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Groton school board continues opt-out discussion

The Groton Area School Board is edging toward a decision about whether to impose an additional tax levy or make significant cuts.

Discussion continued Monday evening about whether the school board wants to opt out of tax levy limitation. Currently, the district offsets a drop in state funding by transferring \$700,000 per year from the capital outlay fund to the general fund.

The capital outlay fund is set aside for facility improvements or repairs, acquisitions of new property or large pieces of equipment or construction projects. The general fund pays for teacher salaries and benefits, books, transportation expenses, utilities, classroom supplies, counselors, paraprofessionals, office staff, librarians, coaches and more.

With the transfer of capital outlay funds to the general fund, there is less money to do capital projects and make improvements at the schools.

"People are asking us to take care of these things," said Superintendent Joe Schwan. "And we need to have room (in the budget) to do them."

The district has a list of potential projects in its five-year capital outlay plan. Some of the items included are high school sidewalk repairs, playground equipment upgrades, replacing flooring in the middle school science lab, replacing lockers, upgrading lighting, repainting rooms and upgrading technology. It also includes renovations of the high school band room, the 1957 English classroom, the 1969 gymnasium public restrooms, the stage and more.

Transferring the funds is also not transparent for the public, Schwan said. What the district is bringing in for capital outlay isn't necessarily being used for capital outlay projects.

Schwan presented an overview of the five-year capital outlay projections, along with tax levy amounts from other districts in the state and a summary of teaching positions that have been eliminated or added since 2012.

The district is down seven full-time equivalent positions since 2012, Schwan said. With a total staff of 49 people, that's a significant number of full-time equivalent positions.

Currently, the Groton Area School District has the 13th lowest tax levy for agricultural property (\$3.593/1,000 of value), 11th lowest tax levy for owner-occupied property (\$5.28/1,000 of value) and the eighth lowest tax levy for all other property (\$8.543/1,000 of value). Other districts in the region include Langford with \$3.17 for agriculture, \$5.396 for owner-occupied and \$8.656 for other property; Frederick Area with \$4.404 for agriculture, \$6.731 for owner-occupied property and \$11.231 for other property; and Aberdeen with \$6.492 for agriculture land, \$8.278 for owner-occupied property and \$11.732 for other property.

"The goal is not to have the biggest tax levy," Schwan said. "But it's an objective way to look at where we sit in the tax climate."

While the board has taken a deep dive into district finances through the last four months, members asked for a special meeting to let the public have another opportunity to ask questions.

"There are probably a lot of questions from the public," said board President Deb Gengerke. "Like if we don't do the opt-out, then what."

Board member Tigh Flihs added he's asked a few people, and many don't even know about the opt-out discussion and budget issues it entails.

"I've purposely asked people, and nobody seems to know about it," he said.

The public needs to be well informed about this issue, including what the consequences would be should the district have to start making cuts, said board member Grant Rix.

It's not as if the district is looking for huge capital projects, he said. The projects on that list are modest and needed.

"These are not extravagant asks," Business Manager Becky Hubsch added. "These are things to keep on going."

If the community wants improvements at the school and continued programs being offered, something has to be done. Vice President Marty Weismantel referenced a recent visit to the Harrisburg School District, where there is a large tax levy and a \$3 million opt-out in place.

"Their facility is beautiful, a first rate facility," he said. "The people are willing to pay for what they've got, and they've got beautiful facilities."

The suburbs of Sioux Falls are just a different beast, said Gengerke. However, at the end of the day, when people see different schools that have big facilities, new buses and other improvements, that money to fund those projects come from taxes.

"Almost half of all schools (in South Dakota) have an opt-out. That's a systematic problem," she said. "That's not just a Groton Area problem."

Weekly Vikings Recap - Vikings vs. Raiders

After having the week off last week, the 6-6 Minnesota Vikings flew out to Las Vegas to face the 5-7 Raiders which might have been the most boring game in NFL history as both teams managed to not score a single point until the fourth quarter.

After the Raiders had to punt, the sixteenth total punt of the game we might add, Nick Mullens and the Vikings finally had a drive good enough to reach the red zone. 
My friend Bob and I were watching Monday Night Football in a basement apartment in Aberdeen, SD. Until I looked it up last week, I hadn't remembered who was playing. My beloved Miami Dolphins won in overtime.

I have a fleeting snapshot in my mind of the look on Bob's face. I'm sure he has one of my shocked expression etched in his memory, too.

