Tigers march on with 5-1 record and win over Sisseton

Groton Area improved its football record to 5-1 with a 21-0 win over Sisseton Friday night. The game was played in Sisseton.



Lucas Hinman snatched the ball away from Sisseton's Logan Grimm.

The Tiger defense was king for the night, coming up with three interceptions, four fumble recoveries and had seven sacks in the Northeast Conference contest. However, penalties ruled the night as Groton had 18 for 145 while Sisseton had seven for 45. "We've done more conditioning this year than we ever have," said Coach Shaun Wanner. "We had 18 penalties so now I have to come up with conditioning for them. I have some pretty good ideas and after this week, they will want a bye to week. We need to clean those up. We can't have that many penalties when it comes to the playoffs."

Sisseton's first possession did not fare well. On third and 13, the Redmen took to the air for the first time and Lucas Hinman was right there to intercept the ball and he returned it for 13 years, putting the Tigers on their own 46 yard line. Groton was unable to capaltize on its possession and punted on fourth and five. Sisseton punted on fourth and 12. The Tiger line had a tough time holding off Sisseton on its next drive. Sacks of seven and four yards put Groton Area at third and 21 before Adam Herman broke free after making a catch from Bennett Shabazz and scored on a 67-yard play with 5:46 left in the first quarter. James Thompson kicked the PAT and Groton Area took the lead, 7-0.

"Adam Herman had a good game," Wanner said. "He had over 200 yards of total offense which was nice to see." Herman had four carries for 101 yards and had two catches for 108 yards.

The Redmen failed to move the ball on the next drive, having to punt on fourth and 20. The dreaded yellow flags started to fly as the Tigers' next drive started at first and 20. Groton ended up punting on fourth and 10. Sisseton's next drive was stopped when Joe Groeblinghoff recovered a fumble, putting the Tigers on the Sisseton 15 yard line. Three plays later on second and 22, Herman scored on a 27 yard run with 43 seconds left in the first quarter. Thompson kicked the PAT and Groton Area took a 14-0 lead.

Sisseton ended up punting on fourth and 11. Going into the second quarter, the Tigers got their first non-touchdown first down when Herman caught the ball to put the Tigers down to the Sisseton nine-yard line. Penalties reversed the flow and Groton ended trying a field goal on fourth and 26 which fell short.

Sisseton got its first first-down of the game with 9:08 left in the half, but ended up punting on fourth and two. Groton's next drive went four

plays and the Tiger punt was blocked on fourth and 10 and the Redmen had their first golden scoring opportunity at the Tiger 18 yard line. Sisseton got a first down and was down to the Tiger five yard line. Going for the touchdown on fourth and five, the Redmen were stopped and Groton took over on its own nine yard line with 1:56 left in the half. Groton got a first down thanks to a Benntt Shabazz 15-yard run and the Tigers ran out the clock to end the first half.

Groton received the kick-off to start the second half. On second and 12, Sisseton's Hunter Ryan intercepted the ball and returned it 17 yards. Once again, Sisseton was knocking on the door, starting its drive at the Groton nine yard line, but when the door opened up on third and 11, Carter Jondahl stepped in to intercept the ball to return the favor. Groton now had the ball on its own 24 yard line.

Groton ended up punting on fourth and 14 and Sisseton started its drive on its own 37 yard line. The Redmen fumbled the ball on second and 10 and Stevie Fey was right there to pounce on the lose ball. Groton's drive went four (well five if you include penalties) plays and Groton punted on fourth 12. It was the same situation for Sisseton as the Redmen punted on fourth and six.

Groton had the ball on its own 49 yard line. Herman had a nice run down to the Sisseton 30 yard line, but a penalty recalled the ball and Tigers were now on its own 37 yard line instead. On second and 22, Herman broke free and dashed 64 yards to score for the Tigers with 2:49 left in the third quarter. Thompson kicked the PAT and Groton took a 21-0 lead.

