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State Historical Society to host Smithsonian Sunday Program on Jan. 11

PIERRE, S.D. – The Museum of the South Dakota State Historical Society will host a special webcast of the Smithsonian Institution's National Air & Space Museum program entitled, "NASA's Flying Saucer: Learning to Land on Mars" at 2 p.m. CST on Sunday, Jan. 11, at the Cultural Heritage Center in Pierre. The program, in the Cultural Heritage Center's education room, is offered in collaboration with the Smithsonian National Air & Space Museum and the Smithsonian Affiliations program.

In this "What's New in Aerospace?" program, Ian Clark, principal investigator for the Low Density Supersonic Decelerator project at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, discusses the Mars Science Laboratory landing and describes the process and technologies used to land the Curiosity Rover on Mars. He provides historical context for the development of those technologies and talks about the need for improvements as we move to larger and larger payloads, and then briefly introduces the Low Density Supersonic Decelerator technology and discusses tests that are being conducted to mature the technologies.

"This is a fascinating program," commented Jay Smith, museum director for the State Historical Society. "We feature experimental balloon technology that took place in South Dakota in our 20th Century section of 'The South Dakota Experience,' so it is very interesting to see NASA's 21st century technology in that context."

There is no fee to view the program, but standard admission fees apply for visitors wanting to go into the museum galleries. The program was originally broadcast Nov. 5 in the Smithsonian's "Moving Beyond Earth" gallery as part of the "What's New in Aerospace?" programming.

The State Historical Society became a Smithsonian Affiliate in January 2013, and it is the only affiliate in South Dakota. Since 2013, the museum has hosted a "Smithsonian Sunday" program on the second Sunday of each month.

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Today in Weather History 1967: Freezing drizzle added a thin coating of ice over a previous ice coating that had been created on the 16th of the month over eastern South Dakota and still existed in most areas. An ice coating remained over many areas in eastern South Dakota through the end of the month.

1991: Light freezing drizzle and freezing rain developed over northern South Dakota from Timber Lake to Webster. Numerous car accidents were attributed to slippery conditions. The Aberdeen Police Department reported 24 accidents in Aberdeen, but only one resulted in an injury. Numerous businesses closed and schools were canceled.

1993: Strong winds, accompanied by existing snow cover and one to five inches of new snow, caused blizzard conditions in parts of north central and eastern South Dakota from the 20th to 22nd. A man died in a weather-related crash of a small plane near Isabel on the night of the 20th. The heaviest new snowfall of four to five inches was located in the Sisseton Hills in northeast South Dakota, while the north central part of the state generally received only an inch or two of new snow.

2008: Arctic air combined with blustery northwest winds brought extreme wind chills to central and northeast South Dakota and west central Minnesota from the late afternoon of the 20th until the afternoon of the 21st. Wind chills of 35 below to 45 below zero were common across the area.

1986: An "Alberta Clipper" intensified explosively south of New England bringing high winds, torrential rains, and heavy snows to the region. Up to 4 inches of rain fell in southern areas and winds gusted frequently to 70 mph. 30 inches of snow fell in southern Vermont, 24 inches on the higher elevations of western Massachusetts, and 20 inches in New Hampshire.

1990: Snow fell at Santa Maria, CA for the first time since records were kept.

1836 - A famous cold wave occurred in central Illinois. A cold front with 70 mph winds swept through at Noon dropping the temperature from 40 degrees to near zero in a matter of minutes. Many settlers froze to death. Folklore told of chickens frozen in their tracks and men frozen to saddles. Ice in streams reportedly froze to six inches in a few hours. (David Ludlum) (The Weather Channel)

1942 - An early cold wave sent the temperature plunging to 3 degrees below zero at Nantucket, MA, and to 11 degrees below zero at Boston MA. (The Weather Channel)

1987 - Heavy snow fell in the northern mountains of Colorado, with 15 inches reported in the Mary Jane ski area. Strong and gusty winds prevailed from the Northern High Plains to the Great Lakes. Winds gusted to 54 mph at Buffalo NY,

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
and reached 66 mph at Livingston MT. Rain, freezing rain, sleet and snow fell across New England, with up to seven inches of snow in Maine. (The National Weather Summary) (Storm Data)

