



### **Today in Weather History**

July 18, 1883: An estimated F3 tornado moved southeast from 3 miles south of Redfield to north of Hitchcock, to 6 miles southeast of Crandon. At least one farm house was destroyed and swept away. Three people were killed on one farm.

July 18, 1983: In the afternoon, an F2 tornado that touched down in the northern suburbs of Minneapolis became one of the most observed and photographed tornadoes ever. The photographic coverage included video from a Minnesota DOT traffic camera and a remarkable aerial video taken from a helicopter by a television camera crew. The tornado began in Brooklyn Park and moved slowly northeast, causing light to moderate damage. It then turned east and slowed as it crossed the Mississippi River. Also on this day, an F2 tornado touched down two mile southeast of Bryant, in Hamlin County. This tornado traveled near Dolph Creek, and moved east along the creek to the Lake Norden area. The tornado damaged many trees and destroyed a barn. A second F2 tornado touched down three miles west of Toronto and moved southeast. The tornado destroyed a barn, silo, and six other buildings and caused extensive damage to farm equipment on a farm one mile south and a half mile west Astoria.

July 18, 2008: Severe thunderstorms developed across parts of central and north central South Dakota bringing large hail up to the size of golf balls and damaging winds to near 80 mph. Some tree, vehicle, and building damage occurred with some of the storms. Eighty mph winds or higher brought down many branches along with some trees in Fort Pierre. Power was cut off for parts of Fort Pierre when branches fell on power lines. Several truck trailers and feed silos were tipped onto their sides by the high winds. Also some buildings were damaged. A loaded train was pushed down the tracks almost a quarter of a mile by the high winds. Seventy mph winds or higher brought down many tree branches along with some trees in Pierre. There were power outages in Pierre along with some buildings receiving damage. Damaging thunderstorm winds also downed six power poles between Sully Buttes and Onida knocking power out to over 800 homes in and around Onida.

18 July 1899: The U.S.'s record 130-minute rainfall amount was set at Rockport, WV with exactly 19 inches.

18 July 1942: Smethport, PA reported the U.S.'s record 3 hour rainfall (28.50"), 4.5 hour rainfall (30.70"), and 12 hour rainfall (34.30").

18 July 1986: A KARE TV news helicopter captured live footage of a tornado as it hit the northern suburbs of Minneapolis. The twister touched down in Brooklyn and continued to Fridley. An F2 in magnitude, it caused \$650,000 in damages.

18 July 1986: At the second round of the British Open at the Turnberry Course in Western Scotland, Greg Norman shot a 63 in wind and rain. A low pressure system in the Atlantic brought 35 mph winds, dropped temperatures into the 50s, and lowered visibilities to less than a mile.

18 July 1996: An F5 tornado moved to the ESE, then E, then NE as it destroyed much of Oakfield, WI. Homes were swept clean of their foundations east of town. Canceled checks were later found 125 miles away in Lower Michigan.

score. A handicap is a numerical measure of a golfer's potential playing ability based on previous play on the course allowing players of different proficiency to play against each other on somewhat equal terms..

Brock Hanten won the Gross Tournament with a 69, teammate Tanner Waage was second with a 74. Tyler Sperry was third with a 74 and Reid Johnson was fourth with a 75. The Net Tournament was won by Sherm Cutler with a 65. Arden Gilbert and Roger Colestock each shot a 68 to finish second and third, respectfully. Another mini tournament was the Skins game. A skins game is a friendly form of competition among amateurs. A value is set on a hole. Players then contribute a set amount of money for each hole. The player with the lowest score at the hole wins the skin. Tanner Waage walked away with winning two holes and Jason Hill and Jarod Fliehs each won one.

Groton was the seventh event on The Dakotas Tour for the professional golfers. Mark Baldwin, Gilford, NH, took the top honors, winning over \$2100. He also leads the tour with 765 points and over \$14,000 in earnings. Last year's Olive Grove winner, Nick Delio, Valencia, CA; finished in fifth place.

The tournament is part of The Dakotas Tour, which is an 18 event professional golf tour played in the Midwest states of Minnesota, Iowa, and North and South Dakota. The Pros are playing for up wards of \$750,000 over the course of none weeks. The pros move on to Aberdeen where they will play the next three days at Moccasin Creek.