Sisseton was third and 15 and got a first down, but with 22 seconds left in the third quarter and second and four, Lucas Hinman recovered the fumble on the Tiger 32. Going into the fourth quarter, the Tigers

Today in Weather History

October 3, 1985: High winds of 60 to 75 mph occurred across much of western South Dakota from the late afternoon of the 3rd into the early morning hours of the 4th. The strong winds blew down power lines and caused power outages for many locations in the Black Hills. The strong winds uprooted trees in Rapid City and blew the roof off of a barn near Newell in Butte County.

1841 - An October gale, the worst of record for Nantucket, MA, caught the Cap Cod fishing fleet at sea. Forty ships were driven ashore on Cape Cod, and 57 men perished from the town of Truro alone. Heavy snow fell inland, with 18 inches near Middletown, CT. (David Ludlum)

1912 - The longest dry spell of record in the U.S. commenced as Bagdad, CA, went 767 days without rain. (David Ludlum)

1964 - Hurricane Hilda struck Louisiana spawning many tornadoes, and claimed twenty-two lives. (Sandra and TI Richard Sanders)

1979 - The first killer tornado of record in October in Connecticut destroyed sixteen vintage aircraft at the Bradley Air Museum in Windsor Locks. The tornado damaged more than one hundred homes causing 200 million dollars damage. Three persons were killed, and 500 others were injured. (The Weather Channel)

1986 - Remnants of Hurricane Paine deluged Oklahoma and southeastern Kansas with 6 to 10 inch overnight rains. Hardy, OK, was drenched with 21.79 inches. Heavy rain between September 26th and October 4th caused 350 million dollars damage in Oklahoma. (The Weather Channel)

1987 - Twenty-five cities in the Upper Midwest, including ten in Iowa, reported record low temperatures for the date. Duluth MN, Eau Claire, WI, and Spencer, IA, dipped to 24 degrees. Temperatures warmed into the 80s in the Northern and Central High Plains Region. At Chadron, NE, the mercury soared from a morning low of 29 degrees to an afternoon high of 88 degrees. Temperatures soared above 100 degrees in southern California. The high of 108 degrees at Downtown Los Angeles was a record for October. (The National Weather Summary)

1988 - Cold Canadian air invaded the north central U.S. bringing an end to the growing season across those states. Unseasonably warm weather prevailed in the southwestern U.S. Phoenix, AZ, reported a record high of 105 degrees. (The National Weather Summary)

1989 - Unseasonably cold weather prevailed from the Pacific Northwest to the Upper Mississippi Valley. A dozen cities reported record low temperatures for the date, including Bismarck, ND, and Williston, ND, with readings of 16 degrees above zero. An upper level weather disturbance brought snow to parts of Idaho, Wyoming and Montana, with five inches reported at West Yellowstone, MT. (Storm Data) (The National Weather Summary)





Daugaard: Education Board member tied to GEAR UP steps down JAMES NORD, Associated Press DIRK LAMMERS, Associated Press

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — A Board of Education member involved in administering a Native American collegereadiness program under scrutiny after an apparent murder-suicide has resigned from the state panel, Gov. Dennis Daugaard said.

Daugaard, in a letter this week to the chairman of the state's Government Operations and Audit Committee, said Stacy Phelps of Rapid City departed because of the "many questions" surrounding the administration of the GEAR UP program designed to help students from high-risk populations go to college. The state had contracted with Platte-based Mid-Central Educational Cooperative to administer the program in South Dakota, which received \$10.7 million in federal GEAR UP funds over the last four years.

Authorities believe Scott Westerhuis shot his wife and four children last month and then set the family home near Platte ablaze before shooting himself. That was just hours after the state Department of Education informed Mid-Central that it was losing its most recent \$4.3 million GEAR UP contract.

The governor said he has asked Attorney General Marty Jackley to look beyond Scott Westerhuis for any evidence of wrongdoing.

"If there has been wrongdoing, I want to find it," Daugaard said in the letter.

Mid-Central was notified on Sept. 16 that it had lost the GEAR UP contract, and state Secretary of Education Melody Schopp cited financial problems and failures to follow proper accounting procedures as reasons in a follow-up letter sent five days later.

