Nearly all of the funds have been raised for the new playground equipment at the city park. The council voted Monday night to go ahead and purchase the equipment. The city has received a grant for half of the cost of the \$24,000 project. The Groton Community Foundation has donated \$3,000, Clark Engineering has donated \$2,500, the Groton Kiwanis Club has donated \$2,000, Emmanuel Lutheran Church's Walk-A-Thon donated \$1,200, the United Methodist Church fundraiser from the Band Festival raised \$400, other donations have amounted to \$3,000 and the Groton Dairy Queen is planning a fundraising day with the help of volunteer workers during the event.

City employees and volunteers will help to erect the equipment and it will have a wood grain bedding under the playground equipment.



Ninth Avenue residents express concerns on Safe Route to School

A number of Ninth Avenue residents came before the council Monday night to express their concerns about the Safe Route to School sidewalk planned for Ninth Avenue. Those present were Jan Dedrickson, JJ Jenkins, Rose Waage, Brenda and Brad Waage, Carolyn and Robert Snyder, Aloise and Gene Brolin and not pictured is Richard Kolker. Around the council table starting at left and going right are Mary Fliehs, Eddy Opp, Mayor Scott Hanlon, Finance Officer Anita Lowary, Clare Brotherton, Michelle Muilenberg and Gary Heitmann.

The residents at the meeting expressed concern that Ninth Avenue is too narrow of street to have a sidewalk. Jenkins said for the summer OST program, they could walk north on First Street and then east on 10th Avenue coming out where the four-way stop light already exists. "From what I understand, the late Mayor (Roy Olson) wanted it on 10th Avenue.

There is no boulevard on the north side and only four to four and one-half feet of boulevard on the south side—not enough for a sidewalk with the existing driveways and garages. "We're not against it," said Rose Waage. "Our Avenue is just a smaller street."

There was also some discussion about making Ninth Avenue a one-way street which would allow putting the sidewalk in part of the street. Robert Snyder said that there needs to be more patrolling of that intersection. "Someone is going to get clobbered there one of these days," he said. Mayor Scott Hanlon said, "The kids don't obey the traffic laws and that the education needs to start at home."

The South Dakota Department of Transportation has not approved any plans for the route and construction is not expected to begin until sometime in 2015.

"We'll keep you informed of what's going on," Hanlon told the crowd as they left.

Schaller named South Dakota Wendy's Heisman Winner

"State Winners are exceptional examples of well-rounded students who excel academically, lead and serve others with the passion and persistence of a Heisman winner," said Archie Griffin, two-time collegiate Heisman Trophy winner. National Finalists will be featured during a televised ceremony on ESPN® networks and will receive gold medals and \$2,000 awards for their high schools. One male and one female National Winner will each receive a crystal Wendy's High School Heisman trophy, a \$500 Wendy's gift card, and a donation from Wendy's in the amount of \$10,000 to their respective high school. Additionally, the winners will be recognized during the collegiate Heisman Trophy announcement on December 14.



This is a history article for November from the South Dakota Historical Society Foundation, which is the nonprofit fundraising partner of the South Dakota State Historical Society. As a salute to veterans on Veterans Day, the article is about Grigsby's Cowboys, men who volunteered to serve their country in the Spanish-American War. The South Dakota State Historical Society — Archives photo is of Col. Melvin Grigsby. Grigsby (1845-1917) was born in Wisconsin and served in the Civil War. He was a prisoner of war at Andersonville. He was a member of the territorial council of 1887 and served as South Dakota's attorney general from 1897-1899.



The Fighting Cowboys of Col. Melvin Grigsby

Cowboys can ride and fight. So thought Melvin Grigsby.

Grigsby was South Dakota's attorney general and the law partner of U.S. Sen. Richard Pettigrew in Sioux Falls. When the United States entered into war with Spain in April 1898 over Cuba securing its freedom from Spanish rule, Grigsby was one of several people who proposed that volunteer regiments of cowboys be organized to fight the war.

