

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Today in Weather History


October 27, 1991: The first winter storm of the season moved across western and northern South Dakota. The storm produced widespread snow and freezing rain. Strong winds also produced blowing snow which caused blizzard conditions. Snow amounts ranged from 3 to 11 inches. Many schools and businesses in western South Dakota were closed. Snow drifts, as high as 6 feet, made many roads impassable. Travel across western South Dakota was extremely difficult, if not impossible. Forty traffic accidents occurred in the Black Hills while five accidents were reported in Pierre. A semi overturned east of Kadoka. Many major roads were closed due to the snow and visibility. Rapid City airport was closed. Freezing rain downed electric and telephone lines in Mobridge, Gettysburg, Belvidere, Midland, and Mission. Ice also broke six power poles in Walworth County. Some rural areas were without electricity for 30 hours. Three accidents in Aberdeen were attributed to slippery roads.

- 1764 A "very remarkable storm of snow with high winds" produced 22 inches at Rutland in central Massachusetts. (David Ludlum)
- 1913: At least three people died and more than a hundred people were injured when the Abercynon Tornado struck an area from Edwardsville to Cilfynydd in South Wales. Click HERE for more information from BBC.
- 1929 A snowstorm dumped 27 inches upon Ishpeming, MI, in 24 hours to establish a state record. (David Ludlum)

- 1987 Showers and thunderstorms produced locally heavy rain from Virginia to New York State. Fallen leaves made roads and sidewalks slick, and also clogged sewers. Rainfall totals of 1.55 inches at Newark NJ, 1.54 inches at Harrisburg PA, 1.27 inches at Scranton PA, and 1.22 inches at Atlantic City NJ, were records for the date. (The National Weather Summary)
- 1988 Low pressure brought snow and gale force winds to the Great Lakes Region, and snow and high winds to the north central U.S. Winds gusted to 47 mph at Lansing MI, and reached 55 mph at Pierre SD. (The National Weather Summary) (Storm Data)
- 1989 Wintry weather invaded the northwestern U.S. A storm crossing the Central Rockies produced up to 23 inches of snow in the mountains east of Salt Lake City UT. "Indian Summer" continued in the Lower Ohio Valley and the Upper Great Lakes Region. Afternoon highs of 71 degrees at Marquette MI and 72 degrees at Sault Ste Marie MI were records for the date. 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

Authorities ID Minnesota man killed in South Dakota crash

ANDOVER, S.D. (AP) — Authorities have identified a Minnesota man who died in a weekend crash on U.S. Highway 12 in northeastern South Dakota.

The Highway Patrol says 50-year-old Dennis Paulson, of Raymond, Minnesota, was driving a minivan that was in the wrong lane and collided with a recreational vehicle towing a Jeep. He was pronounced dead at the scene shortly before 12:30 a.m. Sunday.

One of the five people in the RV suffered minor injuries.

Authorities say a car that was traveling through the crash scene hit a tire that had come off the RV. Both occupants of the car suffered injuries that are not considered life-threatening.

The highway's westbound lanes were shut down for about 4 ½ hours.

State delays move into Hot Springs veterans home

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — The South Dakota Department of Veterans Affairs reports that move-in day for the newly constructed Michael J. Fitzmaurice Veterans Home in Hot Springs has been delayed.

Veterans Affairs Secretary Larry Zimmerman says the project is nearing completion but the department has a few issues it needs contractors to address before veterans can move in.

The 133,000-square-foot, two-story building will house 52 skilled nursing beds on the main level and 48 non-skilled or residential living beds on the upper level.

Zimmerman says the project is one that people of South Dakota overwhelmingly supported, and the department wants to ensure veterans have the care and support that is worthy of their sacrifice.

South Dakota event to offer tool to help recover lost kids

BELLE FOURCHE, S.D. (AP) — State officials will be in Belle Fourche Tuesday evening to encourage parents to register their children in a comprehensive child identification program.

The South Dakota Child Identification Program will collect information to register the children at the Belle Fourche Middle School. The kits may include child's photos, dental impressions, fingerprints, a DNA cheek swab and video interview.

The information packets will be given to each child's parents to keep. The kit is meant to aid law enforcement in recovering missing children.

