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#### **Today in Weather History** May 9, 1999: Heavy rains of two to five inches fell in Lyman County during the late evening hours

May 9, 1999: Heavy rains of two to five inches fell in Lyman County during the late evening hours which caused flash flooding on Medicine Creek. The KOA Campgrounds near Kennebec were flooded including the main facility. Several roads were also flooded and damaged along Medicine Creek. Storm total rainfall in Kennebec was 3.40 inches. Also, a weak F0 tornado touched down briefly three miles south of Reliance with no damage reported. Winds gusting to 70 mph knocked over a 4000 bushel holding bin. This damage was reported 6 miles north of Revillo.

1966: Record snows fell in the northeastern Ohio and western Pennsylvania, including 3.1 inches at Pittsburgh and 5.4 inches at Youngstown Ohio. Snow also extended across parts of New York State with eight inches reported in the southern Adirondacks.

1990: Thunderstorms produced severe weather in the central U.S. during the evening hours, mainly from southeastern Missouri to southwestern Indiana. Severe thunderstorms spawned four tornadoes, including two strong F-2 tornadoes in southern Illinois. Strong thunderstorm winds gusted to 85 mph at Orient Illinois and to 100 mph at West Salem. Thunderstorms drenched northeastern Illinois with up to 4.50 inches of rain.

1966 - Record snows fell in the northeastern Ohio and western Pennsylvania, including 3.1 inches at Pittsburgh PA and 5.4 inches at Youngstown OH. Snow also extended across parts of New York State, with eight inches reported in the southern Adirondacks. (The Weather Channel)

1977 - A late season snowstorm hit parts of Pennsylvania, New York State, and southern and central New England. Heavier snowfall totals included 27 inches at Slide Mountain NY and 20 inches at Norwalk CT. At Boston it was the first May snow in 107 years of records. The heavy wet snow caused extensive damage to trees and power lines. The homes of half a million persons were without power following the storm. (9th-10th) (David Ludlum) (The Weather Channel)

1985 - Lightning struck some trees about 150 yards away from a home in Alabama, and followed the driveway to the home. The charge went through the house and burned all the electrical outlets, ruined appliances, and blasted a hole in the concrete floor of the basement. (The Weather Channel)

1987 - Unseasonably warm weather spread from the Pacific Northwest to the Upper Mississippi Valley. Fifteen cities reported record high temperatures for the date. It was the fourth day of record warmth for Eugene OR and Salem OR. (The National Weather Summary)

1988 - A massive cyclone in the central U.S. produced severe thunderstorms from eastern Texas to the Upper Ohio Valley. A strong (F-3) tornado ripped through Middleboro KY causing more than 22 million dollars damage. Thunderstorms in east central Texas produced hail three and a half inches in diameter at Groesbeck, and near Fairfield. (The National Weather Summary) (Storm Data)

1989 - Thunderstorms developing ahead of a cold front in the south central U.S. produced golf ball size hail and wind gusts to 62 mph at Mira LA, and during the morning hours drenched Stuttgart AR with five inches of rain. (The National Weather Summary) (Storm Data)

1990 - Thunderstorms produced severe weather in the central U.S. during the evening hours, mainly from southeastern Missouri to southwestern Indiana. Severe thunderstorms spawned four tornadoes, including two strong (F-2) tornadoes in southern Illinois. Strong thunderstorm winds gusted to 85 mph at Orient IL, and to 100 mph at West Salem. Thunderstorms drenched northeastern Illinois with up to 4.50 inches of rain. (The National Weather Summary) (Storm Data)

### Eagle Butte training geared toward women in agriculture

EAGLE BUTTE, S.D. (AP) — A training program this summer in central South Dakota aims to help women in agriculture better understand farm and ranch management and also network with each other. The six-week SDSU Extension program called Annie's Project will teach women how to develop financial records, learn key communication skills, ask questions about retirement and estate planning, and expand their marketing knowledge.

