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

City Officials from Bowdle, Groton Elected to District Offices for SD **Municipal League**

HECLA, S.D. - More than 40 municipal officials representing 7 cities gathered at the South Dakota Municipal League's annual District 6 Meeting, held in Hecla on May 16, 2023.

David Reiss, South Dakota Municipal League Executive Director, spoke about the outcome of the 2023 Legislative Session and the effect new laws will have on South Dakota municipalities. Reiss also discussed the direction and future of the Municipal League and services offered to the municipalities.

"More and more we are seeing the need to get better information out to the citizens and legislators. Municipal government provides a vast array of services, and people need to be informed of where their tax dollars are going," said Reiss. "This type of education can only benefit municipal government. The taxpayers would be very proud of their local government if they were fully aware of how much service a municipality provides at a relatively low cost."

The meeting also saw the election of representatives for the district. Rick Boschee, Mayor of Bowdle, was re-elected as District 6 Chair and Brian Bahr, Councilmember from Groton, was elected as Vice Chair. As the district chair, Boschee will act as a contact for and represent their district as a member of the SDML Board of Directors. Duties began immediately.

In other business, those attending voted to hold the 2024 District 6 Meeting in Groton.

Tornado shelter, city shop, jailhouse discussion on the table at Groton City Council

shelter at the Groton City Park will soon be before the City Council.

Clark Engineering Corporation and Dean Marske, president and principal architect at HKG Architects based in Aberdeen. Discussion centered on park bathroom improvements and funding through the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

A safe room for tornadoes and hurricanes has to be able to withstand 250 mile per hour winds, Marske said. That means poured concrete walls or possibly cast walls eight inches thick.



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Weekly Vikings Recap -Za'Darius Smith Trade & Vikings' 2023 NFL Schedule

The Minnesota Vikings made some headlines this week when they traded Za'Darius Smith to the Cleveland Browns. Along with trading Smith, the Vikings also sent the Browns a 2025 6th-round pick and a 2025 7th-round pick. In return, the Vikings received a 2024 5th-round pick and a 2025 5th-round pick.

The trade came with no surprise to a lot of people as it had been rumored for a while that Smith was wanting to get out of Minnesota.



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However, I think a lot of people, including myself, thought Smith's departure would come via release and not trade, so it is nice to see that the Vikings were able to gain some compensation for Smith leaving.

In Defense of Clergy, the Court Strikes Blow for Religious Liberty

In 1977, in McDaniel v. Paty, the U.S. Supreme Court delivered a landmark ruling that held unconstitutional one of the last anticlerical remnants of the founding era, a 1796 Tennessee law that prohibited ministers and priests from holding public office.

The statute, drafted at the dawn of the republic in the name of separation of church and state, reflected a widespread legal policy among the early states that sought to curb the outsized role

that clergy played in English public affairs and the colonies, in which laws respecting establishments of religion were a commonplace. The principle of banning religious officials from holding public office had enjoyed the support of the influential English philosopher, John Locke, as well as Thomas Jefferson. James Madison and John Witherspoon, the only minister who signed the Declaration of Independence, opposed such restrictions.

By 1796, several of the state laws banning religious leaders from holding office had been repealed. Eleven of the original 13 states contained such provisions. The Bill of Rights had been ratified in 1791, and although it would not be held applicable to the states until the 1920s, state leaders became increasingly drawn to Madison's objection that citizens should not be required to choose between civil rights and religious rights. Prohibiting clergy from holding public office ran afoul of the values embodied in the First Amendment.

In 1977, Paul A. McDaniel, a Baptist minister, filed as a candidate to serve in Tennessee's constitutional convention. Another candidate, Selma Cash Paty, brought a lawsuit seeking a declaratory judgment that McDaniel was barred by the anticlerical statute and should be disqualified. A lower court held the state law violated the First and 14th Amendments' guarantees of religious freedom. McDaniel was elected with more votes than the combined total of his three opponents. After the election, the Tennessee Supreme Court reversed the lower court, ruling that the statute did not restrict McDaniel's freedom of religion. The court held that the state's interest in maintaining separation of church and state justified restrictions imposed by the statute. The court said that the state constitution had prohibited clergy from serving in the legislature because they "are by their profession dedicated to God and the care of souls and ought not to be diverted from the

great duties of their functions."