Lennon was just "Starting Over," notably one of the best songs on that album. Sixteen years later when my son Dylan was born, I memorialized his birth and quoted "Beautiful Boy" from the album. Lennon was a fascinating intellect, inspired and flawed, thoughtful and funny. He had so much more to give.

I was consumed by music from birth. It's the purest form of communication we have. No surprise that I went on to become a disc jockey. I remember learning from my teenaged Aunt Joan in 1970 that the Beatles were breaking up. A funeral atmosphere, big because they were so big. Uncharted territory, really, like Elvis was uncharted territory. He became so big there was no template to guide him.

We'd lost icons before. Plane crashes, car wrecks, drugs, plain old bad luck, but assas-

ination? The senseless killing of a man who brought so much joy to the world? It's been 43 years and and I still haven't reconciled it.

I was driving my kids to daycare on September 11, 2001, when I heard the news on the radio. I knew what it was when the second plane hit, and as I listened to my kids chirping happily I knew that the world they would grow up in would be profoundly different. Things can change in an instant.

It was my birthday.

It drew me back to November 22, 1963. I had been the same age Dylan was on 9/11...

I was five. Sunlight streaked through our living room when a soap opera was interrupted. Did my mother gasp? There was an instantaneous chill. The sunshine became icicles. My mother scooped me up in her arms and hugged me, weeping. I tried to understand, but it was too much and I was too little. What does it feel like when a nation weeps? Indescribable. But I felt it.

Sometimes it felt like the world was out of control when I was growing up. As I matured, I understood more. But how could anyone at any age truly understand? Martin Luther King and Robert F. Kennedy were messengers of hope in 1968. And they killed the messengers. They killed our heroes.

Vietnam. Riots. The world roiled around us. I knew enough history to understand the challenges America had faced and overcome. A Civil War. WWII. When I was born, WWII had been over for a scant 13 years.

As the years went on, I saw how these fearful moments were connected and intertwined. I connected the dots. What was inexplicable and unpredictable was the human factor. Unplanned things. The unscheduled, mistimed, misfiring of addled minds. Lost souls. Shooters.

A few short months after the loss of John Lennon, Ronald Reagan was shot. We learned only later how close we were to losing the 40th president of the United States. Just a couple months after Reagan was shot, so too, was Pope Paul II. Yet, he recovered, too.

I remember the sense of optimism I had as the Pope grew stronger, becoming one of the most transformative popes in a critical time. Great change was underway with the collapse of the USSR and democracy in Poland. After so many losses, wins!

I'm getting better at it. Perspective. Better at celebrating the lives, better at mourning less, better at acceptance. Holding out hope. But I'll forever wonder what might have been.


World-Famous Christmas Tree

UNFINISHED BUSINESS - There was discussion about the user agreement for the baseball park. We are getting closer to having something in writing. Tony also brought up the issue of the posts for the scoreboard possibly being set yet before winter. Corey reminded him to get a building permit for the concrete work.

Nuisances - The board reviewed the report sent by Code Enforcement Specialists. They decided to address the issue of vehicles first. The company will be sending out those nuisance letters to those in violation of city ordinances.

Streets - Jeremy filled some of the street holes and leveled some rock piles.

Parks - nothing further

Lagoon/sewer - Joe Whitlock from Stockwell presented information to the board. His company develops studies on existing waste water and storm water facilities. He said that the cost of this study is \$12,500, but NECOG will reimburse \$10,000 to cities whose systems are older than 20 years. The study will take 8 - 12 months to complete. He has looked over current sewer line plans. He said there are various tests to assess our systems. From the plan that he will develop, the state then determines your communities needs for grants and loans. Trevor Meints made a motion to have Joe Whitlock go ahead with the study of our waste water and storm water facilities. Emily Eichler seconded the motion. All were in favor - motion carried.

Rubble Site - The site will need to be burned sometime after it snows.

NEW BUSINESS - Corey has been looking into upgrading our snow removal equipment. He spoke to Titan and they will rent us a skid steer for \$20 an hour or a mini wheel loader for \$22.50 an hour. We need to insure the equipment. We will only be charged for the hours that we put on the machines. If they sell them, they will replace them as soon as possible. Corey discussed with our lawyer the possibility of Jeremy Dosch filling the position on the council for the remainder of the term (until May of 2024.) As long as Jeremy doesn't vote on any matters regarding his salary or position, there is not a problem with him filling the spot. Mayor Mitchell appointed Jeremy Dosch to fill the vacancy.

