



Superintendent's Report to the Groton Area School District 06-6 Board of Education

February 8, 2016

Legislative Session.

The Governor's Education Reform Package is out and in three bills:

HB1182. This is the bill which contains the 0.5 cent tax increase. It is schedule for debate in the House Appropriations Committee at 3:00 PM on 2/8/16. This requires a 2/3 majority in each chamber to pass. The bill, as it is written includes an emergency clause (removes the opportunity for public referral), and would go into effect on June 1, 2016.

SB131. This is the bill containing the details to implement the proposed funding formula changes as well as the changes to the capital outlay taxation, and the provisions related to other revenues and fund balances. This bill will first be heard in Senate State Affairs. This committee meets on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays at 10:00 AM. It was not scheduled on the agenda for today.

SB133. This bill implements the increase in services provided by the E-Learning Center, establishes a mentor program for new teachers, and directs the DOE to promulgate new administrative rules relating to certificate reciprocity for teachers moving into the state.

I met with Mike Hubbard on Thursday, February 4 and provided him with some requested information, including utility bills, building floor plans and blue prints, roofing plans and inspections, etc. for their use in the study of our current facilities.

Members of this team will be onsite during the days of the 22nd and 23rd to conduct their own assessments of the buildings as well.

Special Education Accountability Review. We've received our report from SDDOE Special Education Programs from our Accountability Review. We have three errors to correct on individual student IEPs, all three of which pertain to the use of the accept/reject format for determining appropriate least restrictive special education placement.

HS Instrumental Music Position. We currently have interviews scheduled for this position with three candidates this week.

NCSEC. Our coop member schools have begun conversation about changing the structure under which our cooperative operates. Currently, we're operating under SDCL 13-15-1 which permits schools to enter into cooperative agreements. The other special education cooperatives in our state operate under a different statute, SDCL 13-5-31 which creates a legal, free-standing entity. Under the new statute, one board member from each member school district would be appointed to the board of the NCSEC. Groton Area would no longer serve as a school of record. Rather, the board of the cooperative would make all of the official, public decisions, and would essentially function just as an independent school board with the exception of how the board is appointed. The superintendents' board will be discussing this at our next meeting on March 7 with the NCSEC attorney Rodney Freeman to allow for us to ask questions about the differences and necessity to make such a change.

SDHSAA Out-of-Season Rule Proposal.

• Make a change to current SDH-SAA Regulations that would allow coaches to work with their kids on an unrestricted basis during the Summer Time Period (defined as the end of the State Golf Meets through July 31st), except for:

o A "moratorium" that would allow no contact between coaches and student athletes from July 1 through July 7 for any activity.

o Teams would be limited to the "four team contacts" which include any activity that occurs on-or off-school grounds that:

1. Involves a team camp, scrimmage, or


league, or,

2. Is an event that involves competition or participation with multiple teams from different schools being involved.

• Open gyms, private lessons, etc., would remain legal, as would all other activities, but the rule change would allow coaches more freedom in the number of athletes they can work with at a given time, whether it be as part of instruction given at an open gym, lesson, conditioning program or similar local event.

This was approved on a first-reading at the January SDHSAA board meeting on a 9-0 vote. If/when this rule proposal is passed, we may want to consider gathering parents and coaches to determine a local plan of action concerning summer contacts with our student athletes, especially those that participate in multiple sports. By this year's SDHSAA calendar, this proposal would open contacts between June 8 and July 31 excluding the week of July 1 to July 7 – essentially six weeks of unlimited contacts.


