

Kavanaugh to student teach in Sioux Falls

Dakota State University student Mikaela Kavanaugh is student teaching 2nd grade during the 2016-2017 school year in Sioux Falls, S.D. Kavanaugh is an elementary education/special education major from Groton, S.D.

To be accepted into the teacher education program, students must maintain a 2.6 cumulative grade point average and a 2.7 in their major. They must successfully pass the Praxis Pre-Professional Skills Test and the Praxis content exam in their area of preparation, and successfully complete all coursework and

field experiences. Candidates work in multi-cultural settings, special education classrooms, regular education classrooms, and volunteer settings with K-12 children prior to acceptance into student teaching.

The majority of student teachers are placed in districts within a 60-mile radius of Madison, S.D.

Council says no to fire pit ordinance, grants up to \$500 in matching medflex for employees to offset premium and deductible increases

The Groton City Council talked about a fire pit ordinance. Councilman Jay Peterson said he had a fireman ask if the city had one. The council discussed the pros and cons and decided that an ordinance is not needed at this time.

The city was awarded a grant for the baseball complex playground equipment. It was \$24,000. The match will will be from the Olson Memorial money as well as other funds raised.

The city will be able to accept credit card payments and e-checks for payments. There will be no charge to the city; however, there will be a fee accessed to the cardholder.

City employees will receive \$50 in Groton Bucks for a Christmas

The council then grappled with the health insurance for the employees. The city and employees were faces with over budget and higher premium expenses. If the city would have renewed as is, some employees would see an increase of up to 63 percent. The council mulled over three options which included the plan as is, or have deductibles of \$2,000 or \$2,500, up from the current \$1,000. The council went with the \$2,500 deductible and then will match up to \$500 in a medflex plan for each employee. "I think this is the fairest for all," said Councilman Jay Peterson. "We're doing the most we can with the amount of money we have," added Councilman Burt Glover. (See page 6 for executive session results)



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Weekly Vikings Roundup

The Minnesota Vikings finally stopped their losing streak, beating the Arizona Cardinals 30-24. For the first time in six weeks, the Vikings looked like a team that was prepared and ready to go. It was refreshing to see, and hopefully this win will give the team some confidence for the rest of the season.

The Vikings' defense started the game by forcing Arizona into a three-and-out, but gave up 267 yards on the Cardinals' next four possessions. Luckily, the Vikings' offense was there to pick up the slack. While the unit only produced 129 yards in the first half, they were able to put the ball in the endzone twice. Combined with Xavier Rhodes' 100-yard pick six, the Vikings were up 20-17 at halftime (the Vikings' second extra-point attempt was blocked).



Cordarrelle Patterson got the second half off to a great start, returning the kickoff 104 yards and putting the Vikings up 27-17. The Vikings' defense clamped down in the second half as well, only allowing 30 yards on Arizona's seven second-half drives. The biggest story was the pressure Minnesota got on Carson Palmer. The Vikings sacked Palmer four times and had over 20 quarterback hits in the game.

The player of the game is Xavier Rhodes, who snagged two interceptions and returned one of them 100 yards for a touchdown. Rhodes was also lined up against the Cardinals' Michael Floyd for much of the game, and Floyd finished with only two catches on five targets for 21 yards. The Vikings' cornerback might disappear for some games, but when he is at the top of his game he's one of the best in the league. It was great to see Rhodes secure those interceptions, since he only had four in 52 games coming into Sunday.

The Vikings defensive line also deserves a shout-out, but Danielle Hunter was the brightest star of the unit. Hunter accumulated two sacks, two tackles for a loss, and three quarterback hits. Hunter is quickly becoming one of the best players on this defense, and it appears the sky is the limit for this second-year player who turned 22 years old less than a month ago.

There were no players who stood out in a negative way, so instead I want to say goodbye to the wildcat formation. The Vikings have been running more wildcat in recent weeks, and for a while it appeared to be working. But the Cardinals finally found out how to beat the play, and now other teams have a blueprint. How did the Cardinals solve the Vikings' wildcat? By sending a player to smash into Sam Bradford who was lined up out wide. It was a legal play, and now we can expect other teams to follow suit. So farewell wildcat, it was fun while it lasted but it's not worth having the starting quarterback take unnecessary hits.

Looking ahead, the Vikings will play on Thanksgiving in Detroit. The Vikings will look to repay the Lions for their overtime loss earlier in the season. Both teams are 6-4, and Detroit is 4-1 at home. Minnesota is the better team, but if they aren't playing at 100 percent, it's very possible the Lions sweep the series.



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A Thanksgiving service in Dakota Territory


A good supper and dancing capped festivities at a fur trading post on Nov. 19, 1812, in present-day South Dakota.

It was "what might be called the first

Thanksgiving service in the state," wrote Donald Parker in an article in "South Dakota Historical Collections and Report."

