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

Groton School given A+ rating

The Groton Area School District was granted an A+ rating from the Standard and Poor's Rating. This rating is used to secure the capital outlay certificates.

Thomas Grimmond from Dougherty & Company LLC reported on the capital outlay certificates not to exceed \$8,690,000 to complete the 2017 elementary school renovations and refinance the outstanding deb from the 2010 Eastside Addition. The refinance is to pay off Wells Fargo's loan in the amount of \$1.108 million. The interest rate on the certificates would be 2.78 percent for 20 years. The board approved the resolution. The closing date for the certificates is December 15.

Lorrie Weber, wife of business manager Mike Weber, serves as a line judge for volleyball. As compensation, she is given a Northeast Conference pass for the 2016-17 school year. It is considered a potential conflict and was reviewed by the board. The board acknowledged Lorrie's position and approved it.

Superintendent Joe Schwan reviewed the design of the elementary school remodeling project.

The new sound system in the high school gym is now being installed.

Elementary Principal Brett Schwan reported that 96.8 percent of the parents participated in parent-teacher conferences.

The fourth grade students have gone to the Golden Living Center in Groton where they read to the residents. Some of the students will go on their own time to read the residents in the Bristol Nursing Home. The kindergarten students will present a Thanksgiving Day play and read stories to the residents of the Golden Living Center on Nov. 18.

Dr. Anna Schwan, middle/high school principal, reported on the ICU program. She reported that ineligibility continues to be down and the program is not as consistent as she would like it to be. She is asking for feedback from the teachers with regard to the program's usefulness.

Coming up for the middle/high school is the Snow Queen Contest set for November 27 at 7 p.m., and the winter concert December 8. Thanksgiving break is November 23 through November 27.

The board approved a promissory note from the Capital Outlay Fund to the Capital Project Fund for \$225,000 until December 15th when the district gets the outlay certificates.

Mike Hubbard from Foster, Jacobs and Johnson, Inc., talked about the potential middle/high school project. The board agreed to approve the contract with FJJ to continue with the plan development.

The board grappled with a proposed change to the student handbook in reference to alcohol infractions. "We want the kids to be safe and we want them to participate," Dr. Schwan said. There will be a rewrite.

A November 30 meeting with the middle/high school steering committee. The steering committee is Jan Seibel, Brooke Lingbeck, Mike Nehls, Marty Weismantel, Grant Rix, Steve Smith, Superintendent Joe Schwan and middle/high school principal Dr. Anna Schwan.

The food service inspection from the Groton Area High School was conducted November 7 with a score of 96 out of 100.

Dylan Krueger was approved as a volunteer assistant boys' basketball coach for the 2016-17 school year.

Board member Merle Harder suggested that the road between the football field and the elementary school be blocked off during the football games. He said a child almost got run over. "I think it should be blocked off before someone gets hurt or killed."

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Outdoor Recreation Projects Funded

Groton gets \$24,900 for baseball complex playground equipment

PIERRE, S.D. – Gov. Dennis Daugaard has awarded a total of \$429,000 in Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) money to several communities. The federal assistance program provides up to 50 percent reimbursement for outdoor recreation projects.

The following communities were awarded LWCF grants for outdoor recreation projects:

Aberdeen – 12th Street multipurpose play court development, \$35,000

Dell Rapids – campground and comfort station development, \$75,000

Elk Point – playground equipment replacement, \$54,800

Emery – playground equipment replacement, \$22,800

Groton – playground equipment replacement at ball park, \$24,900

Hayti – playground equipment replacement, \$11,900

Hot Springs – tennis court resurfacing, \$11,000

Huron – Memorial Park playground equipment replacement, \$23,000

Lead – Manuel Park renovation, \$75,000

Onida – swimming pool renovation, \$50,000

Presho – outdoor basketball court development, \$49,000

"I commend these project sponsors for their strong commitment to improve their communities and make South Dakota a better place to live, work and play," Gov. Daugaard said. "Their efforts will benefit future generations of South Dakotans."

Land and Water Conservation Funds come from the National Park Service and are administered in South Dakota by the state Department of Game, Fish and Parks.

GROTON LIONS CLUB


Dave Pigors, president; led the business meeting, and Lee Schinkel was pro tem secretary for the November monthly Groton Lions Club, Thursday evening.

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Weekly Vikings Roundup

The Minnesota Vikings' fall from grace continued Sunday, as they lost to the Washington Redskins 26-20. The Vikings, who won their first five games of the season, have now lost their last four. The team no longer resembles a championship contender, instead they look like what their record indicates: a middle of the road ball club.

The Vikings' offense put on a respectable display on Sunday, scoring 20 points and showing the ability to come back from an early deficit. For the second week in a row Sam Bradford completed 31 of 40 passes, this time for 307 yards. Bradford threw two touchdowns, but he also had an interception late in the game that was entirely his fault. The offensive line was finally starting to show signs of life and only allowed three sacks on the day, but left tackle Jake Long exited the game with an injury. The injury has been confirmed by Mike Zimmer to be an achilles injury, which will sideline him for the rest of the year.

