Summary of Severe Storms and **Dust Storm**

Conditions were favorable for severe thunderstorms during the afternoon of June 1st, 2018, as a warm and very unstable air mass over South Dakota interacted with a cold front. An area of low pressure in northwest South Dakota that morning moved northeast into central North Dakota, dragging a cold front east across South Dakota. Thunderstorms developed ahead of the front and to the west of the Missouri River, producing strong winds and very large hail. There were several reports of hail larger than golf balls around Timber Lake and between 1-1.5" hail in eastern Corson County. As the storms moved east, additional smaller reports of hail were reported in Walworth County, along with a brief tornado near Glenham.

Leading up to the event, conditions were warm and generally dry in the James River Valley during May. Those conditions combined with strong winds from decaying thunderstorms in south central South Dakota to produce a dust storm. South winds of 50 to 80 mph kicked up a significant amount of dirt/dust as the winds moved north, leading to visibilities being reduced to below 1/4 mile in many locations. The reduced visibilities caused a few traffic incidents and the winds knocked down trees, tree branches, and powerlines.



Weekly Vikings Roundup

Last week we started the preseason roster breakdown, beginning with the guarterbacks. This week we move on

to the running backs and fullbacks.

In 2017, the Minnesota Vikings were seventh in the NFL with 122.3 rushing yards per game. While that stat may lead some to believe the Vikings had a good run game last year, the reality is the Vikings were decent at best on the ground. Perhaps the biggest stat to measure the rushing game is yards per carry, and the Vikings finished 22nd in the league with 3.9 ypc. The Vikings are hoping Dalvin Cook will be



able to come back from a knee injury that derailed a promising start to his rookie season. Before his injury in week 4, Cook was averaging 96 rushing yards per game and an astonishing 4.8 yards per carry. Cook has been seen at the team's Organized Team Activities (OTAs) and appears ready to resume carrying the football for the Vikings. Mike Zimmer certainly believes he will be ready for the start of the season and was quoted as saying "I think he'll probably get some work (at OTAs) and then should be ready to roll for training camp." That's great news for all Vikings fans!

Latavius Murray was signed by the Vikings in free agency last year to be the lead back, but he ended up playing second fiddle to Cook in the first four weeks. This offseason, the Vikings and Murray agreed to restructure his contract, lowering his cap hit so that he could stay on the team as the primary backup. Latavius ended up leading the team in carries (216) and rushing yards (842) last season, while also catching 15 passes for an additional 103 yards through the air. Personally, I have mixed feeling on Murray. He is a big running back (6'3", 230 pounds) yet he falls down at the slightest touch. However, he is a reliable backup and didn't lose a single fumble all season.

The Vikings' top two running back spots are essentially locked down by Cook and Murray, which leaves the final spot up for grabs. Currently, the Vikings have four running backs gunning for that final spot, but that could change before the season if the Vikings decide to bring in another RB after NFL rosters are cut down from 90 to 53 players. As it stands now, however, the four players vying for the spot are:

Mike Boone, undrafted rookie from Cincinnati. He is a workout warrior but failed to put it all together on the field in college. Boone is a long shot to make the final roster or even the practice squad.

Mack Brown, entering his fourth season in the NFL. He has been able to stick around the NFL because he is a grinder who won't win many races but does his job well and is always willing to compete. He is a strong candidate for the third RB spot.

Johnny Stanton, undrafted rookie from Nevada-Las Vegas. He played quarterback in college, but the Vikings are giving him a shot at running back in the NFL because of his athletic profile. He is a practice squad candidate if the team sees some traits they would like to try and develop. Almost no shot at the final 53-man roster.

Roc Thomas, undrafted rookie from Jacksonville State. He is a former five-star recruit coming out of high school and signed with Auburn before transferring to Jacksonville State to get more playing time. Thomas is an explosive athlete who can be a homerun threat every time he touches the ball. If he learns to be a little more patient, he can have a long and productive NFL career. He is my dark horse candidate to be the team's third string running back, but he should certainly get a look at the team's practice squad if he fails to make the final 53.

The Vikings elected not to bring in competition for C.J. Ham at fullback this year. Ham is entering his second year in the NFL after being an undrafted rookie from Augustana. The Vikings used a fullback on 18.28% of the snaps in 2017 (according to Pro Football Reference), but that usage figures to drop significantly in 2018 under new offensive coordinator John DeFilippo. Last year the Eagles didn't even have a fullback on the roster, so it will be interesting to see if the Vikings elect to keep Ham around or if they will cut him to make room for

Thinking About Health Rural people most affected by negative health care trends

Recent studies about health care in America show troubling trends, especially in states with large rural and relatively low-income populations.

