

Groton native considers Republican primary challenge to Rep. Dusty Johnson

An Aberdeen businessman says he has formed a committee to consider a run against U.S. Rep. Dusty Johnson in the June Republican primary election.

The Toby Doeden for Congress Exploratory Committee issued a news release and a YouTube video over the weekend characterizing Doeden as more closely aligned with former President Donald Trump than Johnson.

"Dusty is a career politician who campaigns on conservative values, but as soon as he's elected, he scampers back to Washington, where he acts like a liberal, talks like a liberal, and worst of all, votes like a liberal," Doeden said in a news release.

A campaign spokesperson for Johnson responded with a statement from the congressman.

"My record speaks for itself. I'm proud of the work I've done in the last five years to secure our border, cut spending, and fix a very broken Washington, D.C."

Johnson has won several past Republican primary races. He won a three-way race in 2018 for the party's nomination to succeed then-Rep. Kristi Noem, who left the U.S. House to become governor. In the 2020 primary election, Johnson beat Republican challenger Liz May, 77% to 23%. In the 2022 primary, Johnson beat Republican challenger Taffy Howard 59% to 40%.

Johnson's campaign finance committee had \$3.28 million on hand as of the end of September.

Doeden is listed on the website of the Aberdeen Chrysler Center as a "dealer principal." He is also listed as president on the website of the Doeden Investment Group, and as founder on the website of the 4J Foundation, a nonprofit billed as supporting the safety and well-being of children and domestic pets.

'1940-1945: We Will Remember' history of Brown and Day County residents' roles in WWII published

Lee Raines' fourth book, "1940-45: We Will Remember" has been published and can be purchased in paperback or on Kindle on Amazon. All of Raines' books can be found on leeraines.com.

A grandmother's diary and news of the day during the war years of 1940-1945 is the impetus for Raines' depiction of rural South Dakota during World War II. This local military history juxtaposes daily farming responsibilities such as rendering lard, selling eggs, harvesting the crops with local community response to war supply shortages and the inevitable but tragic mourning of the deaths of its sons and daughters. Exhaustive efforts have been made to compile a list of those in the Brown and Day county areas who served and who made the greatest sacrifice. Historical battle narratives, military successes and failures throughout the war, and the impact of the war on local economies, demographics and the families of the area are also explored.

"I used various source documents to develop a picture of what life might have been like during the period of 1940-45 from the perspective of farm life and small-town perspectives," Raines said. "I hope to enable the reader to travel the time period using my grandmother's diary as a base of activity, then the preparation of war from the standpoint of the US, the war itself as if overwhelms the world, our introduction to that war after Pearl Harbor and then the impact on a generation of men and women who served their country."

This labor of love includes interviews of WWII veterans and family members and a vault of service and memorial photographs.

Weekly Vikings Recap - Vikings vs. Lions

The Minnesota Vikings' 2023 season is officially over as the team fell to the Detroit Lions to finish the season 7-10, their first season with double-digit losses since 2013. It's hard to properly characterize what this season was for the Vikings as they lost both starting quarterback, Kirk Cousins, and superstar wide receiver, Justin Jefferson, for at least eight games to injury. To make matters worse, the Vikings finished with a total of 34 turnovers on the season, second most in the NFL. In hindsight, it is quite impressive the Vikings finished with the record they did for how often the odds were against them.

Sunday's game for the Vikings was a weird one for Vikings fans as many probably wanted the team to lose for draft position purposes even though the team still had a chance to make the playoffs if four scenarios went their way. Sunday's game was also one of those unique games where a team decided to play all their starters even though they had already clinched the division and could not improve their seed in the playoffs. For a game that had little to no implication on playoff seeding, it was surprising to see both teams go all out with playing their starters.

Nick Mullens got the start at quarterback for the Vikings and played a decent game for the most part, finishing with 396 passing yards and two touchdowns. Mullens, who started three games this season, averaged an impressive 370 passing yards and two passing touchdowns per game. The problem for Mullens was the turnovers as he amassed eight interceptions in his three starts. If Mullens could have even split that interception total in half, he might have finished the season with a 3-0 record rather than a 0-3 record in his three starts.

The star of Sunday's game was Justin Jefferson who went for 192 receiving yards on 12 catches and a touchdown. Jefferson, who played in only eight full games this season was still able to eclipse 1000 yards receiving today with his performance Sunday. Jefferson's performance, along with Jordan Addison who caught his tenth touchdown this season on Sunday, provided a glimpse of the offense firepower the Vikings are going to have next season. The question all offseason will now become who the quarterback will be throwing the ball for the Vikings.

