
Game scores were 25-19, 25-19, 19-25 and 25-22.





Today in Weather History

November 6, 1959: A strong cold front that brought near blizzard conditions and cold temperatures in the 5th continued to bring record or near record lows during the morning hours. Some low temperatures include;-13 in Murdo; -12 in Eureka; -11 in Britton; -10 in Castlewood;-9 near McIntosh and Redfield; -8 in Andover; -7 in Clear Lake and Kennebec; -6 degrees in Aberdeen; -5 in Watertown; and -4 in Pierre.

November 6, 2008: A strong area of low pressure moving across South Dakota and into Minnesota brought widespread rain, freezing rain, and snow to central, north central, and northeast South Dakota. Much of the freezing fell across central and north central South Dakota west of the Missouri River. As the freezing rain changed over to snow and the winds increased, the ice and snow buildup on the power lines and poles caused hundreds of power poles to break across Jones, Stanley, Dewey, and Corson counties. East of the Missouri River, the colder air and stronger winds moved in changing the rain over to snow. Strong winds of 30 to 45 mph with gusts near 60 mph brought widespread blizzard conditions to all of the area.

Ice buildup from the freezing rain ranged from a tenth to as much as an inch for counties west of the Missouri River. Snowfall amounts across the entire area generally ranged from 2 to 8 inches with a 15 inch amount recorded in southwest Corson County. Some of the snowfall amounts included; 3 inches in Eagle Butte, Blunt, Kennebec, Mission Ridge, and Onida; 4 inches in Pollock, Gettysburg, and Bowdle; 5 inches south of Harrold, Iona, and near McIntosh; 6 inches in Mobridge; 7 inches in Murdo; 8 inches in McLaughlin, and 15 inches southwest of Keldron.


All 4,600 customers of the Moreau-Grand Electric Company lost power due to the storm. The last time this occurred was during the winter of 1967-68. The monetary loss to this cooperative and other electric cooperatives for Jones, Stanley, Corson, and Dewey counties was in the hundreds of thousands of dollars. There were over 100 line workers working countless hours with crews coming as far away as Nebraska and Iowa to assist in the power recovery. Over 1,000 customers were without power for an extended period of time. Cell phone coverage was also knocked out for parts of the West River area due to downed towers.

The blizzard resulted in numerous school, business, and road closures along with flight cancellations. Interstate 90 was shut down from Mitchell, South Dakota to the Wyoming border from Thursday the 6th until Friday evening of the 7th. Many semi-trucks and cars were stranded along the Interstate with many people being rescued. Many travels took shelter in Murdo, Chamberlain, and Pierre until the Interstate reopened. There were several accidents across the area with a serious accident in Walworth County on Highway 83 near the Potter County line. In the early afternoon hours of Friday the 7th, slippery roads, high winds, and low visibilities contributed to the rollover of a passenger van carrying seven students. The passenger van rolled several times causing serious injuries to three of the students. The Governor declared a state of emergency on the 7th, and President Bush declared South Dakota a disaster area.





RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) — Rapid City police are investigating what they say is a suspicious death. Authorities are searching for a man believed to be a recent companion of a woman whose body was found in a hotel Wednesday. Police say 60-year-old Helen Wright had been dead for at least two days. Preliminary autopsy results indicate Wright's injuries were consistent with an assault.

SD Macy's float to feature Christian music band MercyMe

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — Contemporary Christian music band MercyMe will appear on "Mount Rushmore's American Pride" float at this year's Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

South Dakota Tourism Secretary Jim Hagen says the band's "music and unique sound have garnered them millions of fans around the country."

This is the South Dakota Department of Tourism's sixth year appearing in the New York City parade. Neil Diamond appeared on the float in 2011, and Don McLean, singer of "American Pie," appeared in 2012. The following year, rocker Joan Jett had was pulled to another float after complaints from some South Dakota farmers and ranchers who questioned why the vegetarian and animal-rights ally was representing their beef-loving state.

The agency says the goal of the parade appearance is to drive new and repeat visitors to South Dakota.

Thune, Noem question Rapid City site for counseling center REGINA GARCIA CANO, Associated Press

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — The two most senior members of South Dakota's congressional delegation are questioning the location of a proposed counseling center in the wake of a string of suicides among Indian communities around the state.