State officials began seeking other partnership options for the GEAR UP grant when "fiscal accountability and management by MCEC continued to be a concern," Daugaard said in his letter.

The governor said Schopp told her staff to do a risk assessment of all grants and contracts between the department and Mid-Central, and to commission a complete audit and review of the relationships. The cooperative's board last week voted to hire accounting firm Eide Bailly to audit the cooperative.

"Given Scott Westerhuis' position as business manager, and the circumstances surrounding his death,

this is a prudent decision," Daugaard said.

Mid-Central's attorney, Scott Swier, said Friday that he couldn't comment on the governor's letter pending the results of Mid-Central's forensic audit.

Daugaard said in the letter that the Division of Criminal Investigation is looking into Westerhuis' personal finances and his management of the cooperative, where he served as business manager, as authorities search for a motive in the deaths.

Phelps and Westerhuis were involved together in at least one nonprofit that received at least \$1.9 million in GEAR UP funds from the cooperative since 2012, according to Internal Revenue Service Documents. The most recent records say Westerhuis served as chief financial officer and Phelps as chief executive of the nonprofit American Indian Institute for Innovation. Neither reported an income from the organization.

Phelps is also listed as summer program project coordinator on a now-defunct website for South Dakota's GEAR UP program. His biography for the Board of Education website, before it was removed, said that Phelps in 1992 began what would eventually evolve into the current program.

The governor said that even though the state Board of Education doesn't award or have oversight over Department of Education contracts, Phelps' "continued position on that board would be a distraction from the important work the board performs, given his involvement with GEAR UP."

Tony Venhuizen, chief of staff to the governor, said Phelps also resigned from an advisory panel on Native American student achievement.

Phelps didn't immediately answer a telephone call for comment about his resignation. He declined to answer a series of questions from an Associated Press reporter Wednesday morning at his Rapid City home.

"I just can't really talk about anything, you know," Phelps said. "It's an ongoing investigation. That's it."

Body of 16-year-old boy found on I-90 in Minnehaha County

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Authorities are investigating the discovery of a body of a 16-year-old boy from Minnehaha County found on Interstate 90 just east of the I-29 interchange.

The sheriff's office says Jay Gary Lavender was found about 10:45 p.m. Thursday, and it appears the boy had been struck by a semitrailer that left the scene.

Authorities are seeking the public's help in locating the truck, which they believe to be a white semi with a large grill that was traveling west. Witnesses told deputies that the truck was seen parked on the side of the road about a quarter mile west of the scene.

The incident prompted a brief shutdown of the highway.

A look at school shootings in the US in the past decade The Associated Press

School shootings have erupted in small rural communities and major urban centers across the U.S. over the past decade. According to an analysis of all mass shootings by a group called Everytown for Gun Safety, about 11 percent of cases involves possible mental illness and in 44 percent of the cases, the shooter committed suicide. Everytown is a coalition of government officials, victims and advocates against gun violence. Here is a look at some of the worst school shootings in recent years:

Oct. 1, 2015 in Roseburg, Oregon: A gunman opened fire, killing nine people and dying in a shootout with police at Umpqua Community College. A government official says the man was 26-year-old Chris Harper Mercer. One witness said he demanded to know students' religion before shooting them.

Sept. 30, 2015 in Harrisburg, South Dakota: Mason Buhl, 16 has been charged with attempted murder after police say he fired a handgun at Harrisburg High School Principal Kevin Lein. The principal was lightly wounded in his arm. His father has said Buhl, who has taken gun safety classes and would regularly target shoot, seemed to just be mad at everybody.

May 14, 2015 in Jacksonville, Florida: Edgar Robles, 16, has been charged with second-degree attempted murder for shooting into a Jacksonville school bus and injuring two girls. Officials say Robles and some

friends got into a fight with some teenagers on the bus about another person who had died. As the bus pulled away, at least three shots were fired.

Feb. 4, 2015 in Frederick, Maryland: Two men were arrested a month after a shooting outside a high school basketball game that injured two teenage boys. Brandon Tyler, 21, and Chandler Davenport, 19, each face assault and gun charges. Police say the shooting was gang related and that the men and their victims knew each other.