Classes meet once a week beginning June 15 in Eagle Butte at the Tribal Wellness Center. Other class dates will be June 22, 29, and July 6, 20 and 23. Each session will run 5:30-8:30 p.m.

Pre-registration is due by June 10 and class space is limited. The cost is \$150 per person and meals will be served at each session.

#### An Obama milestone: South Dakota visit makes it 50 states JIM KUHNHENN, Associated Press REGINA GARCIA CANO, Associated Press

WATERTOWN, S.D. (AP) — President Richard Nixon did it in less than three years. President George H.W. Bush completed it in one term. President Barack Obama has now matched their feat by visiting South Dakota, his 50th state, on Friday.

It took him nearly  $6\frac{1}{2}$  years.

"I am thrilled to be here," Obama said, opening his commencement address for Lake Area Technical Institute and promoting his proposal for free community college. "I have now been to all 50 states as president and I was saving the best for last.

"To the other 49, I hope you take no offense," he added. He's now the fourth president to set foot in every U.S. state.

Lake Area Tech is among the nation's top community colleges, recognized for rigorously preparing students and for a two-year graduation rate that's higher than the national average. Obama said community college education should be available to everyone, just like K-12 education, because the schools play such an important role in preparing students for the high-skilled, technical jobs of the future.

"As a country we can't afford to let any striving American be priced out of the education they need to get ahead," he said.

In just two years, community colleges like Lake Area Tech can change lives, change careers and benefit their communities, Obama said. The graduates inspired him, he said.

"That's why I came here today, to this little tiny school in a little tiny town," he said.

Obama had traveled to 46 states by the start of the year, leaving four reliably Republican states on the to-visit list.

Trips to Idaho and South Carolina — two of those remaining — were quickly arranged, followed by Utah.

Obama had been to South Dakota before Friday's stop, but that came in 2008 when he was campaigning for president. Last year, he spoke in North Dakota at the Standing Rock Indian Reservation that straddles South Dakota.

Bill Clinton was the other president to visit every state while in office.

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## **Obama lands in Watertown for speech to Lake Area Tech grads**

WATERTOWN, S.D. (AP) — President Barack Obama has landed in Watertown for a commencement address before Lake Area Technical Institute graduates.

He plans to promote his plan for free community or technical college education during his speech.

About 600 of the 720 graduates in the spring 2015 class plan to walk across stage and get their diplomas.

#### Winter storm watch for Wyoming, Colorado, South Dakota MEAD GRUVER, Associated Press

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — A potent spring snowstorm threatened to snarl traffic on interstate highways from Colorado to South Dakota, including a stretch of Interstate 80 across southern Wyoming that was the scene of two big weather-related pileups last month.

After a week of soggy weather in the central Rockies, forecasters predicted rain would transition to heavy snow by Mother's Day. Up to 2 feet was forecast in the mountains of Wyoming and Colorado, and over a foot was possible in the Black Hills.

Six to 12 inches was forecast for high-elevation cities including Cheyenne.

The Wyoming Department of Transportation was monitoring the storm and preparing its plows but not making any plans to close interstates just yet, spokesman Dave Kingham said Friday.

"More often than not, it's a question of visibility than any amount of snow. Or a combination of poor visibility and ice and poor conditions," Kingham said of what it takes to close a highway.

The storm could affect travel along I-80 and I-25 in Wyoming, I-70 in Colorado and I-90 in northeast Wyoming and western South Dakota.

Slick conditions and poor visibility factored into two recent pileups on I-80.

On April 20, a fiery chain-reaction wreck 18 miles west of Laramie on I-80 involved more than 60 vehicles and killed two people. The wrecks happened in dense fog and light slush and shut down I-80 for 100 miles in both directions.

The pileup happened four days after one involving about 60 cars and trucks on I-80 about 15 miles west of Cheyenne. Three people were hospitalized from those wrecks in blowing snow.

Forecasters this time predicted a classic upslope storm in which moisture funneled westward from the Great Plains would fall first as rain, then snow, on east-facing slopes.

