






March 24



Lana Greenfield Responds

We had sent our recent school board story about education pay to Lana Greenfield, Brock Greenfield and Burt Tulson, as well as former Senator Chuck Welke. Welke's remarks were included in the story. Only Lana Greefield responded to our question, "What is going to get done about this?" Here is her response:

No easy fix. The problem is that every state in the union has experienced teacher shortages. Every state is finding that fewer and fewer people are choosing this profession at all. Pay does not seem to be even a factor as some states which pay higher wages than we do still cannot get teachers. I mean how do you get teachers if none are out there?. Arizona went international trying to retrieve people to fill empty classrooms. Around here we still have certain people who say our pay is not adequate and blame the legislature (who funds education 45 cents per every 1.00). These same people become a part of the problem as they continue to spew their venom against being a teacher. We need to speak respectfully of this profession and of those who pursue it. Parents need to speak highly of local educational systems, veteran staff need to help mentor new teachers, administrators need to monitor and guide teachers and have expectations such as no first name basis by a student to a teacher, etc (there are a million things). I think it is time we think beyond our local shortage issues, and instead of making it a possible political agenda, we explore why the teaching field seems to be archaic and unpopular. I loved teaching and feel badly that it is not a popular choice of study any more.





Today in Weather History

April 20, 1966: Canadian high pressure brought very cold air to the Rockies and northern Plains. Record lows included: 3 below in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, 2 below in Cheyenne and Casper, Wyoming, 2 above in Rapid City, 11 above in Fargo, Williston, and Aberdeen, and 15 in Huron.

April 20, 2007: Severe thunderstorms moved through parts of central and northeast South Dakota during the afternoon and evening hours, producing large hail. The largest hail measured 1.75 inches

in diameter and fell 3 miles east of Westport, in Brown County.

1901 - A spring storm produced unusally heavy snow in northeast Ohio. Warren received 35.5 inches in thirty-six hours, and 28 inches fell at Green Hill. Akron OH established April records of 15.6 inches in 24 hours, and 26.6 inches for the month. Pittsburgh PA established April records of 12.7 inches in 24 hours, and 13.5 inches for the month. (David Ludlum) (The Weather Channel)

1920 - Tornadoes in Mississippi and Alabama killed 219 persons. (David Ludlum)

1952 - The tankers Esso Suez and Esso Greensboro crashed in a thick fog off the coast of Morgan City LA. Only five of the Greensboro's crew survived after the ship bursts into flame. (David Ludlum)

1987 - Fifty-two cities in the central and eastern U.S. reported new record high temperatures for the date. The high of 92 degrees at Memphis TN was a record for April, and the high of 94 at Little Rock AR equalled their April record. (The National Weather Summary)


1988 - A storm in the western U.S. brought heavy rain to parts of California. Mount Wilson was soaked with 4.15 inches of rain in 24 hours. The heavy rain caused some flooding and mudslides in the Los Angeles area, and a chain reaction collision of vehicles along the Pomona Freeway which resulted in 26 injuries. (Storm Data) (The National Weather Summary)


1989 - Hot weather spread from the southwestern U.S. into the Great Plains Region. Twenty-three cities reported new record high temperatures for the date. The afternoon high of 104 degrees at Tucson AZ was an April record, and highs of 87 at Provo UT, 90 at Pueblo CO, and 85 at Salt Lake City UT, equalled April records. (The National Weather Summary)

1990 - A fast moving Pacific storm produced heavy snow in the central mountains and the Upper Arkansas Valley of Colorado, with a foot of snow reported at Leadville. Thunderstorms in the south central U.S. produced wind gusts to 76 mph at Tulsa OK, and heavy rain which caused flooding of Cat Claw Creek in the Abilene TX area. Lightning struck the building housing a fish farm in Scott AR killing 10,000 pounds of fish. Many of the fish died from the heat of the fire. (The National Weather Summary) (Storm Data)

2006 - Up to five feet of snow falls in the Dakotas. I-94 and other highways were closed, power was out for thousands and caused at least four deaths.



Hundreds of mourners say goodbye to fallen SD firefighter

BRANDON, S.D. (AP) — Hundreds of mourners have turned out to honor a South Dakota firefighter killed in the line of duty.

A funeral for Steven Ackerman was held Sunday in Brandon. Ackerman died April 12 while fighting a house fire that also killed homeowner David Smith.

Ackerman was a 14-year volunteer with nearby Valley Springs Fire and Rescue. The Argus Leader reports a bagpipe band made up of firefighters from across South Dakota ushered Ackerman's casket to the front of the gym at Brandon Valley High School.