U.S. Sen. John Thune and U.S. Rep. Kristi Noem raised their concerns Thursday in a letter to Health Secretary Sylvia Burwell, asking why the planned intensive behavioral health unit was set to be built in Rapid City, dozens of miles away from the people living on western South Dakota reservations that the center is supposed to help.

The Indian Health Service, which is responsible for providing federal health services to American Indians, intends to spend nearly \$2 million to build the intensive behavioral health unit to help individuals contemplating suicide.

"While we are encouraged by this news, we are concerned about the agency's plans, particularly its decision to place the new facility at the Rapid City Service Unit," the lawmakers wrote in the letter that requests a series of answers by Dec. 1. "... We worry that, by placing the facility so far from the reservations, IHS may not fully grasp the urgent nature of this crisis," the letter continues.

The proposed center comes as the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation — home to about 35,000 people — continues to grapple with a wave of suicides. Fifteen people have killed themselves there since December. The youngest to die was 12 and the oldest 24.

A trip to Rapid City can be longer than 170 miles from some communities on the reservation, and not all tribal members — almost half of whom live below the federal poverty line — have a way to get to there.

"Given the limited resources our tribal members often have for transportation, will IHS be responsible to transport patients to the facility in Rapid City, and back to their homes?" the lawmakers wrote. They also asked for details about how HIS has responded to the increase in suicides, including specific examples of how the agency has ensured that those in need of assistance received it.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services on Thursday confirmed it received the letter and plans to respond to the congressional correspondence.

"IHS is committed to working with the Tribe to address this heart-breaking problem," the agency said in a statement. IHS said it "has increased its capacity to treat behavioral health issues on Pine Ridge Reservation" and is working with the Oglala Sioux Tribe, other agencies and national experts "to provide a comprehensive public health response."

Thune and Noem traveled to Pine Ridge in October and met with students, law enforcement, tribal leaders and others.

"(Young people) told me stories about friends and loved ones who had taken their own lives — and some explained they had tried to do the same," Noem said in a statement. "I recognize there are no words to wipe away the pain these kids have had to experience, but I'm committed to working with these young people and tribal leaders to pave a more hopeful future for them."

Wind Cave completes documents to open additional 5K acres

WIND CAVE NATIONAL PARK, S.D. (AP) — Wind Cave National Park has completed two planning documents needed to move forward with opening of an additional 5,000 acres of park space.

National Park Service Midwest Regional Director Cam Sholly says the documents will allow the park to

open the 5,556-acre Casey Addition, which is located along the park's former southern boundary. The property was acquired in 2011.

The Zoning Management Plan defines allowable types and general intensities of uses, activities and development associated with public enjoyment and use at specified locations throughout the entire park.

The Visitor Use Plan calls for access into the new property along 266th Street and the construction of a gravel parking area near the Sanson Ranch buildings.

Libertarians to meet, endorse candidates in Mandan JAMES MacPHERSON, Associated Press JAMES NORD, Associated Press

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — Libertarian Party members from North Dakota will for the first time field a full slate of statewide candidates in 2016, while South Dakota faithful are working to regain ballot access. Party officials from both states are meeting Saturday in Mandan, where North Dakota supporters are expected to endorse statewide candidates and elect party officers.

THIRD-PARTY THRESHOLD

The Libertarian Party is automatically eligible to place candidates on the 2016 North Dakota ballot after Roland Riemers, the party chairman from Grand Forks, got 5.3 percent of the vote last November in the secretary of state race won by incumbent Al Jaeger.

It was the first time in at least 20 years that a third party — and the only time the Libertarian Party — could automatically be placed on the statewide North Dakota ballot for exceeding the 5 percent requirement.

North Dakota law requires Libertarians and other lesser-known political parties to get at least 7,000 signatures every two years to assure themselves a ballot column, which has been done in every statewide election since 2008. The law waives the signature requirement only if a minor-party statewide candidate gets at least 5 percent of the vote in midterm elections for attorney general or secretary of state, or more than 5 percent in a governor's race.

North Dakota Libertarians are especially focused on next year's governor's race to maintain eligibility without having to gather signatures.

"Our goal is more than to maintain ballot access," said Jack Seaman, a Fargo gold and silver dealer and longtime Libertarian. "Our goal is to win races. I don't think our party is stopping until that goal is met."

SOUTH DAKOTA STATUS

South Dakota's Libertarian Party also is participating in the convention, but chairman Ken Santema said members don't plan to elect party officers or endorse political candidates until next year.

