Sunday was his first day in the Groton-Conde parish. "I shared four things that are on my sleeve that everyone can see. They reflect spiritual gifts of love, encouragement, hospitality and prayer. Those are what I live for."

Carlson is not afraid to be out in the community, visiting with people. "I believe in order to be a successful minister, you need to be out in the community. You need to have a community presence. They want to partner with other believers so they can find healing and wholeness in Jesus Christ. That's my thought in ministry."

Carlson has experienced a welcomed hospitality in the Groton-Conde parish. "My wife and I are so blessed," he said. "We have experienced such a hospitable heart from people, from the food that was brought by our house, to folks who showed up to help

us unpack. Even before we got here, we received a card from the United Methodist Women. From the time we were called to be pastor here until we got here, it has been a tremendous blessing."

Carlson's home town is Menomonie, Wis. It was at the age of eight when he had the calling to ministry. "When I put on the robe to light the candles, I felt a presence that led me to the ministry," he



**JobWise what are you doing today?** I work for Ford Motor Company (Dearborn, MI) in the Global Product Planning and Strategy group as a Manager.

**How long have you been working at the current job?** I joined Ford right out of college, nearing 15 years now. 7 years of which of have been in Global Product Planning and Strategy

How did you get your current job? In my senior year of college (South Dakota State) I had my resume on an online job site and a recruiter for Ford saw it. I did a phone interview and then they flew me out to Dearborn for more interviews and I got the offer. I did not have Ford/automotive on my radar, at the time I was thinking I wanted to do Medical Device industry in Minneapolis area, but I found out I could live in Ann Arbor, MI , home of my beloved Michigan Wolverines, and work for Ford. So I decided to move out here without knowing a soul, figuring I'd stay a few years, take in some Michigan football games and then eventually migrate back to Minneapolis. Next thing you know, I meet a pretty gal from Michigan and 15 years later, still here!

If you have previous employments list them and how long you were there. Been at Ford since graduating from college. I worked within Ford as a Chassis Engineer for about 6 years designing suspension components on F-150 and Explorer before joining my current group Global Product Planning and Strategy.

What high school did you attend and what year did you graduate? Langford High School (1995)

Where did you attend college and what was your degree? Undergrad – South Dakota State University, Major in Mechanical Engineering, Minor in Computer Science (2000), Grad – University of Michigan (Ann Arbor, MI), Masters in Business Administration (MBA), (2011)

What advice would you give the high school students today? The "right" thing to do and the "easy" thing to do are rarely the same thing. No matter what decision you are making, this usually holds true. From deciding the strategy on the next Mustang to picking a college or a career, if you stop and think logically about what is right, and avoid taking the easy road, you will likely have success.

Also, figure out what your unique skills are, find a career that leverages those and then work your tail off! I just read a quote from Rory McIlroy (Professional golfer) who said he has come across a lot of successfully people in life and they all tend to be people who work the hardest, and the really special ones have a unique skill AND work the hardest. I couldn't agree more.

List your major accomplishments that you have had so far in life. On a personal level, I was proud of getting accepted in to University of Michigan for my MBA. It's one of the top programs in the nation (#1 in some publications) and somewhat difficult to get in to. Coming from a small town with ~100 people in the high school, you have a little bit of a "chip" on your shoulder and I always

want to prove to people you belong. To get in and take classes and find out I belonged and could hold my own in that environment was a confidence building experience.

On a professional level, I was the Lead Product Strategist on the Ford Mustang for about 5 years. As the Product Strategist your role is to develop the overall strategy (how will we compete, how we will make money, etc) for the product, this work usually takes place about 5 years before the car hits the dealership. Mustang is such an iconic vehicle and important to the Ford brand, so it was thrilling and challenging at the same time. Under my watch, we created the Boss 302 vehicle (2012 and 2013 model year) that was a huge success, I developed the strategy for the 2015 model year Mustang that is just hitting dealers ( I have been seeing it in the design studio for about 4 years now, so that is always neat to see the public's reaction to something you have been watching develop for so long), and the soon to be produced Shelby GT350. I also led the charge to make Mustang a "global" product, so after 50 years of production, the Mustang is finally being sold in Europe and Asia.

**Are you married?** I am married to Julie (maiden name Trinkle) now for nearly 9 years. She is from Dexter, MI (just outside of Ann Arbor) and that is also where we live now.