The state's program is part of MASONICHIP, an initiative of the Masons. The South Dakota Academy of Physician Assistants is among the groups that help implement the program in South Dakota.

The event will run from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Husband of ex-US Senate candidate Bosworth appears in court

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — The husband of former U.S. Senate candidate Annette Bosworth made his first court appearance Monday after being indicted in connection with his wife's 2014 campaign, which left her with a conviction on 12 felony counts.

Chad Haber appeared at the Hughes County Courthouse. He has been charged with one count each of

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perjury and offering false or forged instrument for filing.

At issue is a nominating petition Haber submitted for his wife's Senate campaign, according to the August indictment, but further details are scarce. A former candidate for state attorney general, Haber has said the charges are unfounded.

Haber faces a maximum penalty of four years in prison and \$8,000 in fines. He said during the hearing that he plans to hire an attorney and said he has "lots of questions" about the charges.

The Hughes County state's attorney is prosecuting the case. Haber's next court appearance is Dec. 1.

A jury in May found Bosworth guilty of six counts each of perjury and filing false documents in connection with her campaign petitions. She avoided serving prison time when a judge handed down a suspended sentence in July.

She was out of the country on a medical mission during the period her petitions were circulating, yet attested to witnessing people signing them. Under state law, the person circulating petitions must witness the signings from registered voters.

Bosworth blamed bad advice from a former attorney and political consultant.

The South Dakota Board of Medical and Osteopathic Examiners voted last month to revoke Bosworth's medical license because of her conviction. She is appealing the conviction and the licensing board decision.

Flandreau marijuana plan could put issue before Legislature JAMES NORD, Associated Press

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — The Flandreau Santee Sioux's plans to sell marijuana in a lounge on tribal land will likely thrust the issue before legislators in the upcoming session, the head of the State-Tribal Relations Committee said Monday.

The committee discussed the tribe's marijuana operation, which is scheduled to open New Year's Eve. Democratic Sen. Troy Heinert, the committee chairman, said he hopes the Santee Sioux and nontribal authorities can find common ground.

Republican Sen. Craig Tieszen said the situation is a "jurisdictional and enforcement nightmare" since marijuana is illegal under state law, and Attorney General Marty Jackley has said any changes in tribal laws won't affect any non-Indians or any nontribal lands.

"The only thing that averts a crisis is people using common sense and being reasonable, but strict enforcement of the law would cause chaos," Tieszen said. "That's just the way it is."

Ryan Kills A Hundred of the Santee Sioux's executive committee said the tribe wants to work with the state and authorities. Speaking before the panel, Kills a Hundred and executive committee Trustee Kenny Weston stressed the safeguards the facility has in place to prevent any marijuana from leaving. The tribe is also emphasizing efforts to prevent impaired driving.

Every plant in Flandreau's growing facility has a barcode. After being harvested and processed, marijuana will be sold in sealed 1-gram packages. Customers will be allowed to buy only 1 gram at a time and will have to return the empty, barcoded package of their purchase in order to be able to buy another gram.

But potential legal questions for marijuana users remain. Representatives from Jackley's office told the committee that the presence of THC, the psychoactive compound that gives marijuana users a high, in someone's blood or urine is considered possession under state law. That could spell trouble for users who ingest marijuana on the reservation and then leave its borders.

Assistant Attorney General Kirsten Jasper said she doesn't believe there are plans to camp at the border of the reservation north of Sioux Falls to pull over drivers but said she couldn't say what individual law enforcement agencies would do.

Heinert encouraged the tribe to learn about the legislative process. He said there will be legislative changes or "darn sure some conversations" about the tribe's endeavor into marijuana at the Capitol during the 2016 session.

Weston said the Legislature should look at changing the state's ingestion law and decriminalizing the use of marijuana.

"We are a nation within a nation, and I hate feeling like we're a nation surrounded by a hostile nation."

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Weston said. "There's bigger problems going on out there in the world. This shouldn't be one of them." Kelsey Pritchard, a spokeswoman for Gov. Dennis Daugaard, said in an email that state legislation on the issue is unlikely. Pritchard said the governor opposes the legalization of marijuana in any part of South Dakota and said he is working with the attorney general "on how best to confront this problem."