While the United States continues to spend far more than any other developed country on health care on a per capita basis and as a percentage of gross domestic product (GDP), many states, especially in the south and Midwest, are losing ground in key areas that pertain to life expectancy.

The Commonwealth Fund's just-released 2018 Scorecard on State Health System Performance confirmed what other recent studies have shown: Life expectancy in the United States is going down while it continues to go up in other developed countries. And rural areas seem to be disproportionately affected.

Some researchers have used one word to explain the sudden reversal in life expectancy trends in the United States: despair. That's because of the rapidly rising number of suicides and deaths associated with alcohol and drug use in this country. The Commonwealth Fund reported that deaths from suicide, alcohol and drug use have increased 50 percent since 2005.

The Scorecard, which assessed every state and the District of Columbia on 43 measures in five broad categories – access to health care, quality of care, efficiency in care delivery, health outcomes, and income-based health care disparities - wasn't all bad news by any means. In fact, most states made improvements between 2013 and 2016 in some or all of the categories. But several others, Nebraska in particular, saw a worsening in all five.

The states scoring the highest overall were Hawaii (#1), Massachusetts, Minnesota, Vermont, and Utah, while those scoring the lowest were Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and Mississippi (#51).

But three of those bottom-ranking states – Arkansas, Louisiana, and Oklahoma – were among the five states making the most improvements. At the other end of the spectrum, the five making the fewest improvements were New Hampshire, Utah, Maine, Wyoming, and Nebraska (#51).

The Commonwealth Fund's researchers noted that progress in all categories is certainly possible in coming years but added that unless significant steps are taken, improvements in many states are not likely anytime soon.

"If every state achieved the performance of the top-ranked state on each Scorecard indicator, the gains in health care access, guality, efficiency, and outcomes would be dramatic," the researchers wrote. "At the current rates of improvement, however, it may take many years or decades for states and the nation to see such progress."

That may portend a continuing decline in life expectancy in the United States.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported in December that life expectancy in the United States declined for the second year in a row in 2016. U.S. life expectancy peaked at 78.9 years in 2014. It fell to 78.7 in 2015 and to 78.6 in 2016.

As the British Medical Journal pointed out earlier this year, this decline is the culmination of a decades-long trend. In 1960, the United States had the highest life expectancy of any country in the 35-member Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), which comprises the world's richest countries. Back then, Americans on average lived 2.4 years longer than residents of the other OECD countries. We started losing ground, though, in the 1980s. Our life expectancy first fell below the OECD average in 1998. Now it is 1.5 years lower than the average of the 35 countries.

Steven H. Woolf, the author of the British Medical Journal article, attributed the decline to "life conditions" that seem to be more challenging to Americans, rural Americans in particular, than they are to residents of other developed countries. He cited the rising number of deaths from opioid overdoses in particular as a symptom of those greater life challenges. But, he added, "the opioid epidemic is the tip of an iceberg, part of an even larger public health crisis in the U.S.: Death rates from alcohol abuse and suicides have also been rising ... These 'deaths of despair,' as some have called them, are disproportionately affecting white Americans, especially adults aged 25-59 years, those with limited education, and women. The sharpest increases are occurring in rural counties, often in regions with longstanding social and economic challenges."

the Kaiser Family Foundation reported last September, the average annual premium for employer-sponsored family coverage reached \$18,764 in 2017. That's a 55 percent increase over 10 years.

So although we are spending more on health care every year and far more than any other developed country, we are getting an increasingly smaller return on that money as measured by most health care outcomes, most notably life expectancy. And residents of many rural communities are especially disadvantaged.

SIOUX FALLS, SD – Ash tree owners in the Sioux Falls area are encouraged to attend an emerald ash borer (EAB) workshop on Monday, June 11, to learn about the insect and effective treatments.


'The emerald ash borer was confirmed in Sioux Falls this spring. This invasive insect is responsible for the loss of more than 100 million ash trees in 33 states," said Dr. John Ball, forest health specialist with the South Dakota Department of Agriculture (SDDA). "The EAB will kill any ash tree that is not being protected by insecticide treatments. The insect is flying and the time to treat is now."

