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Lifeguard training pays off in swimming incident by Elizabeth Varin

A recent scare at the Groton swimming pool highlights the training lifeguards are continuously doing to keep people safe.

During a busy afternoon open-swimming session on Thursday, July 13, lifeguard Emma Schinkel was monitoring the lap pool and deep end from the lifeguard chair. She remembers a young boy and his grandmother were swimming around near the water slide. He was swimming fine, and his grandmother went to the other side of the pool with her granddaughter.

After a bit, Schinkel said, the young boy started waving his hands, as many kids have done in the pool. Then he called for help.

"I don't even remember going from the chair into the pool," she said. "It was an adrenaline rush."

Schinkel jumped in and got the boy out. He hurried to his grandmother after the close call. He had gotten tired while swimming, but was too far from the edge of the pool and the ropes to grab a hold of anything, she said.

Schinkel credits the continuous training the Groton lifeguards receive for her quick response.

"I'm sometimes nervous when I have to lifequard," she said. "But it makes me feel okay because I know I can do it."

Throughout the summer, the lifeguards have in-service sessions where they practice saving swimmers and talk through different situations they may face, said swimming pool co-manager Tricia Keith. Staff are also trained to prevent situations from getting to the point that a save is needed.

"I am very proud of the way all my guards handled the situation," she said. "They handled it so well most people didn't know it happened."

The boy, who is not a regular at the Groton pool, also did what he was supposed to do: called for help, she said. Many kids at the pool have done their swimming lessons with the lifeguards in Groton, so the guards know at what level many of the kids can swim.

"Even people that are good swimmers can get tired and get in a situation where they're not comfortable," Keith said. "And that's why we're here."

Weekly Vikings Recap -**All-time Vikings Offense Bv Jack & Duane Kolsrud**

With the lack of Minnesota Vikings news continuing this offseason, except for Jordan Addison's recent speeding ticket where he was driving his Lamborghini 140 mph, we thought it would be fun to put together the all-time greatest Vikings' starting offense. To make it interesting, we will be picking players based on specific seasons, not based on their overall

Quarterback - Duante Culpepper (2004)

career with the Vikings.

This might come as a shock to some fans who probably thought Fran Tarkenton or Randall Cunningham's 1998 season would make this list, but Duante Culpepper's 2004 season is the best season a Vikings' quarterback has ever had. In 16 games, Culpepper threw for 4,717 yards and 39 touchdowns, both still single-season records in Vikings history. Culpepper would have had a shot at winning MVP that season if it was not for the fact that Peyton Manning broke Dan Marino's record for touchdowns in a season that had stood for 20 years.

Running back - Adrian Peterson (2012)

This was the easiest choice to make when it came to putting this list together. Adrian Peterson's 2012 season is not only the greatest season for a running back in Vikings history, but it is also, in my opinion, the greatest season for a running back in NFL history. Peterson foresight on the parts ran for 2,097 yards that season, finished with the MVP, and led a Vikings team that had gone 3-13 the previous season to the playoffs, all while coming back from a torn ACL the year before. It is truly the most impressive performance a Vikings player has ever had in this franchise's history.

Wide Receivers - Randy Moss (1998), Justin Jefferson (2022), Cris Carter (1995)

You could make the case that this is the best trio of wide receivers of all the NFL teams. You have the most athletic wide receiver of all time in Randy Moss, you have the greatest hands by a wide receiver of all time in Cris Carter, and you have the current best wide receiver in the NFL. I do not think there is a single other franchise in the NFL that could come close to this group. And what makes it even more impressive is that there are plenty of other great wide receivers that probably would make other franchises' all-time teams had they played for them but just could not crack this amazing Vikings trio.

Tight End - Jim Kleinsasser (2003)

When you have that trio of wide receivers in your lineup, your tight end is not going to need to go out for passes. Instead, I want one of the toughest players the Vikings have ever had to play my tight end position, Jim Kleinsasser. Kleinsasser's 2003 season saw

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him catch four touchdown passes, so even with his great blocking and toughness, there will still be a decent pass-catching threat from the tight end position.

Offensive Line - Gary Zimmerman (1988), (1965), Randall McDaniel (1995), Ron Yary

For a Vikings team that has, over the past decade, had horrendous offensive line play, it is amazing to see how impressive this offensive line group is. Not only are all five of these offensive linemen Hall-of-Famers, but they are also some of the best to play their respective positions. Without a doubt, Steve Hutchinson and Randall McDaniel were the best guards during each of their eras, and Ron Yary was the best right tackle of his too. And, if it were not for Anthony Munoz and Jim Otto, both Gary Zimmerman and Mick Tinglehoff would probably have been the greatest at their position during their era, as well.

It's the most democratic business in town. We welcome letters to the editor. We pay for the ink, postage, and labor for you to take us to the woodshed.

