## No more freshmen initiation on school grounds

 Superintendent Joe Schwan talked about homecoming activities and one thing he pointed out was freshman initiation that was coming onto the school grounds and into the school buildings. The senior girls have been waking up the freshmen girls early in the morning and then dress them up and parade them around town and make them attend school. "We are at a point where that shouldn't be happening," Schwan said. "This is troublesome to me because it comes into the building and the parents are out there taking pictures. I don't see any way how that builds school spirit."Middle/High School Principal Dr. Anna Schwan reported from a principal's meeting that homecoming in many schools is being down-played. "Some schools have done away with dress-up days and have made homecoming more low keyed," she said. Board member Kelly Kjelden said, "I don't think there is a valid argument to support this behavior." Board Member Marty Weismantel said, "Even events happening after coordination the parents should think of the potential consequences." Board Member Merle Harder added, "It will be up to the parents to step up and put a stop to events happening away from school grounds."
Superintendent Schwan said this falls under the policy of bully and hazing and the board agreed to disallow future freshmen initiation from happening on school grounds. "School should be considered a safe place for our students," said Elementary Principal Brett Schwan. In other action:
Approved for the band trip to take place May 19-23 and to work out with those attending Global DI for travel arrangements on the 23rd.
Approved to move forward with refinancing the Arena general obligation bonds which will result in approximately $\$ 43,878$ over the last five years left on the bond.
There were good comments about the Lake Region Marching Festival held in Groton. Comments were made about the streets being swept. There was suggestion about garbage patrol for next year.
Letters for summer OST will be sent out soon. There are currently 35-40 students in OST compared to 20-25 last year. "The numbers are growing," said Elementary Principal Brett Schwan.
There has been a meeting with the kindergarten and junior kindergarten teachers to discuss their concerns. The elementary PAC meeting is set for Tuesday, Oct. 13. There have been scheduling conflicts with the girls volleyball and boys basketball tourneys.

Six of Groton's seven touchdowns were scored by different players as the Tigers defeated the Wagner Red Raiders, $48-0$. "It was nice to see so many different people score," said Coach Shaun Wanner. "It got everyone going on offense."
Penalties were also under control with the varsity squad having only three penalties on the night. "We ran quite a bit this week," Wanner said. "We ran more this past week than we did at the beginning of the year. I told them that whatever penalties we have against Wagner would carry over into practice until the Parkston game." That is in two weeks as Groton has a bye week.
The game also marked the 200th win for Coach Shaun Wanner as he is in his 29th year of coaching. There are only 16 coaches in Sourth Dakota history that have reached this milestone. Of them only six are still coaching.
Wanner started coaching in Langford where he coached for five years, then he coached for nine years in Ipswich where he reached his 100th win, and the past 15 in Groton. "I try not to get too caught up in it," Wanner said. "It's a nice accomplishment."
Wanner also pointed out that Assistant Coach Travis Kurth has been with Wanner for nearly 100 games. "I coached him for a couple of years in Langford, then he did some student teaching with me and he's been an assistant for the 15 years in Groton. He's been a big part of my success."
Wanner's career record is 200-88.
Groton scored on its first possession of the football, starting at its own 25 yard line. Marching down the field, securing two first downs and about five minutes later, Adam Herman caught a 49-yard pass from Bennett Shabazz for the touchdown with 7:31 left in the first quarter. James Thompson kicked the PAT and it was 7-0.
Groton's next touchdown drive started with 1:03 left in the first quarter starting at its own 45 yard line. Groton Area got two first downs before Bennett Shabazz scored on a one-yard run with 9:12 left in the first half. James Thompson kicked the PAT and it was 14-0.
On Wagner's third play of its next possession, the Red Raiders fumbled the ball on their own 25 yard line. Trevor Pray made a catch to give Groton a first down at the eight yard line. Bennett Shabazz then scored on an eight yard run with 6:40 left in the half. Thompson kicked the PAT and it was 21-0.
Wagner fumbled the ball on the very first play of its next possession and Hunter Lerew came up with the loose ball at the Wagner 15 yard line with 7:05 left in the half. The Tigers got a first down before Carter Jondahl hit paydirt from two yards out with 6:40 left in the half. Thompson kicked the PAT and it was 28-0.
Groton Area would score one more time before the half when Patrick Gengerke would score on a 25 -yard interception return with 1:47 left in the half. The PAT kick was short by Thompson and Groton took at 34-0 lead at half time.
Groton Area received the open- ing kickoff of the second half and started at its own 41 yard line. Two first downs later, Hunter Lerew would catch the ball from Bennett Shabazz and would complete the 28 -yard pass play with 8:31 left in the third quarter. Thompson kicked the PAT and it was 41-0.
Groton Area would score one more time in the game, starting its drive at the Wagner 37 yard line with 5:06 left in the third quarter. Lucas Hinman would score for the Tigers on a 37yard run on the next play. Thompson kicked the PAT and it was 48-0.
Groton Area would rack up 18 first downs and 345 yards total offense and 45 yards in penalties. Wagner had two first downs and 35 yards in total offense and 23 yards in penalties.
Groton Area had 36 carries for 232 yards. Ball carriers were Bennett Shabazz with 11 carries for 74 yards, Lucas Hinman with eight carries for 48 yards, Carter Jondahl had seven carries for 42 yards, Adam Herman had three car- ries for 21 yards, James Thompson had three carries for 18 yards, Brandon Keith had two carries for 10 yards and Trevor Pray had one carry for 19 yards. Wagner had 23 carries for eight yards rushing.
Bennett Shabazz compalted four of 11 passes for 110 yards and Marshall Lane completed one pass for three yards. Receivers with one catch each were Adam Herman for 49 yards, Hunter Lerew for 28 yards, Trevor Pray for 23 yards, Carter Jondahl for 10 yards and Jackson Oliver for three yards.
Kaden Kazens completed one of seven passes for Wagner for 12 yards and Mato Penny completed two of five passes for 15 yards. Hunter Hewitt caught two passes for 13 yards.
Leading tacklers for Groton Area were Carter Jondahl and Brandon Keith with eight each and Jack McKiver with seven. Hunter Hewitt led Wagner with eight.
Groton Area, now 6-1 on the season, will take next week off. The following week on October 22, the Tigers will travel to Parkston for the final regular season game. Wanner said Parkston has a lot at stake. He said that Parkston just lost big to Winner and they have to beat Groton so they don't have to make a return trip to Winner in the playoffs. "They have a few kids back from last year's state championship team," Wanner said. Parkston is 4-3. They defeated Redfield-Doland, 47-14, and Wagner, 44-16.