1988 - Strong southerly winds ahead of a cold front in the central U.S. gusted to 70 mph at Indianapolis IN. The high winds toppled a masonary wall killing a construction worker. Low pressure and a trailing cold front brought rain and snow and high winds to the western U.S. Winds gusted to 90 mph at the Callahan Ranch south of Reno NV. Soda Springs, in the Sierra Nevada Range of California, received 17 inches of snow in less than 24 hours. (Storm Data) (The National Weather Summary)

1989 - Brutal northwest winds ushered bitter cold arctic air into the north central U.S. International Falls, MN, and Warroad, MN, tied for honors as the cold spot in the nation with morning lows of 34 degrees below zero. Minot ND reported a wind chill reading of 81 degrees below zero. Squalls produced more heavy snow in the Great Lakes Region. Erie PA received 21 inches of snow, including four inches in one hour, to bring their total snow cover to 39 inches, an all-time record for that location. (Storm Data) (The National Weather Summary)

2006 - A major winter storm affected Colorado, dumping several feet of snow on areas of the Rocky Mountains. The snowstorm temporarily closed the Denver International Airport.

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A weather system will move across North Dakota today, and with temperatures around freezing, there is the potential for a light coat of ice. There remains quite a bit of uncertainty however. This system is rather weak and precipitation may not extend far enough south to impact South Dakota. A second system will bring a better chance for measurable moisture, with a greater risk for seeing ice. The main issue is that it remains uncertain over the exact track and the intensity of this storm. This uncertainty extends into Monday as the system moves into Minnesota with some wrap around snow. Accumulations could range from a dusting to as much as 4 inches under the most favorable scenario.



South Dakota State comeback tops CS Bakersfield, 53-49

Man gets 2 years for unregistered firearm charge

U.S. Attorney Brendan Johnson says 26-year-old Gregorio Aguirre has also been ordered to serve three years of supervised release. Aguirre earlier pleaded guilty to possession of an unregistered firearm.

Aguirre is under the custody of the U.S. Marshals Service.

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Judge: Progress on mediation, including SD tribe JAMES NORD, Associated Press

RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) — There has been "major progress" in settlement negotiations between the government and a group of Indian tribes over inadequate federal payments for support costs on public programs the tribes took over administering, a federal judge wrote this week.

Federal Magistrate Judge Karen Molzen wrote in a Tuesday filing in U.S. District Court for the District of New Mexico that negotiations in the settlement process are ongoing. The negotiations are the result of a 2012 U.S. Supreme Court ruling in favor of the tribes, including the Oglala Sioux in South Dakota, that is potentially worth millions of dollars.

Oglala Sioux Tribal Councilman Mike Her Many Horses and Tribal President John Yellow Bird Steele were in Albuquerque, New Mexico, this week for negotiations with the U.S. Department of Justice, which is representing the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Michael Gross, an attorney for the tribes, declined to say how much money his clients are seeking to reclaim. But the litigation has already spawned two partial settlements for the tribes, one for about \$80 million and one for \$29 million.

The high court ruled that the government shorted the tribes by not adequately covering contract support costs on programs the tribes took over as far back as 1975, when Congress enacted changes to give Native Americans more control over local program operations. The negotiations are part of a legal "odyssey" that stretches back to 1990, when the tribes began contending the feds weren't meeting their obligations, Gross said.

The Oglala Sioux joined the litigation in 1999. Her Many Horses said tribal health administration is one area that has suffered from the underfunding.

"We service less people than we normally could have," he said.

He also said the federal shortfall forced the Oglala Sioux to borrow money for payroll expenses, which cost the tribe even more money in interest payments.

Gross, Yellow Bird Steele and Her Many Horses declined to comment on the specifics of the settlement headway.

"We made a lot of progress," Gross said, adding that he hopes the negotiations are wrapped up within a few months.

AG: Sisseton killings result of domestic violence DAVE KOLPACK, Associated Press

A shooting on the Lake Traverse Indian Reservation that left four people dead and one injured was the result of domestic violence, South Dakota Attorney General Marty Jackley said Friday during a news conference attended by family members of the victims.

