Welcome to the early stages of another school year!
We've recently learned the good news that Groton Area High School was selected by Newsweek Magazine as a top school in the nation, \#158 to be specific. Congratulations to all of the students and faculty on their ongoing efforts to make the most of our time together in preparing students for what life brings them. This recognition for you is well-deserved.
During the week of September 15, letters were mailed to all families in accordance with the requirements set forth in the No Child Left Behind Legislation. The letters contain a brief summary of certain indicators of school performance, namely attendance, graduation rates, high school completion rates, and ACT results. Typically, this report also includes information about student performance in the areas of mathematics and English-language arts. Last spring students participated in the pilot of the new Smarter Balanced Assessment (replacing the former Dakota STEP test). As a result, no data is available to report this year. 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## MS/HS Principal - Anna Schwan

John Dewey, an educator known for his progressivism and educational reform commented, "Education is not preparation for life, but life itself." As I see our students and staff back in the swing of things, it's easy to understand Dewey's poignant perception. School manifests itself into a unique state of mind for each of its students so much that it does indeed become each of their lives. As educators and parents we strive for an exceptional quality of life for our kids, and I truly believe that's what we have within our school.
I hope you have had a chance to read that our school was ranked nationally as one of the top schools in the United States by Newsweek magazine. The list, that ranks schools solely on achievement, places Groton in the 158th slot, the highest ranking of four schools in South Dakota. Essentially, our kids are graduating with a preparedness for college that is illustrated by high ACT/SAT scores, graduation rate, and college acceptance numbers. It is truly an honor to be included amongst some very notable schools across the country. We are here due to our stellar teaching staff, outstanding students, and strong community support.
On a similar note, I am proud to congratulate Luke Smith who was named a Semifinalist in the National Merit Scholarship Program. Luke was named after taking the 2013 preliminary test, the PSAT which serves as an initial screening of program entrants. The pool of semifinalists represent less than $1 \%$ of high school seniors. After an application process, it may become possible for Luke to become a finalist and compete for one of the $\$ 2500$ scholarships as well as the notoriety that befalls a National Merit Scholar, sometimes resulting in substantial additional collegiate scholarships.
Fall activities are more than underway keep the doors continually swinging in the school building. On October 20th we will be hosting our first Family Night to be held in the GHS gym during which we will showcase academics throughout our classrooms. Families will have the opportunity to see content, lesson plans, student work, activity promotion, as well as booths sponsored by several post-secondary institutions. The ICU program is fully implemented in the middle school and high school. By requiring that every student complete every assignment we are encouraging a foundation of holding students accountable. Without utilizing and practicing that prior knowledge it's unreasonable to expect success in assessment. ICU is an extensive support program meant to convey to our students that we care enough to never leave them alone.

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## 7th Grade Art - Janene Harry

This year there is another new schedule for the Middle School students and different classes for them to take. While they are in Art during the first quarter they will touch on all seven of the Design Elements: Line, Color, Shape, Form, Value, Space and Texture. They will be doing projects that will include one or more of the elements to show them that more than one is used to complete a project. They will be doing a short unit on Pottery also. The will learn to hand build something, how to fire it and the proper way to glaze it.

## ART I - Janene Harry

They started out the year learning about different mediums they will use for their sketchbook assignments, which are due every week. The first projects were of 3 -D Ribbons using charcoal and then using carbothellos. They drew two different vases/bottles and finished one with charcoal and the other one with pastels. They are currently learning how to do a linoleum print using one color or multiple colors. They frequently use their laptops to search for ideas to draw for class projects and for their sketchbooks.

## ART II - Janene Harry

They will be doing weekly sketchbook assignments using a variety of mediums. They are working on a new project which includes researching a variety of art styles and /or artists. They chose a theme that would be used for four projects such as a giraffe, elephant, ninja turtles, and horse. Then they had to decide on which four styles they would use to do their projects for example: abstract, tribal or realism. They are really turning out great!

## ART III - Janene Harry

These students have weekly sketchbook assignments using their choice of mediums. During their time in this class they can choose projects that they would like to do and they are also given mediums that they have to do. The first project was to reuse one of the old frames that I have in the room for a new project. This is their time to really grow in a new style or strengthen one they have already done.

