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It was a beautiful night for a football game at Doney Field on Friday. A large crowd was on hand for the home season opener with Aberdeen Roncalli.




Bennett Shabazz intercepts the ball and prevents Roncalli's Brayden McNeary from scoring a touchdown in a play that happened in the endzone.


1988 - Unseasonably cool weather prevailed across the north central and northeastern U.S. Thirty cities reported record low temperatures for the date, including Saint Joseph MO with a reading of 38 degrees. A low of 44 degrees at Indianapolis IN was their coolest reading of record for so early in the season. The mercury dipped to 31 degrees at Hibbing MN and Philips WI. (The National Weather Summary)

1989 - An early afternoon thunderstorm produced wind gusts to 104 mph at Winterhaven, FL, flipping over four airplanes, and damaging five others. The high winds also damaged a hangar and three other buildings. A cold front produced strong winds and blowing dust in the Northern High Plains, with gusts to 54 mph reported at Buffalo SD. Powerful Hurricane Gabrielle and strong easterly winds combined to create waves up to ten feet high along the southern half of the Atlantic coast. (The National Weather Summary) (Storm Data)

Cool Summer of 2014

Not much for heat this summer across central and north central South Dakota as well as west central Minnesota as 90s and 100s were few and far between. Cooler than normal weather was the rule across the region throughout the summer. In fact, the meteorological summer for June, July, and August of 2014 was one of the top ten coolest summers on record for Aberdeen, Pierre, Mobridge, and Wheaton, Minnesota. The summer of 2014 for Aberdeen was the seventh coolest on record with an average temperature of only 66 degrees. Pierre had its sixth coolest summer on record with an average temperature of 67.3 degrees. Finally, Wheaton, Minnesota finished up the summer with their tenth coolest summer on record with 67.6 degrees. In fact, this summer makes the third summer in the last 10 years to make the top ten coolest on record which includes 2004 and 2009. As for comparison, the very hot summer of 1936 had average temperatures ranging from 77.2 degrees at Aberdeen to 81.1 degrees at Pierre.





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LOOKING DEEPER

Advice only has value if it achieves its goals. Often, we follow the advice if it agrees with what we want to hear, or if it comes from a trusted friend who may or may not be a wise resource when we need sound, reliable and timely advice. But, certainly, advice coming from David, a "man after God's own heart" would be worth following. So, when he advised his son, it was a tipping point in his career as a king, husband, father, teacher and warrior.

And his advice was simple and can be summed up into a few words: "Be strong and obedient to God." But, what did this mean?

As he grew up in David's household, he saw his father reading the law and prophets, worshipping and praying, writing the psalms and following God faithfully. David proved what obedience was. And when he failed, he repented!

Then, he had to know God's laws to obey them. To know them, he had to study them to apply them. This would take time from other things - but could keep him from failing. God's Word provides anchors, if accepted.

He also was given advice to worship God wholeheartedly, surrender to Him completely and serve Him willingly and faithfully. This he refused to do.

As the story of Solomon unfolds in the Bible, we read of "what might have been" if he had surrendered to God completely. His lack of surrender destroyed God's plan.

The same is true for us. Surrender to God, or fail.

Prayer: Father, may we willingly obey Your Word and surrender our lives to You and bring honor to Your Name. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Deadline approaching for property tax moratorium

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — South Dakotans have until Nov. 3 to apply for a break on state property taxes for fixing up historic buildings.

The eight-year property tax moratorium is for restoration and rehabilitation work completed on historic sites during 2014.

The moratorium is available for buildings listed on the National or State Register of Historic Places and rehabilitated in accordance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation.

The state says the 18 projects approved for the program in 2013 represented more than \$7.5 million in private investment.

Lawsuit from man seeking to be on ballot dismissed

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — A circuit judge was dismissed a lawsuit brought by a Watertown man seeking to be on the ballot as candidate for South Dakota's lone U.S. House seat.

South Dakota Attorney General Marty Jackley announced the dismissal of the lawsuit filed by Charles Haan against Secretary of State Jason Gant.

Jackley says the Circuit Court found that Gant followed the law, and therefore, Haan's name will not be on the ballot.

Incumbent Republican U.S. Rep. Kristi Noem is being challenged by Democrat Corinna Robinson.

Haan filed a lawsuit in 2013 against Noem alleging she had breached the oath of office by among other reasons failing to "stop the implementation" of the nation's new health care law.