The occasion was to celebrate the completion of building the trading post. John C. Luttig, the post's clerk, wrote

in his journal that the post's great door had been hung at 4 p.m. in a ceremony that included a salute of seven guns and three rounds of muskets. The post was given the name Fort Manuel.

"In the Evening a good Supper and a cheerful glass of whisky was given to the Men, and a Dance at which all the Ladies then in the fort attended, concluded the Day," Luttig wrote.

Fort Manuel was notable for more than a Thanksgiving celebration.

The fort was associated with Manuel Lisa, one of the best-known fur traders and entrepreneurs in the early history of the West.

"It was Lisa, more than any other man of his era, who established the pattern of trade and commerce in the northern plains and mountains region," according to a 1977 newsletter of the Historical Preservation Center in Vermillion.

Manuel's system of trade centered on strategically placed posts which enabled exchange with American Indians, security for company operatives and bases for extension. This idea was later perfected by the American Fur Company, but Lisa and his associates dominated

City Council action after executive session

After an executive session, the council passed first reading on the 2017 salary ordi-

- Gave all employees a 75¢ an hour raise.
- The mayor wage increased from \$400 to \$625 a month.
- The councilmen annual wages increased from \$1,200 to \$3,000.
- Councilmen will be paid \$125 for special meetings instead of \$30.
- When the council meets as the Board of Equalization, the board will get \$200 instead of \$100.
- Planning and Zoning Commissioners will remain at \$25 per meeting with special meetings increasing to \$50.
- When an elected official attends a meeting other than council meetings, the full day rate will be \$300 per day instead of \$100 per day and the evening meetings will increase from \$25 to \$100.

the fur trade from approximately 1807-1820, according to the newsletter.

Lisa, 1772-1820, was born in New Orleans or Cuba of Spanish parents and came to St. Louis, Mo., in the 1790s. He led the first trading expedition to the upper Missouri River in 1807 and established a fur trading post at the mouth of the Bighorn River. This was Montana's first trading post and one of many Lisa would build.

Lisa and other St. Louis fur traders formed the Missouri Fur Company in 1809. He left St. Louis for the upper Missouri in May 1812, with a party of 87 men and two barges carrying merchandise, cows, hogs, cats, and chickens. These were "perhaps the first domesticated animals ever carried to the upper Missouri," according to Parker.


In August 1812, Lisa selected a site north of the Grand River on the west side of the Missouri River on which to build a fur trading post that would serve as headquarters for himself and his men. Luttig wrote that the location was the third point above Arikara villages and described the site as a beautiful prairie bluff with several bottoms of fine timber around it. The men used this timber to construct a stockade, blacksmith shop, warehouse, living guarters and other buildings.

Luttig's journal tells of daily life at Fort Manuel. American Indians visited the fort daily to trade and to live inside the fort. Some of the men of the fur company were away trading at Indian camps, some as far as 200 miles away. Luttig's journal entry for Dec. 20, 1812, states that the wife of fur trader Toussaint Charbonneau died of a putrid fever while at Fort Manuel. Many historians believe the woman was Sacagawea, who accompanied the Lewis and Clark Expedition. But by not specifying her name, Luttig left doubt about her identity.

The U.S. Congress declared war on the United Kingdom in June 1812. Lisa used Fort Manuel to hold the American Indians along the Missouri River loyal to the American cause during the War of 1812, according to State Historian Doane Robinson in "Doane Robinson's Encyclopedia of South Dakota."

Luttig's last journal entry is on March 5, 1813. It is believed that American Indians attacked the fort that day, causing Lisa and the others at the fort to abandon it.




Happy Thanksgiving!

Beverly J. "Bev" Kluess, age 87, Groton, formerly of Clark, the widow of Don "Blackie" Kluess, died peacefully with family at her side on Saturday afternoon, November 19, 2016.

Visitation will be held on Tuesday, November 22, 2016 from 4-6 PM at the Furness Funeral Home at Clark and will continue after noon at the Church in Clark on Wednesday.

Funeral services will be held on Wednesday, November 23, 2016 at 2PM in the St. Paul Lutheran Church at Clark with The Reverend Mindy Ehrke officiating. Dorothy Fuller will be the organist. Honorary casketbearers will be all fellow

Bev continued her education in the Clark School from 4th grade and continued in Clark until graduation from Clark High School in 1947. Following her high school graduation, she attended Northern State Teacher College at Aberdeen obtaining her teacher's certificate. She began that fall teaching at the South Elrod School.

Around that same time as teaching at South Elrod, she met Don Kluess at the Clark Ballroom. They dated for about a year and were married on September 28, 1948 at Montevideo, MN. The trip was also their honeymoon. They returned to Clark, Bev worked in the Red Owl Store and a few years later she returned to teaching.
