



the phone about some iron on patches? She's beyond furious!"

I knew at that very moment, I was her girl. I was the one this woman wanted to scream at and pulverize and I would most likely have ended up needing a few iron on patches myself had she decided to hobble into the store and beat me with her crutches! Moments like this are so life changing. There has to be an immediate spike in a person's blood pressure that would most likely shatter the gauge and pop the cuff. It's good eye balls are firmly attached as they would most definitely pop right out of the sockets when the message sent from your brain reaches them if they weren't stuck in there pretty good. I told the gal that answered the phone, "I will handle this call. I'm going to take it in the office." I knew I was going to need to sit down in order to come up with the level of schmoozing this customer was going to require. Slowly I picked up the receiver and hit the "Line 1" button. I told her my name and that I heard she was terribly upset and then I told her I was 100% at fault. She delivered a rather short speech about how times have changed and that the whole world just doesn't care anymore and that no one ever does what they say they're going to do. I sincerely apologized and went over the details of what had transpired when her husband arrived.
