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School board receives state budget update, virtual education programming

The Groton Area School Board traded its regular meeting room for a change of scenery Monday night, convening at the Hot Spot in Bristol — a location that sits along the eastern edge of the district.

With a full agenda, board members received an update on the governor’s proposed budget, heard about virtual education programming, scheduled the 2026 school board election, reviewed an early draft of the 2026-2027 school calendar.

Superintendent Joe Schwan updated the board on the governor’s proposed budget, which included no increase in state aid to K-12 public schools. School administrators have been told to expect a “lean” budget due to sluggish state revenue collection.

However, the governor’s December 4 budget address is only a recommended budget. A final budget will be debated and finalized by the state legislature during its session early next year.

Schwan also reviewed virtual education options. It comes as a handful of students have left the school for home schooling or other virtual options.

Some other districts have invested heavily in virtual education programs and have seen a growth in enrollment. It has come as Groton has seen a dip in enrollment, which impacts state aid funding the district receives.

The district would financially benefit (by about \$2,100-\$2,650 per year) for out-of-district students that choose to open-enroll into the district to complete a fully virtual program. The district also would lose about \$5,400 for each student that switches to open-enroll in another district.

Schwan told the board he wasn’t recommending any action Monday night as there is a lot of information to digest.

Board President Grant Rix agreed.

“There’s a lot of information,” he said. “It’s something we’re going to have to discuss over the next couple of months.”

The board took a step to decrease the cost of its upcoming election while setting dates for the 2026 school board election.

The district will hold an election for two seats on the board on June 2, 2026. However, the district approved cutting back on the number of precincts. In the past, precincts have been set up in Columbia, Andover, Bristol and Groton.

The board voted to only host a precinct at the high school, which is estimated to save about \$4,000. Absentee ballots will still be available.

- The board reviewed a preliminary 2026-2027 school year calendar. The first day of school would be August 19, 2026, and the last day of the school year would be May 17, 2027. However, the calendar has not been finalized.

- The board approved hiring Kyle Gerlach as the junior high boys basketball coach. The board also approved having Teagan Block as a volunteer wrestling coach.

- The board accepted the resignation of both Aubray Harry and Maddi Bjerke as cheer coach, effective at the end of the school year. Superintendent Schwan said they have both reached points in their lives where they’re busy and they want to walk away from the cheer coach position.

- Board members were hesitant about hiring a weight room supervisor, which could cost the district about \$2,000, after cutting back on voting precincts to save about \$4,000.

City brings in new contractor for hail-damaged roofs

After months of stalled progress on hail-damaged buildings, the Groton City Council approved hiring The Roofers of Hayti, S.D., to repair roofs on eleven city structures—replacing a contractor who received a \$45,000 deposit in February but later stopped responding.

The council also set salaries for 2026 and hired attendants for the skating rink at Tuesday's meeting.

Roof repairs have been in discussion since August, when Finance Officer Douglas Heinrich reported to the council that he had not been able to get in contact with Dakota Roofing about the roof repairs. The council had approved hiring the contractor in February, with work set to be completed in 2025.

The city went out to bid again on the project, and five sealed bids were opened in November.

- The Roofers bid roof repairs on eleven city buildings at \$109,482.24.

- All Over Roofing bid \$131,074.08 for all the work, with a 7% increase from 2024 to 2026.

- Five Star Roofing bid \$108,296.54 with bid bond included for a \$6,002 fee.

- Radiant Roofing bid \$177,151.49 for the work including full City Hall roof repair included.

- Ringneck Construction bid \$85,058.63 for roof repair on eight buildings or \$91,792.88 for that roof repair plus soffit/fascia work on the community center.

While the bid was approved with a unanimous vote, Mayor Scott Hanlon expressed some caution.

"We should be a little careful if we're giving money out, to protect ourselves," he said.

Finance Officer Heinrich said the winning contractor isn't going to require a 50% down payment until the city is in possession of the materials.

Council approves salary increases

After about an hour of closed session meeting, the council set city staff salaries for 2026.

Salaries for hourly and weekly staff increased by 3 percent as a cost-of-living increase. However, elected and appointed positions saw no salary increase.

The mayor will receive \$625 per month, and council members will receive \$3,000 per year as well as \$125 for special City Council meeting.