## What causes glaucoma? By Richard P. Holm MD

The second leading cause of irreversible blindness in U.S. is from glaucoma. Three million Americans are affected by this condition, and approximately one in ten will eventually get it, although it is more common in people of African or Asian descent.
The big question is, "What causes glaucoma?" I thought I knew the answer to this question, but the more I looked into this topic the more challenging that question became.
Glaucoma by definition is nerve damage causing loss of vision, which mostly affects the peripheral vision. That is, one can still see what he is staring at, but loses the parts of vision outside that central concentrated spot. We think this is mostly due to an elevated pressure of the fluid within the eyeball and so it is treated by using medications or surgical methods to lower the pressure. When glaucoma progresses, even the central vision can be lost.
To understand the reason for increased pressure within the eye, one has to first understand the construction of the human eye. Think about an enlarged three-D model.
Begin with a white beach ball and line it with a light sensitive blanket of nerves called the retina. On the front of the ball is a hole called the pupil. The hole looks black since it is usually darker inside the eye, unless a camera


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Per Lb. flashes. The pupil is outlined by the colorful iris that can constrict or dilate making the hole smaller or larger, allowing just the right amount of light through to reflect on the retina.
Imagine a magnifying glass-like lens smashed up against and behind the hole to focus light, and a smaller clear dome placed over the front of the ball to protect the pupil or hole. Realize both chambers of the eye are filled with fluid. New fluid is constantly being made inside the big ball, and old fluid flows or drains into the front dome chamber where it's removed.
We think some types of glaucoma happen when the optic nerve is damaged by fluid pressures inside the big chamber becoming too high and tight sometimes because the fluid removing canals are plugged, and sometimes because flow into the front chamber is blocked. And there are several reasons for that blockage. Boy, is this complicated! And to make it even more confusing, sometimes glaucoma nerve damage happens while the pressures inside the eye are normal. Go figure. Once again physicians and scientists are puzzled and are