The Rev. Norm Bouwens told mourners to hold Ackerman up "as an example of how we should live our lives, with valor ... and love."

Childhood friend Mike Harstad of Valley Springs says Ackerman saw himself as a regular person just doing his community a service.

South Dakota couple finds success in leather goods

NEWELL, S.D. (AP) — A western South Dakota man who got his start as a master of leather crafts selling chaps behind the chutes at rodeos now sells hundreds of pairs around the world.

Jack Gully and his wife, Kelly, have owned and operated K Bar J Leather Co. in Newell for more than a decade. The shop employs about 10 workers, most of whom work on chaps, while some of the others etch designs into leather with lasers.

Jack and Kelly Gully each have their own specialty, the Tri-State Neighbor (http://bit.ly/1JPdKU3) reported. He focuses on gun holsters and knife cases, while she makes purses and bags.

Jack Gully estimates he's sold 70,000 chaps and shipped some of them internationally, including to Europe and Australia. One order came in recently from Sweden.

The company also makes leather Bible covers, Jack Gully said, and sells 200 to 300 of them a year at \$75 apiece.

Products are all cut and fringed by hand. The company contracts Amish groups in Kentucky and Indiana to work on holsters and much of the tack. Leather comes from all over, though Jack Gully said they'll occasionally get a local brand among the hides they receive.

A pair of chaps can be made in 45 minutes, but more complex pairs could take hours or days.

"There's no machine that does this," Jack Gully said.

The couple opened their leather shop in Newell in 2002 with help from a South Dakota Department of Agriculture business grant, moving back to the state after living in Colorado.

Newell is about 25 miles east of Belle Fourche.

South Dakota Democrats hope history helps them in 2016 JAMES NORD, Associated Press

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — South Dakota's history of electing Democrats to Congress and the state's "independent streak" will ensure there are competitive congressional races in the 2016 elections, Democratic National Committee Chairwoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz said Saturday.

South Dakota Democrats gathered in Sioux Falls for McGovern Day 2015, the party's large annual gathering, where they heard from Wasserman Schultz. The party's central committee also voted to formally join the fight to send two laws to the voters for their review in 2016, and hosted candidate training.

"It's important for us to make it clear that Democrats are going to compete all over the country," Wasserman Schultz told reporters before she headlined the event. "It'll take a lot of hard work, like any election does, but thankfully South Dakota has a long history of electing progressive Democrats."

South Dakota is considered a Republican-leaning state. The GOP holds all statewide offices and supermajorities in both state legislative chambers. U.S. Rep. Kristi Noem and U.S. Sen. John Thune, both Republicans, will be up for re-election in 2016. They already have a sizeable fundraising advantage.

Wasserman Schultz said the state Democratic Party is well organized and said the DNC would help them build the infrastructure necessary to support a statewide race. Democratic Party Chairwoman Ann Tornberg has said the party hopes to run candidates for both seats.

So far, it's unclear when a candidate to challenge Thune or Noem would come forward. Wasserman Schultz mentioned former Democratic U.S. Rep. Stephanie Herseth Sandlin, who was ousted by Noem in 2010 and now works in the private sector. Herseth Sandlin hasn't given any indication that she would run in 2016.

"We miss her in Washington," Wasserman Schultz said.

The state party is also pushing back against a proposal that carves out a \$7.50 youth minimum wage and fighting against a bundle of election law changes.

The two laws were passed by the Republican-dominated Legislature last session. Democrats argue the youth minimum wage is an affront to voters who overwhelmingly passed the \$8.50 minimum wage in the 2014 election.

Republicans have said the campaign for the wage hike focused on adult workers, not on young workers. Rep. Karen Soli, D-Sioux Falls, said Democrats need to translate issue-based support among voters to the party's candidates.

Residents voted 55 percent to 45 percent in November for the \$8.50 minimum wage. But they also largely voted for Republican candidates at the same time, Soli said, and Democrats need to "close that gap."

The Democrats also heaped scorn on Republicans on issues ranging from environmental regulations to economic policies.

"Our battle is a battle for the people of South Dakota, it's a battle for humanity, and it's just a plain battle for decency," said party Vice Chairman Joe Lowe.

Italian coast guard transport 28 shipwreck survivors to Italy as EU ministers discuss crisis

MILAN (AP) — An Italian coast guard ship headed toward Sicily Monday with 27 survivors of what could be the Mediterranean's deadliest migrant tragedy, as EU foreign ministers gathered for an emergency meeting on the growing crisis as migrants flee instability in Libya at unprecedented rates.

