New South Dakota license plate design for 2016 unveiled

PIERRE, S.D. -- An image of the new license plate design for the 2016 South Dakota license plate reissue was unveiled today.

The current plate design has identified South Dakota motor vehicles since 2006. Many existing plates are succumbing to age, damage and loss of reflectivity, all of which can create readability problems.

The design was a cooperative effort led by Gov. Daugaard, the Department of Revenue Motor Vehicle Division and the South Dakota Department of Tourism and reflects a partnership in promoting South Dakota. The new license plates will be issued beginning Jan. 1, 2016.

Department of Revenue Secretary Andy Gerlach said, "The 2016 reissue will add up to approximately 1.5 million non-commercial vehicle and motorcycle plates consisting of the standard plate, the emblem plate, personalized plates, amateur radio, low-speed vehicles and the commercial radio plate."

The license plate reissue contract was awarded to Intellectual Technology, Inc., (ITI) from Fort Wayne, Ind., through a March 2015 request for proposal (RFP) issued by the Motor Vehicle Division. The RFP requested assistance to the Motor Vehicles Division with the implementation of a plate on demand system. ITI will oversee plate production along with servicing a fulfillment center in Brandon, S.D., to control quality, manage inventory and distribute license plates and annual vehicle registration cards through an on-demand system. The plate on-demand system will reduce material waste while providing a higher level of customer service.

The license plates will continue to be made at Pheasantland Industries located in the South Dakota State Penitentiary in Sioux Falls, S.D.

The new plate design will not be available until Jan. 1, 2016 and can be acquired during a regular vehicle registration renewal period from several convenient methods: local county treasurer's office, self-service terminals (SSTs) throughout the state, and from the Motor Vehicle customer portal at https://MySDCars.sd.gov.

School electives show strong numbers

Reports were given from the Career Technology Events programs at Monday night's school board meeting.

Don Donley showed the board some of the things the students made with the 3D printer. "It's kind of amazing what they can make with it," he said. He has 48 students in his shop classes.

Lindsey Tietz talked about how the students love having the hands on experience. She said

she has 25 students from the seventh grade class, but only have 19 sewing machines and six kitchens in the FACS classes. She has 10 eighth grade students, 15 in FACS 1, 10 in FACS 2, eight in FACS 3 and seven in FACS 4.

Brooke Lingbeck talked about the business classes that she teaches. There are a number of programs that students are using for their business situation. She will be teaching business law in the spring.

There are 23 students doing interns with 11 in area businesses and 12 in the high school/elementary school. Lingbeck is teaching business management, which is a new course being offered.

There were 73 that part in the Color Run this fall.

Superintendent Joe Schwan said the district should be proud of the number of electives that is being offered at Groton Area. Adam Franken was unable to be present for the agriculture education classes and Schwan said the numbers have been very steady.




The Elementary Parent Advisory Council (PAC) is looking to help fund for new playground equipment. The SchoolStore packets were sent home on Monday and is a fund-raiser site. Elementary Principal Brett Schwan said the report cards will be sent home on Friday. He also talked about the math curriculum and the teachers were impressed with enVision 2.0 curriculum.

Dr. Anna Schwan gave the middle/high school principal's report. She gave a report on the Family Night and 10 bonus points were offered to students who attended with their families and they will be available for use in the fourth quarter. 



There is no state income tax, so Social Security benefits and other forms of retirement income get a free ride. Sales taxes are relatively low, although they cover a broad scope of services

. The state has several property tax relief programs.

State Sales Tax

4% (prescription drugs are exempt, and many services are included). Municipalities add an average 1.83%, according to the tax foundation. Residents who are 65 or older and have an annual income of less than \$11,670 (single) or \$15,730 (household) are eligible for a sales-tax refund.

Property Taxes

Median property tax on South Dakota's median home value of \$138,400 is \$1,828, according to the Tax Foundation.

Tax breaks for seniors: A tax freeze and/or municipal property tax reduction is available for seniors 65 and older. To qualify for the assessment freeze, you must meet income requirements and have resided in a single-family dwelling for at least 200 days of the previous calendar year. Unmarried surviving spouses may also qualify for a freeze or reduction. Income is limited to \$26,965.13 for individuals and \$33,706.41 for multimember households, and the value of the home must be less than \$183,095.75.

Single homeowners 66 and older who earn \$10,500 or less can get a property tax refund based on income. Multi-person households headed by someone 66 or older, where the combined income is \$13,750 or less, are also eligible. Refunds are only available for singlehousehold dwellings, and you must have been a South Dakota resident for the entire previous year. People who do not receive a property tax refund and who do not own a home may apply for a refund of sales tax.

South Dakota also has a property tax homestead exemption for homeowners 70 or older (or surviving spouses), which delays payment of property taxes until the property is sold. Taxes are a lien on the property, which includes up to one acre, and must be paid along with 4% interest before the property can be transferred. For a single person, annual income must be less than \$16,000. For a multimember household, the limit is \$20,000.

Inheritance and Estate Taxes: There is no inheritance tax or estate tax.

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

About 1888, a man named Soren Anderson learned of free land being available in a great "new land" (America) and with wife, Elizabeth, in tow, sailed from Oslo, Norway, eventually to settle in Jasper, Minn. While there, their first son, Albert, was born.

About 1890, Soren acquired a quarter of land located five miles northeast of Pierpont.



Soon after arrival in Pierpont, another son, Severt, was born.

