The west side of Groton experienced several blinks and the homes along State Street were without power for a short period of time. An underground cable going up the pole at the west end of Second Avenue West and connected to a cutout was burned off and was moving in the wind, making contact with the ground at times causing the outages. Once the problem was found, it was quickly repaired.

## Dollar General given the OK from city council

On a 5-1 vote, the Groton City Council granted approval for Tyler Oliver of Colby Capital, LCC, to build a building that will house a Dollar General Store in Groton. The location is east of Main Street, south of US 12. Oliver appealed the Planning \& Zoning Commission 3-2 decision to deny the special exception in an R3 zone. The testimony at the city council meeting went about an hour before the council took its vote. Many of the issues raised were answered by Oliver. Oliver said that they will work with the city to make sure such things as drainage, parking, lighting and garbage is all taken care of. Councilman David Blackmun was the lone no vote.
"I'm doing this for our community, for our people and I hope people understand," said Eddy Opp. Councilman Burt Glover said that he wants to make sure the lighting does not go beyond the property line.
After the vote, Mayor Scott Hanlon said, "Please don't let this divide our community. We're going to do whatever we can to make this positive, not negative. We can make this work. I really believe so. I respect all of your folks' feelings This has been a very hard decision for everybody up here. Very, very hard. Let's move forward in a positive way."


Sherwin Nyberg submitted his resignation off the Planning and Zoning Commission and was accepted by the council with regret. Two councilmen had talked with Nyberg asking if he would reconsider.
The city has received a $\$ 1,000$ tree grant from the state. That along with the $\$ 900$ donated by the Groton Garden Club and $\$ 100$ by the city council will provide up to 23 new trees on the west side of Groton. If anyone would like to add to the tree fund, contact city hall. The trees will be planted in the near future.
The second reading of licensing cats in Groton was tabled after a motion to turn it down was defeated. Councilman Jay Peterson said that several other communities around Groton already have cat licensing ordinances.
Spring clean-up time in Groton has been set for May 1-9.
Groton's airport is one step closer to being recertified. The FAA has granted the city its okay and that is contingent upon an inspection by the state.
Anita Lowary was authorized to attend finance officer school June 7-10 in Spearfish.
The summer salary ordinance was approved with the pool managers getting a $\$ 1$ an hour raise to $\$ 13$.

## Superintendent Letter to School <br> Constituents \& Patrons <br> Letter to the Editor:

Dear Groton Area School Constituents \& Patrons.
As many of you are now aware, Groton Area Schools has begun a long-range planning process to ensure our buildings throughout the district provide maximum educational opportunities and safe learning environments. Long-range planning is needed in school districts for a few reasons:

- Facility infrastructure grows old and inefficient. For a while, a district can maintain older equipment and facilities, but funding for this maintenance comes from the same pot of money as the funds we put in the classroom. Much like your home or any business, eventually investments need to be made in modernizing schools.
- Facilities need to evolve. Teachers teach differently now, and providing the right kind of educational spaces is important for educational achievement. For example, even ten years ago, if would have been impossible to predict the importance of new technology in the classroom.

New challenges emerge. When today's twelfthgraders started kindergarten, building security and energy

On January 25th, the school board selected Foster, Jacobs \& Johnson (FJJ) as our partners to help lead us through a three-phase process to develop a longrange plan. Phase 1 of the process includes conducting a district demographic study, listening session to define the "Values" of different community \& stakeholder groups, educational adequacy workshops with teachers and staff, and a comprehensive facility condition assessment.
On February 22 \& 23 FJJ hosted Values Definition ("Listening") sessions that were held with the school board, administration, teachers, staff, students, and public; and Educational Adequacy work session with HS/MS and elementary teachers and staff. These listening sessions and workshops evaluate how our facilities and infrastructure could better support our district and stakeholders, both today and in the future.
On March 29th, Groton Area Schools reviewed results of the district's demographic study, Values Definition sessions, On-Live Survey, and Education Adequacy sessions. The summary presentations where led by representatives from FJJ. The information outlined as a result of these work sessions clearly demonstrates that stakeholder groups in our school district share many of the same ideas about the future of our district. The Groton Daily Independent did a live webcast of the results presentation that can be found at gdilive.com. I encourage everyone to watch the archived webcast.

## Groton Area Schools Demographics

The district demographic study indicated that over the next ten years the enrollment in Groton Area Schools will remain essentially flat (a $1 \%$ increase is projected). The study indicates our enrollment to be maintained due to an increase in open enrollment from Aberdeen and decrease in open enrollment to Webster over the next 10 years. The full demographic report can be viewed on the district's website. As we evaluate this data through the long term planning process, it begins to give us a much better picture of what actions we need to take for Groton Area Schools to continue to provide excellence in education.
Top Outline District Needs (All stakeholder listening sessions \& on-line survey)

1) Attract and Retain High Quality Staff
2) Improve Facility Infrastructure
3) Address Space Needs
4) Increase Accountability \& Respect
5) Maintain High Academic Achievement
6) Form a Facility Vision (for the district)

## Educational Adequacy

What is Educational Adequacy? Educational Adequacy is a complete analysis of a school building focusing on several different categories including but not limited to: Technology, Classroom Size and Suitability, Cafeteria/Kitchen/Serving, Security and Supervision, Music Classrooms/Practice Areas/Etc. Auditoriums/Performing Arts Spaces, Parking and Bus Dropoff for Staff/Students/Parents.
These categories are evaluated based upon current district use, accepted South Dakota Department of Education guidelines, anticipated future needs, and input from the Groton educational staff. While much of our Jr./Sr. high school is in great shape and meet guidelines, the assessment did outline several key points for us to consider addressing; especially at the elementary. The entire Educational Adequacy Report can be reviewed on the district's website.
Recommendations provided

1) Continue to communicate with our district stakeholders about the process as we move forward to improve our facilities; and communities.
2) Use the information gathered from the On-Line Survey, Values Definition and Educational Adequacy work sessions to help guide this facility improvement process.

## Cool Hybrid \&

 Electric Cars! What do you know about hybrid cars? These very cool cars are powered by both gas and electricity. When you are driving one fast on a highway its gasoline engine is working. This makes you move and also charges the car's battery. Then, when you drive around town at lower speeds, the car is able to run on electricity. Hybrid cars do not need to be plugged in. They get up to 90 miles per gallon of gas - more than twice the mileage of most gas-only cars.Companies are also coming out with cars that use electric motors to power everything. They store electricity in batteries, which are then recharged by the owner plugging the car in at home. We are starting to build stations in areas that will allow drivers to recharge their cars while traveling too.

Electric cars are great because nothing comes out of their tailpipes that pollutes the air! Some people argue that the electricity these cars use may be generated by burning coal or natural gas instead of by water power or wind turbines, making them not 100\% environmentally friendly. But, people are working on ways to make batteries that hold more electricity for longer driving and on technology to produce "cleaner" electricity.