Meeting Minutes

December 5, 2023 – GENERAL MEETING

Meeting called to order by Chairman Sutton at 8:45 A.M. in the Commission Chambers, Courthouse Annex, Brown County, SD. Present were Commissioners Dennert, Fjeldheim, Gage, Sutton, and Wiese. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Commissioner Dennert.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA: Commissioner Dennert moved to approve the agenda, seconded by Wiese. All members present voting aye. Motion carried.

OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC COMMENT: None

ORDINANCE #261 – SECOND READING/ADOPTION: Moved by Commissioner Fjeldheim, seconded by Gage to adopt Ordinance #261. An Ordinance adding to the Second Revision of Title 4 Zoning, Chapter 4.2015 "Fences". (Copies of the full Ordinance are available at the Brown County Auditor's Office or Brown County Planning & Zoning Office during regular business hours). All members present voting aye. Motion carried.

LANDOWNERS CONCERNED WITH SUMMIT CARBON SOLUTIONS REROUTING PLANS: Dennis Feickert met with the Commission to share that Summit is trying to figure out a new route, but speculation is they are trying to avoid McPherson County due to their 1-mile setback, where Brown County is 1500 feet. No one has been able to get a map. A resident by Elm Lake was contacted about 3 weeks ago by Summit and he asked for a description of the land, where the pipeline was going to go but they couldn't give him a land description at that time, he hasn't heard back from anyone since then. Dennis has been contacted by a few landowners that were contacted to see if they were interested in signing an easement and questioning the route. A meeting was held at Steve Dutenhoffer's shop, consensus is 'No' we don't want the pipeline. The group of people opposed to the pipeline has grown, and we have the Brown County Commission to thank for digging your heels in and staying on course. The group feels this is a money grab and a multitude of issues such as safety, land disturbance and insurance. Dennis informed the Commission there is a new group formed now called South Dakota Alliance, they are going to be working on legislation and other things to try to strip local government of their ability to pass setback ordinances. Summit Carbon Solutions has hired Lawrence & Schiller advertising company to promote the pipeline in order to save the ethanol industry and anything else they can think of to make this pipeline so great. Chairman Sutton shared that he reached out to the Planning & Zoning Director to see if they had been provided a new proposed map and they had received nothing. Jared Bossly shared that he has also had people reaching out to him wondering where things were at or if the deal was dead since it's been such a long pause but none of us have accepted that this is going away, but every conversation he has had with people it has been 'No' and they don't want this pipeline either. It is not just us a few radicals Farmers that nobody can get along with, which is what we've been labeled. Jared commented there are a lot of new faces here today and this is happening all over in all the counties that Summit Carbon is trying to do this and he was glad to see everybody here and also thanked the Commission for what they've done but we need to keep this fight up because the people do not want this project and there is a lot of issues, even investor issues. We need to keep fighting the fight. Chairman Sutton stated that he has also heard that there is going to be an attempt during the legislative session to introduce a bill or several bills that would circumvent the County's ability to have a final say in Planning & Zoning, setbacks, and all. He commented that we all need to be very diligent and keep an eye on this matter because the last thing we need is the State making decision for Counties on what's going on within counties – local control is critical in having a say in what happens in the future. Chairman Sutton shared that they hear everyone's concerns, and the Commission will stay on top of it. Ed Fischbach shared this new Alliance group has been quoted publicly

now in the media and at public meetings that they have 2 goals: First one is to take away all local authority from the Counties and place it in the hands of the State Legislature – we need to be very vigilant and fight back on this. The second goal is that if they have a private company that says they have a 2/3% of people that have signed easements whether they've been coerced or did it voluntarily then that company can use the eminent domain procedure on everybody. We are also opposed to this and we're going to speak out and fight this as well. From their perspective, they have 3 bills that we have filed with the LRC, that we believe are common sense bills: First one is No Eminent Domain procedure should be implemented on anyone until there's an actual permit granted by the PUC (not just pending it must be granted). The second one is No Surveying of any kind until there is an approved permit granted by the PUC – this is to avoid another situation like what happened at Jared Bossly's place. Third one is very specific that No Eminent Domain should be used for CO2 pipelines – last session there was some opposition to our Bill 1133 because we had other utility groups come in and didn't think it was clear enough and it might affect them so this time, we are being more specific and very clear. All these bills have been filed and sponsored by State Representative Carla Limbs. Ed stated there may be other bills that come down the line but this is what they are proposing at this time and we are going to fight their attempts on their two goals and Ed appreciates Chairman Sutton's comments because nobody around here wants anything taken away from local control and Spink County Commission feels the same way and they're going to fight it with everything they have and he assumes all 66 counties in the State of SD ought to be concerned about this – we don't need the State setting a standard Ordinance for every County because each County has their own individual issues. Ed commented that they heard Summit has given Lawrence & Schiller \$1 million to launch a PR Campaign to try to drive this pipeline through and their attempts to get different groups on board with their Alliance: SD Soybean Association is trying to adopt a resolution to support the pipeline; they've approached the Aberdeen Development Corporation; the State Chamber of Commerce President has been all over the State advocating this project; SD Farm Bureau is another one they've tried to get them on board so we need to continue to vigilant and fight back.