But the U.S. Supreme Court, in a unanimous opinion authored by Chief Justice Warren Burger, struck a blow for religious liberty and declared that the statute violated McDaniel's First Amendment right to freedom of religion. Burger, nominated to the Court by President Richard Nixon, was unpersuaded by the rationale invoked by Tennessee to deny religious liberty to members of the clergy. Burger concluded, "the American experience provides no persuasive support for the fear that clergymen" will promote religious interests and values.

The principal vice of the statute, Burger wrote, was that it made the ability to exercise civil rights—holding public office—conditional on the surrender of religious rights, in violation of McDaniel's free exercise of religion. McDaniel should not be forced to choose between civil rights and religious rights.

The decision was unanimous, but Justices weighed in with different rationales for striking down the law. Justice William Brennan, named to the Court by Dwight Eisenhower, held that the Tennessee statute essentially constituted a test of religious belief, in violation of the Oath Clause of Article VI of the Constitution, which forbids, as we discussed last week in the column on Torcaso v. Watkins, the requirement of a religious test or oath.

Brennan agreed with Burger that governmental imposition of the burden to choose between one's religious beliefs and the wish to hold office is an unconstitutional restriction on the free exercise of religion. And the Establishment Clause, he said, denies to government the authority to discriminate against religious persons seeking public office. The state, he wrote, may not "fence out" those whom it believes to be "overinvolved in religion," for "religionists," like all other members of society, are entitled to the "full measure of protection" when it comes to freedom of speech and association and political activity in general.

Justice Byron White, nominated to the Court by President John F. Kennedy, identified yet another flaw in the statute. He believed that the law violated the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment. The mischief, White wrote, lay in the fact that the statute, which was specific to clergy, implies that ministers are less capable of preventing outside interests from interfering with their governmental service than anyone else.

The Tennessee statute targeted clergy based on rationales once well-grounded as a response to the great power that the Anglican Church wielded in England. But the Bill of Rights and evolving notions of civil rights and liberties in the early years of the American republic indicated that the hurly-burly of American politics could embrace the voices of ministers in discussions and debates about the future of the country without fear that they would eclipse those of non-religionists.





OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC COMMENT: Jared Bossly wanted to inform the Commission that Summit Carbon Solutions employees were trespassing on his property and began surveying without his permission. They are now serving condemnation papers on landowners. Mark Bossly Thanked the Commissioners for the Setback Ordinance that was passed and asked that they keep the Moratorium on and possibly extend it as well.

ORDINANCE #244 - FIRST READING: Moved by Commissioner Fjeldheim, seconded by Wiese to approve the First Reading of Proposed Ordinance #244. Applicants Levi Jensen requesting to rezone from Agriculture Preservation District (AG-P) to Mini-Agriculture District (M-AG) to bring this parcel into compliance for its current use: The West 520' of the North 1,965' of the SW 1/4 of Section 9-T121N-R63W of the 5th P.M., Brown County, South Dakota (14380 390th Áve., West Rondell Twp.). All members present voting aye.

Motion carried.
DISCUSS POSSIBLE ACTION ON RESOLUTION #33-22: Resolution #33-22 was to establish the temporary moratorium on the Issuance of Conditional Use Permits and Building Permits on Hazardous Waste Pipelines in Brown County, SD. Chairman Sutton stated this was to give Brown County, Planning & Zoning along with Planning & Zoning Board time to review our current ordinances and be able to study, research and offer a decision on those findings for what's best for Brown County. We even held a public meeting prior to the final reading and discussed this at length. Ordinance #243 was passed on April 25, 2023, based on what was found to be best for Brown County. Ross Aldentaler, Deputy State's Attorney stated that Ernest Thompson, State's Attorney would recommend lifting the moratorium because we have done all the research we can, and we are compliant with Federal and State Regulations, but it is up to the Board. Jared Bossly, Dennis Feickert, Craig Schaunaman and Janet Hedges expressed some concerns and asked the Commissioners to not lift the moratorium and even look at extending it because want to look at the depth of cultivation and safety of the pipelines. Ross shared information that the Feds are regulating the depth of cultivation already and doesn't feel the County could do anymore. Commissioner Gage shared that we have also been using outside counsel along with the State's Attorney office. Commissioner Wiese stated that he would be comfortable with taking no action at this time due to the information and authority we have on the setbacks, moratorium by statue is a one-year with the potential to extend it but with no action would expire on July 19th, so could wait for 2 months. Mark Bossly and Dennis Feickert mentioned that the Feds are still having meetings on Carbon pipelines and FEMSA is holding a meeting May 31st & June 1st and will listen to public comment session in Des Moines, IA, so this is another reason to leave the moratorium on and let FEMSA review regulations. Chairman Sutton stated we could postpone until July 18th, the day before the moratorium expires. Craig Schaunaman asked about doing a separate ordinance on the depth of cultivation. SE Brown County was hit the worst at this time. He asked the Commission to pass a Resolution for Declaration of Emergency Disaster.