Dec. 12, 2014 in Portland, Oregon: A suspected gang member opened fire on a group outside an alternative high school, injuring four people. Three young people have been arrested in connection with the shooting. Two of them had a prior criminal history. The third pleaded guilty in May and has been sentenced to serve 10 years in a youth prison.

Oct. 24, 2014 in Marysville, Washington: Jaylen Fryberg, 15, killed three 14-year-old girls and a 15-yearold boy after inviting them to lunch in the Marysville-Pilchuck High School cafeteria. The depressed teen turned the gun on himself after killing his friends. Fryberg had sent a text message to a former girlfriend threatening to kill himself days before the shooting.

June 5, 2014 in Seattle: Aaron Rey Ybarra, 26, is charged with first-degree murder after a 19-year-old student is killed and two others wounded in a shooting at Seattle Pacific University. Ybarra's attorney has said mental illness was a factor.

May 23, 2014 in Santa Barbara, California: Elliott Rodger, 22, killed six people and injured 13 others in shooting and stabbing attacks near the University of California, Santa Barbara, campus. Authorities say he shot himself to death after a shootout with deputies. The shooter recorded a disturbing Internet video before the rampage, warning that he would slaughter those with a good life, especially women who had shunned him.

June 7, 2013 in Santa Monica, California: John Zawahri, 23, shot his father and brother and then shot at strangers in cars — killing three people — and then shot at people on the Santa Monica College campus. He was fatally shot by officers in the college library. Investigators say Zawahri was angered by his parents' divorce and they believe mental illness played a role in the killings.

Dec. 14, 2012 in Newtown, Connecticut: Adam Lanza, 20, killed his mother and then used three of her guns, including a semiautomatic rifle, to shoot 20 first graders and six educators at Sandy Hook Elementary School. Volumes have been written about his mental health problems since the Newtown shooting.

April 2, 2012 in Oakland, California: One Goh, 43, opened fire at a tiny Christian school, Oikos University. Goh was charged with seven counts of murder and three counts of attempted murder but is being held at a Northern California mental hospital after psychiatric evaluations concluded he suffers from long-term paranoid schizophrenia and is unfit to stand trial.

Feb. 14, 2008 in DeKalb, Illinois: Five students are killed and 18 were wounded when former student Steven Kazmierczak, 27, opened fire in a lecture hall at Northern Illinois University, before committing suicide. A year earlier, Kazmierczak had been a graduate sociology student at the school. Authorities say he started behaving erratically after he stopped taking his medication for an unnamed illness.

April 16, 2007 in Blacksburg, Virginia: Thirty-two people are fatally shot in a dorm and classroom at Virginia Tech, before the gunman, Seung-Hui Cho, 23, kills himself. He moved to the United States from South Korea with his family while a grade school student. Cho was in his senior year as an English major at Virginia Tech. It was the deadliest shooting rampage in American history and happened about eight years after 13 people died at Columbine High School in Colorado.

South Dakota ag, wildlife agencies launch habitat initiative

The Bison and Jackrabbits square off at 6 p.m. Central time in Brookings, South Dakota. The game will be televised on Midco Sports Network, NBC North Dakota and ESPN3.

North Dakota Gov. Jack Dalrymple and South Dakota Gov. Dennis Daugaard also made a friendly wager. The loser will make a donation to the charity of the other's choice.

Russian warplanes strike central and northern Syria in new raids

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — A Syrian military official says Russian warplanes have attacked the Islamic State group in central and northern Syria.

The unnamed official was quoted Saturday by state TV as saying that the "concentrated and precise" airstrikes destroyed a command center in the central town of Latamneh and targeted positions in the northwestern areas of Jisr al-Shughour and Maaret al-Numan.

The Russian airstrikes that began Wednesday have mainly targeted central and northwestern Syria, strategic regions that are the gateway to President Bashar Assad's strongholds in the capital, Damascus, and the coast.

Russia says it is targeting the IS group and al-Qaida's Syrian affiliate, but at least some of the strikes appear to have hit Western-backed rebel factions.