The legalization of marijuana on the reservation came in June, months after the Justice Department outlined a new policy allowing Indian tribes, which are considered sovereign nations, to grow and sell marijuana on tribal lands under the same conditions laid out for states that have legalized the drug.

About \$33K found in vehicle stopped by assaulted SD trooper

RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) — Approximately \$33,000 was found in the vehicle that was pulled over by a South Dakota Highway Patrol trooper who was then assaulted, law enforcement authorities said Monday.

The Pennington County Sheriff's Office said the money was found after deputies executed a search warrant in the vehicle early Sunday. Deputies also located more than 50 pounds of marijuana and a handgun in a rural area that authorities believe were stashed by the four people suspected to be involved in the Saturday assault of Trooper Zachary Bader.

The South Dakota Department of Public Safety said Bader was assaulted around 11 a.m. Saturday during a traffic stop on Interstate 90. He suffered serious injuries that are not life-threatening.

The four suspects in the assault were apprehended by Pennington County deputies near Wall. The most serious charges are against Donald Willingham, 33, who is accused of attempted murder. Desiree Sukert, 26, and Jonathan Melendez, 22, are charged with being an accessory. All three also face drug charges, along with 23-year-old Chase Sukert.

The four individuals are from Washington state. It wasn't immediately clear what towns in Washington the suspects are from or whether they have attorneys. They are all being held at the Pennington County Jail.

The sheriff's office says the marijuana and the handgun were found about 17 miles away from the scene of the assault, in a rural area off Highway 29 in Meade County.

Bader has been with the Highway Patrol for 10 years and is stationed in Rapid City.

"Trooper Bader is a sterling example of the men and women who protect our state every day," South Dakota Gov. Dennis Daugaard said in a statement Saturday. "We thank him for his service and send prayers to him and his family."

Teen arraigned on attempted murder charge in school shooting DIRK LAMMERS, Associated Press

CANTON, S.D. (AP) — A judge entered a not guilty plea Monday on behalf of a 16-year-old boy accused of shooting and injuring the principal inside his South Dakota high school last month.

Mason Buhl was charged as an adult with attempted murder and the commission of a felony while armed with a firearm. A grand jury indicted Buhl earlier this month on the two charges, which each carry a maximum prison term of 25 years.

Circuit Judge Jon Sogn read Buhl his rights and asked the teen if he understood those rights and the charges against him. Buhl, dressed in green jails scrubs with his hands cuffed, politely answered "Yes" or "Yes, your honor" to the questions, but made no other statements.

Buhl's court-appointed attorney, Mike Butler, declined to speak to reporters after the brief hearing in Canton.

Under state law, Butler could ask the judge to try the case in juvenile court, but no such request had been made as of Monday afternoon. Lincoln County State's Attorney Tom Wollman has said state law requires him to charge a 16-year-old as an adult if he or she commits a serious felony.

Investigators said Buhl confronted Harrisburg High School Principal Kevin Lein with a handgun in his office on the morning of Sept. 30, and fired a single shot with a handgun. Lein suffered a gunshot wound to his right arm.

Buhl was tackled after the shooting by Assistant Principal Ryan Rollinger, who, along with the school's

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activities director, held him down until sheriff's deputies arrived. No one else was hurt, and students were sent home for the day.

Lein, 57, was discharged from the hospital the same afternoon and returned to his job the following day sporting a sling on his right arm.

The school's superintendent said after the incident that the shooting was sparked over a disciplinary action, but didn't elaborate. A motive wasn't discussed during Monday's brief hearing.

Buhl is being held without bond at a juvenile detention center in Sioux Falls. The judge set a trial date of Jan. 19.

Bond set for suspect in Sioux Falls accidental shooting

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — A man facing a manslaughter charge stemming from what authorities in Sioux Falls have determined to be an accidental shooting has made his initial court appearance.

Judge John Schlimgen on Monday set a \$100,000 cash-only bond for 21-year-old David Randle Jr., of Sioux Falls.

Authorities say Randle was holding a rifle Saturday during a gathering at an apartment when it discharged and a bullet hit a major artery in the leg of 19-year-old Mikael Mengitsu Ashame. The Sioux Falls man died at the scene despite first aid efforts.

