

Moving Police Station not an option, but discussion to continue on safety

Moving the police department to the school may not seem like a good idea, but the discussion of how to make the schools safer will continue.

Superintendent Joe Schwan and School Board President Dorene Nelson, along with officers Stacy Mayou and David Hunter, had a discussion with the city council Monday night.

Schwan asked what can be done to help increase security in the schools. City Attorney Drew Johnson explained how the program works in Aberdeen between the Aberdeen Police Department and Aberdeen Central School.

Councilman Michelle Muilenberg said, "As a mom, I applaud the city and the school for thinking out of the box and putting our children's safety first." Schwan said that he is grateful when the officers walk through the school. "They are always welcome to come," he said. Mayor Scott Hanlon said, "At least we're talking." Police Chief Stacy Mayou said, "We can do more researching and try to get more ideas. Maybe we can come up with something that will work for everyone."

The old south substation transformer has been sold to Northwest Energy for \$56,000. They have a need for it in Montana and will be picking it up within the next 10 days.

In 2013, the city has transferred \$100,000 from the water fund, \$820,000 from the electric fund and \$101,000 from the sewer fund to help pay for the street repairs in 2013.

Kim Weber and friends are collecting funds for playground equipment at the pool and would like something for the 2-year-old to 5-year-olds. "It would be wonderful if they could raise the funds," Muilenberg said. Weber has the Sunday School kids at the Methodist Church bringing in donations for the playground as a starter.

The bids were opened for the 2014 street resurfacing project. Street Superintendent Terry Herron had an estimate cost of the project at \$104,699. The low bid came in from Top Coat, Yankton, for \$104,896.64 and was accepted. Five bids were submitted.

The baseball advisory committee was appointed: Kathy Bjerke, Merle Harder, Bary Keith, Mitchell Locke, Kevin Pharis, Brian Schuring and Craig Sternhagen.

The pool and baseball fees for 2014 were tabled until the respective committees can bring back suggestions.

Approximately 60 letters will be sent out to regular delinquent utility customers. The letter will state that they need to get on a payment plan. Failure to get on a payment plan or get current by April 1 will have their electric meter disconnected by May 1. The council agreed to the plan.

Big oil wants to cut ethanol production. The EPA wants to cut back on ethanol and Hanlon said he had notified Johnson, Thune and Noem expressing that Poet is a big part of our community and hope that EPA will reconsider this cutback.



Lady Tigers now just 1 game away from NEC Title

Hamlin found itself flat-footed and quickly found out that the Northeast Conference title was slipping out of its hands and into the hands of the Groton Area Tigers. It was midway in the first quarter before the Lady Chargers managed to make a field goal. The Lady Tigers were quick and aggressive on the boards and by the end of the first quarter, Groton had taken a 15-8 lead.

"We executed well in the first half," said Coach Shaun Wanner. "This win should sew up the number one seed in the region for us."

Camille Sippel and Carly Wheeting were the forces behind all of the scoring for Groton in the second period as Groton upped its lead to 14 at half time, 29-15.

The Lady Tigers upped its lead to 16 in the third quarter, 34-18, and lead by 12 at the end of the break, 38-26.

"They (Hamlin) matched up well with us," Wanner said. "They're quick and they will get after you. They were 11-5 coming into this game and they've had only one bad loss. The other four losses were by four points or less."

There was a sense of desperation by Hamlin in the fourth quarter as the Chargers picked up the pace and became more aggressive at hoop. With 2:16 left in the game, Hamlin had cut the lead to six, 42-36. "It looked like we were a little tired in the fourth quarter," Wanner said. Alicia West hit a three-pointer with 10 seconds left to make it a two-point game, 46-44. Sippel was fouled with five seconds left, but this time, she made both free throws to put the game out of reach, 48-44.

The win puts Groton just one game away from securing at least a share of the Northeast Conference title. The Lady Tigers host Britton-Hecla on Thursday. The

Braves pulled out a surprise overtime win over Aberdeen Roncalli, 51-44, Saturday night.

"There were two things that would pull out through this game," Wanner said. "Team work and just playing smart. Our free throws have been carrying us down the stretch. We were 12 of 17 and that's a big part."

Camille Sippel made four of six free throws in the fourth quarter led the Lady Tigers in scoring with 18 points. Carly Wheeting had a double feature night with 15 points and 11 rebounds as she made seven of eight field goals. Courtney Kurtz had 10 points while Tori Bjerke and Halle Dohman each had two and Kylie Hawkins had one free throw. The Lady Tigers were unable to make any of the seven attempted three-pointers. The Tigers were 18 of 23 in two-pointers for a sizzling 78 percent. The Lady Tigers had 22 rebounds, six steals with Kurtz having two, nine assists with Kurtz having three, and 14 personal fouls which allowed the Chargers to make five of 10 free throws. Groton had 13 turnovers.

"It doesn't get any easier," Wanner said. "We should sow up that number one seed in the region. A win is a win and we have to find a way to win. I told the girls 'This is about you. You put the time in. You went to camp. You worked in the off season. We've had some tough practices. We have to be mentally strong and that's why we're winning the big games this year. We're 16-3 right now and we've had a nice season. We'll have the advantage of playing the rest of our games on our home court."

Kennedy Noem led the Chargers with 10 points followed by Lexi Wadsworth with nine, Molly Koisti eight, Hanna Roe seven, Alicia West five, Brooke Opdahl three and Alli Lakness added two points

Hamlin and Groton Area tangled in the boys varsity game in a 32-minute contest that was decided on a shot at the buzzer.

Hamlin controlled the tip and throughout the first quarter, there were three lead changes and the game was tied at 2, 4, 6 and 8 before Groton took a 14-10 first quarter lead thanks to a three-pointer by Reilly Ell with 1:10 left in the quarter.

Groton scored the first seven points of the second quarter to open up a 21-10 lead with 4:12 left in the half. The Chargers than scored the last seven points of the second quarter and it was back to a four-point game at halftime, 21-17.

"We didn't move the ball very well," said Coach Greg Kjellsen. "They out played us. There's no double about it.'

A pair of three-pointers by the Chargers in the third quarter made it a one-point game, 27-26, but Groton still led at the end of the break, 31-28.

Ell converted a three-point play to start off the fourth quarter as Groton took a 33-28 lead, but the Chargers surged back to take a 35-34 lead with 5:23 left in the third quarter. 