## Algebra I - Mrs. Johnson

Graphing Calculators were used extensively in the opening weeks of this new school year. Students tested equivalency of algebraic expressions by comparing their tables and graphs.
They also determined the mean absolute deviation of a set of data by storing a list of numbers, verifying the mean, and applying formulas.
The current chapter has brought a review of the distributive properties and applications for simplifying algebraic expressions. Algebra has also been used to explain number puzzles. Preparation is now being made for solving linear equations and inequalities. It is important that the textbook be carefully read, as excellent and complete examples are provided.
Informal Geometry - Mrs. Johnson
Students have been relying on simple geometric drawings of points, line segments, rays, lines, and planes to show possible relationships among them. They have used the compass and straightedge to bisect a line segment. In the second chapter, measurements and midpoints of line segments were determined, and points were graphed on the coordinate plane.
This geometry course will soon provide students with a comprehensive study of angles. They will

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name, measure, draw, and classify them. Additional construction work with triangles will be included in their math journals. Students will continue to review and use algebra concepts throughout the school year.

## Pre-Algebra - Mrs. Johnson

The basic language of algebra has been introduced. Students have translated word forms into numerical and algebraic expressions and simplified them by following the order of operations. They have also graphed ordered pairs on the coordinate plane.
Several properties have been reviewed: the commutative, associative, distributive, and identity properties. They serve as foundation for solving simple algebraic equations and inequalities in order to restore the value of the variable. Throughout the course, students will rely on their problem solving skills as they encounter more complex equations and inequalities. They will often present their work on the board for class discussion.

## Transition Mathematics - Mrs. Johnson

The school year began with a review of numbers: how they are used in everyday life, integers and rational numbers, powers of ten and scientific notation. There has been much practice using the order of operations in evaluating numerical expressions. Along with plotting points on the coordinate plane, students have also graphed simple algebraic equations on the graphing calculator. They have then compared and contrasted the equations and their graphs.
Already, this class has experienced a transition from primarily working with numbers to now translating words into algebraic expressions. Students will experience how formulas can be applied to real-life situations in our Candy Counts activity using an Excel spreadsheet on the computer. Simple algebraic equations will soon be written, and inequalities will be graphed. Pre-checks are available that help students focus on places still needing attention.

## MathCounts - Mrs. Johnson

Groton will again host the first Aberdeen Area MathCounts competition of the 2014-2015 school year on Wednesday, October 1. Practices for middle school students are held on Tuesday mornings, beginning at 7:45 a.m. In order to prepare for competitions, it is important that students complete the MathCounts worksheets, study the vocabulary list, and come to practices.
MathCounts is a nationwide coaching and competition program for middle school students that promotes success in mathematics achievement. It encourages good problem solving skills and provides opportunity for learning additional math concepts. During the school year, sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students have the opportunity to participate in area competitions sponsored by 3M Aberdeen.

## K-8 School Counselor - Ashley Seeklander

Hello! My name is Ashley Seeklander and I am the K-8 school counselor. What's going on in the school counselor's office? Lots! Here's the scoop on what we've been doing and what are planning on doing for the rest of the fall semester in classroom guidance:
In September we focused on our Responsibility character pillar and learned about organization. October will bring us to our Respect pillar and will focus on bullying behavior and internet safety. For November, the 6th, 7th, and 8th grade will be moving into career exploration while focusing on our Citizenship pillar. November happens to be National Career month. Utilizing SDMyLife our Middle School

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students will work on career interest inventories, career assessments, and post-secondary searches. We have a special guest this year- her name is Ms. Toril Sanford. Ms. Sanford is a graduate student at Northern State University and will be completing a year-long practicum and internship at Groton Area. She will graduate in May with her Master of Science in Education: School Counseling. Right now she is working a few days a week with me as I go into the classrooms and with Lunch Bunch groups. As the year goes on she will be here every day and will be teaching lessons by herself. Please help me in welcoming Ms. Sanford to our school.

## World History - Mr. Thorson

The freshman started out the year by learning about the Greeks and what they have contributed to modern society. It was interesting to hear their ideas in class discussions when learning about gods and goddesses as well as the stories of Homer and the teachings of Socrates and Plato. This course runs all year long and will cover many important world events, such as Roman Empire, the building of the European nations, the beginnings of the American nation, world revolutions, both world wars and terrorism in our world today. The students will be asked to do projects, make creative posters complete tests and quizzes and partake in class discussions.