Sioux Falls Police Capt. Blaine Larsen says authorities don't believe Randle intentionally killed Ashame. The gun's owner, 19-year-old Mason Mitzel, of Brandon, is facing several drug charges. Schlimgen set Mitzel's bond at \$20,000 cash or surety.

It's unclear whether Randle and Mitzel have attorneys who could comment on their cases.

Ex-director of visitation center accused of embezzling \$40K

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Law enforcement authorities in Sioux Falls are accusing the former director of a family visitation facility of taking over \$40,000 from the organization

Police Capt. Blaine Larson says 40-year-old Aaron Wimmer is facing an embezzlement charge stemming from an investigation into the finances of the Family Visitation Center in Sioux Falls.

The facility works to ensure the well-being of children caught in the middle of divorce, child abuse and other situations. Wimmer led it until August, when authorities began the investigation.

Larsen says the embezzling started in 2011, when Wimmer began to use the center's credit card for personal purchases.

Wimmer has been repaying the center. He is scheduled to appear in court next week. It wasn't immediately clear if he has an attorney who could comment in the charge.

Motorcyclist killed in collision with pickup truck near Tea

TEA, S.D. (AP) — A 55-year-old man was killed when the motorcycle he was driving was struck by a pickup truck near Tea.

The South Dakota Highway Patrol says a the crash happened just after 4:30 a.m. Sunday on Interstate 29 when 25-year-old Cody Hillestad, of Brandon, lost control of his truck and it went into a ditch, hit the median and rolled. The truck landed in northbound traffic and collided with the motorcycle driven by Bradley Carlson.

Carlson was pronounced dead at the scene. It wasn't immediately known if Hillestad suffered any injuries. The crash prompted a four-hour shutdown of the interstate.

China warns US Navy after ship sails by artificial island claimed as Chinese territory

BEIJING (AP) — A U.S. Navy warship sailed past one of China's artificial islands in the South China Sea on Tuesday, in a challenge to Chinese sovereignty claims that drew an angry protest from Beijing, which said the move damaged US-China relations and regional peace.

China's Foreign Ministry said authorities monitored and warned the USS Lassen as it entered what China claims as a 12-mile (21-kilometer) territorial limit around Subi Reef in the Spratly Islands archipelago, a group of reefs, islets, and atolls where the Philippines has competing claims.

"The actions of the U.S. warship have threatened China's sovereignty and security interests, jeopardized the safety of personnel and facilities on the reefs, and damaged regional peace and stability," the ministry said on its website.

"The Chinese side expresses its strong dissatisfaction and resolute opposition," the statement said.

The sail-past fits a U.S. policy of pushing back against China's growing assertiveness in the South China Sea. U.S. ally the Philippines welcomed the move as a way of helping maintain "a balance of power."

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Congressional leaders reach agreement on 2-year budget deal, seek to get rank-and-file backing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional leaders are throwing their collective weight behind a hard-won, two-year bipartisan budget plan aimed at heading off a looming government debt crisis and forestalling a government shutdown in December.

The pact, which would take these volatile issues off the table until after the 2016 presidential election, emerged in behind-the-scenes negotiations late Monday on Capitol Hill. It-would give both the Pentagon and domestic agencies \$80 billion in debt relief in exchange for cuts elsewhere in the budget.

The deal represents one last accommodation between President Barack Obama and departing House Speaker John Boehner, but whether it succeeds depends in great measure on the reception it gets from restive House Republicans, including the arch-conservatives who forced the Ohio Republican out.

"This is again just the umpteenth time that you have this big, huge deal that'll last for two years and we were told nothing about it and in fact even today, were not given the details," said Rep. John Fleming, R-La. "And were probably going to have to vote on it in less than 48 hours." A vote could come as early as Wednesday in the House.

The measure was to be discussed further at a GOP meeting Tuesday morning. Boehner hoped to get it passed before Rep. Paul Ryan's election as his successor, expected Thursday

5 Britons killed after boat sinks off Vancouver Island; 1 person missing amid talk of big wave

TOFINO, British Columbia (AP) — Investigators are trying to unravel the mystery of what caused a whale watching boat with 27 people on board to capsize off Vancouver Island in seemingly calm weather, killing five British nationals and leaving an Australian man missing. A fisherman who was among the first rescuers on the scene offered a clue, saying a survivor told him that a sudden wave capsized the boat.