In following years seen the arrival of Severt's two sons, Milton and Norman, and three daughters. Upon the death of Soren in 1936, Severt moved his family to the Veblen Hillard area to farm.



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

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

Parkston wins defensive game

Groton made the trek to Parkston Thursday night where a hard fought game in the rain resulted in a defensive showdown. Parkston kicked a field goal with one second left in the first half and scored a touchdown with 38 seconds left in the game to hand Groton Area its second loss of the season, 9-0.

"I thought we played well," said Coach Shaun Wanner. "We had a couple of nice drives, but just couldn't get the ball into the endzone."

Parkston had 14 first downs while Groton Area had nine. The Trojans carried the ball 41 times for 209 yards. Blake Bietz had 23 carries for 156 yards, Austin Ripp had seven carries for 24 yards and Kyler Holzbauer had 10 carries for 31 yards. Groton Area had 33 carries for 80 yards. Bennett Shabazz had 18 carries for 44 yards and Carter Jondahl had 13 for 33 yards.

Bennett Shabazz completed six of 13 passes for 78 yards with one interception. Adam Herman had two catches for 31 yards, Patrick Gengerke had one for 16 yards, Brandon Keith had one catch for 23 yards and Carter Jondahl had two for eight yards. Josh Rands completed three of 10 passes for Parkston for 63 yards. Jake DeLange had one catch for 40 yards, Dillian Thuringer had one for seven yards and Blake Bietz had one for 16 yards.

Both teams lost the ball once, but recovered it for their own side. Groton Area had eight penalties for 65 yards and Parkston had seven for 75 yards.

Leading tacklers for Groton Area were Carter Jondahl with nine, Bennett Shabazz and Marshall Lane each had eight and Stevie Fey had seven. Leaders for Parktston were Brady Albecht with eight and Wes Genant with seven.

Groton Area is now 6-2 on the season and will host Mobridge-Pollock on Tuesday in the first round of the playoffs while Parkston, now 5-3, will travel to Winner on Tuesday.

Parkston's first possession was a short one as the Trojans punted on fourth and four. The Tigers got a drive going with a first down catch by Adam Herman to move into Trojan territory, but the Trojans intercepted the ball on third and 14 at the Parkston 25 yard line.

The Trojans got a first down, but a penalty stalled the drive and had to punt at fourth and 10.

Penalties plagued the Tigers on their next drive. Three penalties for 20 yards put the Tigers on their own eight yard line and ended up punting at fourth and 13. The punt pushed Parkston back to their own 39 yard line. The Trojans got a first down, but ended up punting on fourth and four. The Tigers' next drive extended into the second quarter and went 37 yards with two first downs before the Tigers punted on fourth and four. Parkston got a first down before punting on fourth and six. Groton also got a first down and ended up punting on fourth and six.

Parkston's final drive of the first half started at its own 30 yard line with 3:31 left. The Trojans got three first downs include a big pass play down to the Groton four yard line with 19 seconds left. The Trojans called time out with one second left. Jake DeLange then kicked a 23 yard field goal as the Trojans took a 3-0 lead at half time.

Groton started its first drive of the second half from its own 35 yard line. A pair of first downs moved the Tigers down to the Parkston 35, but the Tigers ended up punting on fourth and 16. Then both teams had four plays before punting

Parkston's next big move started from its own 20 yard line with 5:21 left in the third quarter. A pair of first downs and a 15-yard Groton penalty moved the Trojans down to the Groton 13 yard line. On fourth and seven, Parkston attempted a field goal attempt which was blocked.

Groton's next drive extended into the fourth quarter, but the Tigers had a punt on fourth and 15 after securing one first down. Parkston went four plays on its next possession and the Tigers took over on Parkston's 43 yard line with 9:04 left in the game. Groton got a first down and got down to the Parkston 29 yard line. Another first down moved the Tigers to the Parkston 11. It was third and seven from the Parkston eight, but a penalty made it third and 12, then it was fourth and 13 and a penalty made it fourth and 18. A field goal attempt was blocked and the drive went unfruitful.

Parkston scored a touchdown with 1:12 left, but it was recalled with a Parkston penalty, but the Trojans would score on the next play with a 25 yard run by Balke Bietz with 38 seconds eft. The PAT kick was no good and it was 9-0.

In the time remaining, Groton got a first down and the ball down to the Parkston 40, but time ran out and Parkston won a hard fought game, 9-0.

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Marshall County Resident First Flu **Detection Of Season**

PIERRE, S.D. - South Dakota's first influenza detection of the season is a Marshall County resident in the 70 to 79 age group, the Department of Health reported today. The individual was diagnosed with influenza A and was hospi-

"If you haven't already been vaccinated, now is the time," said Colleen Winter, health and medical services director for the department. "Annual vaccination is the single best way to protect yourself and those around you from influenza."

Yearly flu vaccination is recommended for everyone over the age of 6 months, but some groups are at higher risk – pregnant women, people over 50 years and people with chronic medical conditions. Health care workers and household contacts of high risk populations, especially those with young infants in the household, should also be vaccinated. The state offers free flu vaccine for kids aged six months through age 18.

Nearly 60 percent of South Dakotans got a flu vaccine during the 2014-2015 season, the highest vaccination rate in the nation for the second season in a row. South Dakota has had the nation's highest flu vaccination rate for four of the last five seasons.

The 2014-2015 season was one of the deadliest in South Dakota history with
