

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Toby Doeden makes the political establishment nervous. So what's his next move? BY STU WHITNEY South Dakota News Watch

ABERDEEN, S.D. – Toby Doeden was in Sioux Falls on April 9 when the Brown County Republican Party posted on Facebook about its Lincoln Day Dinner the following night, promising a "formal candidate announcement for statewide office."

Doeden, an Aberdeen businessman whose deep pockets and conservative activism have sparked speculation about a run for South Dakota governor in 2026, was the first person who came to mind for political enthusiasts.

"My phone started blowing up," said Doeden, who was scheduled to speak at the event. "I called (Brown County GOP chair) Rich Hilgemann and asked him what was going on."

It turned out that the post referred to a lower office, and even that announcement was called off at the last minute, removing some luster from the Lincoln Day gathering.

Still, tongues were wagging, a telling sign in South Dakota politics.

The fact that a social media message sent ripples of intrigue through the state Republican establishment shows how Doeden's influence has risen over the past 15 months amid the party's populist turn.

"He checks a lot of boxes for a candidate," said Carl Perry, a Republican state senator from Aberdeen who served as assistant majority leader in 2025 and was endorsed by Doeden. "He's an independent person who has done well financially and has a great family. I don't know if his ideas will be the ones that the people of South Dakota choose to support, but he's definitely going to get their attention."

Political newcomer means business

Some see Doeden's ascent as a sign of deteriorating public discourse, given his penchant for inflammatory rhetoric and hardball tactics.

Others view his profile as proof that outsiders can make an impact in an arena traditionally controlled by career politicians.

"He seems intent on being a major player," said Jon Schaff, a political science professor at Northern State University in Aberdeen. "That could be as a candidate or behind the scenes raising money and pushing a pugnacious agenda."

Doeden didn't commit either way during a recent interview with News Watch at his newly remodeled house and office on the rural outskirts of Aberdeen.

But he looked like a man who meant business, emboldened by the political tides in South Dakota and national tone-setting of President Donald Trump.

The property has the feel of a command center, with conference rooms and an office suite for Doeden, with plenty of front-facing windows so that he can "see people coming."

The 50-year-old Groton native also showed off a full-sized indoor court for basketball and

a populist wave after "liberal nonsense," as he calls it, "started leaking into South Dakota."

His politics are personality-driven, not policyfocused, though he talks of lower property taxes, limited government and parental choice for schools.

He uses new media to his advantage, bypassing traditional outlets with paid social media posts, video snippets and a podcast called "Unfiltered," in which he rails against the establishment with his newfound interest in public affairs.

"Up until two years ago," Doeden told News Watch, "I was literally the least political person that you've ever met."

His influence so far has been channeled through the self-funded Dakota First Action political action committee, boosting Republicans viewed as "patriots" or "solid conservatives" and berating "RINOs" (Republicans in Name Only).

The PAC took aim at mainstream Republicans during the 2024 primaries and helped defeat 14 incumbents, with Doeden spending more than \$77,000 on targeted text messaging and mailers for 17 candidates.

Those efforts helped swing legislative leadership to the party's right flank, buoyed by grassroots opposition to carbon pipelines and the state's plan to build a prison in rural Lincoln County.

"He was looking for candidates who were committed, Christian and conservative, as well as upholding landowners' rights," said Perry, who defeated Katie Washnok, president of Aberdeen Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, in the primary after Doeden dumped more than \$6,000 into the race.

The intraparty attacks, some of them mischaracterizing legislative votes or positions, rankled party traditionalists. Others noted the irony of Doeden calling people RINOs when his first vote in a Republican primary came in 2024.

"He's a very mad and angry person," said Lee Schoenbeck, a longtime GOP state senator who retired from office last year. "Mad and angry is not a public policy platform. It doesn't educate our children, create jobs or make our communities safer. He will need to set forth a policy platform that is more than just being mad and angry."

Different kind of change agent

Doeden has been open about his interest in running for statewide office in 2026 as part of a "conservative revolution" in South Dakota, if past misdeeds and establishment resistance don't impede his path.

He flirted briefly with a U.S. House run in 2024 before reversing course and forming Dakota First Action, using resources from his car dealerships and real estate holdings, a portfolio built without generational wealth or a college degree.

The Aberdeen Chrysler owner has ruffled feathers with frequent takedowns of Republican standard-bearers, saying that U.S. Rep. Dusty Johnson "acts like a liberal, talks like a liberal and, worst of all, votes like a liberal."

A campaign spokesperson for Johnson told News Watch that the congressman "has worked hard during President Trump's first 100 days to advance the Republican agenda of securing the border, getting tough on China and keeping men out of women's sports. South Dakota knows he's a conservative who gets things done. Toby peddles fear and anger. Luckily, there's a limited market for that in our state."