Board of equalization members (made up of City Council members) will receive \$200 per year.

Planning and zoning commissioners will receive \$35 per meeting and \$70 per special meeting.

Elected officials will also receive \$300 per full day of additional authorized meetings, and \$150 per half day of additional authorized meetings.

City staff salaries are set to adjust as follows:

- Finance Officer salary increasing from \$32 per hour in 2025 to \$32.96 in 2026
- Deputy Finance Officer salary increasing from \$30.28 per hour in 2025 to \$31.19 in 2026
- Assistant Finance Officer salary increasing from \$25.05 per hour in 2025 to \$25.80 in 2026
- Public Works Coordinator/Street and Water Superintendent salary increasing from \$38.69 per hour in 2025 to \$39.85 in 2026
- Wastewater Supervisor salary increasing from \$34.58 per hour in 2025 to \$35.62 in 2026
- Assistant Street Superintendent salary increasing from \$32.13 per hour in 2025 to \$33.09 in 2026
- Public Works Laborer salary increasing from \$31.35 per hour in 2025 to \$32.29 in 2026
- Technology Specialist salary increasing from \$33.84 per hour in 2025 to \$34.86 in 2026
- Electric Superintendent salary increasing from \$59.66 per hour in 2025 to \$61.45 in 2026
- Electric Lineman salary increasing from \$43.92 per hour in 2025 to \$45.24 in 2026
- Police Chief salary increasing from \$37.93 per hour in 2025 to \$39.07 in 2026
- Police Officer and Assistant Chief salary increasing from \$34.54 per hour in 2025 to \$35.58 in 2026
- Police Officer Level 1 salary increasing from \$32.28 per hour in 2025 to \$33.25 in 2026
- Police Officer Level 2 salary increasing from \$31.52 per hour in 2025 to \$32.47 in 2026

Other city staff news includes hiring staff for the ice skating rink.

The council voted to hire Leah Jones as manager for the rink at \$13.10 per hour with an additional \$250 per month for the manager position.

Others hired as attendants will receive \$11.85 per hour. Those hired include Abby Fjeldheim, Jamie Mitchek, Claire Schuelke, Sydney Locke, Addison Hoffman, Jordan Schwan, Tenley Frost and Sophia Flihs.

- Darrell Hillestad with the Groton airport reported recent upgrades made at the airport north of town. Electrical equipment and a septic tank have been added to the structure moved out to the airport earlier this year. Hillestad advised the council to look into insurance for the structure after the start of the new year.

- The council accepted a bid to purchase a city-owned hoist. Two bids were submitted, with Troy and Darin Zoellner having the winning bid at \$1,500.

Silent but Serious: How to Spot and Manage Gum Disease

Gum disease is one of the most common chronic health conditions in adults. For those 40 and older, it's also the leading cause of premature tooth loss. Unlike cavities, which often cause sensitivity or pain, gum disease is silent. Because the infection starts under the gums, you may not notice symptoms right away.

There are two types of gum disease: gingivitis and periodontitis. Gingivitis is an early, reversible infection of the gums caused by bacteria and hardened plaque (calculus). Once the bacteria and calculus are removed, the gums can return to their healthy state. Think of it like a sliver in your skin: once it's out, the redness and swelling go away.

Periodontitis is irreversible and develops when the infection reaches deeper structures: the gum tissue, the ligament holding the tooth, and the bone beneath. Over time, this leads to gum recession, loose teeth, and tooth loss if untreated. Signs include gum recession, teeth appearing longer, shifting teeth, or changes in your bite. These symptoms reflect permanent damage to the tooth's support system.

Because gum infections are deeper in the gingival pocket, they can go unnoticed. Signs of both gingivitis and periodontitis include red, swollen gums and bleeding when brushing or flossing. This is often called "pink in the sink." Other symptoms may include bad breath, a bad taste in the mouth, or irritated or "itchy" gums. If you notice these, it may be time to get your gums professionally evaluated. Most dental hygienists recommend a cleaning every six months, as that's when gingivitis commonly returns.