Representative Brandie Schaeffbauer asked if we had any ideas on who might be bringing the legislation for taking the local control away from the Counties. She also shared that she has heard they want to put control at the State level for Solar and Wind, so wanted to inform the people of this. Chairman Sutton stated he has not heard of a particular Legislator that's agreed to introduce the legislation. Ed Fischbach stated they have an idea who might, but we don't know that for sure at this time. Commissioner Dennert asked Kylie Lange with Summit Carbon Solutions if she had anything to share with the Commission today as far as what the new route is. Kylie responded that the Commission made it clear that you didn't want to be involved in the routing and it was Summit's job to find the route, so we've been making a lot of phone calls, talked to a lot of landowners. It is not finalized; they are working on it and have got a lot of options and different routes they can take; once they finalize it, she will get with Planning and Zoning and then come to Commission and talk about the final. The comments are correct that they are making a lot of phone calls and trying to find landowners and they've had a decent amount of success; doing a lot of work Redfield north; but once they have a route, they'll get it to Planning & Zoning through the Conditional Use process, looks like we've got a couple of options that comply with your ordinance. Dennis Feickert shared that at the last McPherson County Planning & Zoning Board meeting a representative from Summit Carbon Solutions was there and a reference was made that paperwork was nearly done but quite lengthy for Brown County to request a variance. Dennis was wondering if there had been any contact with Planning

and Zoning as far as permitting a variance or anything at all to move this process forward. Scott Bader, Planning & Zoning Director replied that he has had 2 meetings with Kylie Lange, but nothing has been submitted or a date for them to be at a Planning & Zoning meeting. Kylie replied that she has spent a month putting the paperwork together and it is going to be a pretty lengthy submission for the Conditional Use Permit, trying to have it close to what would be submitted at the State level, so once it's 100% complete it will be submitted. They have a list put together and know that 85% of it can be done before they have a finalized route. Scott Bader shared that he has an email from Kylie with the list of items they are putting together for future submittal of a Conditional Use Permit; that is all his office has at this time. Commissioner Fjeldheim commented to Kyle Lange that most of the people here are totally against this project as far as signing any type of easement, there has never been anyone before the Commission in favor of this project and every time you try to go through we have these people that come and say no to it – so if you don't have the easements and you have a 1500 foot setback from the property line how are you going to get through anywhere. Kylie replied that their 1st step is working with landowners which we have been doing and have a decent amount of success; them not coming into the Commission meeting and publicly making their neighbors angry doesn't necessarily mean they are against the project; quite a few people actually ask that they don't use their name; then making sure it is a compliant route with the ordinance; it is not an easy task and it is not fast which is why it's been more than a month but they are working on it. Ed Fischbach shared that at the Farmer's Union Convention last weekend they had a panel discussion on the pipeline and property rights and Brown County Commission was represented by Commissioner Dennert and Spink County had Commissioner Smith and wanted to let everyone know that they did an outstanding job and was well received; they received a standing ovation at the end. Ed wanted to let the rest of the Commission know how well Commissioner Dennert represented them. Dennis Feickert wanted to share that when he was in the Legislature 15 years ago, they had an attempt back then to strip the counties of their local control of ordinances. This summer there was a summer study on the funding for Counties and how we're going to fund County government going forward. One suggestion was a consolidation of counties; a comment was made that there are 16 counties that are nearing bankruptcy or insolvency so that is something else to keep your eye on as well because if they pull that off it's easier to bribe five counties that have one Board of County Commissioners than it is to come in front of 25 people that have local control. It has been great to see the people come together; the group has been referred to as the minority but causing all this rift but that's not true because this is going to affect the entire state of South Dakota and local government and local control if we allow this to continue. Dennis encouraged the Commission to keep this on their radar and when the bills come up to attend the Committee hearings in Pierre and speak up so we can still have control of our counties, townships, and our land. Jared Bossly reiterated what Representative Schaeffbauer said it's not just pipeline, it's Solar, Wind and if they strip your property rights away Freedom is gone so we all must be watching this. Chairman Sutton shared they will continue to watch and keep track of what goes on during the Legislation in January & February and will report any new news they receive; he thanked everyone for coming in to share their concerns and they will do what they can to preserve landowner rights and make sure we have a voice.