"During the month of January, 1898, and the early part of February, and while I was at Pierre, S.D., attending to my duties as attorney general, there was much war talk. Pierre, as you know, is a great center for the cattle interests of the West and a place where the cowboys often congregate. It was while watching these cowboys ride their bronchos in the streets of Pierre that the idea first came to me that these rough and bronzed riders of the plains, used to camp life in all kinds of weather, and expert shots with rifle and revolver, would make gallant soldiers and daring fighters, in case the government should be drawn into war with Spain and need volunteers to be sent to Cuba. I found upon talking with a number of them that such service would be eagerly sought by them in case they were needed," Grigsby wrote in a letter to Otto L. Sues contained in Sues' book "Grigsby's Cowboys."

Congress passed a measure that authorized three cavalry regiments known as the First, Second and Third U.S. Volunteer Cavalry Regiments. Theodore Roosevelt was named commander of the First Regiment, Judge Jay L. Torrey of Wyoming commander of the Second

Regiment, and Grigsby commander of the Third.

Recently commissioned as a colonel, Grigsby received orders to break his regiment into 12 troops, with five coming from South Dakota, four from Montana, two from North Dakota and one from Nebraska. Grigsby appointed five captains in South Dakota to recruit and organize the individual troops. They were Seth Bullock of Deadwood to lead Troop A, John Foster of Chamberlain to lead Troop B, George Hair of Belle Fourche to lead Troop C, John Hammond of Sturgis to lead Troop D and Joseph Binder of Pierre to lead Troop E. An editorial in the Chattanooga Times on July 9, 1898, stated "Grigsby's Rough Riders are showing themselves superior in every respect, and are becoming familiarly

known as the crack regiment of the Park."

a regiment from Wisconsin wanted to disrupt a Salvation Army meeting.

"The cowboys may be a tough set, but they propose to have peace even if they have to fight for it," stated the June 22, 1898 article.

Of the three volunteer cavalry regiments, only the first fought in the Spanish-American War. While the Roosevelt Rough Riders were fighting in Cuba, Grigsby's Cowboys were battling disease in Georgia. The second regiment trained at Jacksonville, Fla., during the war.

The first casualty in Grigsby's Cowboys occurred on June 13, 1898, when Herbert Lawrence of Troop E died of typhoid fever. According to Sues, about 20 of Grigsby's cowboys died of typhoid fever, dysentery, spinal meningitis, an accidental gunshot wound and other causes while at Camp Thomas or later from diseases contracted at the camp.

Although rumors abounded in camp that the cowboys would be sent to Cuba, those orders never came. On Aug. 10, 1898, it became known that Spain had given up the war and that hostilities were ceased.

"Thus did we see every hope of active service" vanish," Sues wrote.

On Sept. 5, 1898, Grigsby gave his last orders and delivered a farewell message to his men. He said, "Although it is a great disappointment to all of us that we were not permitted to form a part of the line of battle at the front, it cannot be said of the 'Cowboy Regiment' – either officers or men – that they did not do everything possible, not only to get ready at the earliest possible moment for active service, but also to induce those in authority to select this regiment as a part of the army of invasion.

`It has been well and justly said by President McKinley that those soldiers who tendered their lives to the country and performed uncomplainingly their duties in camps of instruction, under conditions most unfavorable to health and comfort are deserving of as much credit Grigsby's Cowboys, as the Third U.S. Cavalry as those who were chosen to go against the

Then after all that, we went shopping for winter wear.


























Groton's volleyball team advances to region championship semifinals

Groton Area, Sisseton and Aberdeen Roncalli all won first round matches at the Region 1A Volleyball Tournament being played in Britton. The host team, Britton-Hecla, had a first round bye as they are the top seeded team in the tournament.

Aberdeen Roncalli defeated Tiospa Zina, 25-15, 25-11 and 25-12.