## World Geography - Mr. Thorson

Geography is a semester course so it gives me very little time to cover the important information required. While we do study cultural differences in both the Americas and Western Europe, I do think it is more important to learn about physical regions of the world. When this subject ends in December, all my students will become familiar with where each country is located on the globe. My hope for these students is that when they hear about a place in the news they will be able to recognize where in the world this region is located. Too many kids across the world and even our country still believe South Dakota is located somewhere in the Deep South!

## U.S. Government - Mr. Thorson

My goal for each senior is to help them understand what their role is in a community. To take part in change or as I like to say, be the rock that causes the ripple. Get out there and make a difference and develop a passion to help make that change. I do this in a number of ways like class discussions, current events and community service projects. We are looking at a project that hopefully will involve landscaping the football field. Hopefully this project will take wings and will have something accomplished by the end of the year. We are also busy in the classroom talking about the Legislative, executive and legislative branches of our governments. We will end the semester talking about civil rights and how minorities had to overcome huge obstacles in American history to achieve equality. It's hard to believe these students are finally seniors. It will be hard to see them go at semester time.

## 3RD/4TH/5TH/6TH GRADE PHYSICAL EDUCATION - BRIAN SCHURING

The physical education classes have been actively participating in their games unit and fall fitness testing. The games we have been playing are: Capture the Pig, Pin Guard, Dodge Ball, Kickball and Mat Ball. Fall fitness tests consists of sit-ups/curl-ups, push-ups/pull-ups, sit and reach and shuttle run/ mile run. Being physically fit means having the energy and strength to perform daily activities vigorously and alertly without getting run down, and to have energy left over to enjoy leisure-time activities or meet emergency demands.

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## 8th/9th GRADE PHYSICAL EDUCATION - BRIAN SCHURING

These physical education classes have been participating in fall fitness testing, games unit and archery. The fall fitness tests include: mile walk/run, sit and reach, curl-ups and push-ups. With these tests, we can gauge their class rank in cardiovascular endurance, agility, flexibility and strength. We are trying to convince our students how important it is to be physically fit. The games unit so far have included Flag Tag, Kickball and Mat Ball. The 9th grade students have also started the activity of archery. With the activity of archery, the students learn everything from bows and arrows to stance, hand/arm positioning and scoring accuracy towards the target.

## 6th Grade Reading - Mary Johnson

Sixth grade reading begins in our textbooks that have fun and interesting short stories in them. We finished with a story that tells about the discovery of Machu Picchu in Peru. The students also had to listen to Mrs. Johnson tell about her bucket list and this is on it. Since I talked to about a "bucket list", they think I'm really old!! Our current story is nonfiction about some strange things that science has proven to work. Ask a student why they would want to use "gecko glue" or how a cockroach can become a spy or why a Kevlar vest could be replaced by spider silk!

## 6th grade Social Studies - Mary Johnson

The sixth graders have travelled back in time to the start of the human race. They have learned that people long ago had the same basics that we enjoy now. They even had technology! But to the ancient civilizations, technology was the invention of a new weapon or tool. We are currently going to begin the chapter about World War I and II. They will be studying the causes to the wars as well as other concepts such as trench warfare, mustard gas, the holocaust, different battles, and the impact of these wars on the world.

## 7th grade Social Studies - Mary Johnson

This year the students will be learning about geographical terms. Then we will begin our adventure studying physical features and the history of the United States. After the US, we will learn about Canada. This will continue with chapters about different places in the world. ## Computers - Cara Dennert

The fall semester in the computer lab has sophomores as well as seniors working with the Office 2013 programs. We are reviewing Microsoft Word, Excel, and PowerPoint touching on Access. The Advanced Computer class will be working in-depth with Google and all it has to offer. Many college students find it easier to do collaborative work through the Google platform, so students will get some insight as to how Google's Docs, Slides, and Sheets work and compare to the Office applications. Later on in the semester students will be completing School Service Projects - putting skills learned to use for classroom teachers. Last year students created Jeopardy games and put classroom storybooks into slideshows for elementary students. It's good to give back and pay it forward!