The party is collecting signatures to regain recognized party status in order to field candidates in 2016, Santema said. The party lost the state's recognition after failing to field a gubernatorial candidate in the 2014 election, but it has had party status in South Dakota for 20-plus years, he said.

State libertarians need to collect and submit nearly 7,000 signatures by the end of March 2016 to regain their status as a political party.

Santema said the hope is to run up to a dozen candidates for legislative and county offices, and maybe a challenger to Republican U.S. Rep. Kristi Noem.

WHAT'S A LIBERTARIAN?

Libertarians have a free-market philosophy, including turning most government services over to private companies to handle.

"We simply want less government and more personal freedom," said Seaman, who got almost 6 percent of the vote for North Dakota's lone House seat last year. Santema defined the party as fiscally conservative and socially liberal — "the best of both worlds."

UNIFIED MESSAGE

Riemers, the party chairman in North Dakota, said Libertarians historically have had a tough time synchronizing a party message. He said "getting along" will be a topic at the meeting in Mandan this weekend. "Libertarians seem to be so disagreeable — we can't agree with each other," he said.

North Dakota freshman RB Santiago tops FCS rushing DAVE KOLPACK, Associated Press

GRAND FORKS, N.D. (AP) — Much like his running style, John Santiago's rise toward the top of the rushing charts in the Football Championship Subdivision has seen its share of jackrabbit starts and stops.

The diminutive freshman from a small town in Minnesota went unnoticed by college recruiters until North Dakota offered him a scholarship. The coaches tried to switch him to wide receiver in fall camp. Then the first touchdown of his collegiate career was called back on a holding penalty after he sprinted in from 72 yards.

The 5-foot-9, 170-pound Santiago has since shown he can play against the big boys.

"I think a lot of people thought John was too small to play Division I football," said Chris Lindquist, Santiago's football coach at St. Francis High School, located on the northern fringes of the Twin Cities. "The competitive streak in that young man is pretty strong. He kind of likes to defy the odds."

Santiago has rushed for 1,162 yards in eight games and his average of 129.1 yards per game ranks him fifth in FCS. He is the only freshman in the top 30. Last week he ran for a season-high 230 yards and three touchdowns in an upset win over Montana State, the preseason favorite of coaches in the Big Sky Conference.

"It is kind of overwhelming," the soft-spoken Santiago said about his high ranking. "There's nothing really special about me. I'm just a small-town kid who made it to a nice college and I'm working hard."

Santiago, a weightlifting fanatic who pound-for-pound is one of the strongest players on the team, has used a special combination of lower-body speed and upper-body strength to keep tacklers at bay. He's clearly one of the fastest players in the league, yet his actual speed numbers are a bit of a mystery. Coach Bubba Schweigert said they don't time players in the 40-yard dash.

Santiago has another weapon that has created a buzz in the Big Sky. His stiff arm has felled many defenders. Lindquist said Santiago has worked hard on perfecting the move, which in high school was often a case of Santiago slapping defenders to the ground.

"He almost forces you into a facemask because you can't grab anything else," Lindquist said. "I think being a little scat back, it's a means to survival. You don't want to take a pounding when you're that small comparatively speaking.

"It's quite the paradox to have a kid that is so humble and so caring and so genuine off the field ... who once he gets on the field almost wants to get in a street fight with you," he added.

While Santiago stayed under the Division I radar in high school, UND coaches latched onto him when he attended one of their summer camps. He was placed at wide receiver on the first day of fall practice, but was shifted to the backfield after a handful of injuries.

"I don't think we guessed he would be this productive this early, but we thought he would be a very good player," Schweigert said. "The one thing we really love about John, too, is that he practices very hard. He's a real humble guy. For this early success, he really keeps it in perspective and knows he can get a lot better."

Santiago has already broken the UND record for rushing yards by a freshman. He's on pace to have the fifth-best rushing season in school history. Even that march has seen starts and stops. After opening the season with 148 yards rushing in a win over Wyoming, Santiago was held to 24 yards by Drake and 7 yards by North Dakota State.

"Of course I felt pretty good after that first game," Santiago said. "I had a little bit of a setback the next two games, but it was important for me to find where I fit in with college football. You can always keep getting better. It doesn't matter where you are on the charts."

Laxalt signed on as an additional plaintiff last month. The critics say the regulations could run mining companies and ranchers out of business and block construction of a \$500 million wind energy project in Elko County.

The Dutch foreign minister says his government's decision to issue a negative travel advisory this week for Sharm el-Sheikh airport was linked to lax security.