The workshop will be held from 6:30 p.m. to 8 p.m. CDT at the Cooperative Extension Regional Center, 2001 E. 8th St., in Sioux Falls. The workshop will include presentations on EAB biology, identification, quarantines and other management concerns, followed by treatment demonstrations and an ash identification session.

This event is sponsored by the SDDA, the South Dakota Cooperative Extension Service and the South Dakota Arborist Association. There is no fee or registration for the workshop.

Meanwhile, the United States spends far more on health care than any other country: \$10,348 per capita annually, which is more than twice as much as the \$5,169 average spent by OECD countries. We spend 31 percent more per capita than the next highest country, Switzerland.

And as noted above, we also spend more on health care – 17.3 percent of GDP, more than twice the 7.9 percent average of comparably developed countries. And the difference is widening every year.

That percentage is expected to keep going up because of constantly rising health care costs and health insurance premiums, although the rate of increase of both has slowed somewhat in recent years. But as

First Human West Nile Virus Detection Reported

PIERRE, S.D. - A Todd County blood donor is South Dakota's first human West Nile virus (WNV) detection of the season, the state Health Department reported today. The person is in the 30 to 39 age group.

"This individual was not ill but was detected through the routine screening of blood donations that takes place to make sure the blood supply is safe," said Dr. Joshua Clayton, State Epidemiologist for the department. "It's a clear indication that mosquito-to-human WNV transmission is taking place and people need to protect themselves."

Clayton said South Dakota has a disproportionately high number of WNV cases compared to other states and he encouraged residents to reduce their risk by taking the following actions:

· Apply mosquito repellents (DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, 2-undecanone or IR3535) to clothes and exposed skin.

Reduce mosquito exposure by wearing pants and long sleeves when outdoors.

Limit time outdoors from dusk to dawn when Culex mosquitoes, the primary carrier of WNV in South Dakota, are most active.

Get rid of standing water that gives mosquitoes a place to breed.

 Regularly change water in bird baths, ornamental fountains and pet dishes.

Drain water from flower pots and garden containers.

 Discard old tires, buckets, cans or other containers that can hold water.

Clean rain gutters to allow water to flow freely.

Support local mosquito control efforts.

These precautions are especially important for people at high risk for WNV, including individuals over 50, pregnant women, organ transplant patients, individuals with cancer, diabetes, high blood pressure or kidney disease, and those with a history of alcohol abuse. People with severe or unusual headaches should see their physicians.



May 2018 Climate Summary

May 2018 was either very wet or very dry, depending on your location. While a generally active pattern brought several opportunities for precipitation, Aberdeen recorded their 7th driest May on record with just 0.52" of moisture (1900 holds the record at 0.25"). This is 0.13" less than was recorded in May 2017. However, 2017 was drier than 2018 from January 1st to May 31st in Aberdeen by 0.58" (3.76" below normal vs 3.18" below normal respectively). On the contrary, an exceptionally heavy rainfall event took place across portions of north central South Dakota on May 17th. Training thunderstorms, those which develop and pass over the same areas over extended periods of time, led to extreme rainfall reports including 13.15" four miles northwest of Long Lake, SD. These measurements are being vetted to determine if they meet standards necessary to qualify as South Dakota's state 24 hour precipitation record (currently held by Groton, SD with 8.74" recorded on May 6th, 2007). This heavy rainfall contributed to the failure of the Hiddenwood Lake Dam about 4 miles north of Selby, SD on the morning of May 18th. Several area roadways were submerged as a result. May 2018 was very warm across the board, May 24-27th in particular. The following were record daily high temperatures: Watertown reached 96° on the 27th, Sisseton reached 90° on the 24th, 93° on the 25th, and 95° on the 26th, and Aberdeen reached 94° on the 25th, 97° on the 26th and 101° on the 27th. This is only the 4th year on record in Aberdeen when a May day reached at least 100° (once in 2018, 1959 and 1931, and 7 times in 1934). This was the 3rd warmest May on record in Aberdeen (64.5° average temperature vs 1st place 69° in 1934), the 3rd warmest May on record in Sisseton (64.3° average temperature vs 1st place 70.3° in 1934), the 3rd warmest May on record in Wheaton (64.8° vs 1st place 67.1° in 1977, the 4th warmest in Timber Lake, 7th in Pierre and Watertown, and 8th warmest in Kennebec. This is an abrupt turn-around from just a month ago. Amazingly, Aberdeen recorded their 2nd coldest April on record this year, and both Sisseton and Wheaton recorded their 3rd coldest April on record this year. "Normal" weather is just the average of extremes in the Northern Plains after all.
