City Council adapts garbage collection routes amid seasonal frost concerns **By Elizabeth Varin**

In response to the seasonal challenges posed by thawing frost, the Groton City Council voted to temporarily adjust garbage collection routes.

The decision aims to safeguard city streets against potential damage from larger vehicles.

Residents need to bring their garbage to Main Street, Highway 37, Sixth Street or Railroad Avenue beginning on Tuesday, March 4.

Those who are unable to bring their garbage to those streets are encouraged to contact city hall for assistance.

Summer recreation staff hires begin

The council has begun hiring summer recreation staff.

The first four hires include Kami Lipp (swimming pool manager), Aaron Severson (junior legion coach), Sydney Kurtz (U10 softball coach) and Kyle Gerlach (junior teener coach).

The council approved an ordinance setting summer recreation employee salaries. Those salaries include:

Council invites bid on more projects

The council authorized city staff to bid street resurfacing work for 2025. While a map of work for the year wasn't available, the city will begin accepting sealed bids for approximately 44,000 square yards of bituminous seal coat and 2,200 square yards of bituminous prime coat.

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Weekly Vikings Roundup By Jordan Wright

Last week we covered the quarterback position in our yearly roster breakdown, so this week we turn our attention to the ground game. The Vikings were 19th in the league with 109.1 rushing yards per game. There is certainly room for improvement, but it was still a massive improvement over the 2023 season when the Vikings ranked 29th with only 91.4 yards per game.

Aaron Jones, released by the Green Bay Packers last offseason, immediately signed with the Vikings and was inserted into the starting lineup on day one. Jones led the team with 255 carries for 1,138 yards and five rushing touchdowns. He signed a oneyear contract so he will be a free agent this offseason, but Jones has mentioned to the media that he would like to be back next year. The problem is that he is 30 years old, which is usually when running backs start to decline. Will the Vikings elect to bring him back and try to squeeze one more productive season out of him? Or will the team look for a younger and/or cheaper option?

Cam Akers was the primary backup last year, carrying the ball 64 times for 297 yards and a touchdown, and he's had an interesting relationship with the Vikings. In September 2023, the Vikings sent a conditional 6th-round pick to the Los Angeles Rams for Akers and a conditional 7th-round pick. A month and a half later, Akers was injured and placed on IR, ending his season. He was then signed by the Houston Texans last offseason. In October 2024, the Vikings sent a conditional 6th-round draft pick to the Texans for Cam Akers and a conditional 7th-round pick. Like Jones, Akers is a free agent this offseason. Will the Vikings bring the 25-year-old back? Or will they let him sign somewhere else, then send that team a conditional 6th-round pick to get him back?

Ty Chandler is the only running back currently under contract for the Vikings in 2025. He was in line to be the primary backup last season, but he got bumped down to third on the depth chart after the Vikings brought back Akers. Chandler had 56 carries for 182 yards in 2024, which aren't great numbers, but he is relatively cheap and will likely be battling for the backup role this offseason.

At fullback, C.J. Ham is under contract through 2025. Ham is a local kid and a fan favorite, but the Vikings don't use a fullback much. With a \$3.4M cap hit, it's possible the Vikings cut him this offseason and put that money elsewhere.

What will the Vikings do at running back this offseason? There aren't a ton of free agent running backs this offseason, but luckily this is a good year to get one in the draft. The Vikings don't have a ton of picks this year, but I still expect the team to figure out a way to draft one. I also think if he's cheap enough, the Vikings will bring Jones back for one more season. With J.J. McCarthy in line to start next season, having a potent ground game will be vital for the young QB to be successful in 2025.

Hamlin is double winner in Northeast Conference

Hamlin will be the Northeast Conference champions in both the boys and girls division with an undefeated record of 10-0. Groton Area is the runner-up in the boys division while Roncalli and Groton Area share runner-up honors in the girls division.

It appears that the Tiospa-Zina vs. Clark/Willow Lake game will not be made up on the girls side and I'm not sure about the boys side yet.



The Life of Tobias Erickson



Tobias "Toby" Lee Erickson, 63, of Billings, Montana passed away suddenly at his home on February 5, 2025, following a cardiac event. His beloved wife, Missy, daughter, Emily, and dog, Bailey, were by his side as he left this world.

Christened a "turkey baby" by his mother, Toby was born on Thanksgiving Day, November 23, 1961, to Gertrude (Clifton) Erickson and Myron Erickson in Sisseton, South Dakota while the family resided in New Effington, South Dakota. Toby was the second youngest in a family of five children. Gertie and Myron set an excellent example of tenacity and industry for their children by opening their own company, Dependable Sanitation, in the face of many challenges including severe damage to their home by a tornado and Myron's suffering a debilitating stroke. 

In 2019, they welcomed their second granddaughter Paige Emerson Zanto. In the fall of 2022, Addy had the privilege of her dad escorting her down the aisle when she married Patrick Costello, and with this Toby's family was complete.

While Toby was a talented engineer and leader, he excelled in his roles as "Daddy" and "Papa," and he adored his girls. He walked the perfect line between a nonjudgmental protector and a trusted advisor. Groton Dominates Redfield in Region 1A Tournament Opener

The Groton Area Tigers came out firing on all cylinders Tuesday night, overpowering the Redfield Pheasants 44-9 in the first round of the Region 1A Girls Basketball Tournament at Groton. From the opening tip, Groton's aggressive defense and efficient shooting set the tone for a dominant performance.

The Tigers wasted no time building an early advantage, jumping out to a 14-2 lead by the end of the first quarter. Their relentless pressure on defense forced numerous Redfield turnovers, and Groton capitalized with quick transition baskets. By halftime, the Tigers had widened the gap to 31-4, with their defense holding Redfield to just two made field goals in the first 16 minutes.