In speaking with News Watch, Doeden criticized the job performance of Gov. Larry Rhoden since taking office in February, citing that as a possible reason for Doeden to enter a high-profile gubernatorial race in the coming months.

Rhoden and Johnson are widely expected to be in that 2026 primary contest, possibly joined by Attorney General Marty Jackley and South Dakota Speaker of the House Jon Hansen, a fellow populist and property rights advocate.

"We're looking ahead to 2026 and trying to figure out where I can be most effective," said Doeden. "I've always been a fighter, and I don't get caught up in what everybody else is going to do."

pickleball, while a Polaris Ranger utility task vehicle sat waiting in the spacious driveway.

"Believe it not, we do have recreational activity around here," said Doeden, with a self-deprecating nod to his hulking physique, an extension of his days as a football player and shot put standout in high school.

'Mad and angry is not a public policy'

There is a Trumpian aspect to Doeden's methods.

He made waves in the business world before coming to politics as an outsider, latching onto



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Weekly Vikings Roundup

It's draft week! If you're familiar with my work, you know how much I love the NFL draft. To me, it's like Christmas, but instead of sitting around a tree and waiting to find out what gifts we'll get this year, we'll be sitting around a TV. Most years, it's pretty clear what direction the Vikings are going to go. Last year, for instance, we knew the team was going to take a QB, we just didn't know which one. This year, however, things feel different. There isn't one clear direction the team will go. So today, we take a look at what the "experts" are predicting the Vikings to do.

I looked at 10 different mock drafts from all the big companies. I went in expecting to find a variety of players for the Vikings, but that was not the case at all. In fact, out of the 10 mock drafts I reviewed, six of them had the same player, while a seventh had a different player but at the same position. Two of the mock drafts predicted the Vikings to trade out of the first round altogether. There was only a single mock draft that went against the grain.

Nick Emmanwori, a safety from Georgia, was far and away the most popular pick for the Minnesota Vikings, with 60% of the mock drafts connecting the player and team. And it makes sense, considering the Vikings lost a starting safety in free agency (Camryn Bynum to the Indianapolis Colts). The Vikings' other safety is Harrison Smith, and while I believe the Hitman should end up in the Hall of Fame when it's all said and done, he's getting up there in age. However, it's important to remember that the Vikings also have Josh Metellus who is technically a safety even if he plays every position on defense. The Vikings' safety group also includes Jay Ward, Theo Jackson, and recently signed Bubba Bolden, but none of those players have proven they have what it takes to be a starter in this league.

Nick Emmanwori was a linebacker in high school before moving to safety at South Carolina. He's fast, as evidenced by his 40-yard dash time at the NFL Combine (4.38 seconds). He's also built like a linebacker at 6'3", 220lbs. Put those two together, and you get an imposing safety with huge potential. Also, like Metellus, Emmanwori can be a run-stopping safety who plays in the box – and he's fast enough to be the deep coverage safety.

One mock draft had the Vikings taking a safety, this time however it was Malaki Starks from Georgia. A few years ago the Vikings took a safety from Georgia in the first round, and that player became one of the biggest busts in Vikings' history. And while they are two different players who just happen to play for the same team, it's hard not to compare Starks to former Vikings Lewis Cine. Both players are 6'1" and 200lbs, but Cine had a much better 40-yard dash time than Starks (4.37 vs 4.5). Ultimately I trust the coaching staff to bring in who they think will make an impact, drafting a slower Lewis Cine doesn't make me feel all

Kelly and Will Fries) to replace Garrett Bradbury and Ed Ingram. However, it's possible the Vikings want to 11 remake the entire interior offensive line by adding someone like Donovan Jackson to

> replace Blake Brandel. Out of the 10 mock drafts I reviewed, two of them had the Vikings moving out of the first round entirely and adding more draft capital. I wouldn't be surprised if the Vikings move down, but I'm not sure Vikings' General Manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah would move out of the first round altogether since first-round picks come with a fifth-year option, increasing the value of picking in the top 32. No matter what happens, though, I'm looking forward to watching the draft this week (the first round is Thursday evening, rounds two and three will be on Friday, and the last four rounds will be on Saturday). Skol!







HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT UP-DATE: Dirk Rogers, Highway Superintendent gave the Commission a Department Update. He shared that they are working on RAIF Culverts on the north side of Mina; B & B Contracting is installing them for the County. Dirk informed the Commission that they didn't receive any bids for the Elm Lake Bridge the second time around so D.O.T. is trying to figure out how to proceed and may tie it to another State project. He discussed the Sand Lake Bridge and setting a bid date at the April 22nd meeting along with discussing load limits. The bridge would be closed for the winter with completion in 2026. In addition to that the Highway Dept. is going to pave Co. 16 this year but not all the way up to bridge. Dirk informed the Commission that they are moving up the project on Co. 14. They are paving west of Mansfield. Once hot mix is ready, they will start asphalt patching. Dirk let them know that he is down a couple guys right now and Jerry & Mike started back at Weed & Pest this week; he shared how valuable those two employees are to him. They plan to start on the guard-Richmond Lake on May 5th rail at and the Dakota Street discussions are moving forward. Scott Meints, Emergency Management Director shared that he has been visiting with Dirk along with School & Public Lands regarding the Spillway project and planned detours . They don't have a detour plan, and no money set aside for detours either. Dirk plans to be reimbursed for taking care of detours and maintaining those roads. Two options will be Brookbrown Road (127th); highway dept. would plow snow but not do any dust proofing and the other option would be down to Co. 13. If you are interested in seeing the plans, you can look at the School and Public Lands website; will begin in 2026 and will be a 2-year project LOCAL EMERGENCY MANAGE-

MENT PERFORMANCE GRANT LEMPG) UPDATE: Scott Meints, Èmergency Management Director met with the Commission to share that they were notified that the LEMPG will be cutting another 35% of their funding. These funds are used towards their salary and benefits but not counted on when doing the budget process. They are cutting the exercise requirements at this time, but Scott stated they will continue to do the exercises. He also informed the Commission that the Homeland Security Funds are on hold at this to the inding being cut, Scott asked if the Commission wanted him to continue looking into a Mass Notification System. He did budget around \$15,000.00 for it this year. He shared that they are a couple other departments that may be interested in using the system so in the future they could pos-sibly share the cost. After some discussion, it was decided for Scott to pursue the project and see what he comes up with that would possibly work for other departments. Scott also said that he heard their may be FEMA cuts

but hasn't heard any more.

DISCUSS BURN BAN: Scott Meints, Emergency Management Director informed the Commission he has been getting calls from residents urging for the County to install a burn ban. Yes, it has been dry, but the fires have been grass fires, which are not from a controlled burn. Scott has talked to the Fire Chiefs, and they are OK with not implementing a Burn Ban. Commissioner Wiese shared that the County has an Ordinance in place that automatically implements a burn ban when the fire danger index reaches "very high" or "extreme fire danger" or 'fire weather watch" or "red flag warning" for any or all of Brown County. After more discussion it was decided not to implement a burn ban at this time, but to review the Ordinance and maybe make some adjustments, which could include a fine instead of a misdemeanor along with having a rule of thumb to check the fire index the day of plus up to two davs before.

"Spring is finally here"

Spring is finally here, and for many of us that brings the joy of returning to outdoor activities, planning summer vacations, and... well, allergies. Depending on the allergen, people can suffer from allergies any time of year, but spring is a particu-



larly common time in our part of the world to hear my patients complain of seasonal allergies.

Allergic rhinitis most commonly manifests as runny nose, congestion, and sneezing. Other symptoms can include cough from postnasal drip or worsening asthma, hives, and itchy or watery eyes. Sometimes these symptoms can be hard to differentiate from a viral cold, but typically the symptoms are fairly classic and don't require any testing.

I often have patients inquire about allergy testing. We might refer to an allergy specialist for testing in patients with severe symptoms that aren't adequately improved with usual care. Testing might include blood or skin patch testing depending on the situation or allergen in question. However, the vast majority of patients can be treated without specialized testing.

Initial recommended treatments for allergic rhinitis are available over-the-counter. Antihistamine medications can reduce many of the symptoms. I recommend using second generation medications such as loratadine, cetirizine, or fexofenadine, which act more specifically for the targeted symptoms. First generation antihistamines such as diphenhydramine or doxylamine are less specific and thus have more problems with adverse effects. Common side effects include dry mouth and drowsiness, but we can see those first generation antihistamines cause more severe adverse effects such as confusion. Another very effective option is an over-the-counter nasal steroid spray, such as fluticasone or various others. Taken daily these will reduce congestion, mucous, and post nasal drip. They are quite safe for long term use and should not have systemic side effects. Additionally, these can be used along with an antihistamine. Take care in the nasal spray aisle, however. Some other nasal sprays are vasoconstrictors, such as oxymetazoline, and while they will alleviate congestion, they should not be used more than three days consecutively. If so they can cause worsening congestion when the medication wears off, or a rebound effect. In summary, allergies can be a real annoyance and truly make people feel rotten. Basic over-the-counter measures can be very helpful and are worth trying. If those aren't working, though, time to talk to your primary care provider about other options or the need for further testing.