Government Investigators have not commented on what caused the 20-meter (65-feet) Leviathan II to capsize on Sunday afternoon. A senior employee of Jamie's Whaling Station, the company operating the boat, said the vessel sank so quickly the crew didn't have time to issue a mayday call. The boat capsized about eight nautical miles (14.7 kilometers) off Tofino, a popular destination for whale watchers.

The company's director of operations, Corene Inouye, said the crew shot flares from the water which attracted the attention of local aboriginal fishermen who rushed to help rescue 21 people. Valerie Wilson, a spokeswoman for the Vancouver Island Health Authority, said late Monday that four of the survivors remained in hospitals in British Columbia and were all in stable condition.

Fisherman Clarence Smith said he was reeling his lines for halibut when his friend saw a flare shoot in the sky. They raced to the scene in their small boat, and saw people in life rafts, in the water, and on rocks. They first helped a man who was clinging to the side of the boat, taking eight minutes to get him on board. He was unresponsive, and tangled in a line.

Then they rescued two women who were clinging to each other, and finally got 10 people on the life raft onto their boat. Among those they picked up were a pregnant woman and a woman with a broken leg.

Rescuers struggle to reach quake-hit Pakistani, Afghan regions as death toll rises to 311

PESHAWAR, Pakistan (AP) — Rescuers were struggling to reach quake-stricken regions in Pakistan and Afghanistan on Tuesday as officials said the combined death toll from the previous day's earthquake rose to 311.

According to Afghan and Pakistani officials, 237 people died in Pakistan and 74 in Afghanistan in the magnitude-7.5 quake, which was centered deep beneath the Hindu Kush mountains in Afghanistan's sparsely

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populated Badakhshan province that borders Pakistan, Tajikistan and China.

Afghan authorities were scrambling to access the hardest-hit areas near the epicenter, located 73 kilometers (45 miles) south of Fayzabad, the capital of Badakhshan province.

In Pakistan, the Swat Valley and areas around the Dir, Malakand and Shangla towns in the mountains of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province were also hard-hit in the quake. The Pakistani town closest to the epicenter is Chitral while on the Afghan side it is the Jurm district of Badakhshan.

More than 2,000 people were injured in Monday's temblor, which also damaged nearly 2,500 homes in Pakistan, officials said.

2 Iranian poets are latest target in hard-liners' crackdown on expression in Iran

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates (AP) — Two Iranian poets jailed for their work and sentenced to 99 lashes apiece for shaking hands with members of the opposite sex are the latest targets in a crackdown that analysts say pits hard-liners against those offering new glimpses of life in the Islamic Republic.

The sentences follow a pattern of arrests and convictions targeting activists, journalists and artists that has served as a grim backdrop to President Hassan Rouhani's efforts to soften the country's image and improve relations with the West, including through the landmark nuclear agreement reached last summer.

Hard-liners in the police, judiciary and military view any rapprochement with the West as a threat to the Islamic Republic and a sign of moral decay. Rights groups and analysts say those targeted in the ongoing crackdown on expression in Iran also serve as pawns in the hard-liners' struggle with moderates ahead of February's parliamentary elections.

"I think people thought with the nuclear deal, there would be sort of a bit of a thaw as well or a bit of an opening up," said Karin Deutsch Karlekar, the director of Free Expression Programs at PEN America, an organization promoting literature and freedom of speech. "I think the judiciary is sort of pushing back and trying to make clear that there isn't going to be that opening people were hoping for."

Fatemeh Ekhtesari, a practicing obstetrician, and Mehdi Mousavi, a trained doctor who teaches literature and poetry, were first arrested in December 2013, months after Rouhani took office. Earlier this month, Ekhtesari received an 11½-year prison sentence, while Mousavi got nine years on charges ranging from propaganda against the state to "insulting sanctities," as well as the lashings, according to PEN.

Stigma and other challenges abound for 5 million US children who've had a parent behind bars

Three years ago, the little girl would hide under a table when confronted with reminders that both her parents were in prison.