Commissioner Wiese offered the following Resolution as of May 9, 2023:

ŘESOLUTION #18-23 RESOLUTION FOR DECLARA-TION OF EMERGENCY/DISAS-

WHEREAS, Brown County, South Dakota, has suffered severe damage, brought on by a severe winter event. On the date and around the dates of

April 10,2023 and ongoing. WHEREAS, Brown County, Brown County Townships and other public entities have had flooding, causing damage to public infrastructure.

WHEREAS Brown County has committed all available resources and taken all possible actions within the jurisdictional boundaries to combat and to alleviate the emergency/disaster, local resources are not adequate to cope with the situation.

FIREWORKS PERMIT: Scott Meints, Emergency Management Director wanted to discuss the Fireworks Permits that the County issues as far as discharging the Fireworks. Scott recommended that we add the addition of state law, SDCL 34-37-19 to the Permit Forms so if due to dry conditions a ban needs to be put in place, those with a permit are aware that it affects them as well. Moved by Commissioner Wiese, seconded by Gage to add the additional SDCL to the permit form.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT UPDATE: Scott Meints, Emergency Management Director informed the Commission that Jamestown called to inform him that they are going to be doubling their output this week.

DISCUSS FUNDING PROPOS-S FOR RIVERBANK ON CO. ROADS 13 & 400: Chad Pray met with Commission to see if the County would be willing to help with the costs of improving the riverbank along County Roads 13 & 400. Chad had 2 bids: Schmidt Construction for \$15,700.00 for pulling up the dirt off North side put on the bank and level it off and \$33,000.00 from Hanlon's for concrete, trucking and loading 100 loads for rip rap after the dirt dries out. 

City Council Continued from front

The council discussed the city's current shop, which can't house all of the city's current equipment.

Councilman Bahr said he and Councilman Nehls recently looked at the facility, and if a bigger building can't be constructed this summer, a larger overhead door may help keep some of the city's newer equipment out of the elements. There may also be some items the city can declare as surplus and sell to make room.

"There's some things in there that need to go," Bahr said. "There are some lawnmowers we've talked to city employees about, and they haven't been used in years."

Councilwoman Karen Babcock agreed with going through the city's current equipment to see what needs to go.

"We don't need to shelter the junk," she said. While there may be some short-term solutions, Bahr said newer equipment is getting bigger than ones built in the past.

"Eventually we'll need to have a new shop," he said. "I would rather do it sooner rather than later."

Jailhouse talks continue

Council members indicated they wanted to donate the city's old jail to the Groton Community Historical Society.

Topper Tastad and Mike Nehls approached the council at its last meeting earlier this month requesting the city donate the jailhouse located near the intersection of East First Avenue and North Third Street.

The jailhouse has been on the City Council agenda on and off for years, said Councilwoman

Karyn Babcock.

"In my opinion, I feel like we're not doing anything with it," she said. "The city's not gaining anything. We're not losing anything."

She proposed letting the historical society take the jailhouse off the city's plate.

Councilman Brian Bahr expressed concerns about restrictions placed on work that can be done to the jailhouse if funding comes from certain historical groups. However, Mayor Scott Hanlon said those restrictions would only be in place for money from groups like the Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission.

Hanlon asked that the item be brought to the council's next meeting in June after lot lines on the property are figured out.

Others on the council were also supportive of handing over the building.

"I think it's great if he's doing it," said Councilman Kevin Nehls.