Jackley said Colter Arbach, 22, was responsible for the deaths in the Nov. 22 attack in Sisseton, located in the northeast corner of the state. Arbach shot and killed Vernon Renville Jr., 31, Candace Labelle, 29, and Angela Adams, 25. Karissa DogEagle, 22, was injured. Authorities say Arbach shot and killed himself.

"All five families involved, the community of Sisseton and South Dakota have suffered a tremendous loss," said Jackley, who travelled to Sisseton to release results of the investigation.

Autopsies confirmed that all victims died of gunshot wounds. DogEagle suffered multiple gunshot wounds to her back.

Jackley told The Associated Press on Friday that DogEagle and Arbach were involved in an "on-again,

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off-again" relationship, and that DogEagle had asked him to move out of a house in Sisseton. Arbach then punched DogEagle three times, Jackley said. Later, DogEagle indicated that someone had called police and Arbach "indicated he may have to fight them off," Jackley said.

DogEagle followed Arbach out the door and saw him shoot several of the victims.

"She turned and ran away and was shot in the back several times," Jackley said.

Jackley said he met with about 50 family members of the victims before the news conference and talked with Arbach's family afterward. He said he wanted to dispel rumors that the killings were related to gangs or drugs. Jackley said Arbach had a blood-alcohol content of .123, but that was not a contributing factor.

The attorney general's report says a Sisseton police officer on routine patrol noticed a vehicle idling in a driveway with doors open and a person lying on the ground near the driver's door. The officer discovered four unresponsive people and DogEagle, who told the officer Arbach was responsible for the shootings.

The investigation determined that two guns were used. There were 18 casings fired from a .223-caliber rifle and three expended shells from a 12-gauge shotgun. There was other ammunition found at the scene.

DogEagle said in a statement that she is healing from serious wounds, but she will require further procedures and physical therapy.

SD Democrats looking for new executive director

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — The South Dakota Democratic Party is looking for a new executive director. Zach Crago currently holds the position, but he says he's stepping down and taking on a new advisory role at the end of the year. Crago has been with the South Dakota Democratic Party for four years.

The Democrats are accepting applications for the position, which they hope to fill no later than Jan. 31.

Crago says he will continue to work with the party in a limited role to help chair-elect Ann Tornberg and vice chair-elect Joe Lowe with the transition.

Warm weather leads to closure of SD outdoor ice rinks

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Parks and recreation officials in Sioux Falls have closed the city's outdoor ice rinks and cancelled sleigh rides at a local park due to the recent warm temperatures.

Jean Pearson with the Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation says rink and warming house hours are subject to weather. Pearson says openings will be announced at a later date as ice conditions improve.

Sleigh rides planned for Saturday at Tuthill Park have been cancelled because of the lack of snow. Weather permitting, rides have been scheduled for Jan. 11 at Memorial Park.

Obama: Keystone offers little benefit to consumers

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama downplayed the benefits of building the Keystone XL pipeline from Canada. He said it would not lower gasoline prices and argued more jobs would be created by repairing America's infrastructure.

He said the pipeline would mainly benefit Canadian oil companies that need to get Canadian oil to the Gulf of Mexico.

He said the pipeline is "not even a nominal benefit for U.S. consumers."

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Obama spoke Friday during his year-end news conference, shortly before he was leaving the White House for a Hawaii vacation.

Obama has resisted efforts by Republicans to authorize the pipeline's construction. Incoming Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell has said it would be the first bill taken up in the new GOP-controlled Senate.

Environmentalists have made opposition to its approval a priority.

NorthWestern Energy seeking to raise rates in 2015

HURON, S.D. (AP) — NorthWestern Corp. is asking the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission for permission to increase electric rates.

The company doing business as NorthWestern Energy wants to increase revenues by about \$26.5 million. CEO Bob Rowe says NorthWestern needs to cover the cost of investments made to meet federal mandates and maintain service reliability.

The requested rate hike would result in an increase of about \$16.76 per month for a typical residential electric customer. It would impact only South Dakota customers.

Regulators will have the final say on any increase, and on when it would go into effect. NorthWestern says rates aren't expected to change before next July.

NorthWestern Energy serves about 678,200 customers in South Dakota, Montana and Nebraska. The company says its last general rate increase was in 1980.