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



Tripping concern at high school arena discussed

Beverly Sombke asked the school board to do something about a loose grate at the entrance of the high school arena.

Sombke told the board she wanted to get something on the record in order to get a loose grate fixed after falling at a recent basketball game. She chipped a tooth, and it will cost about \$1,500 to get a crown on that tooth.

"I don't want anybody else to... there were people around there willing to help me, and it could have been something so much worse," she said. "I did want something done."

Sombke said she honestly didn't know what had happened until she was told what caused her fall. It was a little grate, maybe six inches. But it could be something that hurts someone else, she said.

Board President Deb Gengerke told Sombke the best resource would be talking to Superintendent Joe Schwan. Keep in touch with him, and he can help guide her through the process.

Schwan added, "Ma'am, I was so glad you weren't hurt worse."

Brenda Waage, who attended the meeting with Sombke, said, "she just has bruises on her hands, her knees, her face."

Sombke added, "Time, patience and lots of ice will fix it."

- The school board viewed an initial proposal for the 2024-2025 school year calendar. The draft calendar would have school beginning for student Aug. 21, 2024 and ending May 15, 2025. Discussion took place about whether students should return from winter break on Jan. 2, 2025 or Jan. 3, 2025. A question was also posed about whether the high school graduation was too early and whether it should be moved from Sunday, May 11, 2025 to either Saturday, May 17 or Sunday, May 18, 2025. The calendar will likely be brought back before the board at its January meeting.

- School board officials chose to move the board's January meeting from Monday, Jan. 8, 2024 to Wednesday, Jan. 10, 2024. The meeting time would begin at 7 p.m.

- There's been an increased discussion state-wide about school consolidation, Superintendent Schwan told the board. At a recent meeting of superintendents in the region and state legislators, discussion veered toward districts having shared administrations to lower costs and possibly close some smaller schools to increase the pool of teachers in the state. "I don't necessarily see that impacting us," Schwan told the board. "...It's an easy thing to say. It's a lot harder thing to do."



Urinalysis in patient care

Urinalysis, or testing of the urine, has ancient origins dating back to the time of Hippocrates and beyond. Although we have evolved in our methodology of studying the urine and our understanding of the meaning of its characteristics, we do still rely on urinalysis in making clinical diagnoses frequently in medicine.

In centuries past, the tools of urinalysis were blunt and primarily involved human senses of sight, smell, and taste (yes, taste). Ancient physicians noted that sediment in the urine often correlated with fever, the sediment in question probably being white blood cells. Bubbles in the urine might portend kidney disease, which we know to be true if the bubbles are caused by excessive protein in the urine. And diabetes mellitus was generally known to be present in cases of excessive, sweet tasting urine.

In modern laboratories, we test urine using chemical assays and by looking at urine sediment under a microscope. What might we be looking for when we ask our patients to provide a urine sample?

Red blood cells can be present in a variety of conditions, including trauma to the urinary tract such as from infection or kidney stones, tumors of the urologic tract, and diseases affecting the microscopic structures of the kidney, among other things. White blood cells are more specific to urinary tract infection, though they can be seen in some other types of kidney injury as well.

We look routinely for protein in the urine of patients with diabetes or known kidney disease. Protein in the urine is typically the first sign of kidney damage from chronic diseases like diabetes. And the amount of protein in the urine of a patient with chronic kidney disease can help us understand prognosis and whether certain medications are working. Glucose is found in the urine if a person has very high blood glucose (or if they are taking certain medications). Numerous other chemical tests of the urine can help us to diagnose selective medical conditions.

As a physician in the modern era, luckily I have never tasted my patients' urine like Hippocrates and his cohorts would have. But I do use urinalysis every day to help me diagnose and care for my patients.
