

Changes coming for the city's utility customers

There will be a number of potential changes forthcoming for the city utility customers in the upcoming months. The council approved two of them Monday night.

The first is changing the date that the meters are read. It is currently the 15th of the month. Starting October 1, the council will change the meter read date to the first of the month, to coincide with the billing that the city receives from Heartland and WAPA. That would mean the due date would change from the 10th of the month to the 25th of the month.

The other change coming is the way the city charges for demand rates. Starting October 1, commercial customers who peak out at 25KW will fall into the demand rate structure for that month. Under current city policy, once a commercial customers reaches 20KW, they have to pay the demand rate for a year. Now it will be calculated month-to-month just like the city is being charged for its demand on a month-to-month basis. The new monthly policy will be:

If you use 25KW or more during the month, you will be charged \$14 per KW for demand and .075 for KWH.

If you use less than 25KW per month, there will be no demand charge and the KWH charge will be .097.

The option of being charged a demand rate if you use 6,000 KWH in a month will be eliminated.

Councilmen David Blackmun and David Mc-Gannon presented the rate study information. "I'm looking at trying to the rates fair again," Blackmun said. McGannon proposed raising the demand charge to 30KW and Blackmun wanted to be more conservative and raise it 25KW for now, then review it in six months. McGannon said raising it to 30KW would benefit an extra 13 businesses. But there is a cost to the city budget. By raising it to 25KW, the city could lose about \$8,000 annually in the budget. By raising it to 30KW, the city could stand to lose around \$18,000 annually.

First reading on the date change and the change in rate will be held at the next council meeting.

City Supervisor Terry Herron reported that the city's main lift station, located on Aspen Avenue, lost a pump Monday morning and is now operating with only one pump. The potential risk if the second pump goes down is not great; however, the public works department personnel are concerned, especially since the pumps were installed in the early 1990s and they cannot be rapidly ordered. Herron said it could take up to six weeks to get a pump as they are specially made for each application. Dwight Zerr is looking into the price of a new pump to have on hand and the city is looking for grant money to install a permanent generator at the Aspen Lift Station. Rebuilding the current pump could come in around \$2,500.

Epa's Dirty Rotten Scoundrels By Doug Sombke

Finally Epa has confessed that its working model assessing origination of traffic area toxics has been underestimating gasoline petroleum octane enhancers contributions by 400%. Working closely with this Daschle team I learned and participated in creating the history of the how and why this 1990 Clean Air Act amendment was legislated: Over that time period I learned about the chemistry of gasoline combustion that creates tailpipe benzene and related toxic emissions.

What I have learned about tailpipe emissions caused me to see the amazing irony in a Wall Street Journal editorial headline "Those Dirty Rotten Ethanol Scoundrels". The article aimed to position ethanol as an evil plot, something being bootlegged into our gasoline.

The irony is "Epa's Dirty Rotten Scoundrels" aligned with self-serving petroleum to implement an evil plot to lock ethanol out of free enterprise octane markets: History shows EPA's technocrats at Ann Harbor, Michigan headquarters have always resisted ethanol. They undermined the intent of this Daschle/Dole 1990 Clean Air Act amendment by creating a fraudulent public perception that it is illegal to use ethanol's optimal 94 octane blend or E30 in standard autos: The amendment's intent still is to severely limit costly human genotoxic, carcinogenic benzene and related tailpipe emissions:

While phasing out lead congress feared petroleum interests would replace lead with petroleum's comparably hazardous benzene and related octane referred to as "aromatics": On combustion these aromatic octane enhancers produce substantial benzene and some of the most toxic components found in our air identical to those also found in cigarette smoke: The two carbon ethanol molecule does not contain or produce these toxics like benzene or related aromatic toxics.

The World Health Organization's and consensus other medical researches assert: "Like cigarette smoke there is no recommended safe level for benzene in our air." EPA deceptively lowered gasoline's benzene content from one to a half percent as a fake cure all but nefariously ignores Clean Air Act directives to reduce gasoline's substantial carcinogenic benzene and related polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbon (pah) tailpipe emissions that also cause birth defects including infant brain damage.

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Weekly Vikings Roundup By Jordan Wright

The Minnesota Vikings have now completed their second week of training camp. The team will wrap things up in Mankato on Tuesday, before moving back to Minneapolis to continue training. The Vikings have been in Mankato for the past 52 years,



but this will be their last year there because the team is building a state of the art facility in Eagan, MN. There will certainly be advantages to the new facility, but it will be difficult to reproduce the camaraderie between the players and coaches that a college dorm provides.

On Saturday night the Vikings held their night practice, an annual tradition that allows the fans to watch the team under the bright lights. Thousands of fans turned out for the last night practice in Mankato, and were treated to two hours of practice and live plays, followed by fireworks. The defense won the majority of the plays, which is understandable because the Vikings defense is one of the best in the NFL. However, the Vikings offense was able to make some plays, including two beautiful touchdown throws from Sam Bradford to Stefon Diggs and Jarius Wright.