### More South Dakota statehood celebrations planned

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — More activities are planned across South Dakota to mark its 125th year of statehood.

Madison will host an All-School Reunion and Prairie Music Festival July 26 for everyone who has attended or currently attends an area school.

The annual Carthage Straw Bale Festival on Aug. 2-3 will feature a parade with participants dressing in 1889 style clothing and floats promoting history.

Rochford Heritage Day on Aug. 23 will include displays and artifacts in the community hall showing the town's history.

And Pierre-Fort Pierre will hold an Amazing History Race on Sept. 13 where teams will collect clues about South Dakota history and destinations as they travel through both towns.

#### New Madison water tank replaces 1 that collapsed CARSON WALKER, Associated Press

MADISON, S.D. (AP) — Six months after the 6,500 residents of the eastern South Dakota town of Madison were forced to limit water usage for two days when a storage tank collapsed, a new above-ground tank is online and town leaders are lobbying for help on a long-term solution.

Crews have been dumping soil in the massive hole left by the 1 million gallon underground tank whose concrete-and-dirt roof collapsed Jan. 15 and contaminated the water. Schools canceled classes, and bottled water was trucked in. A day later, residents were allowed to start using water for showering and laundry, and by Jan. 17, water was deemed safe for all purposes.

"We were within hours of draining the towers and running the system dry," city engineer Chad Comes said. "Our best bet was to ask for no use, and our citizens did."

The new 1 million gallon tank and an adjoining pump station already were part of a planned \$3.5 million upgrade to the city's water system, he said. The big issue now is finding a quality, reliable supply of water to replace the city's current wells that are susceptible to drought and contamination, Comes said.

The long-term plan is a 42-mile pipeline to the Lewis & Clark Rural Water System that will deliver Missouri River water to 20 towns and rural water systems in South Dakota, Minnesota and Iowa. Madison will be the last South Dakota connection.

Until then, Madison wants to connect with the nearby Big Sioux River Community Water System Inc., Comes said. That line eventually would tie into Lewis & Clark, he said.

Federal funding for Lewis & Clark has fallen short, but the state Legislature has stepped in to help, Comes said. It approved \$1 million from a fund set up for such projects to cover the cost of engineering and land easements for the Madison to Big Sioux connection and also a section of Lewis & Clark that will run from Sioux Falls to Crooks to serve Minnehaha County Water Corp.

Representatives from both projects are talking to state officials about seeking \$7 million in the next legislative session for construction of the two pipeline links, said Troy Larson, executive director of Lewis and Clark.

That state money — the \$1 million and the \$7 million, if approved — isn't from the general fund and would be repaid as federal funding is available, Larson said.

Gov. Dennis Daugaard met with representatives of the projects this week. He didn't commit to further funding but does support the project, spokeswoman Kelsey Pritchard said in an email. "We're asking for a huge favor here," Larson said.

### Man accused in knife attack at Rapid City mission

RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) — A Rapid City man is accused of attacking two men with a knife at a rescue mission.

Authorities say the attack happened about 7:45 p.m. Wednesday at the Cornerstone Rescue Mission. One victim was hospitalized with non-life threatening injuries.

Fifty-seven-year-old Phillip Fetterman is charged with two counts of aggravated assault.

Program director Brian Mathis tells the Rapid City Journal (http://bit.ly/1nPR11g) that he did not believe drugs or alcohol played a role in the attack, which Mathis says was "unprovoked and out of the blue."

Fetterman is being held in jail without bond.

### Sanford plane fills void in air ambulance service

DICKINSON, N.D. (AP) - A Dakotas hospital is adding an air ambulance service based in the state's oil patch.

Sanford AirMed is expected to be operating in Dickinson by late fall. It will feature a King Air B200 fixed wing aircraft that can travel 1,500 miles and land on a short runway. The plane can carry two patients and five critical care attendants.

Sanford AirMed will replace a void left by Texas-based Med-Trans, a national provider of air transport services that is closing its office in Dickinson.

Sanford Health is based in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, and Fargo, North Dakota.

#### SD man sentenced for killing migratory birds

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — A Vale man has been sentenced in federal court to a year of probation and fined \$18,000 for trapping and killing migratory birds.

Glen Schummer, 68, pleaded guilty to violating the Lacey Act, a federal conservation law, U.S. Attorney Brendan Johnson said. Schummer also was sentenced to a year of unsupervised probation and is prohibited from hunting for one year.