It's hard, especially in small communities, to Steve Hutchinson (2009), Mick Tinglehoff hold local government and longtime friends accountable—hard on relationships—but covering for a friend comes at the cost of credibility. If you can't trust the source of your news you've lost the key foundation of democracy.

We hold ourselves to the same standards as other community leaders. In 33 years as a publisher or owner, every staffer has heard the same speech. "If I get hauled in on a DUI, come down and take a picture of my drunk ass in jail." When one publisher made that mistake, there was no doubt about how it would be covered. Front page.

In my first stint as a publisher, perhaps the most popular guy in town got in hot water. He was administrator of a nursing home and ended up with "a loan" from a naive old lady resident. It ended up in court, in the paper, and people were furious with me.

I lamented the state of things with a mentor, Omar Forberg, the publisher of a North Dakota daily paper at the time. He clarified it for me with a bit of wit that's become a guiding principle. "Hey, he committed news."

The role of newspapers is to serve the common man, not cover for their rulers. In the late 1990's, I was assigned to Sturgis by management of a large newspaper group. I was tasked with organizing a group of newly-purchased newspapers, and for doing investigative work on a business entity that was governing the multi-million dollar motorcycle rally. In short, these private entities steered business their way to the detriment of others while heaping police and cleanup costs on local taxpayers.

This coverage, of course, threatened them monetarily so they threatened back. One day a local restaurant declared it "Tony Bender Day" on the Main Street marquee. It read: "You supply the tar, we'll supply the feathers. Chicken dinner, \$4.75."

I ran right down and stood on the bus stop bench by the sign, hands spread in triumph, while my reporter snapped a photo. We ran it the next day. Then, I called the restaurant owner. He seemed nervous. "Hey, Bob. I just want to thank you for making it Tony Bender Day..." At this point he must have thought I was the most obtuse person ever. I went on and on about the rare honor. I concluded with, "and I appreciate you not making it a turkey dinner!" Then I made reservations for 20, and as a show of solidarity, my coworkers joined me. To his credit, Bob paid for my lunch.

I always say that people perform better under a spotlight, and with the light shone on the unfair expenses heaped upon taxpayers, the consortium was broken up.

Judicial Profiles to Better Understand the Supreme Court

We citizens know a lot about our presidents—their background, philosophy, and character—and sometimes more than we care to know. The same is true of our congressional representatives. By comparison, we know relatively little about our Supreme Court Justices. This needs to change.

A better, indeed, more fully informed historic understanding of the views, experiences, temperament, and character of the men and women that have served on the nation's High Bench will, in the name of civic education, expand the

citizenry's knowledge of an institution that has exceeded the Framers' minimal expectations of the impact of the judiciary on American life.

Since Aristotle, we have known that people shape institutions and institutions shape people. The views and values of the 116 people who have served on the Supreme Court, an independent institution laboring under few checks and balances, have profoundly shaped American lives and the life of our nation. The temperament, ambition, personality quirks, rivalries, judicial philosophies, and ideology of just nine members—the size of the Court set by Congress in the early 1900s—can exert great power in changing the institution of the judiciary and, thus, the meaning of the Constitution.

The Court as an institution can, and does, influence the behavior of the Justices. Its rules and traditions, for example, shape the interaction of the Justices. The Rule of Four—the number of Justices necessary to grant a Writ of Certiorari—requires adaptation to the Court's norms of behavior in order to win support from a recalcitrant judge who, if alienated by personal attacks by a fellow Justice, might not be willing to vote to hear a case. It was with good reason that Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes famously characterized his colleagues as "nine scorpions in a bottle." Thus, the institutional norms of collegiality and tolerance shape behavior, but occasionally give way to nasty fights that become public and accusations that expose the fissures within the Court and the juvenile nature of some of its members.

Justice James McReynolds, a notorious antisemite, refused to dine with Justices Louis Brandeis and Benjamin Cardozo, both of whom were Jewish.

In the mid-1940s, the bitter rivalry and fight between Justices Hugo Black and Robert H. Jackson, stemming from personal ambition

and absence of goodwill, plunged the Court into a storm that forced members to choose sides.

In the early 1970s, Chief Justice Warren Burger manipulated the Court's method for voting on cases in order to place himself in the majority so he could write the Court's opinion, even though his views were at odds with those who formed the majority. He ceased his behavior only when Justice William O. Douglas, after reminding his colleagues of the rules governing voting, threatened to expose Burger's manipulative acts with a letter to the press.

A single Justice's temperament, political skills and vision for America, however, can unite the Court, overturn pernicious precedents and craft an opinion that changes the course of America. Chief Justice Earl Warren, who possessed leadership and political skills nearly unrivaled in the Court's long history, along with a warm and congenial personality, brought discordant voices to a unanimous opinion in Brown v. Bd. of Education (1954) and held that segregation in public schools violated the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment.