Sioux Falls police probe motel robbery report

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Sioux Falls police are investigating a reported robbery at a motel. An employee at Motel 6 reported that a male with a bandanna over his face entered the lobby shortly

before 10 p.m. Thursday, indicated he had a weapon and demanded cash.

The employee says the man fled on foot with an undetermined amount of money.

VA secretary won't immediately visit SD facility

HOT SPRINGS, S.D. (AP) — Veterans Affairs Secretary Robert McDonald says he won't visit the VA hospital in Hot Springs until after a study is complete on the potential ramifications of closing the facility.

South Dakota's congressional delegation in July invited McDonald to the state, as part of efforts to stop the VA from closing the century-old hospital as part of plans to restructure services in western South Dakota.

KCSR radio reports that McDonald says in a letter to the local Save the VA Committee that he doesn't want to be seen as influencing the process of the study. It's looking at the potential environmental, cultural, historical, social and economic effects of the proposed changes.

The study isn't scheduled to be done until late next year.

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AP News in Brief

Obama: Sony made mistake in shelving film under pressure by North Korea hackers; vows response

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama declared that Sony "made a mistake" in shelving a satirical film about a plot to assassinate North Korea's leader, and he pledged the U.S. would respond "in a place and manner and time that we choose" to the hacking attack on Sony that led to the withdrawal. The FBI blamed the hack on the communist government.

Speaking of executives at Sony Pictures Entertainment, Obama said Friday at a year-end news conference, "I wish they had spoken to me first. ... We cannot have a society in which some dictator someplace can start imposing censorship."

Obama said he imagined situations in which dictators "start seeing a documentary that they don't like or news reports that they don't like."

Sony said it had had no choice but to cancel distribution of the movie since theaters were refusing to show it. North Korea denied anew that it had hacked the studio.

"There is not any connection," U.N. diplomat Kim Song told The Associated Press. Song criticized the film but disputed his government hacked Sony and orchestrated the movie's shutdown: "It defamed the image of our country. It made a mockery of our sovereignty. We reject it. But there is no relation" to the hacking.

US-Cuba deal to restore ties puts spotlight on island's human rights record

HAVANA (AP) — To many exiles and their allies, President Raul Castro is a brutal dictator who locks up dissenters in gulag-like jails, snuffs out political discourse and condemns his people to socialist poverty.

Cuba's supporters see the government as heroic, its sins justified by the behavior of its giant enemy to the north, and offset by the fact it provides health care and education that most developing countries could only dream of.

As often is the case, the truth lies somewhere in between.

President Barack Obama said on Friday that he began his historic call with Castro earlier in the week by delivering a 15-minute lecture on human rights and political freedom, adding: "This is still a regime that oppresses its people."

Even so, he said that US policy had failed to change Cuba for more than a half century and it was time to try something new.

Former Cuban leader Fidel Castro silent amid historic thaw in Cuba-US relations

HAVANA (AP) — Everyone in Cuba is talking about the startling turn in relations with the United States, with one notable exception: Fidel Castro.

So far, the larger-than-life retired Cuban leader has made no public comment on the biggest news in years — that the U.S. and his island nation will restore diplomatic relations after more than 50 years of hostility.

His brother, President Raul Castro, announced the historic shift in a surprise television appearance

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Wednesday and there was speculation he could address it again during the Cuban National Assembly, which started one of its twice-annual sessions Friday.

Among those speaking out on the topic was Raul Castro's daughter, Mariela Castro. She said moves by President Barack Obama to ease some travel and trade restrictions with the island are welcome but won't lead to the downfall of the communist system.

"If the U.S. thinks these changes will bring Cuba back to capitalism and return it to being a servile country to hegemonic interests of the most powerful financial groups in the U.S., they must be dreaming," she told The Associated Press.

As turbulent 2014 comes to an end, Obama arrives in Hawaii hoping for quiet family getaway

KAILUA, Hawaii (AP) — A tumultuous year all but behind him, President Barack Obama set off for his annual winter getaway in Hawaii hoping for one thing: Quiet.

Air Force One touched down late in the evening at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, with the president, first lady Michelle Obama, their daughters and two dogs on board. On Saturday, the family was to begin their roughly two-week retreat from the hubbub in Washington on the lush island of Oahu.