Minister Bert Koenders told reporters Friday in The Hague: "We have the impression that there are insufficient security measures there."

British airliner says Egypt disrupts its plans to fly stranded British tourists from Sinai

SHARM EL-SHEIKH, Egypt (AP) — Hundreds of British tourists stranded in the Egyptian resort of Sharm el-Sheikh, from where the doomed Russian plane took off last weekend, waited anxiously Friday for flights home as budget carrier easyJet said the Egyptian government had disrupted its plans to fly the Britons out of Sinai.

Britain had grounded all flights to and from Egypt's Sinai Peninsula on Wednesday, saying there was a "significant possibility" the Russian airliner that crashed last Saturday, killing 224 people, was downed by a bomb.

The Metrojet's Airbus A321-200 crashed 23 minutes after takeoff from Sharm el-Sheikh en route to St. Petersburg, with mostly Russian tourists aboard.

U.K. authorities had approved flights back, starting Friday. EasyJet had been due to operate 10 flights from the Red Sea resort but said eight would not be able to fly because Egypt had suspended British flights from flying into the airport.

"We are working with the U.K. government at the highest level on a solution," easyJet said in a statement.

Low polling sends Christie and Huckabee to undercard debate, Pataki and Graham out the door

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Two candidates who have been part of each of the prime-time Republican debates so far, Chris Christie and Mike Huckabee, have been demoted to next week's undercard event because of

low national poll numbers, delivering a major blow to their campaigns.

It could be worse — and for George Pataki and Lindsey Graham it was. They won't appear in either debate Tuesday on Fox Business Network. The cable news channel limited participation in the main event in Milwaukee to just eight candidates and to just four in the earlier debate.

The candidates shut out of the debates accused the news media of taking away the right of voters to decide who would be the nominee. They also revisited questions about using polls with statistically insignificant differences between candidates as a means of elevating some and devaluing others.

"It is ironic that the only veteran in the race is going to be denied a voice the day before Veterans Day," Graham campaign manager Christian Ferry said in a statement on behalf of the South Carolina senator. "In the end, the biggest loser tonight is the American people and the Republican presidential primary process that has been hijacked by news outlets."

"The voters — not networks driven by ratings or national polls that are statistically irrelevant — should decide our next president," said Pataki, a former governor of New York.

Police failure to simply test a rape kit keys New Orleans woman's 18-year wait for justice

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Marie picked up the phone and dialed the number the detective gave her 10 days before, on the night she was raped at knifepoint outside a friend's house in New Orleans. It was the first of many calls Marie would make in an 18-year ordeal of shoddy police work and numbingly slow prosecution to track down and convict her attacker.

"Just checking to see if there are any leads, if you've caught anyone," Marie recalls telling the detective.

"Nothing's turned up yet," he responded. "Why don't you go on with your life?"

"What about testing the DNA? The rape kit?" she asked.

"We can't. There's no money for that," the detective said.

No flags, no substance, much symbolism: Optics count at historic Taiwan-China meeting

BEIJING (AP) — Saturday's first-ever meeting between the presidents of China and Taiwan presents a formidable challenge: How can they ensure the event's place in history when nothing of substance should happen?

No agreements or joint statements are to be issued and only a vague agenda has been sketched out, a reflection of the extreme sensitivity surrounding the event, especially on the part of Taiwanese wary of Beijing's unification agenda.

Yet the event's symbolism as a moment of coming together is undeniable, putting a strong emphasis on presentation, atmosphere and optics.

The get-together is fundamentally "about recognition, not about results," said University of Virginia China expert Brantly Womack. "The meeting is the message."

China's Xi Jinping and Taiwan's Ma Ying-jeou are the first leaders from the two sides to meet since their territories split during the Chinese civil war in 1949. Ma is the successor to Chiang Kai-shek, whose Nationalists retreated to the island, while Xi now leads Mao Zedong's victorious Communists, who set up government in Beijing.

YANGON, Myanmar (AP) — It's about returning democracy to a nation held hostage to more than a half-century of military rule. It's about hope for a better life for millions of desperately poor people. It's about being fully embraced by the international community. But most of all, Myanmar's general election

on Sunday may prove to be opposition leader Aung San Suu Kyi's moment of destiny — a chance to seize the victory the junta stole from her 25 years ago.