More heavy rain and flooding forecast along parts off waterlogged East Coast

Even with Hurricane Joaquin no longer as big of a threat, the weekend promises little relief for the most waterlogged parts of the East Coast.

The National Weather Service says flooding remains a concern through Monday morning, especially in parts of North and South Carolina that already have received up to 11 inches of rain this week. Forecasters say some areas could see storm totals as high as 15 inches.

Meteorologists say once the rain ends, the threat of flooding persists because the ground is too saturated to absorb water. And high winds could bring down trees like the one that hit a vehicle near Fayetteville, North Carolina, killing a passenger.

The storm also has been linked to a drowning in Spartanburg, South Carolina.

Flood watches and warnings also are in effect in Delaware and parts of New Jersey, Maryland and Virginia.

Gunman at Oregon community college was Army boot camp dropout who studied other mass shooters

ROSEBURG, Ore. (AP) — The 26-year-old gunman who opened fire on fellow students in his community college English class, killing nine people, was an Army boot camp dropout who studied mass shooters before becoming one himself.

A day after the rampage in this Oregon timber town, authorities said Christopher Sean Harper-Mercer wore a flak jacket and brought at least six guns and five ammunition magazines to the school. Investigators found another seven guns at the apartment he shared with his mother.

Officials on Friday also released the names of the dead, who ranged in age from 18 to 67 and included several freshmen and a teacher. They were sons and daughters, spouses and parents.

One of the students was active in the Future Farmers of America and loved to play soccer. Another was on only his fourth day of college. One was a 59-year-old student whose daughter was enrolled in the same school but not injured the shooting. Grieving families began sharing details of their loved ones.

"We have been trying to figure out how to tell everyone how amazing Lucas was, but that would take 18 years," the family of Lucas Eibel, 18, said in a statement released through the Douglas County Sheriff's Office.

Doctors Without Borders says northern Afghan hospital bombed, 3 staff dead, 30 missing

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Three local staffers for Doctors Without Borders were killed and 30 were missing after an explosion near their hospital in the northern Afghan city of Kunduz that may have been caused by a U.S. airstrike.

In a statement, the international charity said the "sustained bombing" took place at 2:10 a.m. (2140 GMT). Afghan forces backed by U.S. airstrikes have been fighting to dislodge Taliban insurgents who overran Kunduz on Monday.

U.S. forces in Afghanistan said they conducted an airstrike on Kunduz at 2:15 a.m. The spokesman, U.S. Army Col. Brian Tribus, said the strike "may have resulted in collateral damage to a nearby medical facility" and that the incident was under investigation. Tribus said it was the 12th U.S. airstrike "in the Kunduz vicinity" since Tuesday.

Doctors Without Borders said its trauma center "was hit several times during sustained bombing and was very badly damaged." At the time of the bombing, the hospital had 105 patients and their care-takers, and more than 80 international and Afghan staff, it said.

The group said all of its international staffers were alive and accounted for.

GOP discontent over choices for House leadership leaves races unsettled, caucus in turmoil

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republican turmoil is boiling over as leadership elections approach, with dissatisfied lawmakers casting about for new choices and a surprise longshot challenger emerging in the speaker's race.

The upheaval reflects a caucus ever more divided in the week since House Speaker John Boehner stunned Capitol Hill by resigning under conservative pressure. And it comes as a long list of weighty and polarizing issues loom on Congress' agenda, including raising the federal borrowing limit to avoid a market-shattering default, and paying the bills to keep the government running.

Rep. Jason Chaffetz of Utah, the brash 48-year-old chairman of the high-profile House oversight committee, intends to challenge the prohibitive favorite for speaker, Majority Leader Kevin McCarthy of California, Republican aides said Friday. Yet it's not clear that the hardliners who ousted Boehner and view McCarthy with suspicion would flock to Chaffetz, given that as committee chairman he's enforced leadership initia-

tives such as punishing lawmakers who buck the party position.

"It would be hard to replace John Boehner with someone who also kicks people off committees for their votes," sniped Rep. Thomas Massie, R-Ky., who is backing another candidate, Rep. Daniel Webster, R-Fla. That raises the prospect of more unrest — and potentially even more candidates — before votes for the new leadership team are cast Oct. 8.