Authorities said the conviction stems from an incident that took place in February, when a hawk was found trapped on property owned by Schummer in Meade County.

Johnson said an investigation revealed that Schummer had two illegal pole traps on his property to catch great-horned owls and various species of hawks. Once the birds were trapped, Schummer would either shoot or club the birds to kill them.

Schummer would then dispose of the birds by throwing them into the river on his property, Johnson said. Schummer told authorities that he had killed at least 10 migratory birds in the past several years, Johnson said.

The investigation was conducted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

### Man's conviction for killing his infant son upheld

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — A Scotland man's conviction for killing his infant son has been upheld. The South Dakota Supreme Court Thursday affirmed the 2011 second-degree murder and aggravated assault verdict in Turner County against Chris Miller, who's serving life in prison for it. His son, 4-month-old Jacob Miller, suffered a severe skull fracture and bleeding on the brain.

### Rapid City man's sleepover rape conviction upheld

RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) — South Dakota justices have upheld a Rapid City man's conviction for raping a 9-year-old girl at a slumber party at his house.

Jeremy Bauer was found guilty of first-degree rape for the April 2012 attack and sentenced to 30 years in prison.

Bauer appealed his case on grounds the courtroom should not have been closed to all but the parties in the case, the media and the victim's assistant when the girl testified. He also said his lawyer wasn't effective.

In a ruling filed Thursday, the state Supreme Court disagreed and affirmed the conviction.

#### High court: No new rape trial for Rapid City man

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — The South Dakota Supreme Court says a Rapid City man sentenced to life in prison for raping a child is not entitled to a new trial.

John Rolfe was convicted in 2011 on three counts of first-degree rape and 12 counts of possession of child pornography.

In Rolfe's first appeal, the Supreme Court determined Circuit Judge Thomas Trimble improperly closed the trial to the public when the victim testified because he didn't properly support the closure on the record. The court remanded it so he could do that.

Rolfe appealed that decision and also asked for a new trial, which Trimble denied.

In a response to that second appeal filed Thursday, justices concluded Rolfe was not entitled to another trial and Trimble properly supported his decision to close the trial.

#### South Dakota man sentenced in staged robbery

HURON, S.D. (AP) — One of two men charged in a staged armed robbery of a Huron convenience store has been sentenced.

Performance Radio of Huron reports that 27-year-old Sidney Malone Jr. pleaded guilty to grand theft and was sentenced to 30 days in jail, with four years suspended. He faced up to five years in prison.

Malone and 26-year old Donnell Williams are accused of setting up a fake armed robbery at the store where both men worked.

Williams is accused of bringing a handgun into the store and pointing it at Malone on Jan. 29. Malone says he took more than \$3,100 dollars.

Prosecutors say Malone has cooperated in the investigation.

A trial for Williams is slated for July 31.

Authorities say Alvarez also must register as a sex offender after his release.

#### Ukraine rebels claim to have found most of the crashed Malaysia Airlines plane's recorders

KIEV, Ukraine (AP) — Emergency workers, police officers and even off-duty coal miners — dressed in overalls and covered in soot — searched through wreckage and bodies scattered across sunflower fields and Ukrainian villages Friday after a Malaysian jetliner flying high above the country's battlefield was shot down, killing 298 people.

Separatist rebels who control the area where the Malaysia Airlines Flight 17 was brought down said they had recovered most of its black boxes and were considering what to do with them. Their statement had profound implications for the integrity of the plane crash investigation.

U.S. intelligence authorities said a surface-to-air missile downed the plane, but could not say who fired it.

Ukraine, whose investigators have no access to the area, has called for an international probe to determine who attacked the plane and insisted it was not its military.

The crash site was sprawling, spread out over fields between two villages in eastern Ukraine — Rozsypne and Hrabove — and access to it remained difficult and dangerous. The road from Donetsk, the largest city in the region, to the crash site was marked by five rebel checkpoints Friday, with document checks at each.

### More than 20 Palestinians, Israeli soldier killed as troops advance into Hamas-ruled Gaza

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — Israeli troops pushed deeper into Gaza on Friday to destroy rocket launching sites and tunnels, firing volleys of tank shells and clashing with Palestinian fighters in a high-stakes ground offensive meant to weaken the enclave's Hamas rulers.

