




## **GAT Wrenchs win Robotics Competition**





Groton Area will advance to the second round of the football playoffs after beating Mobridge-Pollock Tuesday night in Groton, 41-0.

Groton had 351 yards total offense while the visiting Tigers had 52 yards offense. Jackson Doeden led Groton with 143 yards rushing, completed one of three passes for 25 yards and a touchdown and had five tackles. Spencer Knecht had 109 yards rushing, 25 yards receiving and led the defense with 10 tackles and a fumble recovery. Bennett Shabazz had 60 yards rushing and two interceptions. Adam Herman had nine yards rushing and five tackles and Nick Dalchow had seven tackles. Seric Shabazz had five yards rushing.

Mobridge-Pollock came out tough int he first quarter, giving the hometown Tigers a run for the money. Groton took over with 1:52 left in the half



#### Groton beats Sisseton, will host

## Mobridge-Pollock on Tuesday in playoffs

Groton took advantage of three fumbles and an interception to beat Sisseton in the final regular season game Thursday in Groton, 34-6.

Sisseton stopped Groton's opening drive with an interception at midfield. The Redmen would score with 3:51 left in the first quarter on a Dustin Lehrke two-yard run. The PAT run was no good and the Redmen were on top, 6-0.

Groton would take its next drive and march down the field, but on fourth and five, Jacob Milbrandt kicked a 22-yard field goal to make it a 6-3 game.

Rayce Harder would intercept the ball to stop Sisseton's drive on its third play, setting the Tigers up at the Redmen 36 yard line. The drive would be completed at the 5:04 mark left in the half as Jackson Doeden would score on a two-yard run. Milbrandt kicked the PAT and Groton took a 10-6 lead at half time.

Both teams fumbled the ball early in the third quarter with Spencer Knecht recovering the Sisseton fumble. Groton would score with 2:12 left in the third quarter when Knecht scored on a 15 yard run. Milbrandt kicked the PAT and it was 17-6.

Nick Dalchow would recover a Sisseton fumble with 1:26 left in the third quarter at the Sisseton 22-yard line. The Tigers would score at the 11:10 mark in the fourth quarter on a Knecht 13 yard run. Milbrandt kicked the PAT and Groton took a 24-6 lead.

Logan Lane recovered a Sisseton fumble with 10:58 left in the game with the ball on the Sisseton 39 yard line. On fourth and third, Milbrandt came in to kick a 35 yard field goal with 7:15 left to make it 27-6.

Sisseton had four plays before turning the ball over on a punt as Groton was at the Redmen 42 yard line with 4:55 left in the game. Just a little over a minute later, Doeden would score from 14-yards out and Milbrandt would kick the PAT as Groton went on to win, 34-6

Groton had more first downs, 16-9, and more yards rushing, 229-84. Sisseton had the edge in passing, 66-62. Groton had four penalties four 16 yards while Sisseton had three for 30 yards. Groton lost one of two fumbles while Sisseton lost three of four fumbles.

Jackson Doeden had 27 carries for 173 yards and two touch-downs, he compelted two of two passes for 58 yards and had six tackles. Spencer Knecht had 12 carries for 45 yards and two touch-downs, he caught one pass for 30 yards and had eight tackles. Bennett Shabazz had four carries for 12 yards and had one catch for 30 yards. Adam Herman had one yard rushing and caught one pass for 28 yards. Kelby Hawkins completed one of four passes with two interceptions. Austin Merkel had eight tackles and Nick Dalchow had seven.

Dustin Lehrke led Sisseton with 14 carries for 35 yards and Ethan Kranhold had two catches for 56 yards. John Meland led the Redmen defense with 14 tackles and Nick Peterson had nine.

Gorton is now 5-3 ont he season and 4-1 in the Northeast Conference while Sisseton falls to 3-5 on the season and 3-2 in the conference. Groton is the runner-up in the NEC race.
