# Carlson brings special gifts to **Methodist Church Parish**

Pastor Thomas Carlson is the new pastor of the United Methodist Churches in Groton and Conde. He officially took over on July 1, 2015, after being assigned by the district superintendent.

Pastor Matt Richards has accepted a call to the United Methodist Church in Miller.

Carlson said, "I feel called into a ministry to minister to people who are broken, loss and lonely so that they can find wholeness and healing in Jesus Christ." Carlson's sending church is Legacy United Methodist Church in Bismarck. "Their values are Radical hospitality, Extravagant generosity, Passionate worship, Authentic faith sharing, Intentional faith development

and Risk taking missions and service, and if you take the first letter of each one of those, it spells REPAIR," Carlson said. "There are a lot of people who are hurt, that have been mulled by other ministries, that were coming to Legacy to get refreshed, rejuvenated and sent back out to serve. Legacy Methodist Church has a foundation of healing. That is my sending church." Sunday was his first day in the Groton-Conde parish. "I shared four things that are on my

sleeve that everyone can see. They reflect spiritual gifts of love, encouragement, hospitality and prayer. Those are what I live for."

Carlson is not afraid to be out in the community, visiting with people. "I believe in order to be a successful minister, you need to be out in the community. You need to have a community presence. You need to genuinely loving the people, and encouraging the people who are discouraged. People come to church because they want to be loved, where they 7 at 7 p.m. want to be in a faith community. They want to partner with other believers so they can find healing and wholeness in Jesus Christ. That's my thought in ministry."

Carlson has experienced a welcomed hospitality in the Groton-Conde parish. "My wife and I are so blessed," he said. "We have experienced such a hospitable heart from people, from the food that was brought by our house, to folks who showed up to help us unpack. Even before we got here, we received a card from the United Methodist Women. From the time we were called to be pastor here until we got here, it has been a tremendous blessing."

Carlson's home town is Menomonie, Wis. It was at the age of eight when he had the calling to ministry. "When I put on the robe to light the candles, I felt a presence that led me to the ministry," he said. He became committed to Jesus at the age of 13. After high school, he attended a non-denominational college in San Diego, Calif. He then moved to Bismarck where he was a youth pastor for middle school and high school students for five and one-half years and then became a Connections Pastor at Legacy Methodist Church in Bismarck. In addition to Legacy, he became senior pastor at the United Methodist Churches in Edgeley and Ashley, North Dakota, where he served for a year.

Thomas married Britni in 2009 in Bismarck. Britni's college major is graphic arts and photography design, but Thomas said that her passion is with special needs students and doing wellness with Young Living Essential Oils. They also have two dogs that are part of their family, Buzz and Hayley.

On August 1, Carlson will be working towards his Master of Divinity degree at Sioux Falls Seminary.






The clouds were outlined in the early Sunday morning hours from one of the storms that passed through the area Sunday morning.





# Friends...Near and Far

Editor's Note: This is the 27th in a series featuring your friends, near and far.

### **Brock Jones**

**JobWise what are you doing today?** I work for Ford Motor Company (Dearborn, MI) in the Global Product Planning and Strategy group as a Manager.

**How long have you been working at the current job?** I joined Ford right out of college, nearing 15 years now. 7 years of which of have been in Global Product Planning and Strategy

How did you get your current job? In my senior year of college (South Dakota State) I had my resume on an online job site and a recruiter for Ford saw it. I did a phone interview and then they flew me out to Dearborn for more interviews and I got the offer. I did not have Ford/automotive on my radar, at the time I was thinking I wanted to do Medical Device industry in Minneapolis area, but I found out I could live in Ann Arbor, MI , home of my beloved Michigan Wolverines, and work for Ford. So I decided to move out here without knowing a soul, figuring I'd stay a few years, take in some Michigan football games and then eventually migrate back to Minneapolis. Next thing you know, I meet a pretty gal from Michigan and 15 years later, still here!

**If you have previous employments list them and how long you were there.** Been at Ford since graduating from college. I worked within Ford as a Chassis Engineer for about 6 years designing suspension components on F-150 and Explorer before joining my current group Global Product Planning and Strategy.

What high school did you attend and what year did you graduate? Langford High School (1995)

Where did you attend college and what was your degree? Undergrad – South Dakota State University, Major in Mechanical Engineering, Minor in Computer Science (2000), Grad – University of Michigan (Ann Arbor, MI), Masters in Business Administration (MBA), (2011)

What advice would you give the high school students today? The "right" thing to do and the "easy" thing to do are rarely the same thing. No matter what decision you are making, this usually holds true. From deciding the strategy on the next Mustang to picking a college or a career, if you stop and think logically about what is right, and avoid taking the easy road, you will likely have success.