When periodontitis is diagnosed in a dental office, the first step is usually nonsurgical periodontal therapy. This involves scaling and root planing; a thorough cleaning to remove bacteria, plaque, and calculus. Dental hygienists will use special instruments, including ultrasonic scalers, to clean the roots of the teeth and allow the gums to heal. For advanced cases, they may even recommend laser treatment, localized antibiotics, and other adjuncts individualized for your needs. Patients with advanced disease may be referred to a specialist called a periodontist for surgical options to repair the damage that the infection has caused. This might include flap surgeries or bone grafting.

Home care is an essential part of managing both forms of gum diseases. Brushing twice a day with a soft-bristled toothbrush and cleaning between teeth is not just about preventing cavities, it's about the gums too. The infection starts in the gum pocket, so cleaning under the gumline is key. Interdental brushes and water flossers often outperform traditional floss at removing bacteria from the gingival pocket around the tooth.

Gum disease may be silent, but its effects are not. Periodontitis has lasting consequences not only for your smile but for your overall health. Fortunately, with early recognition and consistent care it can be managed effectively. If your gums bleed, your breath smells bad, or it's been more than a year since your last dental visit, now is the time to act. A healthy mouth is a vital part of a healthy body.

After losing four straight games and six of their last seven, the Minnesota Vikings returned home from a two-game road trip to face the Washington Commanders. With an anemic offense that didn't score a single point last week, the Vikings were looking to right the ship, and they did just that with a 31-0 win.

The Vikings won the coin toss and surprisingly elected to receive the ball to begin the game. Head coach Kevin O'Connell wanted to get the offense out there and start building some sort of momentum since they hadn't found the endzone since

November 16th. Leading up to the game, KOC mentioned he wanted to simplify things for J.J. McCarthy, and it showed immediately. McCarthy came out and led the Vikings on a 7-play, 61-yard touchdown drive to take an early 7-0 lead. The Commanders responded with a good drive of their own, but were unable to find the end zone, despite having 1st-and-goal from the four-yard line, and failed on a fourth-down attempt.

The Vikings, backed up to the two-yard line, put together an amazing 19-play, 98-yard touchdown drive that took over 12 minutes. It was the first 12-minute drive in the NFL in four years and the longest Vikings drive of the century. Both teams traded punts to end the second quarter, and the Vikings went into halftime with a 14-0 lead, their largest halftime lead since week three against the Bengals.

The Commanders got the ball to begin the second half and were moving the ball well, attempting to gain some momentum. However, on the 12th play of the drive, Andrew Van Ginkel intercepted Jayden Daniels (who was then injured on the play and wouldn't return to the game), and the Vikings turned the turnover into three points. On the Commanders' next drive, backup QB Marcus Mariota threw an interception to Harrison Smith. Four plays later, the Vikings found the end zone again to extend their lead to 24-0.

Wanting to put the nail in the coffin, the Vikings put together another TD drive early in the fourth quarter, making this a four-score game. With eight minutes left in the game, a Mariota fumble gave the ball back to Minnesota, who were able to eat up the rest of the clock to preserve the 31-0 win. The Vikings are 5-8 with four games remaining.

J.J. McCarthy put together the best game of his young career, completing 16 of 23 passes for 163 yards, three touchdowns, and, perhaps most importantly, zero turnovers. Aaron Jones Sr. and Jordan Mason combined for 128 yards and a touchdown on 25 carries. Jordan Addison led the team with four catches for 62 yards, Josh Oliver caught two touchdowns, and T.J. Hockenson had another.

The Vikings' defense had two sacks (Jalen Redmond and Eric Wilson), four tackles for a loss (Redmond x2, Wilson, and Byron Murphy Jr.), four pass deflections (Andrew Van Ginkel x2, Harrison Smith, and Jay Ward), three QB hits (Jonathan Allen x2 and Wilson), two interceptions (Van Ginkel and Smith), and one fumble recovery (Javon Hargrave).

The player of the game was J.J. McCarthy, who put together a good game from the first snap to the final kneel down. One game doesn't cover up the poor prior performances, and he'll need to prove that this game wasn't a fluke, but this was a good start.

Looking ahead, the Vikings will travel to Dallas to take on the Cowboys. It's a Sunday Night Football game, so kickoff will be at 7:20 pm.

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We the People

Stating the Importance of Restoring a Constitutional Presidency: What is the Why?