Fiorina not backing down on distortion of Planned Parenthood, uses it as campaign centerpiece

GREENVILLE, S.C. (AP) — Republican presidential hopeful Carly Fiorina has spent the last two weeks repeating an erroneous description of videos secretly recorded by anti-abortion activists. That seems bound to continue as she makes her opposition to Planned Parenthood a centerpiece of her 2016 campaign.

Campaigning in South Carolina on Friday, Fiorina said she "absolutely" stands by her criticism of Planned Parenthood. She accused the women's health organization — it's also the nation's largest abortion provider — of pushing "propaganda" against her while being "aided and abetted by the media."

Fiorina has brushed off the facts surrounding her claim as a "technicality." Planned Parenthood, meanwhile, survived this week the latest attempt of conservatives in Congress to cut off its federal funding and accused her of lying.

The flap began at Republicans' Sept. 16 presidential debate, when Fiorina brought up widely circulated videos secretly recorded by anti-abortion activists and showing Planned Parenthood executives discussing the sale of fetal tissue to researchers.

"As regards Planned Parenthood, anyone who has watched this videotape -- I dare Hillary Clinton, Barack Obama to watch these tapes," Fiorina said. "Watch a fully formed fetus on the table, its heart beating, its legs kicking while someone says we have to keep it alive to harvest its brain."

Immigration and Naturalization Act, signed 50 years ago, triggered seismic population change

NEW YORK (AP) — It was considered a symbolic move — President Lyndon Johnson going to the Statue of Liberty and signing an immigration bill that gave people from every country in the world an equal chance to come to America.

The president himself described the legislation as less than revolutionary. "It does not affect the lives of millions. It will not reshape the structure of our daily lives, or really add importantly to either our wealth or our power," he said during the ceremony on Oct. 3, 1965.

But, he noted, the new law also would "strengthen us in a hundred unseen ways."

Fifty years later, there's been dramatic change as a result of the Hart-Celler Act that Johnson signed. A country that was almost entirely native-born in 1965 has a significant foreign-born population; demographic diversity has spread to every region, expanding a black-and-white racial paradigm into a multicolored one. Americans have gleefully adopted musical genres and foods that have immigrant origins, while remaining conflicted and uneasy politically over who's here, legally and not.

Germany marks 25 years of unity, with increasing power in Europe and new refugee challenge

BERLIN (AP) — Germany marks a quarter-century as a reunited nation on Saturday, with two leaders from the formerly communist east heading a country that increasingly asserts itself as Europe's political heavyweight — and now faces a new challenge in a refugee influx that will demand deep reserves of resourcefulness and patience.

West and East Germany united on Oct. 3, 1990, capping a process that started less than 11 months

earlier when the east's communist leadership opened the Berlin Wall under pressure from massive demonstrations. Evening out the differences between east and west has been a far slower process, and some inequalities persist even now.

On the whole, however, "things worked out well — so many people pitched in, showed verve, began to learn new jobs," Chancellor Angela Merkel, who grew up in the east and entered politics as communism fell, said in a video message ahead of the anniversary. Joachim Gauck, Germany's president since 2012, is another easterner, former pastor and pro-democracy activist.

Since reunification, some 1.5 trillion to 2 trillion euros (\$1.7 trillion to \$2.2 trillion dollars) have been funneled into the east to help bring the region up to speed after its outmoded industry collapsed. A steady post-1990 drain of people from east to west appears finally to have been stemmed, with more people moving east than the other way for the first time in 2013.

Even though unemployment remains higher in the east than the west — at 8.7 percent (an enviable figure for many European countries) compared with 5.6 percent — the gap has narrowed. Former Chancellor Helmut Kohl's promise to easterners that they would live in "blooming landscapes" no longer looks far-fetched.

Warren Jeffs' son opens up about secretive polygamous sect, says he feared oppressive father

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — As a young teen, Roy Jeffs would spend long days typing up his father's sermons while stuck inside a house in an Albuquerque subdivision where he and his mother were sent to live in hiding. In the middle of the night, the phone would ring. It was his father, polygamous leader Warren Jeffs.