Some rain will turn to snow at high elevations overnight Friday but most areas will see rain changing to snow Saturday afternoon and evening, said Richard Emanuel, a Weather Service forecaster in Cheyenne.

"Conditions will probably be pretty nasty out there tomorrow night into early Sunday," Emanuel said Friday.

The storm could bring more than an inch of liquid precipitation to some areas, he said.

### SD man sentenced for failing to register as sex offender

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — A South Dakota man has been sentenced to prison for failing to register as a sex offender.

Federal authorities say that 28-year-old Wylie Wind, of Fort Thompson, failed to update his sex of-

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fender registration between Dec, 15 and Feb. 6. Wind was required to register and update his address due to a prior federal conviction.

U.S. District Judge Roberto A. Lange sentenced Wind to 18 months in prison, to be followed by five years of supervised release.

#### Kids, adults gather in Watertown for presidential visit REGINA GARCIA CANO, Associated Press

WATERTOWN, S.D. (AP) — President Barack Obama checks the 50th state off his list of places to visit with a planned commencement speech Friday in Watertown before about 700 tech school grads and their families.

American flags have been attached to light poles along the streets that lead from the airport to the arena, while other preparation included cleaning, painting and polishing the city of 22,000. More scenes from around the area, as the arena filled up Friday with family and friends of the graduates:

#### EXCITED SPECTATORS

Teresa Tufto, 53, of Dawson, Minnesota, said she couldn't sleep Thursday night because of the excitement of seeing her son graduate with a diesel technician degree and also seeing the president on the same day. "It's an honor that he chose Watertown and not an Ivy League school," she said. Her son, Aaron Tufto, 21, was scheduled to start a job in the oil fields of North Dakota, but postponed it to attend the commencement ceremony.

The presidential speech is adding to the joy of getting a diploma, said Tia Koester, 23, of Murdo. "I'm ecstatic that he's here. I'm from a small town, and I never thought I would be able to meet the president," said Koester, who is graduating with a licensed practical nursing degree and plans to work toward a registered nurse degree. "I'm going to scrapbook it and all that jazz," Koester said of the commencement program.

Jordyn Geerdes, 11, skipped school in Watertown on Friday to attend the speech. "I've never really met anyone that's this big for our country," she said. "He's made our country safer and he's kind of like inspired me a little bit. I really want to see him."

HONOR FOR THE SCHOOL

Rather than visit four other presidents at Mount Rushmore in western South Dakota, Obama opted to give a commencement address at Lake Area Technical Institute on the far eastern side of the state. Lake Area is among the nation's top community colleges, and Obama plans to use his speech to promote his plan for free community or technical college education. "It's the best school to come and talk about it," said Terry Dierkson, 35, an automotive technologies instructor at Lake Area.

#### WHITE HOUSE TWEET

An 11-year-old girl in Vermillion who was disappointed that Obama waited so long to visit South Dakota sent him a letter saying so — and the White House tweeted it. The girl named Rebecca listed attributes of the state and included a drawing of a broken heart, with the caption "This is my heart because you haven't visited South Dakota!" The White House tweeted the letter Thursday with the comment, "Rebecca's heart can officially mend when President Obama visits South Dakota tomorrow."

#### PIPELINE PROTEST

A few people opposing the proposed Keystone XL pipeline, which would go through South Dakota as it transports oil from Canada to the Gulf Coast, protested outside the arena where Obama was to speak. "We think this is an opportunity to remind the president of the opposition here in South Dakota to Keystone XL," said Dallas Goldtooth, with the Indigenous Environmental Network. Obama vetoed a

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bill authorizing the pipeline, but supporters have discussed other ways to force its approval. BEST FOR LAST

South Dakota's distinction as the last of the 50 states for Obama to visit while in office sparked an idea for one Watertown printer. Young's Primetime Sports and Embroidery is selling T-shirts that feature a photo of the president and the phrase "Saved the Best For Last."

