Gridiron team completes season with second trek to the west


Groton Area completed its season Saturday with a 38-7 loss to St. Thomas More in the state championship semifinal game played in Rapid City.

The primary purpose of the Coach of the Year award is to acknowledge coaches who get the most out of what they have in terms of player resources and school support. As the legendary coach Ronnie Theisz said, coaches should not be judged


solely by what they did with the great players they had, but how they helped those players who needed help.

Frankly, Mike Becker has fit that role his entire coaching career at Groton Area. Like many A Division coaches, Becker has had to work productively with rosters listing players who varied not only widely in age, but in ability as well. It's like putting a big, active jigsaw puzzle together every week.

With a core of strong players this year, Groton Area marched through most of the competition, losing only to AA sides Pierre and Aberdeen Central and to James Valley Christian, a loss they avenged when it mattered in the semifinals. In mid-season, the Tigers drew with Sioux Falls Christian, which created a great atmosphere for the final.

The 2014 A Boys final exemplified what Becker brings every year to his teams. There's the never-say-die attitude that each player brings to the pitch, then there's the hard work and expectations. But the main ingredient for Becker's recipe for success is teamwork. He coaches for his team and each team member plays for the guys beside them.









Soccer605 Announces Elite Eleven

Soccer605 is pleased to announce the players who have been selected for the 2014 Elite Eleven Teams for Class A and AA, along with the Player of the Year and Coach of the Year for each team.

At Soccer605, we are often asked, "How are players selected for Area the Elite Eleven teams?" First, to be considered for Elite Eleven, a player must demonstrate respect and sportsmanship. Does the player show respect for the game, teammates, coaches, officials and opponents?

Second, the player must demonstrate leadership, character and integrity on the team. When the chips are down, does the player pick his head up and do his best to help his team get back in the game? Does she support and encourage her teammates, even when they make mistakes? Does he hold himself and his teammates to a high standard, demanding the best of himself and bringing out the best. When his team needed him to perform, Strom was there every time in those around him on the pitch?

Third, does the player demonstrate a high level of competency on the field and leave a lasting impression on her teammates, her opponents, coaches and officials? Does she have a reputation as being an impact player, someone to watch – or watch out for – in a match?

While these aren't the only factors, they are key factors that can get a player noticed for the Elite Eleven "long list" during the first half of the season. Once the long list is compiled, at Soccer605 we reach out to our Elite Eleven Selection Panel across the state – high school coaches, college coaches, club coaches and referees – to gather more input, see if we are missing players, and begin narrowing down the long list to a short list.

Just as in forming any soccer team, based on the identified talent on the short list, we begin to conceive the formation we will use for the final team. If we have a lot of great midfielders who have been identified, we might go with a 3-5-2 formation. If we have some outstanding defenders, we might go with a 4-4-2. In some cases, a player may have played a different position during the high school season than we ultimately see him or her playing on the Elite Eleven team. Finally, using the input from observations of players during games, as well as other information, including statistics, we work our way to the final Elite Eleven. And while we receive and value input from folks across the state, the final decisions fall on us at Soccer605.

It isn't an easy process – there are so many more than eleven great players in each division across the state. With all of the teams not playing each other this year, it made it even more difficult to compare players who were never matched up on the pitch this season. Ultimately, as with any player selection process, the Elite Eleven decisions are subjective, and while you may not agree with our selections, we are sure you will agree that these teams would be formidable on the pitch! Please join us in congratulating the 2014 Elite Eleven Teams and the Coaches of the Year!

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What to do with Bus #92

Randy Hjermstad hit a deer with Bus #92 and is in for repair. But the EMC Insurance Company had other ideas for the former Conde School activities bus. "It's one of the lowest mileage buses in the fleet," said Superintendent Joe Schwan. "It's 20 years old and is a stick shift, but it's one of the better buses we have and it's a dependable bus." The bus has 80,000 miles. The estimate of the repairs is \$4,264.

EMC wrote a letter to the school giving them two options. One was to total the bus at a cash value of \$4,000 and the the deductible and fees, the school would get a check for \$3,500 and lose the bus. The second option was to get a check for \$2,100 with a \$1,400 salvage value and the school would keep the bus.

Board member Kelly Kjelden asked, "They (Harlow's of Webster) have our bus?" (yes) "They bought our surplus buses?" (yes) "And they won't play ball?"

Harlow's has bought the last two buses, but have not picked them up yet nor have they paid for them. Board member Merle Harder asked if the district could keep those two buses and use them for scrap to fix up Bus #92. "They're not going to resell them back to the school," Schwan said.