One survivor, identified as a 32-year-old Bangladeshi, has put the number of people on board the smugglers' boat when it capsized near the Libyan coast at 950, and only a handful have been rescued. The survivor was flown Sunday by helicopter to Catania, in Sicily, where he was interviewed by prosecutors. He was being treated in a hospital.

"He is pretty well now and he is reporting that there were really many, many persons including children on the boat. So it's confirming the terrible news," said Carlotta Sami, a U.N. refugee agency spokeswoman.

International agencies stressed that the information provided to prosecutors still needs to be confirmed.

Earlier Friday, the Italian coast guard ship Gregoretti brought the bodies of 24 victims to Malta, where the dead will be buried.

Aid agency: migrant deaths in recent days comparable to Titanic tragedy

An international aid agency spokeswoman has compared the scale of deaths in recent shipwrecks to the death toll in the sinking of the Titanic luxury liner more than a century ago.

Sarah Tyler, a spokeswoman for Save the Children in Catania, Sicily, said more than 1,000 people have died in the waters of the Mediterranean, adding "that is almost as many as died in the Titanic, and 31 times the number who died when the Costa Concordia sank."

One survivor's account has put at up to 950 the number of people on board the smuggler's boat that sank off the coast of Libya this weekend, with only a handful rescued. last week in which more than 400 people died or went missing in another shipwreck.

The Bangladeshi survivor said many of the passengers were below deck and trapped inside when the boat sank.

5 years after BP's oil spill, an undaunted industry pushes drilling even deeper into the Gulf

ON THE GULF OF MEXICO (AP) — Five years after the nation's worst offshore oil spill, the industry is working on drilling even further into the risky depths beneath the Gulf of Mexico to tap massive deposits once thought unreachable. Opening this new frontier, miles below the bottom of the Gulf, requires engineering feats far beyond those used at BP's much shallower Macondo well.

But critics say energy companies haven't developed the corresponding safety measures to prevent another disaster or contain one if it happens — a sign, environmentalists say, that the lessons of BP's spill were short-lived.

These new depths and larger reservoirs could exacerbate a blowout like what happened at the Macondo well. Hundreds of thousands of barrels of oil could spill each day, and the response would be slowed as the equipment to deal with it — skimmers, boom, submarines, containment stacks — is shipped 100 miles or more from shore.

Since the Macondo disaster, which sent at least 134 million gallons spewing into the Gulf five years ago Monday, federal agencies have approved about two dozen next-generation, ultra-deep wells.

The number of deepwater drilling rigs has increased, too, from 35 at the time of the Macondo blowout to 48 last month, according to data from IHS Energy, a Houston company that collects industry statistics.

5 years after BP spill: A look at what's changed in offshore drilling in the Gulf of Mexico

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — As oil gushed from BP's ruptured well five years ago and public outrage built by the day, the Obama administration issued a six-month moratorium on drilling in the Gulf of Mexico. When the well was finally capped after nearly three months, political and industry pressure mounted on the White House to lift the ban, which it did about a month earlier than planned.

Since then, oil and gas drilling Gulf has bounced back strongly and the number of deep-water drilling rigs has actually increased from 35 to about 48. Drillers are pushing into even deeper water and greater depths below the sea floor to reach reservoirs considered riskier than the Macondo field, the source of the nation's worst offshore spill.

Elsewhere, the Obama administration has pushed to open up offshore waters in Alaska and along the Atlantic coast to drilling. In January, the Interior Department unveiled a plan to open up drilling next year in the Chukchi and Beaufort seas on the Arctic coast of Alaska and off the coast between Maryland and Florida.

Here's a look at what else has changed and what hasn't in the world of offshore drilling in the five years since BP's April 20, 2010, Macondo catastrophe:

Authorities say terrorism investigation leads to 6 arrests in Minnesota, California

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Six people have been arrested in connection with a terrorism investigation in Minnesota, where authorities have been tracking youths who have traveled or tried to travel to Syria to fight with militants, including the Islamic State group, authorities said.

A spokesman for the Minnesota U.S. Attorney's Office said the arrests were made Sunday in Minne-

apolis and San Diego but there is no threat to public safety. Spokesman Ben Petok did not give details about the charges. He said more information would be released Monday.

The U.S. Attorney's Office and the FBI planned a news conference Monday to announce details. The news conference was billed in a press release as an announcement of a joint terrorism task force operation.