Now almost 10, she's a confident, popular student, and ace recruiter for the program that helped her, says Daniel Howell, a case manager for New Hope Oklahoma. It offers after-school programs, weekend retreats and summer camps for about 500 Oklahoma children annually who have parents behind bars.

Nationwide, there are few comparable programs, despite a vast pool of children who might benefit.

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Child Trends, a research organization, released a report Tuesday estimating that 5 million U.S. children have had at least one parent imprisoned — about one in every 14 children under 18. For black children, the rate was one in nine, the report said.

The report was based on data from the 2011-12 National Survey of Children's Health — a phone survey sponsored by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services that collected input from parents and other caregivers.

Obama showcases diversity in music at White House with R&B, soul and jazz performances

WASHINGTON (AP) — Whether belting out Tyrics to Al Green's "Let's Stay Together," leading a mournful congregation through "Amazing Grace," or tweeting his Spotify music playlist that includes Stevie Wonder and Nina Simone, President Barack Obama has shown that he's a pretty soulful guy.

The president and his wife, Michelle, also have prominently showcased such R&B and soul talent as Patti LaBelle and B.B. King during state dinners, music history events and the annual Easter Egg Roll.

The latest installment of the PBS series "In Performance at the White House" celebrated the history of American music with performances by Queen Latifah, Smokey Robinson, Usher, Trombone Shorty, and Esperanza Spalding, among others. It is set to air on PBS stations Jan. 8.

Spalding landed on the first lady's Spotify music playlist. The Grammy Award-winning jazz singer and bassist said the variety of musicians who have performed at the White House conveys a message of inclusion at what the Obamas have long touted as the "People's House."

"It seems like there is a theme of wanting to really support artists who are working hard— not just in their craft— but communicating about the issues of our time," said Spalding, an advocate of human rights issues at the U.S. detention facility at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

In 1880, Theodore Roosevelt married his first wife, Alice Lee.

In 1922, the first annual celebration of Navy Day took place.

In 1938, Du Pont announced a name for its new synthetic yarn: "nylon."

In 1947, "You Bet Your Life," starring Groucho Marx, premiered on ABC Radio. (It later became a televi-

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sion show on NBC.)

In 1954, U.S. Air Force Col. Benjamin O. Davis Jr. was promoted to brigadier general, the first black officer to achieve that rank in the USAF. Walt Disney's first television program, titled "Disneyland" after the yet-to-be completed theme park, premiered on ABC.

In 1962, during the Cuban Missile Crisis, a U-2 reconnaissance aircraft was shot down while flying over Cuba, killing the pilot, U.S. Air Force Maj. Rudolf Anderson Jr.

In 1978, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin (men-AH'-kem BAY'-gihn) were named winners of the Nobel Peace Prize for their progress toward achieving a Middle East accord.

In 1980, opera star Beverly Sills gave her last public performance during a farewell gala at New York's Lincoln Center.

In 1990, death claimed bandleader Xavier Cugat at age 90, author Elliott Roosevelt at age 80 and French movie director Jacques Demy ("The Umbrellas of Cherbourg") at age 59.

In 1995, a sniper killed one soldier and wounded 18 others at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. (Paratrooper William J. Kreutzer was convicted in the shootings, and condemned to death; the sentence was later commuted to life in prison.)

In 2004, the Boston Red Sox won their first World Series since 1918, sweeping the St. Louis Cardinals in Game 4, 3-0.

Ten years ago: White House counsel Harriet Miers withdrew her nomination to the Supreme Court after three weeks of brutal criticism from fellow conservatives. As many Floridians continued to struggle to find food, water and fuel in the wake of Hurricane Wilma, President George W. Bush visited the state to inspect the damage. Tropical Storm Beta formed in the Caribbean Sea, becoming the 23rd tropical storm of the Atlantic hurricane season.

Five years ago: Dozens of Jewish extremists hoisting Israeli flags defiantly marched through the Arab-Israeli town of Umm el-Fahm, chanting "death to terrorists" and touching off clashes between rock-hurling residents and police. Former Argentine President Nestor Kirchner died at age 60. The San Francisco Giants won the first game of the World Series, defeating the Texas Rangers 11-7.

One year ago: The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommended new restrictions for people at highest risk for coming down with the Ebola virus and symptom monitoring for those at lower risk.