The board gave Superintendent Schwan the authority to work with the insurance company and come up with a way that the district can keep and repair Bus #92.





Advances to Region 1A Title Game against Sisseton

Milbank jumped out to a 4-1 lead before Groton scored 12 unanswered points to take a commanding 13-4 lead. The stunned Bulldogs were unable to over the deficit and Groton went on to win the first game, 25-17.

Milbank scored first in the second game, but the game was close through the first half with the game being tied eight times and there were three lead changes. When it was 13-12, Groton scored five straight points to take an 18-12 lead. The Bulldogs closed to within two, 21-19, but Groton scored the last four points to win, 25-19.

Milbank took a 3-0 lead in the third game. The momentum had shifted to Milbank as Groton never had the lead in the third game. The Bulldogs won, 25-17.

Groton came out in the fourth game and took the early lead, 4-1. The game was tied at 7, 8, 9, 15, 16 and 17 and the lead changed hands twice. Groton scored five straight points to take a 22-17 lead. A serving error and a hitting error by Groton and three kills by Milbank tied the game at 22. Josie Doeden had a kill to give the lead back to Groton, 23-22. Doeden followed with a block to make it 24-22. Ashley Gibbs had a kill and the Tigers upset the number one seed team of the regions with a 25-22 win.

Coach Chelsea Hanson said, "This was a big win for us. We really hadn't beaten a team that was ranked higher than us or had a better record than us all year and we pulled it off. We have been heading in the right direction for the last 6-7 games and with this team. We have been riding the peaks and the valleys. We played with composure, when we had them up 21-17 in the fourth set, Milbank rallied to tie the game. At the beginning of the season we would have not been able to stop their run and win, but we have come a long ways and reversed the trend. I am so proud of these girls, they've really pulled together the last few weeks and put the team first and they are starting to reap the benefits of that. It feels great to be in the Region Championship. We knew going into this tournament anybody could win on any night and the girls came out ready to play. I'm excited for them. They deserve to have some success for how hard they have


South Dakota Pump Prices

Say what? What on earth is 2E6 (otherwide known as 2 ECHO 6)? The Groton City Council had a special meeting last week to meet with Jason Engbrecht who works for the Aeronomics Division of the South Dakota Department of Transportation. At the center of the discussion was the future of the Groton Municipal Airport which is officially known as 2E6. The airport is located five miles north of Groton and was activated in May of 1949 by the United States Coast Guard.

Engbrecht told the council that the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has been telling him that something needs to be done with 2E6. "They said I've been putting it off for 13 years and now, you will deal with it," he said.

The city received a 24 hour notification that Engbrecht would be coming to Groton to discuss closure of the airport. That resulted in a special meeting being called and Engbrecht told the council, "I'm on your side. I will try to help you."

on the south end and is 1,855' long. The public can use the airport without permission.

#2) Change it to a publicly owned private airport. Once it becomes private, pilots who wish to use the airport must first obtain permission from the city. This was done in Harrold.

#3) Sell the property and give the funds to the Aberdeen Regional Airport.

The council will not consider option #3 as it gets about \$25,000 a year for rent of the property around the airport.

There were other things that Engbrecht talked about. He said the length of the airport could be changed as well as the width. If that was done, then the city would not have to do any more to the airport. As of right now, the farming of the property is too close to the airport edge, especially on the ends. "I would get really tough on this," Engbrecht said of farming too close to the airport. "You have a liability issue here."

Grain bins were errected a few years ago 2,471' to the northwest of the airport. The city was unaware of the grain bins going up until they were completed. City Finance Officer Anita Lowary said she has been in contact with the county zoning administrator to discuss the situation. One option available to the city is to extend the city's zoning administration to include three miles around the airport. Anything within three miles of the airport needs to be "airspaced." In other words, anything built within three miles must be documented with the FFA.

The city's airport has been unlicensed for two years. It has been taken off of many of the FFA records.

Engbrecht also said the wooden markers at the airport are considered unsafe. In addition, there were markers located a the middle of each end of the runway which needed to be moved immediately. He said there are black and white cones that are available and would be a safer option for the airport. He said if an airplane wing tip would hit one of the wooden markers, it could cause an accident.

Council members will mull over options one and two. City Attorney Drew Johnson will make his legal presentation at the November 17th council meeting. The council will then decide which option to take at the December 2 meeting. If everything is done, the city's airport could be licensed once again.
