Groton schools recognized in U.S. News rankings

Groton Area Schools have earned statewide and national recognition for academic excellence, with all three schools—elementary, middle, and high school—featured in U.S. News & World Report's latest rankings.

In the 2026 Best Elementary and Middle Schools report, Groton Area Elementary School ranked No. 69 of 209 South Dakota elementary schools, placing it among the top 40% statewide. Groton Area Middle School achieved an impressive No. 5 of 143 South Dakota middle schools, marking it as one of the top-performing middle schools in the state.

Middle and high school principal Shelby Edwards said the rankings are a reflection of hard work at every level.

"We're incredibly proud to see Groton Area Middle School recognized for its strong academic performance," Edwards said. "This acknowledgment reflects the hard work of our students, the dedication of our teachers and staff, and the unwavering support from our families and community. It's always rewarding to see those efforts validated at the state and national level."

The U.S. News rankings are based on performance in state assessments and how well schools prepare students for the next academic stage. For Edwards, the most important measure of success is readiness—not just for high school, but for life.

"The most important indicator of a successful middle school is how well it prepares students—academically, socially, and emotionally—for the challenges of high school and beyond," she said. "Building confidence, curiosity and a love of learning are just as important as test scores." Edwards said Groton's above-average reading and math results stem from a mix of high expectations, targeted instruction and community support.

Teachers use data to guide instruction, provide targeted support and celebrate growth," she said. "Groton has been known for its high academic rigor, and while we do not waver from that, our staff meet each student where they are and build from there."

At the elementary level, principal Brett Schwan said he's proud to see Groton Area Elementary recognized among the top performers in the state.

"Ranking No. 69 out of 209 schools is a meaningful acknowledgment of the hard work our students, staff and families put in every day," Schwan said. "It's always encouraging when outside measures reflect the strong learning culture we see in our building."

He noted that U.S. News evaluates elementary schools largely on state assessment data in English/language arts and math for grades three through five, along with growth and school climate measures. Based on recent results, approximately 69% of Groton Area Elementary students scored proficient in reading and 65% in math.

"These numbers highlight strengths and also guide us in the areas where we are continuing to grow," Schwan said. "However, test scores only tell part of our story. True success includes students who feel safe, supported and excited to learn; strong relationships between staff and students; and a positive school culture where families feel welcomed and involved."

Schwan said what makes Groton Area Elementary special is the people inside it.

"Our students are kind, curious and hardworking, and our teachers care deeply about building strong connections and meeting every child's needs," he said. "We are grateful for the support of our families and our community, and while we are proud of this recognition, we remain committed to continuous improvement."

Edwards agreed that beyond the data, Groton's greatest strength lies in its community.

"Groton Area Middle School is a place where students are known, supported and encouraged to grow in every area of life," she said. "The rankings are one reflection of success, but the daily learning, caring environment and sense of community are what truly make the Groton Area School District so special."

Earlier this year, U.S. News released its 2025–2026 Best High Schools rankings, in which Groton Area High School ranked No. 44 among South Dakota high schools (within the top 25 percent of 186 high schools in the state), No. 4 in the Aberdeen Metro Area—behind Warner, Central, and Ipswich—and No. 8,832 nationally out of more than 24,000 public high schools reviewed.

Elementary and middle school rankings are based entirely on publicly available data from the U.S. Department of Education, according to U.S. News & World Report. Data about grades taught, contact information and enrollment are from the U.S. Department of Education's Common Core of Data for 2023-2024. State assessment data was sourced from the Department of Education's EdFacts initiative. For the latest U.S. News rankings, mathematics assessment results from the 2022-2023 academic year and reading assessments from the 2021-2022 academic year were used.

At the high school level, enrollment, student ethnicity and other profile information came from the Common Core of Data from the U.S. Department of Education website. Statewide mathematics, reading and science assessment data used in the 2025-2026 rankings is from the 2022-2023 school year. High school graduation rate data is from the 2022-2023 school year.

Trump's Backhoe: A Metaphor for **Unconstitutional Demolition**

President Donald Trump's backhoe gouged, slashed and ultimately demolished the East Wing of White House last week, an unauthorized, illegal act and a metaphor for the way in which he has, since January 20, purported to rule, not govern, while shredding the constitutional provisions,

norms and laws that have well served this nation for more than two centuries.

The objection here is not to remodeling the East Wing, though sentiments, historic moments and traditions urge restraint. Indeed, previous presidents have made significant changes in that part of the White House where First Ladies conducted important business, hosted memorable receptions and advanced worthy causes. It was in the East Wing that Nancy Reagan launched her "Just Say No Campaign" to fighting drugs. Betty Ford called the East Wing the "heart" of the White House.