#### North Dakota farm boy who lost arms graduating high school

MILNOR, N.D. (AP) — An 18-year-old North Dakota boy who lost both arms in a farm accident 15 years ago is graduating high school and preparing for college in Minnesota.

Parker Sebens fell into a running grain auger on the family farm near Milnor, in far southeastern North Dakota, in September 2000, when he was 3 years old. He spent 54 days in a medical center near Minneapolis, where he went through more than 50 hours of surgery before an infection forced doctors to amputate his arms.

Even without prosthetic arms, Sebens can still do things like driving and texting, using the remaining stumps of his arms.

"People can feel sorry for me, but I think that goes away after they see how much I can do," he told KSTP-TV (http://bit.ly/1zJh7et ).

He even shoots pool with his dad, Mitch Sebens.

"He kept impressing us all the way through; he just learned one thing after another," his father said. "When I think about it, it's hard to think about what he's had to go through growing up when the other kids had it so easy, but he did it."

Parker Sebens soon will be getting two prosthetic arms, then heading off to college at Minnesota State University Moorhead. After college, he'd like to become a motivational speaker.

Mother Rene Sebens is finishing a scrapbook for her son as his graduation day nears.

"I thought for a long time he was going to die there, I really did," she said. "I guess I just wanted everyone to know he's living it and accomplishing everything that we want him to."

Family, friends and even strangers have helped him immensely as he's grown up, Parker Sebens said. He's gotten thousands of cards and letters over the years and they keep coming.

"They really just push me to get everything done," he said. "I just wish there was just a way to give back to everyone."

Parker Sebens said he has been determined throughout his life to find ways to do the things he wants to do. Aside from cooking and laundry, there is very little he can't do.

"Every day he amazes me," Mitch Sebens said.

#### Buffalo Chip Campground at Sturgis to be state's newest city

STURGIS, S.D. (AP) — People in the Buffalo Chip Campground area near Sturgis have voted unanimously to make their community South Dakota's newest city.

Thursday's vote was 43-0 in favor of incorporation, though the courts might have the final say.

The city of Sturgis unsuccessfully tried several ways to block the election, including an appeal to the South Dakota Supreme Court. City officials and adjacent landowners believe the campground is within the city's 3-mile jurisdiction, and they're concerned about Buffalo Chip's ability to annex areas around it. They also believe the citizen petition that prompted the vote had invalid signatures.

Buffalo Chip owner Rod Woodruff wants to turn the campground into a city that can attract businesses

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friendly to the motorcycle industry. The annual Sturgis Motorcycle Rally draws hundreds of thousands of people to the area. The campground hosts hordes of those visitors.

"We're happy to be here and we're looking forward actually to utilizing this position as a municipality to be able to develop further economically in this whole region and be able to contribute more to tourism," Woodruff told KEVN-TV.

Sturgis City Manager Daniel Ainslie told the Rapid City Journal that the dispute isn't over.

"The appeal of the county's decision to approve the petition will still work its way through the courts," he said.

#### Plains states brace for severe weather days after tornadoes Associated Press

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Oklahoma and other Great Plains states were bracing Saturday for more severe weather.

The National Weather Service says there's a risk of severe thunderstorms Saturday — including possible tornadoes and large hail — in parts of western Kansas, western Colorado, and the Oklahoma and Texas panhandles.

"We're going to see storms that present the risk of a full gamut of severe weather," National Weather Service meteorologist Todd Lindley said.

Threatening skies stretched beyond the Plains states, as twin weather systems stretching from the Carolinas to California produced an unseasonably early tropical storm in the Atlantic and a late-season snowstorm in the Rocky Mountains.

Up to 5 inches of snow was possible in the Nebraska Panhandle, and parts of South Dakota could receive as much as a foot, according to the weather service.