Corps increases water releases into Missouri River HEATHER HOLLINGSWORTH, Associated Press

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The amount of water released into the lower Missouri River began increasing this week after August runoff was the third highest in more than a century, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers said Friday.

Water management chief Jody Farhat said during a conference call that although river levels would rise three to four feet, the water is expected to stay in the channel unless there is significant additional rain. She described fall as a "very good time" to evacuate flood water and said the releases would ensure there is room in the reservoirs to handle next year's runoff.

Kevin Low, Missouri Basin River Forecast Center Hydrologist for the National Weather Service, described the chances for widespread flooding as "insignificant," although he said the likelihood of localized flooding was slightly increased.

Releases from Gavins Point, the lower-most dam on the Missouri River, are expected to climb to 45,500 cubic feet per second by Tuesday, up from an average of 28,500 cubic feet per second in August. The corps also was boosting water releases from the Oahe, Big Bend and Fort Randall dams, and the higher flows were expected to continue for about three months.

The releases come after portions of Montana, Wyoming and the Dakotas received more than 400 percent of their normal August precipitation, said Kevin Stamm, a hydraulic engineer for the corps. He noted that a large swath of central and north central Montana received more than 5 inches of rain and some areas received more than 10 inches.

The heavy rainfall in Montana led to damaged bridges and blocked and washed out roads.

August runoff has been heavier just two other times since 1898 — the heavy flood years of 1993 and 2011, Stamm said.

The excess water will allow the corps to extend the navigation season by 10 days, with it now ending at the mouth of the Missouri River on Dec. 10. The higher releases also will benefit winter hydropower generation and reduce the risks to water intakes when ice forms, the corps said.

Driver who struck deaf, blind biker in SD cited

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — A South Dakota driver has been cited for striking a deaf and blind Norwegian man hours into a tandem bicycle ride from South Dakota to Nebraska.

Authorities in Sioux Falls have cited 70-year-old Melvin Coelho for illegal overtaking and careless driving. The former charge is a class two misdemeanor.

Harald Vik was cycling with his interpreter Robert Skarsbakk on Aug. 22 when Coelho attempted to pass them, but struck them.

Vik sustained a broken pelvis and leg and arm injuries. He returned home this week.

Vik was born deaf and began losing his eyesight at age 10, and he's an advocate for the disabled in his native country. He tandem-biked across the U.S. in 1982 during his first trip to the country, and he's ridden in more than 50 countries.

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2 Omaha men with stolen ATM in van arrested in SD

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Police in Sioux Falls say two Omaha men have been arrested after they were pulled over driving a U-Haul van loaded with a stolen ATM.

Police spokesman Sam Clemens a motorist driving by a gas station reported seeing the ATM being loaded into the van. The caller also reported seeing the van take off down Interstate 229.

Clemens says 23-year-old Kentrell Reed and 22-year-old Isaiah Brown were arrested after the van was pulled over. They are facing initial charges of third-degree burglary, grand theft, possession of stolen property and intentional damage to property.

The arresting officer also found a sledgehammer and other tools. Police believe the van was backed into the window and the sledgehammer used to break the glass.

Police are still looking for a third suspect.

SD to reprint hunting handbooks because of errors

MITCHELL, S.D. (AP) — The South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks Department will have to reprint 250,000 hunting handbooks because of incorrect dates given for two seasons.

The Mitchell Republic (http://bit.ly/ZaUfU9) reports the mistake will cost about \$32,500. The original handbooks showed incorrect dates for the hunting seasons for tundra swan and Unit 1 of Canada goose.

Emily Kiel is a spokeswoman for the department's wildlife division. She says the department admits the internal oversight.

The handbooks are printed every year and contain South Dakota hunting laws and regulations.

By the time the mistake was caught, thousands of copies had already been delivered to major retailers in Mitchell, Rapid City and Sioux Falls. Kiel said the department has asked retailers to throw away the handbooks.

A new version should be out by Sept. 15.

AP News in Brief

Cease-fire in Ukraine appears to hold, despite rebel claim Ukraine has violated the deal

KIEV, Ukraine (AP) — A cease-fire in Ukraine's rebellious east appeared to be holding on Saturday, but claims by a pro-Russian separatist leader that the Ukrainian side had violated the agreement showed that the fragile deal could quickly unravel.

National Guard Commander Stepan Poltorak was quoted by the Interfax news agency Saturday as saying that although some shooting took place up to about 45 minutes after the cease-fire, "as of this morning there haven't been any violations, either from our side, of course, or from the terrorists."