"I believe in my heart that things are going to change for sure," said lawyer Kyaw Thu Win, sitting in a sea of red party T-shirts and flags at a recent campaign rally that drew tens of thousands of ecstatic Suu Kyi supporters.

Suu Kyi's National League for Democracy party and its chief rival, the ruling, military-backed Union Solidarity and Development Party, held final rallies Friday, the last day of campaigning before a cooling-off period. Most analysts, observers and journalists who have toured the country are certain the NLD will win the elections — if they are free and credible.

An NLD-dominated Parliament would be a democratic milestone for a country that was ruled by the military from 1962 to 2011, when — after intense international pressure — it handed power to a nominally civilian government led largely by retired generals. The military still retains many powers, but a majority in Parliament would give the NLD the presidency and control over the shape of the government and lawmaking.

It will also give hope to many of the ethnic minorities who form 40 percent of the country's 52 million people. Myanmar is home to some of the world's longest-running insurgencies, fought in regions where ethnic groups are demanding greater autonomy.

Personnel records show years of complaints against officer, allegations of harassment

FOX LAKE, Ill. (AP) — An Illinois police officer who staged his suicide to make it look like he was murdered had a troubled job history, ranging from numerous suspensions to sexual harassment allegations to complaints that he intimidated an emergency dispatcher with guns, according to his personnel records.

Despite a reputation as a respected youth mentor, Lt. Charles Joseph Gliniewicz also had problems off the job, including one incident in which a sheriff's deputy found him passed out in his truck and took him home, only to have Gliniewicz report his truck stolen the next day, according to documents in the file.

The records were released late Thursday by the Village of Fox Lake in response to a Freedom of Information request, after a day in which officials said Gliniewicz had sought out a hit man to kill a village administrator he feared would expose him as a thief, and may have planned to plant cocaine on the administrator to discredit her as a criminal.

The image of Gliniewicz that's emerged in recent days stands in stark contrast to the hero's funeral and outpouring of community support after his death in September.

Dubbed "G.I. Joe," Gliniewicz was a well-known figure in the bedroom community of 10,000 people 50 miles north of Chicago. His death, moments after he radioed that he was chasing three suspicious men, prompted an intense manhunt involving hundreds of officers, and raised fears of cop-killers on the loose. Thousands attended his funeral, and he was held up as the latest example of dangers faced by police.

October jobs report will show whether US hiring has downshifted from a robust pace

WASHINGTON (AP) — When the government issues its October jobs report Friday morning, the data may address a key question: Has the U.S. job market downshifted into a slower pace of hiring?

The report could signal a third straight month of tepid job growth after robust gains in the first half of this year averaging more than 200,000 a month.

In August and September, hiring was held down as faltering global economies and a stronger dollar cut into U.S. manufacturers' overseas sales and lowered corporate profits. Evidence suggesting that China's enormous economy was weakening more than anyone had thought also likely spooked some employers. Many retailers ordered fewer goods over the summer as they worked off excess stockpiles.

Those headwinds lowered job gains to just 136,000 in August and 142,000 in September.

Economists have forecast that hiring in October added 185,000 jobs, according to a survey by FactSet. The unemployment rate is expected to remain 5.1 percent for a third straight month. Hiring at that level, while below last year's pace, would still be enough to lower the unemployment rate over time.

First man? First dude? Hillary Clinton ponders a title for Bill Clinton if she wins presidency

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Hillary Rodham Clinton is facing a question with global implications as she seeks the White House: What do you call the husband of a U.S. president?

First man? First gentleman?

Funnyman Jimmy Kimmel asked the Democratic presidential contender about that quandary Thursday should her husband, former President Bill Clinton, become the official White House spouse.

Appearing on "Jimmy Kimmel Live," she offered a couple of ideas with a smile: "first dude" and "first mate."

"We have to really work on what to call him," she quipped.

Dalton throws 3 TD passes, leads way on reverse as Bengals beat Browns 31-10 and go to 8-0

CINCINNATI (AP) — Andy Dalton plopped down in the chair and didn't even wait for the first question. "A little different from last year, huh?" he said, his eyes widening.

Different in every way — not only the Bengals quarterback, but for his still unbeaten team, too.

Dalton connected with tight end Tyler Eifert for three scores and played the role of blocker on Mohamed Sanu's reverse for a touchdown, setting up Cincinnati's 31-10 victory over the Cleveland Browns on Thursday night.

The Bengals improved to 8-0 for the first time in franchise history, their longest winning streak within a season.