Vacationing in Hawaii, where the president was born and spent much of his childhood, has been a tradition every year that Obama has been in the White House. This year, the trip comes as Obama closes out a chaotic sixth year in office on something of a high note.

Lofty aspirations to overhaul immigration laws, early childhood education and U.S. wages were scuttled by stubborn opposition to Obama's agenda in Congress, and on his watch, Democrats took a drubbing in the midterm elections that will relegate them to the minority in Congress for Obama's last two years. Crises erupted in Ukraine, the Middle East and West Africa, diverting Obama's attention time and again.

Yet as Obama packed his bags for Hawaii, he appeared buoyed by what he had managed to accomplish on other fronts, including the resumption of relations with Cuba last week after a half-century of antagonism. In his year-end news conference Friday, Obama said he felt energized, citing signs of major progress in the economic recovery and his recent executive actions on immigration and climate change.

Visiting Israel, GOP presidential hopeful Ben Carson promises strong support for Jewish state

JERUSALEM (AP) — In his first visit to Israel, prospective Republican presidential candidate Ben Carson said he is in awe of the Jewish state, inspired by its ancient holy sites, impressed by the resilience of people living in a perpetual conflict zone — and deeply disappointed in President Barack Obama.

"I do not believe that Obama has been one to cultivate the relationship," said Carson, a retired neurosurgeon who has emerged as a favorite of some conservatives in the early field of possible GOP candidates.

"I would make it very clear that Israel and the United States have a long, cordial relationship, and I don't think we should ever leave the Israelis in a position of wondering whether we support them," Carson said in an hourlong interview with The Associated Press in Jerusalem. "And that certainly is a question now."

Carson, 63, perhaps best known for his groundbreaking work in separating conjoined twins, is largely unknown to most Americans. But he's earned hero status among conservative activists thanks to his

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outspoken criticism of Obama's health care law.

His rags-to-riches story — he had a hardscrabble childhood in inner-city Detroit — and his deep Christian faith also appeal to potential voters. While Carson has said he is "strongly considering" a bid, supporters have already opened offices in the early voting states of Iowa and New Hampshire.

Iraqi Shiites battling IS group appeal for aid as shortages force desertions

BAGHDAD (AP) — Abu Murtada al-Moussawi answered the call last summer from Iraq's top Shiite cleric to help save the country from the Islamic State group, but after less than three months on the front lines he and several friends returned home because they had run out of food.

"Sometimes, we didn't have enough money to buy mobile scratch cards to call our families," al-Moussawi, a Shiite from the southern city of Basra, said. "Everybody felt like we were being forgotten by the government."

Now Iraq's Shiite religious establishment is urging the faithful to donate food, money and supplies. The clerics hope to prevent a repeat of last summer's collapse of Iraq's demoralized army in the face of the Islamic State group's lightning advance, which saw the extremists capture the country's second largest city Mosul and sweep south toward the capital.

Shortly after the June blitz across northern Iraq, tens of thousands of Shiite men answered a nationwide call-to-arms by the top Shiite cleric, Grand Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani. Many volunteers came from the country's most impoverished areas and were barely able to make ends meet even before taking up arms.

The Shiite fighters are credited with helping to stall the militants' advance outside Baghdad, breaking the siege of the northern Shiite-majority town of Amirli in August, and later driving the militants out of Jurf al-Sakher south of the capital.

Just in time for ski season? Tour agencies say North Korea may soon lift Ebola restrictions

TOKYO (AP) — North Korea, never a country to take the threat of foreign invasion lightly, has been under virtual lockdown since October to keep the Ebola virus from crossing its borders. But two leading travel agencies that specialize in the small but growing North Korea market say they have confirmed that the North may be ready to open up its doors again soon.

The country has taken some of the strictest Ebola measures outside of West Africa despite having very little contact with any of the countries that have been impacted and being — by any reasonable standard — at a very low risk. Some reports by state media have insinuated Ebola was created by the U.S. military.

But Uri Tours, based in New Jersey, recently announced on its website that it has received a strong indication that tours will be allowed to resume in January, "just in time" for foreign skiers to hit the slopes of Masik Pass, which it calls the "most exotic ski destination on earth."