In Donetsk, the largest city controlled by the Russian-backed separatists, the night passed quietly — a rarity after several months of daily shelling in residential areas. But Alexander Zakharchenko, the top separatist leader from Donetsk, told the Russian news agency RIA Novosti that the cease-fire had been violated with two rounds of shelling in the town of Amvrosiivka, about 50 km (30 miles) southeast of Donetsk.

"At this time the cease-fire agreement is not being fully observed," he said.

Earlier Saturday, the mayor's office in Donetsk said there had been no reports of shooting or shelling

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there although some shelling had been heard late Friday afternoon.

AP Analysis: Hitting militants in Syria risks embroiling US in its unpredictable civil war

BEIRUT (AP) — The U.S. and its allies are trying to hammer out a coalition to push back the Islamic State group in Iraq. But any serious attempt to destroy the militants or even seriously degrade their capabilities means targeting their infrastructure in Syria.

That, however, is far more complicated. If it launches airstrikes against the group in Syria, the U.S. runs the risk of unintentionally strengthening the hand of President Bashar Assad, whose removal the West has actively sought the past three years. Uprooting the Islamic State group, which has seized roughly a third of Syria and Iraq, may potentially open the way for the Syrian army to fill the vacuum.

The alternative would be to finally get serious about arming the mainstream Western-backed rebels fighting to topple Assad. But there is a reason the administration of President Barack Obama has been deeply reluctant to throw its weight behind them.

The relatively moderate rebel factions fighting in Syria are in tatters. There are no secular groups, and the strongest factions are Islamic groups, many of which work with al-Qaida's official branch in Syria, the Nusra Front.

The Nusra Front, which has somewhat dropped from international headlines because of the Islamic State group's exceeding brutality, is on the U.S. list of terrorist groups and is still very active.

For Obama, a glimpse of his good old days in Europe amid foreign policy criticism at home

WASHINGTON (AP) — For President Barack Obama, it was a brief glimpse of his good old days in Europe.

On the continent that cheered his ascent to the White House, Obama was enthusiastically welcomed in Estonia by Baltic leaders who see American military power as the best safeguard of their own security. And at the NATO summit in Wales, Obama gathered numerous statements of support for his call to confront Islamic State militants in the Middle East.

"I did not get any resistance or pushback," Obama declared as he closed a three-day trip.

But Air Force One sped Obama back to a far different landscape in Washington, where he returned late Friday. He has faced harsh criticism not only from Republicans, but also some Democrats, for being overly cautious in his response to the Islamic State militant threat and Russia's provocations in Ukraine. A few days in the warm embrace of European allies was unlikely to dramatically shift that dynamic.

The criticism of Obama's foreign policy has thrust the White House into a defensive posture and sent the president's approval ratings on international matters tumbling. In Europe, too, Obama has grappled with allies who have both quibbled with his perceived lack of focus on the continent and resisted his calls for more aggressive action against Russia and in the Middle East.

Aging S. Koreans, once prostitutes for US troops, being pushed away from base they never left

PYEONGTAEK, South Korea (AP) — More than 70 aging women live in a squalid neighborhood between the rear gate of the U.S. Army garrison here and half a dozen seedy nightclubs. Near the front

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gate, glossy illustrations posted in real-estate offices show the dream homes that may one day replace their one-room shacks.

They once worked as prostitutes for American soldiers in this "camptown" near Camp Humphreys, and they've stayed because they have nowhere else to go. Now, the women are being forced out of the Anjeong-ri neighborhood by developers and landlords eager to build on prime real estate around the soon-to-be-expanded garrison.

"My landlord wants me to leave, but my legs hurt, I can't walk, and South Korean real estate is too expensive," says Cho Myung-ja, 75, a former prostitute who receives monthly court eviction notices at her home, which she has rarely left over the last five years because of leg pain.

"I feel like I'm suffocating," she says.

Plagued by disease, poverty and stigma, the women have little to no support from the public or the government.

French president's popularity lower than ever amid economic woes, exposure of his private life

PARIS (AP) — Things can't get much worse for French President Francois Hollande: The economy is lagging; his new government is already under fire; and his private life has just been exposed in a ravaging book by the former first lady.

Adding to his concerns is the possibility that his chief rival — conservative Nicolas Sarkozy — will launch a political comeback this weekend.

The developments have helped push Hollande's popularity to new record lows. Three polls released in recent days show that he has lower approval ratings than every other French president in modern times.

