coin purse.

I was a mercenary visitor.

When Grandma Joachim died, it was her daughter who took my hand and led me to the casket. As Grandma Bender and I looked down at the shell of what had been, she squeezed my hand. "No more nickels," she said.

My memories of Grandma Bender are much more vivid. We had more time together. I spent summers there and would have grown fat on the rich German delicacies had Grandpa and Grandma not seen to it that I develop my skills as a bale hauler.

Nobody worked harder than Grandma.

One day, out in the field, we came upon a very young rabbit—its mother was dead. Grandma picked it up, and when I realized she meant to dispatch it, I pleaded for its life. I lost the case and the bunny lost its life. She thought it better to end its life with a quick twist of the neck than have it starve or become a meal for a fox.

But Grandma was far from heartless. If you were quick, you could catch her eyes smiling. She could spot a drinker a mile away, and when Grandpa walked in the door after a social visit at George's Bar, she would chew him out for

having "chicken eyes." She ended every argu-"Ach Benny, you're so dumb."

Theirs was not a romantic partnership. Grandpa tells me that when he asked her to marry him, all she did was shrug her shoulders as if to say, "Well, I'm not doing anything else for the rest of my life." With a simple shrug of the shoulders, my father came into existence fense. While some speculate that his producas did I some years later.

At Christmas, she would get modern kitchen conveniences from her thoughtful children and grandchildren. But at the end of the day the new mixers and toaster ovens would be stowed in the attic with last year's loot. "She was saving it for nice," she told us. We still quote her today.

Today when any Bender gets a gift you can see a glint come to his eye and a grin to his face. "I'm gonna save it for nice," is the punch line that always gets a laugh.

It's official, Justin Jefferson is going to be a Minnesota Viking for many more years! Even though I knew the news was coming, it was still stressful waiting for the official announcement. And finally, after nearly a year of speculation, the Vikings announced they had signed Justin Jefferson to a four-year, \$140 million extension that will keep him in Minnesota through the 2028 season. The contract also makes Jefferson the highest-paid non-quarterback in the NFL, and he's worth every penny.

The other exciting news coming out of Minnesota was the announcement of new alternate jerseys the team will debut this season. Called the "Winter Warrior" jerseys, they feature an all-white look, including a white helmet which will mark the first time in team history they will have worn a helmet that isn't purple. The team announced they will wear the alternate jerseys for the week 15 matchup against the Chicago Bears, and you can see the jerseys for yourself on the Vikings' website.


> Trishton Jackson – Mostly relegated to special teams last season, Jackson will have an outside chance of becoming the team's WR3 or WR4.

> If I had to guess, I'd say the six receivers listed above have the best shot of making the final 53-man roster. However, there are currently six other receivers on the Vikings' roster right now. Devron Harper, Lucky Jackson, Ty James, Jeshaun Jones, Malik Knowles, and Thayer Thomas still have time to impress the coaching staff enough to get some playing time in 2024. However, I wouldn't be surprised if the Vikings decide to bring in a free-agent WR to compete for the WR3 spot.





Rory Allen McKittrick, 61, unexpectedly passed away in his home on June 1, 2024.

Rory was a devoted son and brother, a loving father, adored uncle to many nieces and nephews, and a gushing grandfather to his granddaughter Brooke and newest grandson, Cooper. While many people gain their identity through work, Rory's identity was truly rooted in these roles and it was here that that he showed what a wonderful and kind man he was.

Rory would describe himself as an introvert, but there was no person he could not hold a riveting conversation with. While Rory had many talents, the gift of conversation and making people feel valued were two of his best. He could hold a conversation with anyone, about anything, and his many life adventures ensured each conversation would be injected with a great story (somehow Bruce Springsteen, baseball, hunting, or fishing would often be part of those stories).

Rory was born September 4, 1962, to Roger & Luetta (Gooding) McKittrick. He grew up with three brothers, Randy, Lonnie, and Wade, whom he loved unconditionally. Over the years, Rory loved watching their families grow and spending time with each of them. After high school, Rory accepted a scholarship at Northern State University to play baseball and study business administration/computer science. He loved to learn and therefore poured himself into his studies. When not attending class, studying, or supervising the computer lab, he could be found training on and off the baseball field. Rory was a humble but talented pitcher for the Northern State Wolves. He led the Wolves in E.R.A, strikeouts, and was an all-district selection in 1983. Rory's baseball career carried over to a brief stint with the Atlanta Braves single A minor league team. His passion for sports, exercising, and being active continued throughout his life. His family jokes that over the past few years his "coffee group" were the people at the local gym that he exercised with and spent time shooting the bull with in the sauna.