Sisseton defeated Milbank, 25-18, 25-15 and 25-10.

Groton Area defeated Webster Area, 26-24, 25-17 and 25-23.

Webster Area jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the first game. Groton came back to tie the game at three and five before taking a 7-5 lead as Kylie Hawkins got a kill.

Groton got a rally going as a Webster serve went into the net, Josie Doeden had a block to score, Skyler Bonn had an ace serve and Camille Sippel added a kill as Groton took a 14-9 lead.

The Lady Tigers held a 16-11 lead before Webster Area started to rally.

"Volleyball has a lot of momentum shifts," said Coach Aaron Helvig. "It's like a roller coaster. It's up and down. The team that has fewer ups and downs is the one that's going to win. If you can be even keel through the bad times you can go get it done."

Webster's next three out of four points were given to them as the Tigers hit the ball out of bounds with Breanna Bullert having one ace serve. The Bearcats drew to within one at 16-15 when Groton called time out.

The game was tied at 16, 17 and 19 before Groton took a 21-19 lead and Webster called time out. Groton got to 24-20, but couldn't get that last point. The next two points were given by Groton and Lindsey Vogl got an ace serve to make it 24-23. Groton called time out, but Webster tied the game with the help of a Groton miscue. Josie Doeden had a kill to give Groton a 25-24 lead and Kylie Hawkins got a kill to give Groton the 26-24 win.

"Volleyball is a unique sport," Helvig said. "It's a lot of momentum and how you're feeling that day. It's not necessarily just skill. I would say volleyball is 90 percent mental and 10 percent physical. It's a very mental sport and that's when you need the teammates to support each other."

Groton scored first in the second game, but Webster scored the next five points to take a 5-1 lead. Groton eventually tied the game at seven and took a 9-7 lead with a Halle Dohman





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tip over. Dohman got another hit later on that bounced off of a Webster player and Courtney Kurtz had a reverse tip over to give Groton a 12-9 lead.

Webster came to within two, 16-14, but Camille Sippel and Josie Doeden each had a kill and Webster had one serve into the net as Groton took a 19-14 lead. Doeden had a pair of back-to-back kills as Groton took a 22-16 lead. Nikki Koehler had an ace serve after a Webster time out, but her next serve went into the net. Webster returned the favored with a net serve. Kasey Waage had the last serve and Webster ended up hitting the ball out of bounds as Groton won the second game, 25-17.

"I told the girls during the break of the second and third game that we're taking their power away—they're big hitter," Helvig said. "We're not letting them get good passes to set her up. We were taking their element that they wanted away from them for the most part."

Groton jumped out to a 4-0 lead in the third game and a Doeden kill gave Groton an 8-3 lead when Webster called time out. The Lady Tigers increased its lead to 11-4 and upped it to 17-8. Webster scored six straight points to close to within three, 17-14. Sippel broke the cold spell with a kill, but Webster continued its rally and took a 19-18 lead. Groton called time out.

"We had talked that we can't get down on each other," Helvig said. "We have to play hard and keep our heads up. The girls actually brought this up during the time out. You're

suppose to be there to pick up your teammates and how we have to support each other when things aren't going well. It's easy to see the negative side and it's a lot harder to pick your partner up, to pick your team up and get going and turn things around."

Regan Lewandowski had a tip over to tie the game and Doeden followed with a kill as Groton recaptured the lead, 20-19. Groton gave Webster a point with a net serve. Marisa Keller's serve for Webster was out of bounds and Hawkins had a block as Groton took a 22-20. Webster called time out.

Groton got to 24-21, but the Tigers had two miscues as it got to 24-23. Hawkins had a kill and it was touched by a Webster player as it went out of bounds to give Groton the

"It's always tough when you have the lead like that to really press and finish the match." Helvig said. "It's hard to keep the pressure on that long, to get that concentration and focus, but we did and they did a good job.