How did the two of you meet? We met at an Irish bar in Ann Arbor. She was out with some friends one night and I was out with my roommate. It turned out my roommate knew one of Julie's friends and so my roommate and I kind of "joined" their group and I got to talking to Julie and the rest is history. We chuckle because it's not the ideal "we met at church" story. She grew up in a relatively small town (Dexter is about 4000 people today, in the mid-90's probably around 2500) and her dad was a Farmer, so we had a lot in common. I laugh because I moved 1000 miles away from our family farm and end up marrying a farmer's daughter out here!

**Do you have any children?** We are blessed to have 3 children. Brady (6), Tyler (3) and Lauren (4 months).

Do you feel that your high school and college education prepared you adequately for post education **life?** I feel blessed to have had the educational experiences I have had. Langford was a great school with great teachers that pushed you, cared for you and prepared you for college and life. In my job I do a lot of writing of strategy papers and presenting them to senior management. I still draw upon the writing and speech lessons that Ms. Hoines gave me! Also the great Math and Science courses that Mr. Kruse and Mr. Gibson had really helped pave the way to getting my Mechanical Engineering degree at SDSU. As for South Dakota State, it was the best. I remember first starting at Ford and sitting next to graduates from Michigan, Ohio State, Stanford and they would poke fun at me about where I came from (Jackrabbits pennant hanging proudly in my office). And I would tell them, "it got me the same job you guys have, getting the same pay, and it probably cost me 1/10th as much for my degree!" Force = mass x acceleration (Physics 101) at SDSU and at Stanford. My MBA from Michigan is just icing on the cake.

### **Today in Weather History**

July 8, 1922: Two tornadoes occurred near the southern border of South Dakota, with one at St. Charles in Gregory County, and the other on the southern shore of Lake Andes, in Charles Mix County. The distance apart was about 30 miles. The tornado in Gregory County missed the town of Lake Andes, however it destroyed about 29 cottages and 5 large barns. Fifteen people were injured, but no one was killed.

July 8, 1951: An F2 touched down in open country and moved northeastward, passing three miles northwest of Corona in Roberts County. Thirteen buildings were destroyed on a farm with only the house left standing. Three cows and 20 pigs were killed.


July 8, 2011: Historic releases on the Oahe Dam of 160,000 CFS kept the Missouri River from Pierre to Chamberlain at record flood levels throughout July. Extensive sandbagging and levee building had been done earlier to hold back the river. Residents in the Pierre, Fort Pierre, and Oacoma areas continued to be the most affected by the river. Many homes along with roads, crop and pastureland remained flooded throughout the month. The Missouri River at Pierre remained from 5 to 6 foot above flood stage throughout July. The Missouri River at Chamberlain reached a record stage of 75.1 feet on July 8th. Flood stage at Chamberlain is 65 feet. The flooding on the river began in late May and continued into August.


July 8, 2013: A thunderstorm complex moving across central and north central South Dakota produced gusty winds up to 70 mph. These strong winds brought down several tree branches around the area with Dewey County the hardest hit location. In Timber Lake, downed tree branches fell on houses and vehicles causing damage.

- 1816 Frost was reported in low places throughout New England. (David Ludlum)
- 1950 The town of York, NE, was deluged with 13.15 inches of rain in 24 hours to establish a state record. (The Weather Channel)
- 1975 Three people were killed and six others were injured when lightning struck a walnut tree near Mayo, FL. The nine people were stringing tobacco under a tin shed when the bolt hit the nearby tree. (The Weather Channel)
- 1987 Thunderstorms in the central U.S. produced wind gusts to 90 mph at Waterloo, IA, 6.38 inches of rain at Tescott, KS, and twenty-five minutes of ping-pong ball size hail at Drummond, OK. (The National Weather Summary) (Storm Data)
- 1988 Thirty cities in the north central and northeastern U.S. reported record high temperatures for the date. Beckley, WV, equalled their all-time record with a high of 93 degrees. Afternoon and evening thunderstorms spawned seven tornadoes in Adams and Logan counties of eastern Colorado, and hail caused 2.3 million dollars damage in Adams, Logan and Washington counties. (The National Weather Summary) (Storm Data)

1989 - Sixteen cities in the central and western U.S. reported record high temperatures for the date. The high of 103 degrees at Denver, CO, equalled their record for July, and a 110 degree reading at Rapid City, SD, equalled their all-time record high. Denver reported a record five straight days of 100 degree heat, and Scottsbluff, NE, reported a record eight days in a row of 100 degree weather. (The National Weather Summary)



#### Sioux Falls-area road being renamed despite protests

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — A four-mile stretch of state Highway 11 will be renamed "Veterans Parkway" despite pleas from Sioux Falls-area history buffs to keep it called Powder House Road.