Also, figure out what your unique skills are, find a career that leverages those and then work your tail off! I just read a quote from Rory McIlroy (Professional golfer) who said he has come across a lot of successfully people in life and they all tend to be people who work the hardest, and the really special ones have a unique skill AND work the hardest. I couldn't agree more.

**List your major accomplishments that you have had so far in life.** On a personal level, I was proud of getting accepted in to University of Michigan for my MBA. It's one of the top programs in the nation (#1 in some publications) and somewhat difficult to get in to. Coming from a small town with ~100 people in the high school, you have a little bit of a "chip" on your shoulder and I always want to prove to people you belong. To get in and take classes and find out I belonged and could hold my own in that environment was a confidence building experience.

On a professional level, I was the Lead Product Strategist on the Ford Mustang for about 5 years. As the Product Strategist your role is to develop the overall strategy (how will we compete, how we will make money, etc) for the product, this work usually takes place about 5 years before the car hits the dealership. Mustang is such an iconic vehicle and important to the Ford brand, so it was thrilling and challenging at the same time. Under my watch, we created the Boss 302 vehicle (2012 and 2013 model year) that was a huge success, I developed the strategy for the 2015 model year Mustang that is just hitting dealers (I have been seeing it in the design studio for about 4 years now, so that is always neat to see the public's reaction to something you have been watching develop for so long), and the soon to be produced Shelby GT350. I also led the charge to make Mustang a "global" product, so after 50 years of production, the Mustang is finally being sold in Europe and Asia.

**Are you married?** I am married to Julie (maiden name Trinkle) now for nearly 9 years. She is from Dexter, MI (just outside of Ann Arbor) and that is also where we live now.

**How did the two of you meet?** We met at an Irish bar in Ann Arbor. She was out with some friends one night and I was out with my roommate. It turned out my roommate knew one of Julie's friends and so my roommate and I kind of "joined" their group and I got to talking to Julie and the rest is history. We chuckle because it's not the ideal "we met at church" story. She grew up in a relatively small

town (Dexter is about 4000 people today, in the mid-90's probably around 2500) and her dad was a Farmer, so we had a lot in common. I laugh because I moved 1000 miles away from our family farm and end up marrying a farmer's daughter out here!

**Do you have any children?** We are blessed to have 3 children. Brady (6), Tyler (3) and Lauren (4 months).

Do you feel that your high school and college education prepared you adequately for post education life? I feel blessed to have had the educational experiences I have had. Langford was a great school with great teachers that pushed you, cared for you and prepared you for college and life. In my job I do a lot of writing of strategy papers and presenting them to senior management. I still draw upon the writing and speech lessons that Ms. Hoines gave me! Also the great Math and Science courses that Mr. Kruse and Mr. Gibson had really helped pave the way to getting my Mechanical Engineering degree at SDSU. As for South Dakota State, it was the best. I remember first starting at Ford and sitting next to graduates from Michigan, Ohio State, Stanford and they would poke fun at me about where I came from (Jackrabbits pennant hanging proudly in my office). And I would tell them, "it got me the same job you guys have, getting the same pay, and it probably cost me 1/10th as much for my degree!" Force = mass x acceleration (Physics 101) at SDSU and at Stanford. My MBA from Michigan is just icing on the cake.

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# It's time to get your house numbers up, or else

Last year, the Groton City Council had voted to make it mandatory to have house numbers installed on homes and businesses. Thus far, compliance has been limited as there are many places that still do not have house numbers. The city will be doing a one-call to all Groton residents reminding them of the ordinance. In addition, there will be a notice on this month's utility bill. Residents will have until July 31, 2015, to have their house numbers up or a summons will be issued.