The biggest cause for concern is the defense. Through the first five games of the season, the Vikings' defense looked to be a dominant group. However, over the last four weeks, the unit has taken a step back. Less than a minute into the second quarter, the Vikings had given up two touchdowns. I'm sure Mike Zimmer had words with his players at that point, because the defense stiffened and made Washington settle for field goals for the rest of the game. This was another game where the Vikings should have been dominant in the trenches, but they were only able to sack Kirk Cousins once. This team will not be able to win many games unless the defense is playing at a high level, and it appears more and more likely that the first five games were an anomaly and not the norm.

The player of the game was Stefon Diggs, who was playing in front of his home city. Diggs caught 13 passes for 164 yards and continues to prove that he is a playmaker. If you read my column last week, I hope you took my advice and played him in fantasy! Another candidate for POTG was Danielle Hunter, who has become perhaps the Vikings' best defensive end. Hunter had the only sack on the day and also accumulated four tackles (one for a loss) and two of the Vikings' six quarterback hits.

The player who needs the most improvement is a tie this week, as both Jerick McKinnon and Matt Asiata were completely ineffective on the ground. The two players combined for only 29 yards on 15 attempts for a paltry 1.9 yards per carry. I know that the offensive line is having difficulties opening holes, but both running backs made poor decisions on Sunday. Both McKinnon and Asiata were unable to see where the holes were going to open up, and both of them missed multiple cutback lanes which would have led to big gains. The Vikings offense has shown they can move the ball through the air. If the team can start gaining yards on the ground as well, they just might be able to make up for the slack from the defense.

Looking ahead, the Vikings will face the Arizona Cardinals next Sunday. The game will be in Minnesota, which is good because the Vikings will need every advantage against a very good Cardinals team. Coming into this past Sunday (this column was written before the ending of the Cardinals/49ers game), Arizona is 3-4-1, but their record isn't indicative of how good the team can truly be. The Vikings' defense will be in for a long day, as Carson Palmer leads an explosive offense that features Larry Fitzgerald at wide receiver and David Johnson at running back. If both teams play at their best, this one will be a great game to watch. However, with how poorly the Vikings have been playing, I am not confident at all and won't be surprised if the Cardinals hand the Vikings their fifth loss in a row.

Section 210 was enacted to encourage production of electric energy by qualifying cogeneration and small power production facilities ("QFs"). Basin Electric and the Participating Members further give notice that on or after January 1, 2017, they will file with FERC a joint petition for waiver of certain obligations under Section 292.303 of the FERC's Regulations.

Part 292 of FERC's Regulations sets forth the requirements regarding arrangements between electric utilities and QFs. Part 292 requires electric utilities to purchase and sell energy and capacity from and to QFs. Under the proposed Implementation Plan (and subject to terms and conditions imposed pursuant thereto), Basin Electric and the Participating Members would agree to (1) permit any QF to interconnect with the transmission or distribution system of any Participating Member to the extent such QF is entitled to

interconnection under Part 292; (2) permit any QF with a capacity of 150 kW or more to sell energy and capacity to Basin Electric at rates that comply with Part 292 to the extent that (a) a Participating Member would otherwise be required to purchase from such QF and (b) the QF delivers power to the Participating Member's system at a point where the Participating Member provides retail service with energy purchased from Basin Electric; and (3) permit any QF, regardless of capacity, to purchase supplementary, backup, maintenance and interruptible power on either a firm or nonfirm basis from a Participating Member at rates that comply with Part 292. The proposed Implementation Plan may be modified based on public comments, FERC's response to the petition for waiver described below, or otherwise as appropriate.

The proposed Implementation Plan is available for review by interested parties at the offices of Basin Electric. Copies will be sent to interested parties upon request. Written comments on the proposed Implementation Plan must be submitted on or before December 2, 2016, to Basin Electric Power Cooperative, Attention: Dave Raatz, Vice President/Executive Planning, 1717 E. Interstate Ave., Bismarck, ND 58503 or by emailing purpa@bepc.com. Copies of written comments will be made available to interested parties. In addition, any interested party may request a public hearing on the proposed Implementation Plan by submitting a written request to the above address no later than December 2, 2016. If timely and properly requested, one or more hearings on the Implementation Plan will take place prior to the FERC filing referenced below. Details regarding the date, time and location of any such hearing(s) will be sent to each person requesting a hearing. A representative of Basin Electric and the Participating Members will be present at the hearing(s).

In connection with the proposed Implementation Plan, and pursuant to Section 292.402 of FERC's Regulations, on or after January 1, 2017, Basin Electric, on behalf of itself and the Participating Members, intends to apply for a waiver of certain obligations under Section 292.303 of FERC's Regulations which, if granted, would result in all purchases from QFs being made by Basin Electric and all sales to QFs interconnected with the Participating Members being made by the Participating Members. More information on the waiver request is provided in the Implementation Plan. Persons wishing to comment on the waiver request should follow the procedures for written and oral comments on the Joint PURPA Implementation Plan.



Groton Area ends its season record at 15-8 while West Central goes to 21-6.