After making the decision to leave baseball, he pursued and received his master's in business administration at the University of South Dakota. His career evolved from a store manager into the world of technology. He began as an entry level programmer and eventually rose into a variety of management positions where he led and motivated members of his teams in the development of complex logistical and coding algorithms. The communicator and leader in Rory truly shined in these positions.



More items of interest include authorizing the business manager to publish the proposed 2025 fiscal year budget and schedule a public hearing at 7:30 p.m. July 8.

The district is also looking at adding a feature to the current Groton Area School District app that would allow teachers, coaches, parents and students to communicate. The goal is to start rolling it out in mid-July, said Superintendent Joe Schwan.

Supreme Court Should Embrace Transparency

Rising concerns about the U.S. Supreme Court's lack of impartiality amid increasing calls for judicial recusals, reforms and transparency form a historical backdrop of anxiety as Americans are once more bracing themselves for a landmark ruling that will have a direct bearing on the future of our constitutional democracy, the Bill of Rights and the rule of law. In this case, Trump v. United States, the question is whether the president enjoys absolute immunity from criminal prosecution.

The Court will render a decision that may determine, as former President Donald Trump asserts, that the nation's chief executive should possess constitutional authority to order the assassination of his political opponents. The citizenry's anticipation of this historic decision, expected any hour in the final days of the Court's Term, has generated nationwide demands for transparency in the work of the High Bench at a juncture when public respect for governmental institutions, including the Court itself, is in sharp decline.

This is not the first time that the nation has anxiously held its breath while awaiting the Court's seminal rulings on matters that could re-shape our legal landscape and the future of the country. With Brown v. Bd. of Education (1954),

Americans understood that a decision banning segregation in public schools would shake southern culture to its core and open avenues for racial equality promised by the 14th Amendment. In the Pentagon Papers Case (1971), everyone knew that the future of freedom of the press and the status of the First Amendment were at stake. In Roe v. Wade (1973) and Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization (2022), the fundamental question of a woman's right to govern her own reproductive organs was in the hands of nine justices.

The public's heightened anxiety about judicial decisions that might displace the pillars of our nation can be allayed, to some degree, if there is among the citizenry, a respectable level of confidence in the work of the Court-- that it is above the fray and not a tool of political bias, and that its opinions are grounded in facts and law and are well-reasoned and defensible.

Public confidence in the Court can be bolstered through transparency. While the Justices do most of their work behind the scenes—in chambers and judicial conference—the reputations of the individual justices and hence the institution are well-served if citizens believe that rulings are not the product of judicial bias. Wise judges will recuse themselves from cases if there is even the "appearance" of bias. As Justice Felix Frankfurter wrote, "justice must satisfy the appearance of justice."

In this current climate, two Justices -- Clarence Thomas and Samuel Alito -- are laboring -- fairly or unfairly -- under suspicions that their votes and perhaps opinions in the presidential immunity case promoted by Trump will be partisan. Thomas and Alito have rejected calls for their recusal and the fraught politics of the issue has ensnared the Court in a storm of controversy and doubt at a time when its reputation can least afford it.

As with most governmental problems, the remedy for institutional damage to the Court is transparency, with the focus on judicial recusal, to borrow from the federal code—28 U.S.C. Section 455—whenever a judge's impartiality "might reasonably be questioned." The Justices themselves can shoulder the responsibility for asking colleagues to withdraw if they refuse to recognize the basis for public perception of bias. Additional measures seem necessary to remove from the Justices themselves the sole responsibility for deciding when recusal is the right call.

Sen. Sheldon Whitehouse's proposal, the "Supreme Court Ethics, Recusal and Transparency Act of 2023," which has been approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee, would require the Justices to adopt a code of conduct, create a mechanism to investigate alleged violations of the code, improve disclosure and transparency expectations and require Justices to publicly explain their recusal decisions. At a time when public confidence in the Court has declined, we need a measure to restore its reputation. This bill is a good start. It promotes the nation's commitment to the rule of law and confidence in the Court.

The benefit of an explanation for a Justice's refusal to withdraw from a case is transparency, precisely what the Court and the country need at this juncture in American history.








Dear EarthTalk: Which of the big tech companies are considered the greenest now? – B.P.

As global demand for sustainable practices intensifies, the race among major tech companies to adopt green practices has become highly competitive. Many tech giants, including Microsoft, Apple and Google are pursuing demanding sustainability goals.