The objection, rather, is to Trump's disregard of laws that require the president to work in concert with various national planning agencies when remodeling the White House, a national treasure. But Trump's disdain for federal laws and regulations, like his consistent defiance of constitutional principles, procedures and processes, after nine months in office, it is painful to say, is "old" news. As a backhoe, he proceeds as he pleases, tearing down the oaths, structures and institutions that have confined executive power since George Washington was sworn into office. The "Take Care Clause" in Article II commands the president to "faithfully" execute the laws. For an authoritarian like Trump, however, who has asserted "absolute" power, constitutional commands, like constitutional limitations, are irrelevant.

Trump's authoritarian presidency has been emboldened by a feckless Republican-controlled Congress, eager to do his bidding, a willing participant in shredding enumeration of powers, separation of powers and checks and balances, complicit in its surrender of institutional dignity and integrity, and its own demise, resembling the self-humiliation of the ancient Roman Senate that ceded its power to the executive and marked the end to the Roman Republic. The president lacks constitutional authority to dissolve Congress, but the House of Representatives, under Speaker Mike Johnson, has essentially achieved the result by deciding to shut down "the People's House," retreating to the sidelines, aiding and abetting Trump's usurpation of foundational legislative powers, including authority over spending, appropriations, taxing and warmaking. It is no overstatement to say that Congress is a shell of the First Branch of government created by the framers of the Constitution.

The list of offenses grows daily. On October 27, the House Oversight Committee fulfilled another long-standing wish of President Trump when it sent a letter to Attorney General Pam Bondi, in which it concluded that the pardons granted by President Joe Biden, signed by autopen, had not been directed by the president and were, therefore, "void." This roadmap is clear: Biden's pardons are meaningless. Bondi will enjoy an open lane to prosecute Trump's "enemies," including members of the January 6 Committee, to whom Biden wisely granted preemptive pardons in anticipation of Trump's retribution campaign. It may well be that Trump's hatred of Biden stems less from the fact that he lost the 2020 election (Trump knows he lost) than the fact that the preemptive pardons, until now, have thwarted his prosecutorial revenge against committee members.

The theoretical removal of this roadblock rests on a slender reed, but it purports to provide Bondi with a green light to pursue those pardoned by Biden. The question of whether a pardon can be declared 'void" will be left to the courts. History teaches that there are only a few, exceptional, grounds for reversing a presidential pardon, but vitiation of a pardon could include fraud, bribery and the imposition of unconstitutional conditions, in the case of a "conditional pardon." This possibility requires further discussion, and though it seems far-fetched that a court would overturn pardons issued by Biden's autopen, who, among us, could have predicted that the Supreme Court would assert a doctrine that essentially clothes the president immunity from criminal prosecution?

The GOP-controlled Congress has long since abdicated its constitutional responsibilities, nourishing the entrenchment of an authoritarian administration that has no desire to continue the republican experiment launched in 1776. Indeed, Trump's own acts could be easily substituted for the colonists' grievances against King George III that they announced to the world in the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. The oversight committee has just furnished citizens with yet another grievance.





The Minnesota Vikings traveled to Detroit to try and tame the Lions. The last time these two teams met in Detroit was week 18 last season, with the number one seed on the line. Detroit dominated that game, and most people thought the same thing would happen this week. However, the Vikings were able to get the 27-24 win and move to 4-4 on the season.

J.J. McCarthy was finally healthy and in line to start just his third game since he was drafted in 2024, which was especially important with Carson Wentz going on IR due to a shoulder injury. Christian Darrisaw, Brian O'Neill, and Andrew Van Ginkel were also available for this game, meaning this is the healthiest the team has been this season.

The game started well for the Vikings, despite the Lions getting the ball first and marching down the field for a quick touchdown. The Vikings responded with a touchdown drive of their own, thanks in large part to

a 61-yard kick return by Myles Price, and finished off with a one-handed TD catch by Justin Jefferson. The Vikings' defense forced a Detroit punt, and the offense found the end zone again, this time a McCarthy pass to former Lion T.J. Hockenson to take a 14-7 lead.

After both teams traded punts, Detroit found the end zone again to tie the game. The Vikings answered with a field goal to retake the lead, and then the defense held the Lions to a three-and-out. The Vikings had a decent drive going on their next possession, but a McCarthy pass was thrown behind Jalen Nailor and intercepted. The Vikings' defense held strong, forced a punt, and the Vikings were able to go into halftime with a 17-14 lead.

The second half started sloppily for both teams. Three consecutive punts and then a Detroit fumble gave the ball to Minnesota at the Detroit 28-yard line, and five plays later, McCarthy scampered into the end zone to extend the lead to 24-14. Detroit kicked a field goal on its next possession, and the Vikings took a seven-point lead into the fourth quarter.