Heavy rains on Friday night caused some flooding in Oklahoma. In Shawnee, the Red Cross opened a shelter because officials said a Granada Lake dam was close to being topped after heavy rains, threatening homes in one neighborhood. Officials also closed some roads, including part of Interstate 44 in Tulsa.

Earlier this week, powerful storms rumbled through the southern Plains, producing more than 50 tornadoes and dropping 7.1 inches in Oklahoma City on Wednesday — the third-heaviest rainfall for any day on record dating back to 1890, state climatologist Gary McManus said.

David Wheeler and his family retreated underground to a small shelter several times this week. Two years ago, a top-of-the-scale twister tore a miles-long path through the Oklahoma City suburb of Moore and turned Wheeler's son's school to rubble. The family now regularly drills on what to do if the skies turn ominous.

"We've done some dry runs before the spring. I made the kids go down there by themselves, and we've done the same thing with me, the wife and the kids, all together," Wheeler, a fifth-grade teacher whose family has survived two deadly tornadoes, said Friday.

Wheeler and his family are not the only ones who sought extra protection after the 2013 tornado that killed 24 people, including seven children who died in an elementary school.

In the two years since, the city has issued more than 3,000 storm shelter permits. City officials estimate that about 40 percent of homes in Moore now have shelters, spokeswoman Deidre Ebrey said.

#### Putin, in swipe at US, decries `unipolar world' at Victory Day parade

MOSCOW (AP) — Russia showed off new machines of war, including a highly sophisticated tank, on Saturday in the annual Victory Day military parade through Red Square that marks the surrender of Nazi Germany and the Red Army's key role in the defeat.

The Armata tank drew a round of strong applause as it rumbled through the square, part of a long convoy that ranged from the World War II era to the most modern. Also on view for the first time at the parade was a lumbering RS-24 Yars ICBM launcher along with several new, smaller vehicles.

Victory Day is Russia's most important secular holiday, both commemorating the Soviet Union's huge suffering in the war and highlighting Russia's portrayal of itself as a force for peace and security. This year's parade, on the 70th anniversary of the surrender, was the biggest military parade since the Soviet Union's collapse.

In his speech to the assembled troops and veterans, President Vladimir Putin said that the carnage of the war underlined the importance of international cooperation, but "in the past decades we have seen attempts to create a unipolar world." That phrase is often used by Russia to criticize the United States' purported aim to dominate world affairs.

The observances were shadowed by the near-complete absence of European leaders from the ceremony. German Chancellor Angela Merkel is to come to Moscow on Sunday, a visit that will include recognition of the Red Army's sacrifices.

#### Ana becomes surprise tropical storm near Carolinas, weeks ahead of Atlantic hurricane season

MIAMI (AP) — Early surprise Ana muscled up to a tropical storm as it plodded toward the Southeast coast early Saturday, threatening to bring the Carolinas drenching rains and dangerous surf after forming weeks ahead of the formal June 1 start of the Atlantic hurricane season.

The U.S. National Hurricane Center in Miami said Ana was centered at 5 a.m. EDT Saturday about 115 miles (170 kilometers) south-southeast of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. Ana has sustained top winds of 60 mph (95 kph) while moving north-northwest at 3 mph (6 kph).

Forecasters say a tropical storm warning extends from south Santee River in South Carolina to Cape Lookout, North Carolina. Ana is forecast to deliver 1 to 3 inches of rain, up to 5 inches in scattered spots, and drive potentially life-threatening surf.

#### US open to talks with North Korea to test waters on nuclear issue, but prospects remain bleak

WASHINGTON (AP) — After three years of diplomatic deadlock, the Obama administration says it is open to holding preliminary talks with North Korea to probe its intentions and assess the prospects of ridding the country of nuclear weapons.

A senior South Korean envoy traveled to Washington and Beijing this past week as nations involved in long-stalled aid-for-disarmament negotiations consider their diplomatic options. Tensions have eased a little on the Korean Peninsula following the completion of annual U.S.-South Korean military drills.