Chief Justice John Marshall, widely regarded as the greatest Justice in our history, brought warmth, charm, a convivial personality and, most of all, a down-to-earth sincerity to the bench. Far from being viewed as manipulative and pretentious, he was regarded by his colleagues as authentic. His close friend, Justice Joseph Story, the most scholarly of Justices, said of Marshall: "I love his laugh—it is too hearty for an intriguer."

It was Marshall who convinced his colleagues to room and dine together while they performed their duties on the Court. He brought wine to dinner—his beloved Madeira—and created an institutional atmosphere that set the tone for the work of the Court for decades to come.

To understand the Supreme Court—its history, work, and role in American politics—is to understand those who have donned black robes and taken seats in the Marble Palace. It is especially important at this juncture, when members of the Court are ensnared in public controversies—for their votes, speeches, and scandals—for the citizenry to understand who these men and women are. What is the content of their portfolios? What did they do before winning appointment to the Court? What judicial vision and philosophy did they articulate? And, of course, what were their highs and lows as Supreme Court Justices?

With very few exceptions, no appointee to the Supreme Court possessed greater experience than John Jay, the first Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. We begin next week with a profile of Jay, President George Washington's first judicial appointment.

Bossly feels that Summit convinced our farmer own etha-nol plants that CO2 is a waste product so going to do them a favor by sequestering it underground. If it makes it cheaper in California it will raise the prices of Ethanol here and people will stop using it if higher than regular unleaded. He believes Summit plans to monopolize this by getting their hands on the CO2. By doing the green methanol the CO2 can be done in house, trucked or railed away, and not take anyone's farmland, not taking up economic development along highways and this is safer. Jared just wanted to make the Commissioners aware of this other option and possible economic development for the

Dennis Feickert commented that Summit Carbon Solutions did a sponsorship last year to the Brown County Fair and again this year they are offering a sponsorship and he feels that it wrong and sets a bad example for the County. Jared Bossly added that they are suing the County then sponsoring the Brown County

Fair, he feels is a slap in the face RESOLUTION #33-22 – MOR-ATORIUM: Chairman Sutton shared that Moratorium is set to expire tomorrow (July 19th) and by advice from the State's Attorney the Moratorium was put in place to give the County the opportunity to review and possibly change our Ordinances to he in line with what the County was expecting any pipeline to comply with. Jared Bossly also feels that there is no reason to take this off either, because FEMSA is still working on this and there is no highpressure Carbon Pipeline like this Summits easements state that you can't plant a tree or build within a 1000 ft. of the pipeline, but they can put it closer than that to homes or our farm buildings. stitution states that "Nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just com-pensation." U.S. Const. Amend. (emphasis added). WHEREAS, the South Dakota

State Constitution provides that "Private property shall not be taken for public use, or damaged, without just compensation[.]" SD CONST Art. 6 §13 (emphasis added).

WHEREAS, the omission of "private use" from these laws implies a complete prohibition on the taking of private property for

non-public purposes. WHEREAS, On July 6, 2023, hundreds of citizens held a rally in Pierre in support of revisions to South Dakota eminent domain law, culminating with approximately 2,000 signatures in support of eminent domain reform.





Normally, patients may leave and await their results from home. If the physician has requested a follow-up appointment, please schedule prior to your departure. We highly encourage this step as the schedules fill up very quickly.

- Results: Nowadays, many health institutions offer an application for your phone or computer to track your information at the touch of a button. While this is incredibly convenient, it can also create anxiety. If an abnormal result occurs, please wait patiently to hear from the clinic. We are performing many tasks and seeing patients during the day. It may take time to hear from us. Depending on your preference, you will receive either a phone call or message from the doctor or nurse on your results along with what to do with the information. More serious results will likely come from the doctor themselves. The majority of the results and information will be relayed to you from the nursing staff.
- Messages/questions: With these new apps, many patients have the option to message their physician with questions/concerns. The questions go to a pool being covered by a litany of clinic staff. They will use their knowledge to help with the concern/question. When necessary, the staff will forward it to the physician. Depending on the institution, we may have 24-72 hours to respond. If your question involves symptoms like chest pain or shortness of breath - DO NOT MESSAGE. Please call the clinic to speak with a nurse, call 911 or proceed to the Emergency Room.
- Medication refills: There's nothing more frustrating than going to the pharmacy and find there are no refills available on medications. Most healthcare systems likely have a timeframe set for when medications are required to be sent, the average is about 24-48 hours. That being said, please watch your medication supply carefully. When you have about 5-7 days left, call your pharmacy and request a refill, send a request via your application or call the clinic. Please plan accordingly around vacations/travel and holidays. If available, sign up for your pharmacy's notification system for your convenience. This will ensure timely refills so you do not go without your medications or make unnecessary trips to the pharmacy.

In closing, the healthcare system is a very busy entity providing care to thousands of patients simultaneously through various avenues. I'm hoping this essay can give patients some insight and assistance on how to navigate the systems and get the most seamless care.