The Sioux Falls City Council on Tuesday night voted 7-1 to make the change to honor military veterans. Opponents say the move will erode memories of a New Year's Eve 1936 explosion.

The Minnehaha County Historical Society says a gang from Sioux City, Iowa, lit an eastern Sioux Falls dynamite storage building on fire that day to get rid of adversaries. The explosion shattered windows miles away.

The lone vote against changing the name came from Councilman Kermit Staggers, who said he sees no connection between Highway 11 and military history. He said other area streets would be a better fit for the name.

#### 1 person dead in mobile home fire in Aberdeen; cause unknown

ABERDEEN, S.D. (AP) — A mobile home fire in Aberdeen has left one person dead.

Firefighters responded to the home about 10 p.m. Tuesday and found a body. Authorities did not immediately identify the victim.

The cause of death and the cause of the fire were not immediately determined.

The state fire marshal is helping in the investigation.

#### City of Pierre drop sites for June storm debris now closed

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — The city of Pierre says drop sites for debris that were set up after last month's storm are now closed.

The city reminded residents on Tuesday that city crews aren't picking up debris from curbs anymore. Property owners need to dispose of the remaining detritus properly and trim or remove damaged trees that are in the boulevard.

The city baler facility is available to accept tree remains.

#### Civil Air Patrol cadets to participate in SD training camp

RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) — Cadets with the Civil Air Patrol will be getting a taste of military life during a weeklong training camp that begins Friday in South Dakota.

Cadets with the Patrol's South Dakota and North Dakota Wings will participate in the training camp that will take place at South Dakota Army National Guard facilities at Camp Rapid in Rapid City.

Some of the planned activities include training in survival skills, an obstacle course, rappelling and learning leadership skills. The cadets, ages 12 to 20, also learn military customs and courtesies and participate in a variety of physical fitness activities.

Encampment Commander Maj. Nick Gengler says the training "will test a cadet's mind and body." The Civil Air Patrol is a nonprofit organization that performs rescue missions.

### Utility company asks Montana to raise electricity rates MATTHEW BROWN, Associated Press

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — A utility company is proposing a 21 percent electricity rate increase for residents and businesses in dozens of eastern Montana communities, and state regulators said Tuesday they'll carefully review the case to make sure customers don't get gouged.

The proposal from Montana-Dakota Utilities would increase residential electricity bills on average by \$14.80 a month, or \$178 a year, according to filings from the Bismarck, North Dakota, company. MDU serves 26,000 eastern Montana customers.

The five-member Public Service Commission has 10 months to decide whether to approve the increase, which spokesman Eric Sell described as unusually steep.

"You can't just have utilities set their own rates because then consumers get gouged. But you can't have rates for consumers set too low where (MDU) can't invest in their business," Sell said.

The rate increase would bring MDU almost \$12 million in additional annual revenue.

Documents submitted to the commission by MDU detail the expenses that it says are driving the need for a rate increase.

They include MDU's share of \$400 million in pollution controls at power plants in Sidney, Montana, and Big Stone City, South Dakota; a newly constructed \$77 million gas plant near Mandan, North Dakota; a \$220 million wind farm in North Dakota and two small natural gas plants in Sidney.

Also included are new substations, lines and other equipment needed to meet growing electricity demand in the Bakken oil-producing region of Montana and North Dakota, said MDU spokesman Mark Hanson.

The costs are being shared by customers in neighboring North Dakota and South Dakota.

"The timing of them unfortunately happened at the same time," Hanson said, adding that the company had been prudent in its investments.

MDU's last rate increase was just over 6 percent in 2011. Since then, the company says spending on its electrical operations in Montana increased by about 60 percent.

#### SD judge allows pipeline's operator to survey properties

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — A South Dakota judge is allowing the operator of a proposed oil pipeline to survey the properties of nearly 20 residents who oppose the project.

Judge Mark Salter on Tuesday granted Dakota Access LLC the right to get surveyors on properties that are along the project's proposed route.

The company wants to build the 1,100-mile Dakota Access Pipeline from North Dakota to Illinois. About 270 miles of the pipeline would be in eastern South Dakota.