But it remains unclear if a diplomatic overture to North Korea will even get to first base as the Asian nation appears intent on retaining its nuclear weapons. U.S. officials don't believe the North has dem-

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onstrated a serious interest in re-engaging on the issue, and a spokesman at the North Korean diplomatic mission at the United Nations declined to comment on the question of re-engagement.

President Barack Obama has broken the ice with several other long-standing adversaries, like Iran, Cuba and Myanmar. In the case of Iran, the U.S. has joined with other world powers in negotiating a framework agreement to prevent Tehran from obtaining a nuclear weapon.

North Korea has gone far beyond that point. The North conducted its first nuclear test in 2006, and despite international sanctions intended to prevent Pyongyang from obtaining sensitive technology and starve it of funds, U.S.-based experts are forecasting that it could increase its nuclear arsenal from at least 10 weapons today to between 20 and 100 weapons by 2020.

#### Oklahoma, other Plains states brace for more severe weather days after tornadoes touched down

MOORE, Okla. (AP) — When spring arrives in Oklahoma and conditions are right for tornadoes, David Wheeler and his family don't take any chances.

Two years ago, a top-of-the-scale twister tore a miles-long path through the Oklahoma City suburb of Moore and turned Wheeler's son's school to rubble. That's when he installed a small underground shelter in his garage. Now the family regularly drills on what to do if the skies turn ominous.

"We've done some dry runs before the spring. I made the kids go down there by themselves, and we've done the same thing with me, the wife and the kids, all together," Wheeler, a fifth-grade teacher whose family has survived two deadly tornadoes, said Friday.

The Wheeler family retreated underground nearly a dozen times Wednesday night, when powerful storms that rumbled across the southern Plains produced more than 50 tornadoes. The menacing clouds had barely vanished before forecasters began warning of another system that could produce even more violent twisters through the weekend in parts of Kansas, Oklahoma and North Texas.

"We're going to see storms that present the risk of a full gamut of severe weather," including large hail, high winds and tornadoes, said Todd Lindley, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service.

# Attorneys for No. 1 NFL pick Jameis Winston file counterclaim saying he did not rape woman

ATLANTA (AP) — Attorneys for No. 1 NFL pick Jameis Winston said in a federal court filing that the former Florida State University quarterback did not rape a woman who is suing him and that she is motivated by greed.

Attorneys John F. Myers and David Cornwell Sr. filed a counterclaim Friday against Erica Kinsman in court in Orlando for the Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback, now with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Kinsman, a former student at Florida State, filed suit against Winston last month, saying she was intoxicated at a Tallahassee bar in December 2012 when Winston and others took her back to an offcampus apartment and that he sexually assaulted her. Her lawsuit, filed two weeks before the April 30 NFL draft, accused Winston of rape, assault, false imprisonment and emotional distress.

Winston signed a four-year, \$23.35 million contract with Tampa Bay and was at the start of rookie minicamp on Friday. He could not immediately be reached Saturday.

Winston has repeatedly denied the allegations in the past and prosecutors declined to file charges against him in late 2013. He also was cleared by the university following a two-day student conduct hearing last year. The hearing was held to determine whether Winston violated four sections of the code of conduct — two for sexual misconduct and two for endangerment.

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# Jury finds Utah teen guilty in 50-mile crime spree that left deputy dead

PROVO, Utah (AP) — A jury found a Utah teenager guilty Saturday in a 50-mile crime spree that left a one sheriff's deputy dead and another wounded.

Prosecutors say Meagan Grunwald, 18, was violently in love with her much older boyfriend and would do anything to stay with him, including driving a speeding getaway car in the three-county chase. The teenager tearfully told a jury she was too afraid to stop driving when the man she loved turned the gun on her and threatened to kill her family.

The Provo jury of six women and two men began deliberating Friday afternoon. They returned with a verdict around 12:35 a.m., said court spokeswoman Nancy Volmer.

