Thursday is the day when the Columbia bus route will change due to the bridge taken out south of Columbia. Superintendent Joe Schwan reported to the school board members Monday night that letters were sent out on Friday to the patrons of Route #5 indicating the new pick-up times. The first pickup will be at 6:45 a.m., but Schwan said the only consolation is that the students is an older student and does not always ride the bus. Work on the bridge is expected to be done by October 1, but the board is skeptical about that date.

Lynette Grieve gave a report on the physical education program that she teaches at the elementary school.

HOOPS TO FOR HEART

Brian Schuring talked about the objectives of the physical education classes in the upper level of the elementary school. He reported that the third, fourth and fifth grade students raised just under \$4,000 for Hoops for Heart. He also teaches classes for sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth grade.

Jan Seibel teaches health in seventh, eighth and ninth grade. She expressed concerns about students who go for band practice and it makes it difficult for homework assignments. May 13 is the junior high health fair. Seibel talked about the Walk South Dakota program for the teachers. Janel Lone walked 425 miles as the high individual walker. The winning group, the Rusty Roamer," walked 1,242 miles. They are Connie Stauch, Bill Duncan, Jana Duncan and Jan Hoffman.

Janene Harry talked about art. There is a pottery element. Hannah Webb's art work at the Granary was recognized during the art festival. She also expressed concern about band students. "I don't take students away from band and they shouldn't take them away from me," she said.

Kippley talked about the foreign language program. She teaches the Spanish classes. The state no longer requires a foreign language class for graduation. Each year, a Groton student has won a state-wide competition. Kippley will not be teaching in Groton next year and she it will be a bigger challenge for the students to learn through the internet instead of having a teacher in the building.

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




The availability of blood is dependent on the success of blood drives held in many communities. The citizens of the Groton area can be assured that their community is a good example of a well-run blood program.



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Groton MathCounts students take second at NSU

Thirty-three students in grades eight through twelve from the Groton Area School District participated in the 61st Annual NSU Mathematics Contest held Wednesday, April 16, 2014, on the campus of Northern State University in Aberdeen, South Dakota. They were among 530 contestants representing 31 schools in North Dakota, South Dakota, and Minnesota, who participated in the event and tested in four divisions: Elementary Algebra, Geometry, Advanced Algebra, and Senior Math. Out of the 115 students taking the Elementary Algebra test, Lexie Harder, Madilyn Wright, Alexandra Stange, and Nathan Fjelstad received certificates of honorable mention. Of the 115 students taking the Senior Math test, Luke Smith and Jacob Milbrandt received certificates of honorable mention.

As a school, Groton received second place in the Class AA/A division. To determine school rank, the highest score in each of the four divisions was taken to compute each school's result.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include: Microbial contaminants, such

as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treat-ment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming. Pesticides and herbicides,

which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
Organic chemical contami-

nants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