Salter's decision comes after Dakota Access sued the Minnehaha County landowners arguing its surveyors need to check all properties along the proposed route to determine if the land is suitable for the underground pipeline.

The state's Public Utilities Commission hasn't granted a construction permit.

Landowners say they oppose the project mostly out of environmental concerns.

### Polygamists want questions on faith quashed at water hearing JAMES NORD, Associated Press

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — A polygamous sect seeking permission to double the amount of water available at a remote South Dakota compound wants to block discussion of its faith during a public hearing this week.

The request for more water comes from Seth Jeffs, brother of imprisoned sect leader Warren Jeffs, and members of the United Order of South Dakota, a trust run by the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, or FLDS.

Jeffrey Connolly, an attorney for the group, argued in a filing with the South Dakota Water Management Board that information about the group's faith isn't relevant to the application the board will consider Thursday morning. He asked that evidence and testimony regarding the group's religion, details about the trust, allegations that the group "is a 'secretive organization' or is engaged in 'abnormal activity'" and personal details about its members be excluded.

Connolly said in the filing that type of evidence is irrelevant and that opponents of the project are attempting "to use this forum for other purposes." He declined to comment on Tuesday.

The group's secrecy and history — Warren Jeffs and other FLDS leaders have been convicted of sexually assaulting underage girls — have raised concerns about how many people live at the compound and whether the request for more water means more members will be moving there. The sect is head-quartered in a community along the Utah-Arizona border.

Linda Van Dyke Kilcoin, who lives near the South Dakota compound, is attempting to have the group's request for more water dismissed. Several other neighbors also filed petitions to intervene in the group's water request.

Michael Hickey, an attorney for Kilcoin, said he's never dealt with such a private group before. "When people decline to give me information, it raises my suspicion, I guess," he said.

"There's a lot of people that are just very concerned about that compound down there, its effect and what's going on," Hickey said.

The National Park Service and U.S. Forest Service recently dropped their opposition after reaching a deal that includes conditions such as water usage metering.

The fenced-in compound, complete with a guard tower, sits on hilly land the group bought about a decade ago. Valued for tax purposes at \$5.3 million, it's secluded by tall pine trees along a public gravel road that cuts through it. Several buildings dot the complex, including seven large residences, a chapel and school, a greenhouse and several farm buildings.

In written answers to questions from Kilcoin's attorney, Jeffs said he's unsure how many people are served by the compound's water supply but that the number is within the limits of wastewater permits. The system has a 126-person capacity. According to a 2014 drinking water report filed with the state, about 75 people live at the ranch.

Jeffs said in the document that he knows of no plans to increase the number of people served by the water system beyond what's allowed by current wastewater limits.

While Jeffs pleaded guilty in 2006 to harboring his then-fugitive brother, he did not face any sex abuse charges.

The FLDS is a radical offshoot of mainstream Mormonism whose members believe polygamy brings exaltation in heaven. Polygamy is a legacy of the early teachings of the mainstream Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, but the faith abandoned the practice in 1890 and prohibits it today.

#### SD man to spend 6 months in jail for 8th DWI conviction

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP)  $\overline{\phantom{a}}$  A South Dakota man will spend six months in jail for his eighth DWI conviction.

Circuit Court Judge Joni Cutler on Tuesday sentenced 42-year-old David Wells to 180 days in jail with work release and suspended a five-year prison term. Wells was ordered to spend five years on probation and his driver's license was revoked for three years.

The Yankton man pleaded guilty in March to driving under the influence sixth or subsequent offense. Wells was arrested on Oct. 4 after he was pulled over for running a red light in Sioux Falls. He registered a blood alcohol level of 0.174. The legal limit is 0.08.

Authorities say Wells has prior DUI convictions from March 1989, July 1993, September and October 1996, March 2000, December 2001 and May 2012.

#### SD authorities using new technology to revisit cold case

DEADWOOD, S.D. (AP) — South Dakota authorities are using 3-D technology in an effort to get the public to help them identify the victim of a homicide.

Attorney General Marty Jackley says the FBI's technology has been used to develop a three-dimensional headshot of the victim.

In February 2000, skeletal remains of an unidentified man were discovered near St. Onge, a community 14 miles north of Deadwood. Authorities at the time determined the man died from multiple gunshot wounds.

Jackley says the new head shot of the victim can give the public a better idea of how the man looked before his death.