The team was able to avoid any injuries during the night practice, which is the main goal of the team during any offseason activities. Left tackle Rashod Hill, who was filling in for injured LT Riley Reiff, went down during the practice and had to be carted off, but he was able to return shortly after and was seen on the sideline smiling and in good spirits. All reports coming from the team is that Hill should be fine and shouldn't miss any time.

The only negative from Saturday's night practice was Adam Thielen, who participated in his tenth training camp at Mankato (if you include college). Being the local kid, many fans were wearing his jersey and were hoping for some highlight reel catches from the receiver who worked his way from the practice squad to become a starter and catch 69 passes for 967 yards in 2016. Unfortunately for the fans, Thielen had a quiet night, which left most of the crowd disappointed.

Other news and notes:

The Minnesota Vikings have made it a priority to resign their top defensive players. First, it was Everson Griffen who got a 4-year extension (even though he still had two years left on his current deal). Next, it was Xavier Rhodes, who received a 5-year extension and is now one of the highest paid cornerbacks in the NFL. The Vikings weren't done there, however, as the team decided to reward Linval Joseph this past week. Joseph, like Griffen, still had two years left on his current deal, but the Vikings felt he deserved a pay raise, so they gave him a 4-year, \$50 million extension which locks him up through the 2022 season.

Drought Monitor

Scattered showers in the Plains brought drought elief to a few isolated locations and merely talled the deterioration in others. In North Daota, temperatures in excess of 5 degrees above ormal, combined with a continued lack of rainfall ed to an expansion of abnormally dry, moderate rought, and severe drought in the east. A one ategory improvement, from severe to moderate drought, was made over the south-central part of

the state near the South Dakota border in response to locally heavy rainfall that improved many of the drought indicators including stream flow, soil moisture, and evaporative demand. However, impacts to vegetation are generally set with the rainfall having come too late in the season to improve things. Conditions in the remainder of the state remain unchanged. USDA reports nearly three-quarters of the state's topsoil is short to very short and reports of agricultural impacts are widespread. North Dakota Governor Doug Burgum has declared a drought disaster for most of the state.

In South Dakota, two weeks of localized rainfall brought a mixture of improvements and degradations to the eastern half of the state. Moderate drought was reduced slightly in central South Dakota and a one-category improvement was made near the east-central border where reports of 12 inches of rainfall fell. The southeastern part of the state missed out on the heavy rains. Leading to the expansion of moderate drought into the area. The western part of the state remained status quo.

As with the Dakotas, patchy rainfall also occurred in Nebraska and Kansas. Nebraska saw a small reduction in abnormal dryness in the east-central part of the state where locally 3-5 inches were reported last week. Kansas saw a reduction in abnormally dry conditions in the southwest part of the state and an increase in the southeast.

Safe Route to School Grant expired in January and City Finance Officer Hope Block managed to get an extension on the \$13,900 grant.

"They don't do this grant any more so we need to finish it up," she said. It needs to be used by December 31. Once the city approved the grant, the school will also need to approve the grant. Then they can decide what to the use the money for. One of the options include a portable speed trailer that the city will have to match at 25 percent of the cost. Then there was discussion on the cross-walk on SD37. Councilman Karyn Babcock said it would be nice if there was a button for pedestrians to push that would turn the light to red to stop traffic while the pedestrians crossed the road.

Chip and seal project is suppose to start on Friday or early next week. The old rubber tire packer is on its last leg and will not last much longer. The city is going to borrow a pull-behind one from Webster Scale. The old packer will be junked as it is not worth fixing.

The council authorized for Terry Herron or Hope Block to sign the petition for Les Hinds to be on the WEB Water board. Hinds is running for re-election.

The council approved the swimming pool schedule as proposed by the swimming pool managers.

The Groton Community Fund is giving the Groton Police Department a grant for two AEDs for the patrol vehicles. The current one is 14 years old, The city would pay for about \$700 with the remaining \$2,000 coming from the grant. The council accepted the grant. "We're very, very appreciative of the grant," said Police Officer Jerry Bjerke.

A body camera policy is being considered. Police Chief Stacy Mayou is looking at Webster's policy.

The new police vehicle is one of those vehicles where there have been issues of Carbon Monoxide getting into the cab. As of yet, there is no formal recall on this. A Carbon Monoxide detector was purchased and installed in the police vehicle.

The benefit for former Groton Police Chief Harlan "Butch" Radke is September 10. He was diagnosed with cancer and will be undergoing treatment. The city will put a basket together for a family pass at the pool, a rubble site pass and a season pass to the ball park for the fundraiser.

The new signal lights may be installed at SD37 and US12 by sometime next week.