Grunwald faces up to life in prison when she is sentenced July 18 in the January 2014 chase that also included a carjacking. Her boyfriend, 27-year-old Jose Angel Garcia-Jauregui, was killed in a shootout with police. Grunwald is ineligible for the death penalty because she was 17 when it happened.

The two-week trial included testimony from a deputy shot in the head during the chase and a woman who pulled her child out of her car as it was stolen at gunpoint. Grunwald took the stand in her own defense, telling the jury that being in the car with Garcia-Jauregui was like looking at a devil.

#### Officials say at least 6 guards, 30 prisoners killed in Iraq prison break; 40 inmates escape

BAGHDAD (AP) — The spokesman for Iraq's Interior Ministry says that 40 inmates escaped from a prison in eastern Iraq after overpowering guards, an assault that killed six police officers and 30 prisoners.

Brig. Gen. Saad Maan said Saturday that a fight broke out among the inmates of the Khalis prison in Diyala province and when guards went to investigate, they were overpowered and had their weapons taken.

Maan says some of those that escaped were wanted on terrorism charges. There are hundreds of inmates in the prison.

#### Mounting brazen attacks, New Generation cartel arises from Mexico's assault on big drug lords

MEXICO CITY (AP) — It has the drugs and distribution system of a traditional cartel — and it has the modern weapons and audacity of an army. After attacking federal forces, downing a military helicopter and shutting down streets in Mexico's second-largest city last week, the New Generation Jalisco cartel is now the main enemy in the country's fight with drug cartels.

In just a few years, New Generation has grown from being an offshoot of the powerful Sinaloa cartel to one of Mexico's strongest criminal groups in its own right, according to the U.S. Treasury Department, whose Office of Foreign Assets Control maintains a "black list" of drug trafficking organizations.

Its quick rise reflects a rapidly changing organized-crime landscape in Mexico as the government targets top leaders of established cartels. More than any other criminal group, New Generation has taken advantage of the government's top-capo strategy, strengthening and grabbing territory from other cartels as they are weakened.

"You're talking about a powerful, large organization with grand logistics, well-made structures, a

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strong group of assassins, and dedicated and qualified people with high-caliber weaponry," Guillermo Valdes, a security expert and former director of the Mexican intelligence agency, told The Associated Press. "It's a new cartel, a second generation born in a restructuring process."

The strategy of hitting top leadership began in 2006 under President Felipe Calderon and has continued under his successor, Enrique Pena Nieto. As a result, large organizations have been fragmented, leaving smaller, leaderless groups to fight among themselves over control of local organized crime activities and drug-smuggling routes to the north.

#### Polish president challenged in re-election bid by rock star, exactress, vodka producer

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The incumbent is an aristocrat who embodies Polish tradition. His challengers include a punk rock star, a blonde bombshell actress and a renegade vodka producer who once wielded a gun at a press conference.

Poland's presidential elections Sunday have a colorful cast of candidates whose antics are providing most of the drama, because there's little suspense about the result: President Bronislaw Komorowski expected to easily win re-election.

Komorowski, a popular leader aligned with the ruling center-right Civic Platform party, won office in 2010 after his predecessor, Lech Kaczynski, died in a plane crash.

His time in office has been marked by general harmony with his allies in government. He has long enjoyed high approval ratings, though some voters seem to be growing bored by him and Civic Platform, which has been in power since 2007. That has given a boost to the anti-establishment candidates, most of all for the punk rocker Pawel Kukiz — pronounced like "cookies" — who used to perform in a band called "Breasts."

If no candidate wins at least 50 percent on Sunday, a runoff will be held on May 24. The presidency carries many ceremonial duties, with most power in the hands of the government. However, the president is also officially the commander-in-chief and has the power to propose and veto legislation.

#### Britain's Prince Harry talks rugby, presses noses with Maori on 1st trip to New Zealand

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (AP) — Britain's Prince Harry arrived in New Zealand Saturday for a weeklong visit and was soon talking about the country's prowess in rugby, pressing noses with indigenous Maori leaders, and laughing off marriage proposals.