Jackley adds the facial approximation technology is presenting the opportunity for the public to help out with solving the cold case and bringing closure to a victim's family.

#### Statewide count finds 1,036 homeless people in South Dakota

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — Officials have counted 1,036 homeless people in South Dakota, about 17 percent more than last year.

The homeless count was conducted in January by the South Dakota Housing for the Homeless Consortium in collaboration with community agencies and homeless service providers.

The consortium says the statewide, one-day count is a snapshot of people experiencing homelessness.

The group says 61 percent were adults over the age of 24; 26 percent were children under 18; and 13 percent were adults between the ages of 18 and 24.

Eighty-seven percent of the people counted were sheltered in an emergency shelter, transitional housing or motels being paid for by a nonprofit, while 13 percent were on the streets, vehicles or places not meant for human habitation.

The count in 2014 found 885 homeless people.

#### Daugaard: Consider 'all options' in education funding study

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — A state panel studying school funding and teacher pay should examine "all options" when making recommendations to lawmakers on how to improve South Dakota's education system, Gov. Dennis Daugaard said Tuesday.

Daugaard said the Blue Ribbon Task Force on Teachers and Students meeting this week must not push

for or write off policy change without understanding its effectiveness. Options could include raising revenue and school consolidation.

"Everything is on the table. There are some who have asked me to rule out certain policy decisions, and ... I'm unwilling to do that," he said. "There are some who have asked us to jump immediately to policy proposals ... but that position proceeds on an assumption that there's nothing to be learned from self-examination, from examination of our own history, from the examination of other states who differ from us, and I believe there is something to be learned."

Education funding could be a major focus for the 2016 session, Daugaard said.

Daugaard and Republican legislative leaders in February announced the creation of the task force following calls from Democratic legislators and education officials to boost teacher pay. It strives for high student achievement, excellent teachers and a funding system to support them both.

The governor said the panel follows in the footsteps of groups that have studied the state's adult and juvenile justice systems, leading to major overhauls of both.

Republican Rep. Jacqueline Sly, a leader of the education task force, said expectations are high.

"Do something," Sly said, recounting what she's heard. "Don't just have this task force and have nothing come out of it."

#### Missouri River reservoirs still have room for flood waters

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — More rainfall than expected flowed into the Missouri River last month, but the river's reservoirs still have plenty of room because of this year's below-average snowfall.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers says it expects 26.6 million acre feet of water will flow into the Missouri River this year. That's 105 percent of normal.

The Corps says last month's runoff of 6.8 million acre feet was 125 percent of normal, so the amount of water released from the dam on the South Dakota-Nebraska border was reduced to minimize flooding.

The river's reservoirs are using only 35 percent of the space reserved for flood control storage. It helps that the snowpack above Fort Peck Dam was 72 percent of normal and the snowpack below that dam was 78 percent of normal.

#### Rep. Steve Hickey resigns from SD House to study in Scotland

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — Republican state Rep. Steve Hickey is resigning his seat in the South Dakota House to move to Scotland and study Christian ethics in the modern world and the surveillance state. The Sioux Falls Republican has served since 2011, and his resignation is effective Sept. 1.

Hickey will resume his studies of German pastor and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer, an anti-Nazi ac-

tivist, to pursue a doctorate at the University of Aberdeen in Scotland.

Gov. Dennis Daugaard says he is fielding candidates to take Hickey's place, and expects to appoint

#### Rainy week brings moisture to South Dakota crops, pastures

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Rain over the past week brought moisture to crops and pastures in many parts of South Dakota.

The Agriculture Department says in its weekly crop report that topsoil moisture supplies in the state are rated 82 percent adequate to surplus, and subsoil moisture is 74 percent in those categories.

Stock water supplies statewide are rated 82 percent adequate to surplus, and pasture and range conditions are 63 percent good to excellent.

South Dakota's corn and soybean crops both are rated 74 percent in good to excellent condition. About two-thirds of the winter wheat crop is in fair, good or excellent condition.

#### The Latest: Guarded optimism over a Greek deal helps shore up European markets

European stock markets were solid as guarded optimism over the prospects of a deal between Greece and its creditors in time to avoid a Greek exit from the euro.

At a summit of the eurozone's 19 leaders Tuesday, Greece was effectively told it must have a reform plan agreed by Sunday or face an exit from the euro. Sunday's summit will involve the leaders of all 28 European Union nations.