An insightful reader of this column, an exercise in civic education, recently suggested that readers may need to be persuaded of the importance to our nation of the restoration of a constitutional presidency. Why, indeed, should Americans rebuke the long rise, under both Democrats and Republicans, of Presidential Government, which is currently riding the rails of authoritarianism under Donald Trump, and embrace the concept of a chief executive, cabined by constitutional limitations, who will willingly comply with the metes and bounds of the office? In considering the essential "why?" behind this question, let's consider the impact of a rehabilitated presidency on the lives of Americans and the life of America.

For starters, the question is akin to asking about the value of the rule of law. In *Reid v. Covert* (1957), Justice Hugo Black gave voice to the first principle of American Constitutionalism: "The United States is entirely a creature of the Constitution. Its powers and authority have no other source. It can act only in accordance with all the limitations imposed by the Constitution." The principle that the government, including the president, has only those powers—express or implied—granted to it by the Constitution was an article of faith for the founders, and should be, I submit, a constant for every generation of American citizens.

Governmental subordination to the Constitution, what the framers regarded as the essence of the rule of law, is critical to a political system committed to government based on the "consent of the governed." That doctrine, indispensable to republicanism, declares, in the words of John Adams, principal author of the world's oldest constitution—the Massachusetts Constitution of 1780—and four other state constitutions drafted at the founding, "The people have a right to require of their magistrates an exact and constant observance" of the "fundamental principles of the Constitution."

The passage of time has disturbed neither the force nor the vitality of that requirement. If it were otherwise, it would be necessary to acknowledge that we have abandoned governance based on preestablished rules and embraced governance grounded on the whims of those who wield power. In the case of the presidency, this would result in government based, not on law, but on the will of the executive. "That might result in a benevolent despotism," Justice Benjamin Cardozo rightly observed, "if the judges," or presidents, for that matter, "were benevolent men." In any case, "it would put an end to the reign of law." And not merely an end to the rule of law, we should insist, but to republican principles as well.

"In a government of laws," Justice Louis Brandeis justly cautioned, "existence of the government will be imperiled if it fails to observe the law scrupulously." It is for this reason, as James Madison pointed out, that "it is our duty to take care that the powers of the Constitution be preserved entire to every department Government; the breach of the Constitution in one point, will facilitate the breach in another."

While achievement of the rule of law more than occasionally escapes our grasp, owing largely to the interests of those who exercise power, it is worthy of our effort and admiration, as victims of Auschwitz and Buchenwald would attest. The rule of law maintains the principle of limited government, promises to thwart arbitrariness, pledges government conduct in accord with known laws and procedures, applies brakes to unlimited discretion and power, provides

a sense of certainty and predictability, and fulfills the will of the people, as manifested in their ratification of the Constitution. In practice, the rule of law means that government officials may not undertake acts that are prohibited by the Constitution.

The virtues of the rule of law apply with equal force to the presidency. A lawless presidency would be accountable, not to known rules and laws, but only to the president's ego, which would unleash a parade of horrors. Such a president might unilaterally take Americans to war, risking the blood and treasure of the nation for meritless causes, grant self-serving pardons, arbitrarily order troops to the streets, violate with impunity the Bill of Rights, and order the arrest of citizens without concern for due process of law. By slipping the chains of the Constitution, such a president could destroy the principle of government by consent of the people. A constitutional presidency is far more appealing.

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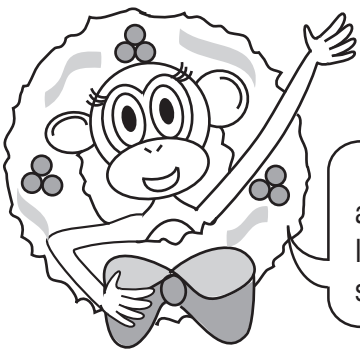

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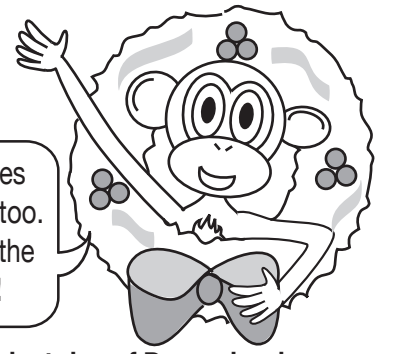