This week, ex-partner Valerie Trierweiler described Hollande as a mean liar in a book released seven months after they broke up, amid reports that he was having an affair with French actress Julie Gayet.

Not only did Trierweiler spread intimate details of Hollande's infidelities, but she also depicted the Socialist leader as someone who despises the poor — a grave political sin for a left-wing leader who won election in 2012 on promises of social justice.

New York couple whose plane crashed off Jamaica praised for efforts to revitalize their city

KINGSTON, Jamaica (AP) — Mystery shrouds the crash of a private plane carrying a prominent upstate New York couple who were taken on a ghostly 1,700-mile journey after apparently becoming incapacitated at the controls before slamming into the waters off Jamaica.

The wreckage of the high-performance plane carrying Rochester real estate developer Laurence Glazer and his entrepreneur wife, Jane — both experienced and enthusiastic pilots — had not been found late Friday, hours after U.S. fighter pilots launched to shadow the unresponsive aircraft observed the pilot slumped over and its windows frosting over.

The plane's pilot had indicated there was a problem and twice asked to descend to a lower altitude before permission was granted by an air traffic controller, according to a recording of the radio conversation. Radio contact with the plane was lost a short time later.

As dark fell, Jamaica Coast Guard Commander Antonette Wemyss-Gorman said search operations would be suspended and resumed at first light Saturday. A U.S. Coast Guard cutter is expected to arrive

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in the area late Friday and join the search at first light, said Petty Officer Sabrina Laberdesque. Rick Glazer said that his parents were both licensed pilots. He said he could not confirm they were killed, adding that "we know so little."

Heavy monsoon downpours, floods kill 110 people in Pakistan, 86 in India as more rain expected

ISLAMABAD (AP) — Heavy monsoon rains and flash floods have killed 110 people in Pakistan and 86 people in India, officials said Saturday, as forecasters warned of more rain in the coming days and troops raced to evacuate people from deluged areas.

The annual monsoon season has struck hard across the region, leaving people to wade through rushing water in towns and villages across Pakistan and in Indian-controlled areas of Kashmir, where authorities say they are seeing some of the worst flooding in decades.

Ahmad Kamal, a spokesman for Pakistan's National Disaster Management Authority, said at least 61 people died in the eastern Punjab province since Thursday. He said another 38 people died in the Pakistan's portion of Kashmir and 11 died in northern Gilgit Baltistan province.

Kamal said officials believe all those were killed when the roofs of their homes collapsed. He said the delgue has injured 148 people across the country.

"We are dispatching tents and other relief items for those who have been affected because of rains and floods," he said. He said the army helicopters and boats were evacuating people from affected areas.

Texas Democrat Wendy Davis reveals terminating 2 pregnancies in 1990s in upcoming memoir

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas Democratic gubernatorial candidate Wendy Davis, who became a national political sensation by filibustering her state's tough new restrictions on abortion, discloses in her upcoming memoir that she had an abortion in the 1990s after discovering that the fetus had a severe brain abnormality.

In "Forgetting to be Afraid," Davis also writes about ending an earlier ectopic pregnancy, in which an embryo implants outside the uterus. Davis says she considered revealing the terminated pregnancies during her nearly 13-hour speech on the floor of the Texas Senate last summer — but decided against it, saying "such an unexpected and dramatically personal confession would overshadow the events of the day."

The Associated Press purchased an early copy of the book, which goes on sale Tuesday.

Both pregnancies happened before Davis, a state senator from Fort Worth, began her political career and after she was already a mother to two young girls. Davis catapulted to national Democratic stardom after her filibuster temporarily delayed passed of sweeping new abortion restrictions. She's now running for governor against Republican Attorney General Greg Abbott, who is heavily favored to replace Republican Gov. Rick Perry next year.

The second pregnancy happened in 1996. Davis writes that during her second trimester she took a blood test that could determine chromosomal or neural defects, which doctors first told her didn't warrant concern. But a later exam revealed that the brain of the fetus had developed in complete separation on the right and left sides, Davis says. She sought opinions from multiple doctors, who told her the baby would be deaf, blind and in a permanent vegetative state if she survived delivery, she writes.

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Half of NFL teams move to variable pricing, charging more for desirable games, less for others

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. (AP) — Many NFL teams are following the leads of other sports — dropping prices for less desirable games while jacking up costs for the biggest matchups.

"The reality is not every game is created equal," said Jennifer Ferron, senior vice president of marketing and brand development for the New England Patriots.