According to city ordinance 9-1-4: 9-1-4: Building Numbering.

a) Addresses for dwelling units and places of business on all public and private streets shall be assigned by the Finance Officer in accordance with the procedures adopted by the City of Groton.

b) Within thirty(30) days of notification of the address by the Finance Officer, the owner, occupant, person, firm, corporation or business in charge of any house or building to which an address has been assigned must place or construct such numbers as to be easily visible and distinguishable from the street or avenue on which the property is located. Any other numbers must be removed to avoid confusion. These numbers shall not be less than three (3) inches in height and of a contrasting color to the background. The numbers shall be read horizontally from left to right or vertically from top to bottom. The numbers in plain, block, vertical (not slanted) font are preferred. The property owner, occupant, or person in charge of the structure shall pay for all costs and installation of the numbers.

c) In case a principle building is occupied by more than one business or family dwelling unit, each separate unit must display a separate unit number.

d) If the building or dwelling is situated in such a way that the address can not be easily seen from the roadway in front of said structure, then a sign or address post must be used in front of the structure or at the entrance of the primary driveway and place in such a way that it can easily be seen from the roadway.

e) New structures must comply with this ordinance within 30 days of occupancy.

f) In the event that the owner of occupant or person in charge of any dwelling or building refuses, fails, or neglects to comply with the terms of this ordinance by placing the number assigned or replacing the number if necessary, a notice shall be sent to the property owner by first class or certified mail or by personal service giving ten days after date of the notice to comply. Failure to comply with this notice will result in a fine not to exceed \$50 for each offense and each day in violation constitutes a separate offense.

Wright & Sudlow is expected to show up this week to do the curb and gutter that needs to be done on the Fifth Avenue West project. That was reported by city supervisor Terry Herron at the city council meeting held Monday night. He also reported that they are toying with the idea of renting a backhoe to move infrastructure in prepration for the 2016 Broadway Project. Councilman Mary Fliehs asked Herron about the cemetery upkeep. Herron said, "Brian (Gravatt) has been doing a good job at the cemetery. He's been basically doing it all by himself."

Electric Superintendent Shawn Lambertz reported on the outage caused by the lightning from Saturday night's storm. Lightning hit the electric pole on the north side of the park, Lambertz said that pole is scheduled to be changed out on Wednesday from 9 a.m. to noon. Residents on the east side of Main Street and the west side of North Third Street north of the park to US Highway 12 will have no power during the pole change-out. Two street lights were also burned out from the bolt of lightning and they were changed out to the new LED lights. Lambertz reported that more LED lights will be installed during the winter months.


It was also mentioned that lightning hit a tree at the BJ Clocksene place on West Third Avenue, causing some damage in the area including an air conditioner and garage door opener.

There was discussion on the garage at the baseball complex and possibly moving it to the pool area for storage for pool and park equipment and miscellaneous stuff. Councilman David Blackmun said the baseball committee will be meeting Sunday night to discuss the garage. They are looking to have a two-stall garage for storage as the baseball complex.

The lights on Locke-Karst Field will all be relamped. Lambertz reported that Musco will be coming on July 13th to do the work. The city has budgeted \$3,000 for repairs to the baseball lights for this year. Lambertz said that Jerry Locke has said they will come up with the rest of the money to relamp the lights. Groton will be hosting the regional Legion Tourney and they want the field in top condition.

The council approved \$294,000 worth of bills with just \$211,000 in the bank. City Finance Officer Anita Lowary reported that about \$37,000 worth of loan payments will be paid on the 15th of July in anticipation of revenue from the city utility money coming in.

The fee for paying midget umpires for league games was discussed. The rate is \$20 behind home plate and \$15 for the umpire. The council



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

authorized the fees.

The Groton Independent had the low quote for the official newspaper status. The Dakota Press was also designated and agreed to charge the same rate as the Independent, which is \$.24 for the line rate, \$3 per column inch for display advertising and free classifieds.

The official banks will be First State Bank, Wells Fargo Bank, Dacotah Bank and SD Public Funds Investment Trust.

The council granted approval to move the one basketball hoop at the pool to the north side of the big slide. Currently the hoop has been taken down as the slide was installed in that area.

The budget for the first six months of 2015 was reviewed. As Councilman Burt Glover said after the discussion, "You could have saved the ink and said we're still broke." So far, the council has overspent the budget by \$50,441.09. Lowary said a lot of that came from paying off the note at the First State Bank, which was not ancipated for 2015 as it was



JUNE 30, 2015 - GENERAL





in the Commission Chambers, an ordinance amending Second Revision Brown County Ordinances, Title 16, Chapter 16.06 - Other Provisions by adding new Section 16.06.04 – Contracts to Operate Certain Concessions during Fair Week, as follows:

16.06.04 Contracts to Operate Certain Concessions During Fair Week

Should the Brown County Commission decide to enter into an agreement with a private group or organization, allowing the group or organization to provide certain concessions during Fair Week, the following rules will apply:

These provisions will only apply to contracts for concessions sold at the fair "Clubhouse" (aka Beer Garden) and or the fair 'Grandstand" during Fair Week.