"There would be like this piercing of despair in your heart," Roy Jeffs said. "What's he going to say now? Is he going tell me I've lost my place? Is he going to kick me out?"

Roy Jeffs, now 23, says he was controlled, manipulated and shuffled around the country and assigned to work crews to atone for his perceived transgressions before leaving the sect last year.

His stories provide a window into the secretive sect based on the Utah-Arizona border in which cellphones, toys, movies, the Internet, bicycles and even swimming were strictly forbidden. He said Jeffs imposed his control over followers by reassigning children and wives to different men, sending people to "houses of hiding" and wielding the constant threat of exile.

The son told his story to CNN for the first time in a story broadcast this week and described his upbringing in the polygamous sect in an Associated Press interview on Friday.

Louisville investigating allegations by escort that former staffer arranged sex for recruits

A book by an escort alleging that former Louisville staffer Andre McGee brought escorts into dorm parties, and paid for the women to strip and have sex with the Cardinals' recruits, their fathers and players is available online.

Louisville is investigating allegations by Katina Powell in the upcoming book, "Breaking Cardinal Rules: Basketball and the Escort Queen," from a publishing affiliate of the Indianapolis Business Journal. The 104-page book was available early Saturday, but some details were published on the Journal's web site on Friday.

The escort said during a four-year period many of the activities took place in the players' dormitory. Louisville officials say they learned of the allegations in late August and immediately notified the NCAA. McGee left Louisville in 2014 to become an assistant at Missouri-Kansas City. That school put McGee on paid leave Friday night and issued a statement saying the allegations were being taken seriously.

The age of consent to have sexual intercourse in Kentucky is 16, though in some instances it could be 18. It is unclear if a criminal investigation has also been launched in light of the allegations.

In 1944, during World War II, U.S. Army troops cracked the Siegfried Line north of Aachen, Germany. In 1951, the New York Giants captured the National League pennant by a score of 5-4 as Bobby Thom-

son hit a three-run homer off the Brooklyn Dodgers' Ralph Branca in the "shot heard 'round the world." In 1955, "Captain Kangaroo" and "The Mickey Mouse Club" premiered on CBS and ABC, respectively.

In 1962, astronaut Wally Schirra became the fifth American to fly in space as he blasted off from Cape Canaveral aboard the Sigma 7 on a 9-hour flight.

In 1974, Frank Robinson was named major league baseball's first black manager as he was placed in charge of the Cleveland Indians.

In 1981, Irish nationalists at the Maze Prison near Belfast, Northern Ireland, ended seven months of hunger strikes that had claimed 10 lives.

In 1990, West Germany and East Germany ended 45 years of postwar division, declaring the creation of a reunified country.

In 2008, O.J. Simpson was found guilty of robbing two sports-memorabilia dealers at gunpoint in a Las Vegas hotel room. (Simpson was later sentenced to nine to 33 years in prison.)

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush nominated White House counsel Harriet Miers to the Supreme Court (however, she withdrew three weeks later after criticism over her lack of judicial experience and Republican concerns about her conservatism). A Russian space capsule with American tourist Gregory Olsen aboard docked with the international space station. Australians Barry J. Marshall and Robin Warren won the 2005 Nobel Prize in physiology or medicine for showing that bacterial infection - not stress - caused ulcers in the stomach and intestine. British actor-comedian Ronnie Barker, half of the long-established and much-loved duo The Two Ronnies, died at age 76.

Five years ago: Ruling-party candidate Dilma Rousseff, trying to become Brazil's first female leader, fell short of getting a majority of votes in presidential elections. (Rousseff prevailed in a runoff against her centrist rival, Jose Serra.) Angel McCoughtry had 18 points as the U.S. won gold at the women's basketball world championship with an 89-69 victory over the host Czech Republic.

One year ago: An Internet video was released showing an Islamic State group militant beheading British hostage Alan Henning, the fourth such killing carried out by the extremist group being targeted by U.S.-led airstrikes.