### China tells companies, executives to buy stocks, promises credit in bid to halt price slide

BEIJING (AP) — In a flurry of new moves to halt a stock market slide, China's government on Wednesday told state companies and corporate executives to buy shares, raised the amount of equities insurance companies can hold and promised more credit to finance trading.

Hundreds of companies have announced a halt to trading in their shares after emergency measures announced last weekend failed to stop a slide that has dragged down the benchmark Shanghai Composite Index by more than 30 percent since early June.

Despite the new measures, the Shanghai index lost another 5.9 percent on Wednesday and Hong Kong's Hang Seng index closed down 5.8 percent after earlier diving as much as 8.5 percent.

The decline threatens to fuel political tensions and set back Communist Party plans to use financial markets to make China's state-dominated economy more productive. The party wants to encourage stock ownership but small investors whose holdings have plunged in value say they will no longer buy shares.

"The central government made considerable reputational investment in the rally over the last year, particularly via ample cheerleading from state media," said IHS Global Insight economist Brian Jackson in a report. "As a result, support is likely to remain extraordinary, although that will find difficulty reversing the rapid shift in attitudes by retail investors."

### Fanatical shock troops fighting to the death a key weapon in Islamic State group's arsenal

BAGHDAD (AP) — They are the Islamic State group's elite shock troops. Fanatical and disciplined, they infiltrate cities of Iraq and Syria, unleash mayhem and fight to the death, wearing explosives belts to blow themselves up among their opponents if they face defeat.

IS calls them "Inghemasiyoun," Arabic for "those who immerse themselves," a sort of special forces unit parallel to its regular forces that is credited with many of the group's stunning battlefield successes. A recent online video from the group showed a unit preparing to launch an eventually successful attack on the central Syrian town of al-Sukhna. "Victory or martyrdom," the fighters, wearing blue bandanas, scream in a circle around their commander, pledging their allegiance to God and vowing never to retreat.

"They cause chaos and then their main ground offensive begins," said Redur Khalil, spokesman for the U.S.-backed Kurdish People's Protection Units, which have led a string of military successes against

the IS in Syria.

Though best known for its horrific brutalities, the Islamic State group has proved to be a highly organized and flexible fighting force, according to senior Iraqi military and intelligence officials and Syrian Kurdish commanders on the front lines.

Its tactics are often creative, whether it's using a sandstorm as cover for an assault or a lone sniper tying himself to the top of a palm tree to pick off troops below. Its forces switch between conventional and guerrilla warfare, using the latter to wear down their opponents before massed fighters backed by armored vehicles, Humvees and sometimes even artillery move to take over territory. The fighters incorporate suicide bombings as a battlefield tactic to break through lines and demoralize enemies, and they hone them to make them more effective. Recently, they beefed up armor of the vehicles used in those attacks to prevent gunfire from killing the driver or detonating explosives.

### To some who stood by Bill Cosby, his sedatives-before-sex admission is a turning point

As a chorus of sexual assault accusations against Bill Cosby resounded this winter, some fans and famous friends stood by him, calling the allegations unproven attacks on a comedy legend.

But for some, the breaking point came this week, when newly unsealed court documents revealed that the comedian has admitted to giving at least one woman quaaludes before sex — the kind of behavior long suspected by women who have accused him of drugging and abusing them.

"Completely disgusted," tweeted singer Jill Scott, who had vociferously defended her mentor. The Bounce TV and Centric networks stopped re-running "The Cosby Show," apparently booting the 1980s comedy classic completely off TV. Some fans who went to his recent performances, even as the allegations swirled, said they won't go again.

Wayne Stanfield saw Cosby's January show in Turlock, California, feeling there wasn't enough proof to condemn a comic he'd grown up seeing as a good-guy star. But that changed after he learned that Cosby had said, under oath, that he'd given a powerful sedative to women he wanted to bed.

"Well, then, shame on him," Stanfield said Tuesday.

### Most foreign ministers leave Iran talks, reflecting stubborn differences in way of a deal

VIENNA (AP) — Secretary of State John Kerry is staying at Iran nuclear talks, and so is Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif. But foreign ministers of the five other nations at the negotiating table are leaving or have already left, reflecting a rough slog ahead for a deal.

All seven ministers had arrived to Vienna over the past few days in hopes their added diplomatic weight would clinch agreement. But they decided to leave after talks busted through a second extension on Tuesday, with Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov saying the sides were still apart over nearly 10 issues.