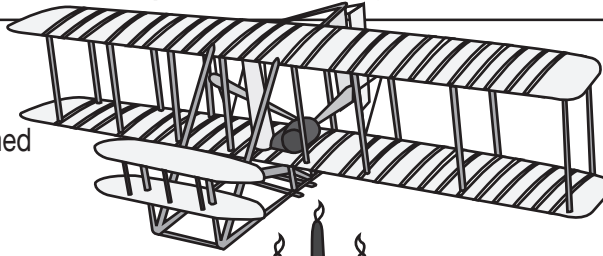


December Days

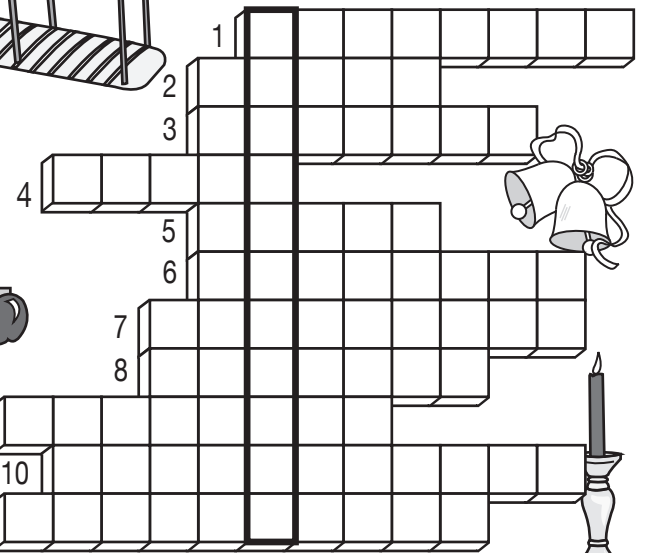

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Sand Mining Wreaks Havoc On Marine Ecosystems

Dear EarthTalk: What is "sand mining" and why is it bad for the environment?

Sand mining, extracting sand from the earth, is the second most widespread human activity in marine environments, after fishing. Sand and gravel are the most extracted materials across the globe. According to the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), the dredging industry removes six million tons of sand from marine settings around the world each year.

Sand is typically extracted from where it's most abundant: aquatic areas, like ocean floors. Once mined, it is incorporated into concrete, glass, electronics and asphalt, which are then used to construct buildings and houses. Although sand has many important roles in human development, it is also important for the health of ecosystems. "This resource is often seen as an inert, abundant material, but in reality it is an essential resource that shapes coastal and marine ecosystems, protects shorelines and sustains ecosystems and livelihoods," says Aurora Torres, a biodiversity researcher at Spain's University of Alicante.

Removing sand in large amounts has negative effects on the environment. The process of dredging harms aquatic habitats by altering natural seagrass and coral while clouding the water. Sand mining has also been connected to the spread of invasive species, changes in wave patterns and coastal erosion. These issues are becoming increasingly prevalent. "Without new thinking, the sands of time will run out," says Beatrice Kariuki, a Kenyan spoken word poet, in a video released by UNEP.

There are solutions to this growing threat. The sand mining industry is not regulated in many areas, so increasing government oversight is one avenue. Also, construction companies can use other materials. In Singapore, recycled glass is replacing sand in 3D-printed concrete. Limiting the amount of sand removed at one time is the most sustainable option since the sand will naturally replenish. "Keeping sand in the rivers is the best adaptation to climate change," says Marc Goichoit, a leader at the World Wide Fund for Nature. "If a river delta receives enough sediment, it builds itself above sea level in a natural reaction."

Sand mining is projected to continue at its current unsustainable rate unless people across the globe take action. One way to get involved is to petition your local legislature for governmental action, like creating restrictions and regulations on the industry. Also, stay informed on sand mining from sources such as the Marine Sand Watch, a data platform that monitors and tracks dredging activities across the globe..

While this was Goodall's most well-known work, it was not her last. After receiving her Ph.d, Goodall continued to advocate for wildlife protection and conservation of endangered habitats. As a researcher, Goodall left her legacy on challenging the idea of human uniqueness. Her youth empowerment, reforestation and activism also inspired multiple generations to come together for conservation.