Following Detroit's field goal, Myles Price returned the kickoff all the way to the end zone, but the Vikings were called for a holding penalty, so the drive started at the 26. A Vikings' three-and-out gave the ball back to Detroit, who put together a 12-play drive, but their field goal attempt was blocked. The Vikings' next drive was a successful field goal, which extended the lead to 10 with three and a half minutes left in the game. The Lions weren't done, though, as they put together a TD drive in about a minute and a half. The Lions still had all three timeouts left, but a Vikings' first down sealed the game.

The NFC North is the most competitive division in football. The Packers, Lions, and Bears all have five wins, while the Vikings are only a game behind with a 4-4 record.

J.J. McCarthy completed 14 of 25 passes for 143 yards, two touchdowns, and one interception. Aaron Jones and Jordan Mason combined for 114 yards on 19 carries. Justin Jefferson led the team with six catches for 47 yards and a touchdown, while Jordan Addison added 48 yards on two catches.

Blake Cashman was all over the field on defense, racking up 14 total tackles. Another line-backer, Eric Wilson, led the team with two sacks, while Javon Hargrave, Jalen Redmond, and Levi Drake Rodriguez each had one apiece.

The player of the game was Eric Wilson. Besides his two sacks, he also had three tackles for a loss and two QB hits. Wilson was brought in to be a backup, but he's been playing so well the Vikings can't keep him off the field.

Looking ahead, the Vikings will host the Baltimore Ravens on Sunday (noon kickoff). The Ravens will be coming off a mini bye, since they played the Dolphins last Thursday, and their MVP-caliber QB will be back in the fold after missing a month because of injury. Despite their 3-5 record, expect the Ravens to be heavy favorites in this matchup.

Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers

The South Dakota Public Utilities Commission designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink's basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$31.04-\$41.50 per month and business services are \$51.25-\$59.50 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

CenturyLink participates in the Lifeline program, which makes residential telephone or qualifying broadband service more affordable to eligible low-income individuals and families. Eligible customers may qualify for Lifeline discounts of \$5.25/month for voice or bundled voice service or \$9.25/month for qualifying broadband or broadband bundles. Residents who live on federally recognized Tribal Lands may qualify for additional Tribal benefits if they participate in certain additional federal eligibility programs. The Lifeline discount is available for only one telephone or qualifying broadband service per household, which can be either a wireline or wireless service. Broadband speeds must be at least 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload to qualify.

A household is defined as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Services are not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in these programs. Consumers who willfully make false statements to obtain these discounts can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from these programs.

Groton City Council advances 2026 budget, addresses utility issues at municipal airport

By Elizabeth Varin

The Groton City Council discussed ongoing issues with bringing electric utilities to the municipal airport, approved the first reading of the city's 2026 budget ordinance and agreed to move forward with installing a swinging gate to block a section of road near the soccer fields during games.

At its last meeting, the City Council gave Darrell Hillestad approval to work with the city's electric department to get power out to the new building at the municipal airport.

However, Electric Utility Supervisor Todd Gay told the council Tuesday evening that it wouldn't be possible with the way the area is set up.

The building, which had previously served as the concession stand at the baseball/softball complex, was moved to a lot on the west side of the runway. The building and concrete foundation are 500 feet from the transformer out there, which is too far to run a line and get

About 250 to 300 feet is the maximum distance to run power to a building running 20 amps, Gay said. And with discussion of hangars being built out there that would need electricity, that line wouldn't be able to meet the demand.

"In my professional opinion, it's too far from the transformer that's sitting there," he said. Councilwoman Karyn Babcock asked what the city would need in order to run power out

"I feel like we need to accommodate what's coming," she said. "So, moving forward, how do we accommodate what's coming?"

Northern Electric Cooperative would be able to put in a transformer and line to the building, Gay said. However, it will cost the city around \$5,000 to put in the equipment, along with a monthly service fee.

Gay said it would be better to fill the trench and contact Northern Electric Cooperative to get on their schedule. ${
m ``I'}$ want it built the right way," he said. ${
m ``I'}$ just want what is best long term. That's it."

Hillestad asked if he could bury a line anyway as a trench has already been dug for it.

Gay asked the council if they wanted him to reach out to Northern Electric Cooperative to get the process going, to which the council said "yes."

Budget ordinance gets first approval

The city is one step closer to a finalized 2026 budget.

The council held its first reading of its 2026 appropriations ordinance, reviewing projects discussed throughout the last few months to select what should be funded for the coming year.

A handful of items have already been earmarked for different projects and equipment ordered, said Douglas Heinrich, city finance officer. However, some items are still up for discussion.

One of those items was adding radar signs on the highways in town. The total included in the budget document is from the higher end bid, and there may be grant funding available that would cut down the city's bill for it, he said.