Harry was greeted by Prime Minister John Key and other dignitaries when his plane landed in Wellington on a sunny and calm fall day. Wearing a blue suit, Harry stopped often to say hello to cheering fans as he began his first tour of the South Pacific commonwealth nation of 4.5 million.

From the airport he traveled to Government House for an official welcome. He pressed noses with Maori leaders in a traditional greeting called a "hongi" and met with military representatives. He also talked with schoolchildren, feigning surprise when some told him they didn't play rugby.

"I thought you would be forced to play rugby," he said. "That's why you have such a good rugby team isn't it?"

Harry was scheduled to watch a rugby game Saturday night between Wellington's Hurricanes and South Africa's Durban-based Sharks. The prince also talked about soccer, telling the children that most royal family members were Arsenal fans.

#### Today's Highlights in History:

On May 9, 1945, with World War II in Europe at an end, Soviet forces liberated Czechoslovakia from Nazi occupation. U.S. officials announced that a midnight entertainment curfew was being lifted immediately.

#### On this date:

In 1754, a political cartoon in Benjamin Franklin's Pennsylvania Gazette depicted a snake cut into eight pieces, each section representing a part of the American colonies; the caption read, "JOIN, or DIE."

In 1814, the Jane Austen novel "Mansfield Park" was first published in London.

In 1864, Union Maj. Gen. John Sedgwick was killed by a Confederate sniper during the Civil War Battle of Spotsylvania in Virginia.

In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson, acting on a joint congressional resolution, signed a proclamation designating the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day.

In 1926, Americans Richard Byrd and Floyd Bennett supposedly became the first men to fly over the North Pole. (However, U.S. scholars announced in 1996 that their examination of Byrd's recently discovered flight diary suggested he had turned back 150 miles short of his goal.)

In 1936, Italy annexed Ethiopia.

In 1951, the U.S. conducted its first thermonuclear experiment as part of Operation Greenhouse by detonating a 225-kiloton device on Enewetak Atoll in the Pacific nicknamed "George."

In 1961, in a speech to the National Association of Broadcasters, Federal Communications Commission Chairman Newton N. Minow decried the majority of television programming as a "vast wasteland."

In 1965, Russian-born American pianist Vladimir Horowitz performed publicly for the first time in 12 years with a recital at Carnegie Hall in New York.

In 1974, the House Judiciary Committee opened public hearings on whether to recommend the impeachment of President Richard Nixon. (The committee ended up adopting three articles of impeachment against the president, who resigned before the full House took up any of them.)

In 1980, 35 people were killed when a freighter rammed the Sunshine Skyway Bridge over Tampa Bay in Florida, causing a 1,400-foot section of the southbound span to collapse.

In 1994, South Africa's newly elected parliament chose Nelson Mandela to be the country's first black president.

**Ten years ago:** President George W. Bush, Russian President Vladimir Putin, French President Jacques Chirac and German Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder commemorated the 60th anniversary of the Allied victory over Nazi Germany with a lavish military parade in Moscow. President Bush then traveled to the republic of Georgia, the first American chief executive to visit. Actress Renee Zellweger married country music star Kenny Chesney on the Caribbean island of St. John in the U.S. Virgin Islands (however, the marriage was annulled just months later). The news and opinion website The Huffington Post was launched.

**Five years ago:** Lena Horne, 92, the enchanting jazz singer known for her signature song, "Stormy Weather," and for her triumph over bigotry that allowed her to entertain white audiences but not socialize with them, died in New York. Dallas Braden pitched the 19th perfect game in major league history, leading the Oakland Athletics in a 4-0 victory over the Tampa Bay Rays.

One year ago: Russian President Vladimir Putin made his first trip to Crimea since its annexation,

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calling it "historic justice" during a Victory Day display of military pomp and patriotism. A judge struck down Arkansas' ban on same-sex marriage, saying the state had "no rational reason" for preventing gay couples from marrying.