As the third quarter progressed, Groton's lead continued to grow. When Taryn Traphagen sank a mid-range jumper with 4:53 left in the period, the mercy rule was enforced as the Tigers reached a 35-4 advantage. By the time the quarter ended, Groton had stretched their lead to 41-6, putting the game well out of reach.

Faith Traphagen led the Tigers in scoring with 11 points, followed closely by her sister, Taryn Traphagen, who added 10. Brooklyn Hansen and Rylee Dunker each contributed 6 points, while Chesney Weber scored 4 and led the team with 5 rebounds and 4 assists. Talli Wright added 3 points, and Jerica Locke and Jaedyn Penning each chipped in 2.

Groton's defensive intensity was a difference-maker, as they racked up 17 steals, with Faith Traphagen leading the way with 7. The Tigers forced 30 Redfield turnovers and held them to just 14 percent shooting from the field (3-for-21). For Redfield, Charli Jungwirth was the bright spot, leading the team with 5 points. Brynn Giblin and Kinley Smith

each scored 2. The Pheasants struggled to find any rhythm against Groton's smothering defense and managed just three field goals the entire game. Despite committing 15 turnovers of their own, Groton was efficient offensively, shooting 43 percent (12-of-28) on

two-pointers and 36 percent (5-of-14) from beyond the arc. Their free throw shooting matched their three-point percentage at 36 percent (5-of-14).

With the dominant victory, Groton advances to the next round of the Region 1A Tournament, carrying momentum and confidence into their next challenge. Redfield, meanwhile, will look to regroup and build for the future after a tough night on the court. Groton Area will play Sisseton, 7 p.m., at the Groton Area Arena. - Story compiled by ChatGPT







The state's export numbers mirror the U.S. as a whole, with Canada being the top importer of U.S. goods for several years.


Canada is also the top importer in 23 states, supplying the largest amount of grain, livestock, meat and poultry to the U.S., according to Visual Capitalist.

Scammers might contact you to offer you a "cheaper" Medicare but will need your personal information to sign you up. Don't fall for it.

They might impersonate a Medicare employee and say that your card is about to expire and you need a new one. They'll ask for your current card number and your personal information to verify it's really you. (Wrong: Medicare cards don't expire.)

Scammers might call and say that your Medicare benefits have been canceled, but claim they can help you get the benefits reinstated if you give them your personal information or even a fee. (Wrong: Medicare won't communicate with you that way, and if they need to contact you, it will be by mail.)

Thieves might try to claim that your old paper card isn't good now and that you need a new one with a chip in it, like a credit card. (Wrong: Medicare cards are only made of paper.)

They might offer you a refund of some type or something free, or you might be offered genetic testing. All you need to do, they'll say, is give them your Medicare card number ... and your bank information for the refund.

Whether you're contacted by phone, email or text message, don't give out your Medicare card number or any of your personal or financial information.

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Dear EarthTalk: What does USAID do for climate and environment and how will that change now if President Trump is allowed to dismantle the agency?

Proposed efforts by President Trump to dismantle the agency have raised concerns about the broader impact on global climate action, of which. USAID has played a crucial role.

USAID's Climate Strategy (2022-2030) outlines a plan for reducing emissions, enhancing resilience and promoting sustainable development across multiple sectors and regions. The agency has set ambitious goals, like helping partner countries avoid six billion metric tons of carbon emissions by 2030. Through targeted programs, USAID has helped countries transition toward renewable energy by funding solar and wind projects. Their efforts to prevent deforestation and promote reforestation have protected critical ecosystems, while climate-smart agriculture programs improve food security and help farmers adapt to changing weather. "Abnormal Electrical Signals"

Atrial fibrillation is probably a diagnosis you have heard of, if not because a friend or family member has it, because it has been mentioned in a public advertisement or pharmaceutical commercial.



Atrial fibrillation (or "A-fib") is the most common cardiac arrhythmia, a condition estimated by the American Heart Association to be present in more than five million Americans.

A-fib happens when abnormal electrical signals occurring throughout the cardiac atria (upper chambers of the heart) override the normal intrinsic electrical pacemaker. Sometimes this causes symptoms such as heart palpitations, dizziness, poor exercise tolerance, or heart failure. In many cases, however, patients have no symptoms at all. I can recall numerous instances of finding A-fib in a patient simply by listening to their heart on a routine exam and finding the heart rhythm to be irregular. The widespread use of smartwatches and other monitoring devices is alerting people to the possibility of A-fib with greater frequency.

Atrial fibrillation is diagnosed by an electrocardiogram (ECG) or a longer term heart rhythm monitor. When we find A-fib, we should look for any underlying causes such as heart valve problems, heart failure, and even thyroid disease. More frequently, A-fib does not have any single cause; it can occur for no particular reason, but a person's risk of it increases with numerous factors including obesity, heavy alcohol use, high blood pressure, sleep apnea, and of course advancing age. Treatment of atrial fibrillation has various options, which include medication to keep the heart from going too fast, medication to keep the heart in a normal rhythm, shocking the heart back into normal rhythm, or a catheter procedure to ablate the abnormally-firing portions of the cardiac tissue. Of utmost importance, because in A-fib the atrial chambers do not effectively pump and empty blood into the lower chambers with each heartbeat, blood pools in some areas and has the risk of forming clots. This is why patients with atrial fibrillation are at elevated risk of a stroke and why for many of those patients we recommend taking a blood thinner long-term. We have tools to estimate stroke risk in an individual patient, so the discussion of blood thinners is one you should have with your primary care provider or cardiologist. In summary, atrial fibrillation is a very common diagnosis, especially as patients get older. Our individualized approach to treatment focuses on control of symptoms and quality of life as well as reducing the risk of stroke.