In cold-weather cities, games in December may be less attractive than those in early fall. Weeknight games pose more of a challenge to fans who must work the next morning. It's tougher to sell or re-sell tickets to games between bad teams where no rivalry is involved.

Variable pricing already is used in major league baseball, the NBA and NHL. After several years of study, half the NFL clubs are making the move this season, particularly with preseason games.

"The advantage to the league is we have season ticket members that are more satisfied with their NFL experience. That's clearly our priority," said Brian Lafemina, the NFL's senior vice president for club business development.

Billie Jean King on tennis, gay athletes: Serena can win more majors, Sam made NFL history

NEW YORK (AP) — Billie Jean King is so busy attending events during the U.S. Open, she hardly has time to watch matches at the venue that bears her name.

However, King still has plenty of opinions on tennis and other topics. She believes Serena Williams can win "tons" more Grand Slam titles and Michael Sam "made history" despite not making the roster of an NFL team.

Williams will try for her sixth U.S. Open title and 18th major on Sunday when she faces Caroline Wozniacki. King won four of her 12 major singles titles in New York, her last coming 40 years ago against Evonne Goolagong at Forest Hills.

"She should win at least six or seven or eight," King said. "If she wins this, it will have saved her year, basically."

Williams is attempting to turn her season around after failing to reach the semifinals of the Australian Open, French Open and Wimbledon. She's gone 18-1 since Wimbledon, winning tournaments in Stanford and Cincinnati en route to the U.S. Open. She's relied on big serves — around 118 mph — to reach the final at Flushing Meadows.

On September 6, 1944, during World War II, the British government relaxed blackout restrictions and suspended compulsory training for the Home Guard.

On this date:

In 1861, Union forces led by Gen. Ulysses S. Grant occupied Paducah, Kentucky, during the Civil War. In 1901, President William McKinley was shot and mortally wounded by anarchist Leon Czolgosz

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(CHAWL'-gawsh) at the Pan-American Exposition in Buffalo, New York. (McKinley died eight days later; Czolgosz was executed on October 29.)

In 1916, the first self-service grocery store, Piggly Wiggly, was opened in Memphis, Tennessee, by Clarence Saunders.

In 1939, the Union of South Africa declared war on Germany.

In 1943, 79 people were killed when a New York-bound Pennsylvania Railroad train derailed and crashed in Philadelphia.

In 1954, groundbreaking took place for the Shippingport Atomic Power Station in western Pennsylvania.

In 1966, South African Prime Minister Hendrik Verwoerd (fehr-FOORT') was stabbed to death by an apparently deranged page during a parliamentary session in Cape Town.

In 1970, Palestinian guerrillas seized control of three U.S.-bound jetliners. (Two were later blown up on the ground in Jordan, along with a London-bound plane hijacked on September 9; the fourth plane was destroyed on the ground in Egypt. No hostages were harmed.)

In 1984, country music's "Texas Troubador," Ernest Tubb, died in Nashville at age 70.

In 1991, the Soviet Union recognized the independence of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia. Russian lawmakers upheld a decision by residents of Leningrad to restore the city's pre-revolutionary name, St. Petersburg.

In 1997, a public funeral was held for Princess Diana at Westminster Abbey in London, six days after her death in a car crash in Paris.

In 2002, meeting outside Washington D.C. for only the second time since 1800, Congress convened in New York to pay homage to the victims and heroes of September 11.

Ten years ago: Former President Bill Clinton underwent successful heart bypass surgery during a four-hour procedure at New York Presbyterian Hospital/Columbia. In Iraq, seven members of the First Marine Division from Camp Pendleton, California, and three U.S.-trained Iraqi soldiers were killed by a car bomb near Fallujah. Former hurricane Frances pounded the Florida Panhandle as a tropical storm.

Five years ago: The White House announced the resignation of President Barack Obama's environmental adviser Van Jones, who'd become embroiled in a controversy over past inflammatory statements; Jones cited what he called a "vicious smear campaign" against him.

One year ago: Debra Milke (MIHL'-kee), who'd spent more than two decades on Arizona's death row, was released on bond after a judge ruled there was no direct evidence linking her to the death of her 4-year-old son Christopher, other than a purported confession to a detective whose credibility has been called into question. (Milke faces a retrial in 2015.) NASA's newest robotic lunar explorer, LADEE, rocketed into space in an unprecedented moonshot from Virginia that dazzled sky watchers along the East Coast.