By midway through the fourth quarter, it became clear that the Vikings' playoff hopes

were officially closed when it was announced that the Tampa Bay Buccaneers defeated the Carolina Panthers. After that moment, the sole focus for the Vikings was to get out of Sunday's game with no injuries. Luckily for the Vikings, no one got injured. However, that was not the story for the Lions who appeared to have lost their start rookie tight end, Sam LaPorta, to a knee injury for the playoffs. It will be interesting to see if LaPorta's injury hurts the Lions' offense next week when they take on the Los Angeles Rams in the Wild Card Round.

Lions 30 - Vikings 20

With the Vikings' loss and the Las Vegas Raiders' victory over the Denver Broncos on Sunday, the Vikings will officially be slotted for the 11th overall pick in the 2024 NFL Draft. It will be the highest draft pick the team has had since they selected Trae Waynes 11th overall in the 2015 NFL Draft. For a team that does not usually draft this high, it might finally be time for the Vikings' front office to draft

Let those Lions roar





 Technology is always a challenge. I have experienced difficulties and I have seen other people experience difficulties. I don't take pride in seeing someone else having problems as I have my share of them as well.
 We have been having issues with the camera we take on the away games with the focus not working correctly. I decided to buy a new camera and then send the other in for repair. I got the new camera and of course, rule number one, is to make sure it works properly with the equipment I have. After a short experiment, the new camera was working wonderfully with our YoloBox. The YoloBox is the encoder that takes the input of audio and video, encodes it, and then sends it over the internet to the cloud so you can view it.

It was time to put it all in practice at the Warner double header. We got it all set up and it was working fine for the girls junior varsity game - well, until about halftime. Jeslyn tapped me on the shoulder and showed me the YoloBox video had frozen. I tried every trick in the book to get the video back. It would not work. By now, I'm getting text messages about us being off the air - but my main focus was on the camera, trying to get it to work. I tried different cables. I went out to the car to bring in more cables. Nothing. I reset the camera to factory default. Nothing. I tried every setting possible on the camera. Nothing. I restarted the YoloBox. Nothing. You see a trend here? By now, my stress level was elevated.

I did search on-line for possible solutions. I came across a site called JustAnswer. I tried them. Of course, it was not free, but I was virtually willing to pay any price to get back on the air. They said they had a four minute wait time. Not bad, I can wait for that. By now, the boys junior varsity game was starting. More than four minutes had passed. Nothing.

Tired of waiting, I tried to call Canon support directly. Do you think I could find a phone number for them? It was impossible. Nothing on the website. Nothing under support. I searched for a phone number and the link just took me back to their website. Nothing. I tried a different wording in my search and saw a phone number pop up in the search. I called it. I actually got a real human being. Maybe things will finally turn around.

I talked with the guy. Told him what I had all done. He was puzzled as well. There was nothing coming out of the HDMI video output. Nothing.

Then I remembered a USB output on the camera. This was something new on the camera. I asked how that worked. He said it would output the video but not the audio. I knew if I could get the video input into the YoloBox, I could rig something up for the audio. The guy wasn't sure if it was going to work. Of course, having the right cable to do it was important. It then dawned on me that the power supply for the YoloBox would work. I plugged it into the camera and into the YoloBox. Nothing. I asked the guy on the phone that somewhere on the camera settings I seen something about USB output. He directed me to the location, made a change. I looked at the YoloBox - YES! THERE WAS VIDEO!!!

I thanked the guy for his help. We would have to trouble shoot the HDMI output another time. It was getting halftime of the boys junior varsity game. Now that I had video, I had to rig up some cables to get the audio going. That was actually the easy part. We now had video and audio. We went back on-line and it was working.

Well, nothing everything was well. You remember when I said I used the power supply cord for the YoloBox to reroute the video. Now we had a new problem. The YoloBox was not going to have enough power to last through the rest of the games. I needed a power supply cable - USBC to USB. I asked around if anyone had one. Nothing.

Then I realized something. The new camera's power supply was a USBC cable. Great! I plugged it into the YoloBox. But the camera only had an hour and half left of power supply. The YoloBox was at 64 percent. Time was not on my side.

So I would take the single power supply cable and switch it between the camera and YoloBox to help keep them going. It worked. By the end of the night, the camera had 15 minutes of life left and the YoloBox was at 15 percent. That was cutting it way too close.

So we survived the night. Both varsity games were broadcast without issue with our modified setup.

The next day, I took the camera and hooked it up to the TV to see if it would work. That was the first thing I would need to do before calling support. Much to my surprise, there was video.

Then I hooked the camera up to the YoloBox. Much to my surprise, there was video. What? Really? Why? I shouldn't be complaining, but really!