For groups and organizations to be eligible to contract with the County to provide concessions at these venues, the group or organization must meet the following criteria:

The group or organization must be recognized by the IRS as a not-for-profit organization under federal tax law.

The group or organization must demonstrate that it has a large enough volunteer base to effectively handle the requirements of the contract and the challenges of providing excellent service to the fair-going public.

Any contract entered into with a group or organization will be for a maximum of three years or three Fairs, whichever is shorter, with either party to the contract having the right to terminate the contract during the Contract Review Period each year, by giving proper notice to the other party.

The Contract Review Period will begin on the first day after the end of a given Fair Week and will end at 5:00 pm on the last business day before the 15th day of September of that same year. The Contract will specify how and to whom notice of termination will be given.

A Contract will terminate: Automatically at the conclusion of the third Fair Week covered by the contract, or

By one party to the contract giving written notice to the other party, during the Contract Review Period, of that party's intent to terminate the contract, or

At any other time by the mutual agreement of the parties.

If a Contract is terminated as provided by either section 5a or 5b above, and should the Brown County Commission decide to enter into a new contract, the Commission will:

Advertise for proposals in September and early October with a goal of having proposals submitted by 5:00 pm on the last business day before the 15th of October.

The Commission will open proposals at the first Commission meeting following the deadline set for submission of proposals.

The Commission will then investigate the various proposals with a view to awarding a contract by the middle of November.

If a contract is terminated at a time other than during the Contract Review Period, the County Commission will establish a schedule similar to the one provided herein, other than for the particular dates, to award a new contract.

In determining to whom a contract should be awarded, the County Commission will consider:

The not-for-profit status of

the organization submitting the proposal.

The proposal bid amount, The strategic plan for Fair Week, submitted with the proposal, along with the financial safeguards the organization plans to have in place to account for the revenue collected.

The organization's volunteer

The organization's past history and experience, if any, running the concession,
The overall impact on and the

benefit to the citizens of Brown County each proposal would

On occasion, the Brown County Commission may vary the provisions of sub-sections 6 and 7 above by Resolution of the Commission for good cause

A public hearing will be held before the Brown County Commission on the 21st day of July 2015 beginning at 8:50 a.m. in the Commissioner's Chambers, Courthouse Annex, Brown County, South Dakota to consider repeal of Title 6 - Traffic Regulations, Chapter 6.02 - Parking, Second Revision Brown County Ordinances, as amended and replace with Title - Traffic Regulations, Chapter 6.02 – Parking, as follows: CHAPTER 6.02 PARKING

6.0201 Parking Violations: Unless otherwise provided herein, restrictions for parking on County Roads and on County property will follow the guidelines of SDCL 32-30.

1. Stopping or Parking on Rural Highway Prohibited. No person shall stop, park, or leave standing any vehicle, whether attended or unattended, upon the paved or improved or maintraveled portion of any highway, outside of a business or residential district, when it is practical to stop, park, or leave such vehicle standing off of the paved or improved or main-traveled portion

of the highway.

2. Standing or Parked Vehicles

Remaining Space Required Unobstructed View Required. In
no event shall any person park or leave standing any vehicle,

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whether attended or unattended. upon any highway unless a clear or unobstructed width of not less than twenty (20) feet upon the main-traveled portion of such highway opposite such standing vehicle shall be left for free passage of other vehicles thereon, nor unless a clear view of such vehicle may be obtained from a distance of two hundred (200) feet in each direction upon such highway.

3. No Parking Zones Posted by Department - Violation Pro-hibited. It will be a violation to park in any position so prohib-ited by parking signs erected by the Brown County Highway Department with concurrence of the Brown County Sheriff's Department. These signs erected will be enforced by this Department. All signs will be official no parking signs as made under the direction of the Brown County Highway Department. When so erected, they will become official no-parking zones under

the County Ordinance. 4. Disability Parking Signs. Disability parking signs will be erected where appropriate around public buildings, parks, the fairgrounds and other county locations. If a vehicle is parked in a location limited to disability parking and does not have a license plate or mirror hanger allowing disability parking, the vehicle will be tagged and removed as provided by this chapter. 5. Places Where Standing and