Babcock added, "we were going to demolish it. If he wants to preserve it, let him preserve it," referring to Groton Community Historical Society President Tastad.

Sewer violation penalties discussed

Residents may soon have less time before fines are assessed should they violate the city's sewer policy.

The council looked over amendments to ordinance number 768 dealing with the sewer penalty timeframe. Currently, the city must wait 10 days after a resident violates the ordinance before fines can be assessed. The amendment would shorten that time period to 24 hours.

However, some tweaks are being made before the changes go before the council again.

Councilwoman Karyn Babcock expressed concern about how residents would be given notice

that they are violating the policy. She asked for clarity on how residents would receive notices, verbally or in writing.

A first reading of the amended ordinance is set to go before the council at an upcoming meeting. In other action:

- The council approved hiring two additional summer employees. Dillon Abeln was hired as a groundskeeper, and Claire Sbylut was hired as a day baseball/softball coach for all teams.
- Beer can be brought to some Groton Amateur Baseball games at the baseball complex in Groton. The council approved a special event alcoholic beverage license so game attendees could bring their own beer to certain games. Dates for those games are June 9, June 18, July 1, July 16 and July 23 through 27. Beer will not be allowed if little league or softball is present, according to the license.
- The city will start listing items on BigIron Auction. The council approved listing a 1992 digger currently valued at \$5,000 on the online auction site. The city will still advertise that the machine is going to be auctioned at BigIron, but there will be "a lot more exposure that way," said Finance Officer Douglas Heinrich. More city machines may be declared surplus as the city looks to clean up its shop.
- A ribbon cutting for the city's water tower is scheduled for 11:30 a.m. July 20 followed by a lunch served at City Hall and sponsored by IMEG. It's a way to involve the community more with engineering projects going on in the city, Heinrich said. Utility credits can be won as door prizes at the event. Engineering will also be a focus of the summer storytime at the library that day.
- The look of a new sign outside of the Groton Police Department was approved by the council Wednesday evening. The 48-inch by 60-inch sign will look like the police department's patch, with "Est. 1888" added to the bottom.



"The Gift of Kidney Donation"

The first successful organ transplant was a kidney transplant in 1954. The donor was the identical twin of the recipient. The new kidney worked for 11 months. This was long before any anti-rejection medications were available.

Based on Science, Built on Trust

Cyclosporine, the first anti-rejection medication, was approved for use in 1983. The use of anti-rejection medications has significantly increased how long transplanted organs will function.

A transplanted kidney from a living donor will last on average 12-20 years. A kidney from a decease donor lasts 8-12 years on average. Amazingly, the longest reported kidney transplant lasted 60 years. Most people who have kidney transplants for end stage kidney disease are first treated with kidney dialysis. Since dialysis is an option treatment for end stage kidney disease, people may wonder why kidney transplants are needed at all.

Dialysis is not ideal as it only can do about 10-15% of the work that a healthy kidney dose. Dialysis is also very costly and time consuming for the patient. The average life expectancy of a patient on dialysis is 5-10 years. Thus dialysis commonly used as a bridge to kidney transplants, and not a replacement for transplant.

Kidney and liver transplants are unique because they can be done with living donors. For the kidney donor, once a kidney is removed, the remaining one will increase in size to adjust for the lost kidney. The portion of the liver that is donated can regrow rapidly and the donor's liver will be back to normal size and function in a few months after the donation. Donation of a kidney or part of a liver does not shorten the donor's life expectancy.

Per the National Organ Transplant Act, neither living nor deceased donors are compensated for organ donations. This is truly a gift of life that is given to the recipient. However, organ recipients may pay for their living donor's travel, lodging, and lost wages in connection with the donation. The donor's surgery is often billed to the recipient's health insurance. The National Living Donor Assistance Center also helps eligible donors financially when they cannot have their expenses covered by the donor, the donor's insurance company, or state programs.

Since 1954 over one million organ transplants have taken place in the United States. The Organ Procurement and Transplant Network reported over 42,800 organ transplants were done in 2022. Last year 6,466 people became living organ donors. Thanks to organ donors, transplant recipients can live longer and healthier lives. Consider checking the organ donor box next time you are at the DMV. One day, it may lead to the gift needed for someone else to stay healthy out there.