Microsoft has set the most ambitious target: to run entirely on renewable energy by 2025, to go carbon-negative by 2030, and to neutralize all past emissions dating back to 1975 by 2050. Also, Microsoft has mandated its suppliers report their emissions since 2021 and has implemented a carbon tax on its supply chain. In May 2024, the company signed the largest corporate clean energy deal, purchasing 10.5 gigawatts of carbon-free power from Brookfield Renewable Partners. Microsoft already sources electricity from solar and wind farms across America, Europe and Asia.

to 1975 by 2050. Transparency distinguishes Microsoft from other major tech companies: It has openly invested in carbon offset projects, such as installing clean stovetops in Kenya and protecting Indonesian forests, and has supported renewable energy infrastructure, including backup generation for Wyoming solar grids and energy storage batteries in Ireland. In 2020, Microsoft founded the Climate Innovation Fund, investing \$1 billion in over 35 companies developing climate technology solutions for underserved communities.

Apple differs in that it mainly makes physical products. Apple hopes to limit its annual carbon emissions to less than 10 million 'unavoidable' metric tons by 2030 and reach zero net emissions via carbon offsets and removal. In 2022, Apple's carbon footprint was a staggering 22.5 million metric tons, 75 percent produced during manufacturing and 20 percent generated during product use and transportation.

Since production accounts for most of Apple's emissions, the company has prioritized material and energy sourcing. The 2019 MacBook Air's external enclosure is 100 percent recycled aluminum, reducing the product's carbon footprint by nearly half. Also, Apple is developing more durable and energy-efficient products and powering its production lines, offices and data centers with clean energy. And Apple has many carbon offset/removal projects, mostly to protect and restore wetlands, grasslands and forests.


Google has striven to neutralize its carbon emissions since its founding in 1998, and aims to exceed carbon neutrality by becoming carbonfree by 2030. Its carbon-free plan includes three phases: offsetting, reducing and eliminating emissions. For two decades, Google has used "high-quality" carbon offsets and renewable energy. However, Google's lack of clarity about what constitutes "high-quality" makes it difficult to verify their sustainability claims. Since 2017, Google has increased reliance on wind and solar power and hopes to power all facilities soon with locally sourced carbon-free electricity. Sun and wind energy can be unpredictable and insufficient for large-scale tech operations. To address this, Google collaborated with its subsidiary DeepMind to develop machine learning systems that forecast wind farm output up to 36 hours in advance and worked with local authorities to optimize solar panel placement.

"How to **Prevent** Sudden Death"

My first experience with cardiopulmonary resuscitation was during the summer of 1969. I was an orderly in a Minne-

apolis intensive care unit (ICU) when my patient stopped breathing. I called for help and provided mouth-to-mouth breathing until the team arrived. Later the doctor told me I saved the patient's life, further convincing me that medicine was my life's purpose.

Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) is the act of rhythmically pushing on the chest and breathing into the mouth of a person whose heartbeat and breathing has ceased. CPR can result in enough circulation to keep the victim alive until spontaneous circulation and breathing resumes.

In 1740, the French described how mouth-to-mouth breathing sometimes saved drowned people, and, through the early 1900s, mouth-tomouth breaths were given to bring lifeless newborns around. In the mid-1950s, two anesthesiologists, Dr. Elam and Dr. Safar, with help from the Red Cross, began promoting mouth-to-mouth resuscitation for adults discovered in cardiac arrest. In 1960, chest compressions were proven valuable in preserving circulation, especially to the brain, and even more important for survival than artificial respiration.

In 1947 a Cleveland surgeon used an internal (open chest) brillator to save a 14-year-old boy, and in 1955, Boston cardiologist, Paul Zoll, developed the now popular external (on skin) defibrillator. Studies show that the defibrillator is even more important than chest compression. With available automated external defibrillators (AEDs) and education on how to perform CPR and use AED devices, we have even better outcomes.

For those having a cardiac arrest, the sooner they get defibrillation, effective CPR, and a 911 call for help, the greater the chance of functional recovery. Out-of-hospital successful survival after CPR is about ten percent but increases to 35 percent when the arrest is witnessed and the victim is provided early defibrillation. The sad news is that more than 50 percent of those who could benefit will not have CPR because bystanders fear they might do something wrong. The big mistake is NOT TO TRY.

Simple, first-level, CPR courses are available for anyone interested in every community and through the internet, while AED devices are popping up in almost every community gathering area. Please notice where they are placed. Trust me, if someone has a cardiac arrest, and you try to help, you might just save a life.