The new tentative target date for a deal now is Friday. The U.S., backed by Russia, China, Britain, France and Germany, want long-term curbs on Iran's nuclear program, offering Tehran sanctions relief in return.

### Supporters of Confederate heritage to make final stand on flag in South Carolina House

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — The Confederate flag that flies at the South Carolina Capitol could soon be making its last stand.

The South Carolina House will begin debating the flag's fate Wednesday. If House members back a Senate bill to take the flag down, Gov. Nikki Haley could sign it into law before the end of the week and the flag would be removed and taken to the Confederate Relic Room.

But some House Republicans are saying not so fast, and plan to offer amendments that would preserve some kind of symbol in front of the Statehouse to honor their Southern ancestors.

One of them, Rep. Mike Pitts, said to banish all flags from the site would be akin to erasing history, including that of his family members in Laurens County and the mountains of North Carolina and Virginia.

"I guess my plan for tomorrow is to be a lot like my ancestors were at the Bloody Angle," Pitts said, referring to part of a Virginia battlefield where fighting raged for nearly 24 hours in 1864, leaving Confederate dead stacked four deep behind their fortifications. "And fight until I have nothing left to fight with."

#### Baltimore police say 4 shot, 3 fatally, near University of Maryland, Baltimore, campus

BALTIMORE (AP) — Baltimore police say four people have been shot, three fatally, near the University of Maryland, Baltimore, campus.

Detective Rashawn K. Strong said in a statement early Wednesday that officers responded around 10:30 p.m. Tuesday to a reported shooting a few blocks from UMB.

Strong says officers found a woman and two men with gunshot wounds. One man and the woman were taken to a hospital, where they died. The second man was pronounced dead at the scene.

A fourth victim walked into a hospital with a gunshot wound. Strong says the woman is listed in stable condition.

A statement on the school's website says campus police reported that two gunmen, each in a van, pulled over near a group of people, got out and began firing, striking the four individuals.

### Pope wraps Ecuador leg of South America trip after calling for new ecological, economic order

QUITO, Ecuador (AP) — Pope Francis wraps up the first leg of a three-nation South American pilgrimage Wednesday after issuing an impassioned call for a new economic and ecological world order where the goods of the Earth are shared by everyone, not just exploited by the rich.

Francis will visit the elderly and give a pep talk to local priests before flying to Bolivia, where the environment, ministering to the poor and the government's tense relations with the Catholic Church are high on the agenda.

Bolivian President Evo Morales, an Aymara Indian known for anti-imperialist and socialist rhetoric, will greet Francis at the airport and join him for a speech to local officials and diplomats before the pontiff goes to the Bolivian city of Santa Cruz. The stop in La Paz is being kept to four hours to spare the 78-year-old pope from the taxing 4,000-meter (13,120-foot) elevation.

Francis and Morales have met on several occasions, most recently in October when the president, a former coca farmer, participated in a Vatican summit of grassroots groups of indigenous and advo-

cates for the poor who have been championed by Francis. Their shared views on the need for wealthy countries to drastically change course to address climate change bump up against Morales' anti-clerical initiatives that have roiled relations with the local church.

Taking up the global warming issue in Quito on Tuesday, Francis pressed the arguments made in his headline-grabbing encyclical earlier this month that the planet must not be exploited by the wealthy few for short-term profit at the expense of the poor.

### Raid casts spotlight on Subway spokesman's ties to former head of obesity foundation

ZIONSVILLE, Ind. (AP) — A raid at the home of an iconic restaurant spokesman is casting a glaring spotlight on his relationship with the former head of a foundation he set up to combat childhood obesity.

Federal and state authorities raided the home of Subway pitchman Jared Fogle on Tuesday, just two months after the then-executive director of Fogle's foundation was arrested on child pornography charges.

Authorities wouldn't describe the nature of the investigation or what they hoped to find on electronics removed from Fogle's house. Fogle's attorney said his client, known by millions as "The Subway Guy," was cooperating with investigators.

Subway said in a statement that it believed the raid was "related to a prior investigation" of a former employee of the Jared Foundation, an organization founded by Fogle to raise awareness about child-hood obesity. The company didn't say whether that employee was former foundation executive director Russell Taylor.

Federal prosecutors in May filed a criminal complaint charging Taylor, 43, with seven counts of production of child pornography and one count of possession of child pornography. Investigators said they discovered a cache of sexually explicit photos and videos Taylor allegedly produced by secretly filming minor children at his home.