Parking Prohibited. Except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic, or in compliance with law or the directions of a police officer or official control device, no person shall stand or park a vehicle, whether occupied or not, except momentarily to pick up or discharge a passenger or passengers:

a. In front of a public or private driveway; b. Within fifteen (15) feet of

a fire hydrant; c. Within twenty (20) feet of

a crosswalk at an intersection; d. Within thirty (30) feet upon the approach to any flashing signals, stop sign, yield sign or traffic control signal located at

the side of a roadway; e. Within twenty (20) feet of the driveway entrance to any fire station and on the .....side of a street opposite the entrance to any fire station within seventyfive (75) feet of said entrance

when properly sign posted; f. At any place where official signs prohibit standing and

6 Places where stopping prohibited. Except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic, or in compliance with law or the directions of a police officer or official traffic control device, no person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle:

a. On a sidewalk;

b. Within an intersection;

c. On a crosswalk:

d. On any railroad tracks; e. At any place where official signs prohibit stopping;

f. Parking shall be prohibited from within two hundred (200) feet of any bridge or river cross ing. Signs will be erected regarding this and vehicles parked in this area will be tagged and removed as provided by this

Chapter. 6.0202 Enforcement - Ticketing Illegally Parked Vehicles:

A violation of this Chapter is a Class II Misdemeanor. However before a criminal citation is issued, the following procedure will apply:

Whenever any vehicle is parked in violation of the provisions of Chapter 6.02 the officer shall attach to the vehicle a notice showing such violation, which such notice shall be in an envelope shape and instructs the owner or operator to enclose the amount of the assessment described thereon in such envelope and deposit such amount in the courtesy box located at the Brown County Sheriff's Office or deliver such envelope to the Sheriff's Office.

Anyone who is parked in violation of the provisions of this chapter shall have 72 hours or three days from the date of the violation to make full payment of the assessment designated on the violation notice. Failure to make the full payment of the assessment within 72 hours or three days from the date of the violation will result in the assessment being doubled. Failure to make the full payment of the assessment within ten days from the date of violation is also a Class II Misdemeanor and, in

addition to any fine or imprisonment authorized, the court shall tax as costs the original assessment to be paid directly to the

Unless otherwise provided, the Brown County Commission by resolution may from time to time establish assessments, fines and penalties for parking in violation of this chapter.

Repeated or Continuous Violations

Original offense. When a vehicle is illegally parked as provided herein, the deputy or officer shall attach to such vehicle a parking violation ticket indicating the offense and penalty associated

with the offense. Subsequent offenses. If a vehicle remains illegally parked the same place for at least an

hour after being ticketed, then: A second violation ticket shall attached with the second offense penalty being doubled from the initial ticket.

Any continued violations where a vehicle remains in the same spot may be enforced on an hourly basis with the fines being increased as follows:

Third offense is \$20.00: Fourth offense is \$30.00; and Fifth offense is \$35.00:

with the total of fines not exceeding \$100.00 in any given day.

This procedure may be contin-

ued on an hourly basis, except as provided in the limitation in this subsection, until the vehicle is towed. The owner of the vehicle shall be liable for the penalties prescribed for all violations in addition to any costs for towing or storage by third parties, as provided herein.

6.0203 Removal of vehicles

illegally parked Any vehicle parked in violation of this Chapter or state law may be removed by the Sheriff's Department, or by a third party or a towing service at the direction of the Sheriff's Department, and placed in public storage in the manner provided herein. The owner of the vehicle, in addition to the fines and penalties provided in this chapter, shall the charges for towing and storage of such vehicle so removed.

The guidelines for enforcing these parking tickets will be as

follows: When a vehicle is found in violation of the provisions of this Chapter, the deputy or officer will tag the vehicle for the underlying offense, as provided herein, and will then run a registration check to determine the owner of the vehicle.

The deputy or officer will next attempt to contact the owner of the vehicle to determine whether the vehicle can be removed by the owner within a reasonablé

If the attempt to contact the owner is unsuccessful, or if the owner is unable to remove the vehicle within a reasonable time. or if the owner does not remove the vehicle as promised, the deputy or officer may then contact a towing service to remove the vehicle.

The owner of a towed vehicle will be responsible for both the fine identified for the underlying offense and the reasonable cost of towing and storing the vehicle.

It will be assumed that a tow-ing or storage fee is reasonable if the fee is based the fair market cost of similar towing or storage services in the local area.

Any vehicle found unattended upon a bridge or causeway or in any tunnel or where such vehicle constitutes an obstruction and hazard to traffic or is a wrecked vehicle or is parked in such a way as to constitute a clear and immediate danger to public safety may be removed at any time without prior notification of the owner.