Well, on our way to Willow Lake, I took an extra USBC power supply cable and adapter along just in case. We tried the HDMI output at Willow Lake and it worked just fine. I have no clue why it worked, but I had my emergency Plan B in place just in case it would die. It never did. It worked just fine for the whole night.

Meanwhile, at Willow Lake, the IT guy there was making several trips up to our area where they had their equipment. We had hooked into their internet switch. During a break I asked him what was wrong. He said they had no internet and that I was not on either. I looked at our YoloBox, but it said we were transmitting. We looked at the switch box and there was no light. How was that possible? Then I realized the YoloBox had switched to the cellular mode

when the ethernet connection was down. Tyler, the IT guy, was bringing in tools, cables, a new switch, crawled under the bleachers to work on the internet connections down there - and he just had rotary cuff surgery on top of it all. He finally got the connection going by about near the end of the C game. I switched to their internet for the junior varsity game and it worked.

I had sent in the old camera for repair - I had an estimate of \$500. They got the camera and sent me the estimate for repair - try \$800. Ouch. But it's still half price of a new one. Oh yeah, remember that JustAnswer that I gave up on - they charged me \$47. I will say they finally did reach out to me, but I was already on Canon's support line.

Once I get the camera back from repair, that one is going to the Arena to replace that camera. That camera has a tendency to zoom out on its own. Plus the camera does not charge the battery. It needs to go bye-bye.

 Corey Mitchell called the meeting to order. He called for a motion to approve the agenda. Cole Kampa made a motion to approve the posted agenda. Emily Eichler seconded the motion. All in favor - motion carried. Corey Mitchell called for any conflict of interest on agenda items. Jeremy stated that he would have a conflict when discussing salaries. He will not vote on any salary items. Minutes were passed out from the December 6th meeting. Trevor Meints made a motion to accept the minutes as presented. Emily Eichler seconded the motion. All in favor - motion carried.

Nuisances - Code Enforcement Specialists sent letters to residents in violation of city ordinances. Some residents have been taking care of correcting their violations.

Streets - They look good. As discussed at the last meeting, we rented a skid steer for \$20 an hour from Titian. We are also trying out a metal plus blade (from RDO) that costs \$11,878.46 We may need another system of snow to know whether or not it is what we need.

Parks - Jeremy will be checking on the buildings weekly. The council discussed the filtration process and also the winterization of the well heads and buildings. The Buntrock representative was present during the winterization and is aware of the council's concerns. Jeremy has also been in contact with the

general contractor about the steel in the concessions stand canopy.

Lagoon/sewer - Jeremy is working on January's paperwork. Rubble Site - The site will need to be burned after another snowfall.

NEW BUSINESS - Cara ordered new checks for the sewer account. She will look into what the monthly rate will be for data backup. The following yearly declarations were addressed: Jeremy Dosch made a motion to keep Groton Independent as our publication source. Emily Eichler seconded the motion. All in favor - motion carried. On salaries, Jeremy Dosch's salary will remain at \$17 per hour. Cara Dennert's salary will remain at \$1,500 per month. Emily Eichler moved that the City Council's hourly salary be raised to \$17 per hour. Cole Kampa seconded the motion. All in favor - motion carried. Cole Kampa and Jeremy Dosch were given petitions as they are up for reelection this year. Anyone who would like to run for council may request a petition.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION ORDINANCE #263

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 4, SECOND REVISION BROWN COUNTY ORDINANCES AS AMENDED

TO REZONE CERTAIN DESCRIBED PROPERTY

INTEREST POLICY: Moved by Commissioner Dennert, seconded by Wiese to approve the following Policy in regard to interest earned from deposits and investments: State law allows income from deposits and investments to be credited to either the General Fund or the fund making the investment. The County's policy is to credit all income from deposits and investments to the General Fund during the year, except for interest earned on specific certificates of deposits for the Solid Waste Fund. USGAAP requires income from deposits and investments to be reported in the fund whose assets generated that income. Where the governing board has discretion to credit investment income to a fund other than the fund that provided the resources for investment, a transfer to the designated fund is reported when authorized by the Commission. Fund transfers of investment earnings to the General Fund shall not occur in 2024, all funds shall receive the income generated from the assets of the fund. All members present voting aye. Motion carried.