Israel launched the operation late Thursday, following a 10-day campaign of more than 2,000 air strikes against Gaza that had failed to halt relentless Hamas rocket fire on Israeli cities.

Israel's first major ground offensive in Gaza in just over five years came as Egyptian cease-fire efforts stalled. Earlier this week, Israel accepted Cairo's offer to halt hostilities, but Hamas refused, demanding that Israel and Egypt first give guarantees to ease the blockade on Gaza.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said he had ordered the military to prepare for a "significant expansion" of the ground offensive.

"It is not possible to deal with tunnels only from the air. It needs to be done also from the ground," he said before a special Cabinet meeting in Tel Aviv.

## Hit by double disasters, Malaysia Airlines may become tainted for travelers, never recover

HONG KONG (AP) — Hit by two astonishing tragedies in quick succession, the Malaysia Airlines brand may become the airline industry's equivalent of asbestos or News of the World: toxic to the public and, experts say, impossible to redeem.

Malaysia Airlines Flight 17 was downed over eastern Ukraine on Thursday with 298 people aboard by

what American intelligence authorities believe was a surface-to-air missile. Just four months earlier, a Malaysia Airlines jetliner carrying 239 people disappeared about an hour after taking off from Kuala Lumpur. The jet has still not been found, a source of profound unease for travelers and the aviation industry.

"I can't comprehend of anything they can do to save themselves," said Mohshin Aziz, an aviation analyst at Maybank in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

"Perception-wise it really hits home," Aziz said. "It's very difficult to fight against negative perception." Even before the Flight 370 mystery, state-owned Malaysia Airlines was in serious financial trouble. In an industry infamous for impoverishing shareholders and irking customers, Malaysia Airlines had long stood out for its years of restructurings and losses.

## Substantial number' of those on downed Malaysia jet were heading to AIDS conference

SYDNEY (AP) — A large number of world-renowned AIDS researchers and activists heading to an international AIDS conference in Australia were on board a Malaysian jetliner that was shot down over Ukraine, officials said Friday, as news of their deaths sparked an outpouring of grief across the global scientific community.

There have been unconfirmed reports that up to 100 people on board the Boeing 777 were en route to the Victoria state capital of Melbourne to attend the 20th International AIDS conference, which starts Sunday, Victoria Premier Denis Napthine said, though he hastened to add that reports were conflicting and it was far too premature to give a precise figure.

"There's been confirmed a number of senior people who were coming out here who were researchers, who were medical scientists, doctors, people who've been to the forefront of dealing with AIDS across the world," Napthine told reporters in Melbourne. "The exact number is not yet known, but there is no doubt it's a substantial number."

The plane, which was flying from Amsterdam to Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, crashed Thursday with 298 people on board. American intelligence authorities believe a surface-to-air missile brought the aircraft down but it was not yet clear who fired it.

At least 27 Australians were confirmed to be on board the plane, which was scheduled to continue flying to Australia after stopping in Kuala Lumpur, Australian Foreign Affairs Minister Julie Bishop told reporters in Brisbane.

## Secrets leaker Chelsea Manning's gender treatments to begin; prison bureau rejects transfer

WASHINGTON (AP) — National security leaker Chelsea Manning can get initial treatment for a genderidentity condition from the military after the Bureau of Prisons rejected the Army's request to accept her transfer from Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, to a civilian facility.

Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel has approved the Army's recommendation to keep the Army private in military custody and start a rudimentary level of gender treatment, a defense official said Thursday. Defense officials have said the Army doesn't have the medical expertise needed to give Manning the best treatment.

The initial gender treatments provided by the military could include allowing Manning to wear some female undergarments and also possibly provide some hormone treatments.

The decision raises a number of questions about what level of treatment Manning will be able to get and at what point she would have to be transferred from the all-male prison to a female facility.

In May, Manning's lawyer, David Coombs, had contended that civilian prisons were not as safe as military facilities. In a statement, he had said, "It is common knowledge that the federal prison system cannot guarantee the safety and security of Chelsea in the way that the military prison system can."

#### Washington wildfire forces evacuation of small town; sheriff says 35 homes have burned

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — A small north-central Washington town and a nearby hospital have been evacuated ahead of a wind-whipped wildfire that has already burned at least 35 homes, authorities said.