It added that the annual Pyongyang Marathon in April is "a definite go."

Koryo Tours, another major agency, says it has also confirmed that the travel restrictions will be lifted sometime between January and April. Beijing-based Koryo Tours is promoting travel packages from late January for the ski resort — though with a little less fanfare than Uri Tours — and is taking applications for the marathon.

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Falling oil prices force Algeria to confront heavy spending and subsidies

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) — With oil prices at their lowest in five years and showing few signs of hitting bottom, Algeria is feeling the pinch.

Though its problems are dwarfed by the impact on Russia for example, Algeria may have to rein back many of the policies it has held dear over many years. Generous subsidies, for one, may have to be scaled back despite the potential risk of social unrest in the North African country.

Oil revenues make up 97 percent of the country's hard currency earnings and 60 percent of the government's budget. Like Russia, which has seen a full-scale run on its currency, there have been few efforts to diversify the economy away from oil and gas.

Central Bank governor Mohammed Laksaci has warned that the oil and gas dividend won't last forever though nearly \$200 billion of foreign reserves can help cushion the blow in the short-term.

"This capacity to resist such shocks will disappear quickly if the price of oil stays at a low level for a long time," he told parliament recently, deploring the economy's continued dependence on oil.

Federal court finds protesters in contempt for ignoring order to halt anti-whaling campaign

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Radical environmentalists who threw acid and smoke bombs at Japanese whalers were found in contempt of court for continuing their relentless campaign to disrupt the annual whale hunt off the waters of Antarctica.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals Friday ordered a commissioner to determine how much Paul Watson and members of the Sea Shepherd Conservation Society he founded owe Japanese whalers for lawyer fees, damage to their ships and for violating the court order to stop their dangerous protests.

The Japanese whalers are demanding \$2 million in addition to their attorney fees and damage and cost to their ships for warding off the protests.

The environmentalists' exploits have been documented on the long-running Animal Planet reality TV series "Whale Wars."

Sea Shepherd said in a statement it is disappointed with the ruling and considering its legal options.

On Dec. 20, 1860, South Carolina became the first state to secede from the Union as all 169 delegates to a special convention in Charleston voted in favor of separation.

On this date:

In 1790, the first successful cotton mill in the United States began operating at Pawtucket, Rhode Island.

In 1803, the Louisiana Purchase was completed as ownership of the territory was formally transferred from France to the United States.

In 1812, German authors Jacob and Wilhelm Grimm published the first volume of the first edition of

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their collection of folk stories, "Children's and Household Tales."

In 1864, Confederate forces evacuated Savannah, Georgia, as Union Maj. Gen. William T. Sherman nearly completed his "March to the Sea."

In 1924, Adolf Hitler was released from prison after serving nine months for his role in the Beer Hall Putsch; during his time behind bars, he'd written his autobiographical screed, "Mein Kampf."

In 1945, the Office of Price Administration announced the end of tire rationing, effective Jan. 1, 1946. In 1963, the Berlin Wall was opened for the first time to West Berliners, who were allowed one-day visits to relatives in the Eastern sector for the holidays.

In 1973, singer-songwriter Bobby Darin died in Los Angeles following open-heart surgery; he was 37. In 1987, more than 4,300 people were killed when the Dona Paz, a Philippine passenger ship, collided with the tanker Vector off Mindoro island.

In 1989, the United States launched Operation Just Cause, sending troops into Panama to topple the government of Gen. Manuel Noriega.

In 1994, former U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk, 85, died in Athens, Georgia.

In 1999, the Vermont Supreme Court ruled that homosexual couples were entitled to the same benefits and protections as wedded couples of the opposite sex. Country music legend Hank Snow died in Nashville at age 85.

Ten years ago: In a sobering assessment of the Iraq war, President George W. Bush acknowledged during a news conference that Americans' resolve had been shaken by grisly scenes of death and destruction, and he pointedly criticized the performance of U.S.-trained Iraqi troops. Attorneys presented opening statements in the Robert Blake murder trial in Los Angeles. (Blake was later acquitted of killing his wife, Bonny Lee Bakley, but was found liable in a wrongful-death lawsuit brought by Bakley's family.)
