Optional make-up days, moving graduation to a Saturday is discussed for 2014-15 school year The proposed 2014-15 school calendar was discussed. Superintendent Joe Schwan ex-

plained a few changes on the calendar. The first day of school is set for August 21 with the last day set at May 15. He noted there was no empty day between the fall in-service and the first day of school. He also noted that the elementary Christmas concert is set for the last day of school in 2014 on December 19. He said that they would keep an eye on the weather and if it looks bad for that Friday, they may move it up.

Board member Marty Weismantel suggested that President's Day and Easter Monday could be considered optional make-up days instead of attaching them at the end of the school year. It was noted though that there would be a long stretch in January through March with no days off for the faculty. Merle Harder brought up that perhaps graduation could be done on a Saturday instead of Sunday. Schwan is going to check on the athletic calendar to see if there were any Saturdays open.

Harder mentioned that there needs to be some improvements at the bus barns and that it needs to be added to the Capital Outlay budget for next year.

The GRASP OST Payment Policy was discussed and will be approved through its addition in the school policy handbook. One thing of note is that when a family balance drops below a negative \$100, OST services will be denied until such a time when a satisfactory payment plan has been established between the family and the OST director. The rate is \$2.50 per hour per child with reduced rates for multiple children from the same family.

Schwan said he will be meeting with the Groton City Council on Tuesday, Feb. 18, 8 p.m., to discuss the option of having the police department stationed at the high school.

Middle/High School Principal Anna Schwan reported on the fact that Joellen Gonsoir is a national semi-finalist in the Ronald Reagan Scholarship competition. It is based on leader-ship and integrity and if selected as a finalist, she will be interviewed over the telephone. Up to \$10,000 for four years is at stake.

The 147th Army Band Concert will be held February 12 starting at 9:30 a.m. It is open to the public and will be held in the GHS Gym.

The fee for the 2014 Driver's Education will remain at \$250.

Anna Schwan proposed adding a business program at GHS. It would include Accounting for grades 10-12, Business Law for grades 11-12, Introduction to Business for grades 9-12, and an extra-curricular program entitled, "Future Business Leaders of America." She proposed to having it start with the 2014-15 school year. Schwan said, "I'm a huge proponent for it and it would be a great asset to our school." Without hesitation, the board gave the okay for the program. Superintendent Schwan said with all of the resignations and retirements, by adding this to the curriculum would not affect the number of teachers the district will have. Mr. Schwan said there would be a shuffling of classes and instructors to make it work.

Groton girls avenge earlier loss to Roncalli

It was another intense, crowd-pleasing home game for the Groton Area Tigers as this time, the Lady Tigers beat Aberdeen Roncalli, 52-38. It was the third lowest scoring game for Roncalli this year.

"I told the girls we're not going to play as bad as we did the first time we played them," said Coach Shaun Wanner. "The first time we just got out hustled and we didn't rebound very well. And I thought if we did those two things a little bit better, we're going to win." Groton controlled the boards, 31-21.

The non-conference win will boost Groton's standing in the regional standings, edging ever so closer to that number one seed, which is where Groton has been for the past several weeks. Roncalli is now 11-5 on the season while Groton goes to 15-3. Right now, the number two seeded team is Milbank followed by Webster at number three.

A huge test is happening on Friday where the Northeast Conference Championship will be at stake. Groton, Hamlin and Clark-Willow Lake each have one loss in the conference race. "At this time of year, your experienced basketball players and junior and seniors need to perform and that's what it takes," Wanner said. "I remind them a lot about that. This game gives us extra confidence going into Friday's game. Hamlin is like Roncalli. They are not very big. They have some girls that can defend. Roncalli lost to Hamlin down there by three points. Of all the surprise teams, that is Hamlin. Their coach has them playing well."

The game was tied twice in the first quarter with Roncalli get the early lead, but the Tigers went on a five-point scoring run and took a 7-2 lead with the help of a three-pointer by

Cheyenne Schaller. The Cavaliers quickly came back to tie it at seven, but Courtney Kurtz responded with a three-pointer of her own to keep the Tigers ahead and Groton took a 13-12 lead into the second quarter.

The game was tied at 15 and 17 and there were two more lead changes before the momentum switched to Groton. Groton scored the last seven points of the second quarter to take a 24-17 lead at halftime. Kurtz picked up her third foul with 2:05 left in the first half. "We switched a few things defensively in the second half," Wanner said. "I put Courtney on the (Kate) Heintzman girl and flip flopped Camille over to (Paige) Sommers. So that really helped us a lot."

Roncalli never threatened in the second half. Sippel and Kurtz each had a three-pointer to keep the Tigers on top at the end of the third quarter, 36-23. "Offensively, we converted when we needed too," Wanner said. "We played the pace of the game to the way we wanted too. We did an excellent job on the execution on the offensive side. We put up 52 points against a good defensive team. Roncalli likes to play fast. I thought we controlled the pace of the game, especially in the second half. We held them to 38 points."

Groton opened up a 15-point lead in the fourth quarter and went on to win by 14, 52-38.

After a long stretch of playing on the road, the Lady Tigers will be playing at home all the way up to state. Groton hosts Hamlin on Friday, Britton-Hecla on February 20th and the regions starting February 25.

Three players hit double figures for the Lady Tigers with Courtney Kurtz leading the way with 19 points followed by Camille Sippel with the final play. Carly wheeting made 17, Carly Wheeting with 10, Kylie Hawkins four and Tori Bjerke two.

Groton made 32 percent of its field goals, making 12 of 28 shots. Sippel and Kurtz each made two three-pointers. The same two girls

shined from the line, making and attempting all of Groton's free throws. They made 16 of 22 free throws for 73 percent. "That was big for us," Wanner said. Kylie Hawkins had eight rebounds while Kurtz had seven and Sippel and Wheeting each had five. Groton had six steals as the Cavaliers threw the ball away six more times on their own. Sippel and Hawkins each had two steals. Groton had five assists with Kurtz and Wheeting each having two. Groton turned the ball over only three times on their own as the Cavaliers had nine steals. Groton had 16 fouls with Wheeting having four.

It was Roncalli's starting five that scored all but two points. Paige Sommers had 10 with six of those coming from the charity stripe. Harley Kline and Emily ohle each had nine, Kate Heintzman had five, MiKayla Malsam had three and Abby Vogel added two points.

The Cavaliers made 31 percent of its field goals and was four of 10 in three-pointers. Roncalli made 11 of 17 free throws, had 22 fouls, nine steals and nine assists.

Groton won the junior varsity game, 31-14. Marlee Jones had 10 points, Katie Koehler seven, Audrey Wanner six, Emily Locke five, Rachel Blackmun two and Tori Bjerke added one free throw.



If you would have told me before the game that those two kids would score 12 points, I would have said that we would win by 15.'

Rielly Ell stole the show in the first half. > Reilly Ell led Groton in scoring with 18 points followed by Wyatt Lone with 10, Mason Madsen and Kasey Kurtz each had six, Kyler Ell had five and Spencer Knecht and Lucas Sternhagen each had four points.

> No one hit double figures for Sisseton as Jordan Cornelius and Dominic White each had eight points, Ethan Kranhold had seven, Hunter Medenwald six, Brayden Tasa five and Wyatt Youngblom had four points.

> Groton had the hotter hand, making 49 percent of its field goals while Sisseton made 37 percent.