center election board, the person in charge of the election may appoint a person to be designated as the vote center assistant. Technology downloads pertinent information from BC Connect or DEVNET to a flash drive, which is mailed to the requesting entity or uploaded to their site upon receipt of payment. Payment is deposited with the County Treasurer into the general fund. We typically get two of these requests annually but have had as many as four requests in a year. This will also include smaller data dumps that are sorted for the recipient. Beacon Subscriptions: See below Web access agreement. We currently have 77 active paying Beacon accounts, accounting for \$25,605.17 received annually. This money is deposited with the County Treasurer into the general fund. Tax estimates for real estate transfer closings: These are tax estimates we perform for our local title company and realtors so they can calculate appropriate tax credits between buyers and sellers upon real estate transfers. If we receive a request to do a tax estimate, we will have it ready by five (5) days after we receive the request. These will be charged \$23.54 plus tax (a total of \$25.00) to perform the request. If the request is needed with less than 5 days-notice, the charge will be \$37.66 plus tax (a total of \$40.00). These fees will need to be paid at the time the estimates are returned to the customer, as we are not allowed to maintain accounts receivable status.

Website Access Agreement: The Brown County website provides real estate information from the convenience of a personal computer 24-hours a day, 7-days a week. Access is allowed by a username and password. There is a fee for access, which covers the expense to provide this service. Fees are based on the number of users and must be paid in advance. Prices have been adjusted as of July 1, 2023, to reflect the change in state tax rate. Fee Schedule/Annual Fee: (Based on number of users): 1-5 people/\$318.60; 6-10 people/\$509.76; 11 + people/\$764.64. Temporary User: 1 Month/\$106.20. \$26.55 Setup Fee. All members present voting aye. Motion carried.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Jared Bossly, wanted to personally invite the Brown County Commissioners to attend a Rally in Pierre on Monday, January 8th at noon in the Rotunda of the State Capitol to stand up for Property/Landowner Rights along with local control.

SOUTH DAKOTANS FIRST: Craig Schauman informed the Brown County Commission that South Dakotans First is an organization that is wanting to educate people on the property rights and local control. They are going to work hard to keep that local control, including any legislation that deteriorates that. Craig spent 4 days at the Navigator/PUC Hearings, and he was impressed on how PUC staff handled the situation and how well prepared they were. Craig commented that it would be a disservice to the public to take local control away; there are going to organizations actively lobbying to keep the local control where we have it now.

Dennis Feickert commented that some of the counties the Commissioners act as the Planning & Zoning Board; he is concerned about the smaller counties that will give up and say let the State handle it. He stated it would be a disaster to lose local control and we need to lobby to retain local control. Dennis told the Commission to hang in there for Property Rights and Thanked them for what they have done thus far.

All members present voting aye. Motion carried.

All members present voting aye. Motion carried.

ORDINANCE #264 – SECOND READING/ADOPTION: Moved by Commissioner Gage, seconded by Fjeldheim to adopt Ordinance #264. Applicant Thomas Monroe to rezone from Agriculture Preservation District (AG-P) to Mini-Agriculture District (M-AG) to bring this parcel into compliance for its current and future use: Proposed Lot 1, "Monroe Addition" in the SW1/4 of Section 2-T128N-R65W of the 5th P.M., Brown County, South Dakota (37824 101st Street, Palmyra Twp.). All members present voting aye. Motion carried.

BID - EXPO ROOF: Discussion was held in regard to the Bid from Mega Construction to replace the roof on the Expo Holum Building. Chairman Sutton stated that building supplies are going to continue to rise but they were given until January 16th to accept the bid: personally, he feels that it is a critical need, and the building is worth maintaining and preserving. Commissioner Fjeldheim stated that it's not just an issue with the Expo Building, all the buildings have been neglected over the years because funds were not available, so we need to do something before they all deteriorate. Rachel Kippley, Fair/Fairgrounds/Parks Manager stated that she didn't have any new information and the flashing between the buildings has been discussed. From the Fairgrounds standpoint they will do whatever they can to raise some additional funds, whether it is signage with the Expo or other donations. Commissioner Fjeldheim asked about the naming right if anyone checked into that. Commissioner Sutton shared that he visited with Sarah Patton, whose father was named the Executor of the Holum Estate, and he signed the contract with the Aberdeen Cougars; he has passed away now. Sarah's thought was that if someone would donate – we could rename it as Holum-No Donors Name. Commissioner Wiese asked about the funding options available; if we approve the contract then continue to discuss where to take the funds from. Dennis Feickert asked about the Wings Hockey Program fit into the mix of the buildings; he knows there is significant use of the Expo Building by the Hockey Program so wondering where that fits into replacing the Expo Roof and then he commented there was a lot of money put towards the DEX building in Huron. Dennis shared that when he was a Legislator, he had a bill that would have taken the Sales Tax Revenue off the Fairgrounds and would have put it into a fund to replace or help with deterioration buildings. Commissioner Sutton shared that Aberdeen Hockey Association (AHA) does have Zombie storage room and some of the Locker Room in the Expo square footage; so that is a negotiation the Commission could have with the Hockey Association; impressing the importance of maintaining the roof is in their best interest as well. Senator Al Novstrup shared with the Commission that him and Rachel have been working a bill that would do a rebate like