Most of the budget requests were added to the "keep" list, but a new trailer for the electric department was removed from the budget ordinance.

"I think it's a good idea, but with all the expenses we have, putting it off for the year might be good," said Councilman Brian Bahr

Other projects that were kept in the budget totals include painting the exterior of City Hall (estimated \$20,000), replacement nets for the baseball/softball fields (estimated \$3,411), street resurfacing (estimated \$120,000), roof repairs (estimated \$100,000) and a new bucket truck (estimated \$261,000).

City moves forward on swinging gates at soccer fields

The council approved moving forward with a project to add swinging gates on West Third Avenue where the street intersects with Garfield Street as well as where it intersects with North Lincoln Street.

The gates will block the roadway when soccer games are played on the soccer fields.

Councilman Brian Bahr said the city already has the equipment. It might as well install it so the gates don't just rust.

The gates help with a safety issue, he said. If people are going to be using the bathrooms at the skating rink, there should be something there to block cars from the roadway.

The council approved having the city get quotes to complete the project.

The council also reviewed a proposal to convert a handful of narrow



lots along Second Avenue West into three larger lots. The proposal was approved at the city's Planning and Zoning Commission meeting in October. However, Public Works Coordinator and Street/Water Superintendent Terry Herron expressed concern about water lines running to the property.

Currently two lines run under Second Avenue West to the property. However, if the lots were to be developed, one more line would be needed, which would mean a portion of the roadway would have to be dug into.

Councilman Brian Bahr said that issue was not presented to the planning and zoning commission when it reviewed the proposal. He asked if there would be repercussions if the plat proposal was sent back to the planning commission.

"We'd hate to tear our nice streets up," he said.

The council tabled discussion about the proposal, with Bahr saying he would reach out to the planning commission president to discuss the issue.

- Electric Utility Supervisor Todd Gay reminded the council and community that the city's dual fuel ordinance is increasing as of this month. Customers who have the dual fuel meters will see an increase on their bill from \$10 per month to \$25 per month. Dual fuel refers to residences where heat is primarily from electric sources with a fossil fuel backup. This is the minimum charge so if a customer uses at least 460 KWH of electricity on that meter, they will not see the increase.
- Mayor Scott Hanlon told the council he had proclaimed November 3-9, 2025 as HOSA Future Health Professionals Week in the city to recognize and support the students, advisers and members of the Groton Area HOSA Chapter and to promote awareness of healthcare careers and the role these future professionals will play in the community.
- The city will begin accepting applications for skating rink employees. The first round of applications is set to be reviewed Dec. 2, and applications submitted after that will be reviewed on an as-needed basis.

"Listen to your gut"

People often talk about having a "gut feeling" or are told to "listen to their gut" when making a decision. Do you know what your gut is trying to tell you? There are multiple things that your digestive system can



do to get your attention. Do you know what your body is trying to tell you? Here are some of the things your gut could be trying to say.

Pain just below the breastbone that occurs soon after eating could be a sign of a stomach ulcer. Pain that improves with eating, but then comes back 2-3 hours after eating could be a sign of an ulcer in the small intestine right past the stomach. The pain from ulcers is often described as a burning pain. This pain improves with acid blocking medication like a PPI (Proton Pump Inhibitor) or antacids.

The gallbladder can also cause significant pain in the right upper part of the abdomen, especially after eating fatty foods. Often this pain will radiate to the right shoulder or between the shoulder blades. It can lead to significant nausea and diarrhea. This pain usually will come and go. It can become very severe if a small gallstone gets stuck in the bile duct between the gallbladder and the small intestine. Infections of the gallbladder can cause fevers and chills as well.

Issues with the small intestine can also cause serious pain. The condition of Irritable Bowel Syndrome (IBS) causes abdominal pain, bloating and changes in bowel movements. IBS can cause severe diarrhea, severe constipation or both. IBS is considered a diagnosis of exclusion since these symptoms can be caused by many other conditions like Microscopic Colitis, Celiac Disease, Crohn's Disease, Ulcerative Colitis, Small Intestine Bacterial Overgrowth, and even Colon Cancer.

However, it is important to note that not all pain in the stomach area is from the digestive system. Heart attacks can also give symptoms of indigestion, nausea, vomiting, and stomach pain. These subtle signs happen more frequently in women and can lead to delay in diagnosis. Aortic dissections or ruptured aortic aneurisms can also cause severe, tearing pain in the abdomen that can radiate to the back or shoulders.

If you notice your gut trying to tell you something, listen and get it checked out by a doctor. Many of these issues have similar or overlapping symptoms. Finding a physician who can order and interpret the right tests to find the answer is key. Your gut knows when something

is wrong, and you should trust it. Listen to your gut and stay healthy out there.