Okanogan County Sheriff Frank Rogers said late Thursday he's heard of no injuries from the Carlton Complex of wildfires.

The sheriff issued his highest evacuation notice Thursday for Pateros, a town of about 650 people along the Columbia River. Residents drove south to Chelan. A hospital in nearby Brewster was evacuated as a precaution, with the patients sent to Omak.

"The whole town was evacuated," Rogers said in a telephone interview as he drove the eight-mile stretch between Brewster and Pateros. "It was a chaotic mess but we got everybody on the highway."

"There's nobody in Pateros" except a few "stragglers" who stayed, he said, adding the fire was burning in the town, although the small business district was believed intact.

#### Militants who seized swaths of Syria, Iraq try to govern as a state, but face risk of backlash

BEIRUT (AP) — Across the broad swath of territory it controls bridging Syria and Iraq, extremist militants from the group known as the Islamic State have proven to be highly organized administrators. Flush with cash, they fix roads, police traffic, administer courts, and have even set up an export system of smuggled crude from oil fields they control.

But the extremists — a mix of Iraqis and Syrians but also foreign fighters from Arab countries and non-Arab regions like the Caucasus — run the risk of provoking a backlash from the people they have come to rule.

Unlike Lebanon's Hezbollah or the Palestinian militant group Hamas, which have deep roots in their communities, the Islamic State group is not a grassroots movement and its sway over its populations is ultimately based on violence, not necessarily a groundswell of support for its vision of a hard-line Islamic caliphate. While it has been welcomed by some disenfranchised Iraqi Sunnis as potential saviors from the Shiite-dominated government in Baghdad, many consider the group an alien entity.

In recognition of that, the group has varied the imposition of the radical version of Islamic law they advocate. In their main stronghold in Syria, the city of Raqqa, they have unleashed it without reserve, killing perceived offenders and cutting off the hands of thieves in public.

But in Iraq's second largest city, Mosul, they have been more cautious. They've taken some steps like banning alcohol and painting over street advertisements that show women's faces — but have held off on strict punishments for now.

## As more states legalize pot for fun and medicine, edibles industry burgeons

MONTPELIER, Vt. (AP) — Move over, pot brownies.

The proliferation of marijuana edibles for both medical and recreational purposes is giving rise to a cottage industry of baked goods, candies, infused oils, cookbooks and classes that promises a slow burn as more states legalize the practice and awareness spreads about the best ways to deliver the drug.

Edibles and infused products such as snack bars, olive oils and tinctures popular with medical marijuana users have flourished into a gourmet market of chocolate truffles, whoopie pies and hard candies as Colorado and Washington legalized the recreational use of marijuana in the past year.

"You're seeing a lot of these types of products like cannabis cookbooks," said Erik Altieri, spokesman for the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws. "They've always been popular among a subset of marijuana, but with the fact that more and more people from the mainstream are able to consume, there's a lot more interest."

Many pot users turn to edibles because they don't like to inhale or smell the smoke or just want variety. For many people who are sick or in pain, controlled doses of edibles or tinctures can deliver a longer-lasting therapeutic dose that doesn't give them the high.

## Sandusky's adopted adult son says victim's testimony sounded similar to own alleged abuse

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Hearing the first victim to take the witness stand against Jerry Sandusky helped push the former Penn State coach's adopted son Matthew to come forward with his own allegations of abuse, he said in a television interview.

Matthew Sandusky said in a Thursday broadcast of "Oprah Prime" that he recognized elements of his own abuse when he sat through testimony by a young man described in court as Victim 4, someone he knew better than any of the other seven who testified at the trial. Sandusky was convicted of various types of abuse involving 10 boys, including all eight who testified.

"But his story isn't his story — it's my story," Matthew Sandusky told Oprah Winfrey about Victim 4. "At this point, that's where the door really opened up and it kind of just hit me from every single detail that this man is talking about."

He said he wonders if it wouldn't have been easier to simply keep quiet and not turn against his adopted father, knowing it would alienate family members who helped him in many ways over the years.

Winfrey asked him how people can know that what he's saying is the truth and not an adaptation of Victim 4's experience.

### Freaky Friday: McIlroy dazzles again on Day 1 of British Open, but must break 2nd-round jinx