A newsletter is also sent home or emailed to you every week to let you know when tests are and what's going on in the classroom. Also don't forget that our Science, Reading, and AR are now online.

## Title I -Lynette Grieve, Jill Helvig \& Bonnie Schimmel <br> Reading

Our kindergarten Title 1 students are having so much fun using games, activities, and computers as we practice and reinforce the phonics skills of letter recognition, letter names, and phonemic awareness.
Our first, second, and third grade Title 1 students also use many different activities, games, and computer games to work on and reinforce their sight word recognition, phoneme segmentation, phonics skills, phonemic awareness, vocabulary, reading fluency, and comprehension.
As the students are successful in their learning process each day, they earn chips that they can use to 'shop' at our Title 1 store on Fridays. They all love Fridays!
The fourth and fifth grade students started the year on 'Success Maker' and 'Read Naturally', a computer program that they get to pick a story, make a prediction, learn vocabulary words, read, read, and reread the story, take a quiz on the story, and retell the story all before they can pass out of it with a teacher.
As we progress monitor on our weekly probes, the kindergarten probes are letter sounds. The first graders are doing nonsense words, and the second through fifth grader probes are doing oral reading fluency.
It is very important to your child's success in school and life, that you have your child read every night. We all know that everyone is busy, but is there anything really more important than your children???
Suggestions: While you are making supper, doing dishes, washing or folding clothes have them sit at the table or nearby and read out loud to you. When you are driving to a game or another activity,
have them read to you or to themselves. This is much more important to your child's success in life than watching a movie or playing a video game. Any waiting time your child may have, have them read, even if it is only five to ten minutes at a time. In the grand scheme of life..... it will be worth it.
Math
Throughout the first few weeks of school, the Title 1 Math teachers have been giving short assessments to find the strengths and areas that need improvement. In grades K-2, we have been working on forward and backward counting from different numbers (ex. start at 48 and count forward to 61 or start at 22 and count backwards to 15) number after and before a number (ex. What comes after 12, what comes before 34) and identifying and recognizing numbers.
Some different activities to help your child improve on these skills:
Counting forward and backward beginning at different numbers (this can be done individually or with a partner called shared counting
Give them a number and have them tell you what comes after or before it
Identifying and recognizing numbers around the house, stores, town, etc.
Writing numbers
Playing Bingo to recognize numbers
Count steps forward and backward from one room to the next or around the block, etc.
In the upper elementary, we have been comparing numbers using different place values from the hundred millions place down to the thousandths decimal place. We are adding and subtracting decimals. This becomes tricky for some as we forget to line up the decimals or add zeros to the bigger numbers.

## Guidance - Ashley Seeklander

Greetings Groton! My name is Ashley Seeklander and I am the K-8 school counselor. I am super excited to be starting my 2nd year at Groton and my 6th year as a school counselor. One week I have side A and the next week I have side B K-5 for Classroom Connections; 6-8th grade have me every other week. We focus on one of the six Character pillars each month: Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring, and Citizenship. September's pillar was Responsibility and in October we will be focusing on Respect. By the end of the year all our students will be "professionals" at knowing the six pillars and what makes each pillar so important.
In January we started Lunch Bunch groups for our 1-5th graders. We are continuing these groups this year. Lunch Bunch is a small group session designed to boost self-esteem, social skills, and increase peer relations. Any student can be nominated by their classroom teacher to attend. These groups are held during the grade level's lunch period. No classroom or recess time is used. Teachers assign 2-3 students from each side to the Lunch Bunch group who may need a little extra boost in that week's topic area. Students may be referred to Lunch Bunch as many times (or as few times) as necessary. Our most recent topics have been about asking questions in class and homework headaches. So far the students have loved the opportunity to participate.
We have a special guest this year- her name is Ms. Toril Sanford. Ms. Sanford is a graduate student at Northern State University and will be completing a year-long practicum and internship at Groton Area. She will graduate in May with her Master of Science in Education: School Counseling. Right now she is working a few days a week with me as I go into the classrooms and with Lunch Bunch groups. As the year goes on she will be here every day and will be teaching lessons by herself. Please help me in welcoming Ms. Sanford to our school.