Kyle Loven, spokesman for the Minneapolis office of the FBI, said six people were arrested Sunday but gave no further details. An FBI spokesman in San Diego referred questions to Loven.

Authorities say a handful of Minnesota residents have traveled to Syria to fight with militants within the last year. At least one Minnesotan has died while fighting for the Islamic State.

Hillary Clinton tries to capture magic of 2008 campaign a second time in New Hampshire

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hillary Rodham Clinton will try to recapture the magic of her come-from-behind victory in the 2008 New Hampshire primary as she returns to the state that gave her first presidential campaign a second wind.

Clinton again arrives in New Hampshire as the leading candidate for the Democratic nomination. This time, she faces little opposition. Nevertheless, her campaign is determined to show early-state voters that Clinton is not taking that position for granted.

As she did in Iowa last week, Clinton plans to forgo the packed rallies that marked her previous campaign and focus on smaller round-table events with selected groups of supporters.

She'll speak with employees of Whitney Brothers Inc., a small business that makes wood furniture, in the liberal enclave of Keene on Monday and hold a round table with students and teachers at New Hampshire Technical Institute in Concord the next day.

New Hampshire has long been fertile ground for the Clinton family. In 1992, a second-place finish in the New Hampshire primary made Bill Clinton the "comeback kid," refueling his effort to capture the nomination and, eventually, the White House. Sixteen years later, a win in New Hampshire salvaged Hillary Clinton's campaign from a third-place finish in the Iowa caucuses and propelled her into a months-long battle for the nomination finally won by then-Sen. Barack Obama.

Fliers see cheaper tickets this summer domestically and to Europe; Hawaii 10 percent lower

After years of steadily-rising airfare, travelers this summer can expect a tiny bit of relief — \$2.01 in savings to be exact.

The average roundtrip domestic ticket this summer, including taxes, now stands at \$454, down less than a percent from last summer. Vacationers to Europe will fare better with the average ticket down 3 percent to \$1,619, about \$50 less than last summer.

Not all travelers will get to save.

Flights to Hawaii, Florida and New Orleans are cheaper, but travelers heading to New York, Denver and San Francisco can expect to pay more.

Even in Europe, it depends on the destination. Overall fares are down but it will cost more this summer to fly to cities like Amsterdam; London; Budapest, Hungary; Lisbon, Portugal; Frankfurt, Germany or Reykjavik, Iceland.

Witnesses to WWII: 70 years later, Iwo Jima vet, Okinawa schoolgirl wrestle with legacy of war

ITOMAN, Japan (AP) — In Norman Baker's mind, the Japanese were fanatical, brutal animals with no respect for life. To Yoshiko Shimabukuro, Americans were long-nosed demons who rained hellfire from the skies before raping and pillaging anything with the worse-than-death fate of crossing their path.

Both the 18-year-old U.S. Marine and the 17-year-old Okinawan schoolgirl had known the enemy only from the virulent propaganda they had been fed. When they finally met their foes in the closing months of World War II, in separate, back-to-back battles hundreds of miles apart, it was on the most terrifying terms. And in the 70 years since, it has been difficult to reconcile the hatred of the past with the peace of the present.

Will the Boston Marathon ever be just a race? Here are some things to look for in Monday's run

BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Marathon will never be just another race again. The twin bombs at the finish line of the 2013 race made sure of that.

But when the field of 30,000 leaves Hopkinton on Monday morning, the world's oldest annual marathon will take the initial, tentative steps back toward its roots as a world-class sporting event first, and a cause — for fitness, for fundraising, for freedom — second.

"For us, the core principle is the Boston Marathon is an international athletic event focused on competition and excellence," Tom Grilk, the executive director of the Boston Athletic Association, said last week as he prepared for the 119th edition of the race.

"We start there, every time. Including last year," he said. "What happened in 2013 was the closest and perhaps most poignant part of our history, but part of the history. The history going forward would be written by the people who come and run and watch and participate in all the ways that people do." A year after the explosions killed three people and wounded 260 more, the Boston Marathon got just

what it needed: A safe race, an American victory on Patriots' Day, and a chance for runners and residents alike to rally on Boylston Street.

In 1912, Boston's Fenway Park hosted its first professional baseball game while Navin Field (Tiger Stadium) opened in Detroit. (The Red Sox defeated the New York Highlanders 7-6 in 11 innings; the Tigers beat the Cleveland Naps 6-5 in 11 innings.)

In 1914, the Ludlow Massacre took place when the Colorado National Guard opened fire on a tent colony of striking miners; about 20 (accounts vary) strikers, women and children died.