Dennis mentioned; it is Senate Bill 32: the State Department of Revenue would collect the 4.2% State Sales Tax and then send it back to the County in a designated fund; and they have sponsors of both the House and Senate side, so he asks for the Commission and Associations support of this bill. Rachel shared that could potentially be a \$100,000.00 per year, which could replenish the Capital Improvement Fund. Rachel said she could draft a letter to AHA to let them know where we are at and see if there could be a partnership to take care of the roof. Commissioner Dennert verified with Rachel that she still feels this bid is still going to be as competitive as we would likely have; Rachel said she did what she is hearing the prices are only going to go up. Rachel shared that they are looking at option 1 with the removal and replacement of the roof for \$658,500.00 with 2 alternates: alternate option 1 for \$4,125.00 and alternate option 2 for \$5,980.00; if decide to address the flashing right away but Rachel will need to get more information on the differences, and we could look at the shared fund to take care of part of this. Commissioner Sutton stated where the buildings connect has historically been an issue and having the leakage and Commissioner Gage stated the leakage comes in right where the electrical boxes are in the Expo. Commissioner Wiese made a motion that they enter into the contract and authorize the Chairman to sign it and have Auditor Heupel create a spreadsheet showing potential available funds for consideration at the next meeting so we can determine before the bill actually becomes due and exercise our options, seconded by Fjeldheim including whichever option is determined by the contractor to include in the funding options. All members present voting aye. Motion carried.

INMATE HOUSING AGREEMENT: Moved by Commissioner Wiese, seconded by Dennert to approve and authorize the Chairman to sign the Inmate Housing Agreement with Corson County; housing of inmates for Jail and JDC; the cost would be \$100/day for Jail and \$350/day for JDC. All members present voting aye. Motion carried.







It was a historical night Friday in Groton with so many things at play. It has been many years since the Groton Area boys have beaten Clark/Willow Lake, but this was the year and it was in big fashion with 84-20 final score.

Head Coach Brian Dolan was recognized for his 100th win at Warner which includes his coaching time at Aberdeen Roncalli. Dolan said, "It was a nice touch to have those kids back. It's all about them. 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School Board sets amount and term for school opt-out resolution

A school district opt-out has been talked about since 2016 and the board has engaged in serious discussion for the past six months. At the meeting held Wednesday evening, the board agreed with a maximum opt out of \$1.25 million for a term of 10 years. Now that the dollar amount and term have been set, a resolution will be passed at the next school board meeting. Projections have the district using \$1.25 million in 2025, \$1.15 million in 2026, \$1 million then for the next four years, \$1.045 million in year seven, \$1.062 million in year eight, \$1.125 million in year nine and \$1,135 million in year 10.

A lot of school districts are using capital outlay funds to help fund the general fund. There are also a number of districts (about 25 percent) that also have an opt-out and are using capital outlay funds. Groton Area has been using \$600,000 to \$830,000 from capital outlay to fund the general fund.

Superintendent Joe Schwan said he wants to restore the integrity of the capital outlay fund to keep its funds. The board entered into a lengthy discussion to figure out what the dollar amount should be and the term of the opt out should be in order to create a resolution.

Schwan said you take what you need. He said that the board does not need to take the full amount of the opt-out. It is decided on a year-by-year basis. His projection reflects a 3 percent annual expenditure growth.

We can't pocket the money," Becky Hubsch, school business manger, said. "We have to maintain a certain cash balance." A district has to have at least one month of under 30 percent cash balance which is set by state law. "The days of sitting on large fund balances are long gone," Schwan said.

Hubsch said that the flexibility of the opt out would benefit the district. "Something weird could happen with the state formula," she said, "but we have to have teachers in the building."

"I think we would be tying our hands if we go any lower than \$1.25 million," said board member Marty Weismantel. "This school is going to be here. We are looking out for the best interest of the students, staff and the district."

Board President Deb Gengerke said if the district did the \$1 million opt out, by year seven, the district would need to start withdrawing funds from the capital outlay fund, which could be up to \$295,088 by year 15. With the \$1.25 million opt out, the district would opt out in varying amounts to keep the district from taking money from capital outlay. However even at that, by year 14n(2038), the district would need to pull \$7,367 from capital out and by year 15 (2039), it would be \$45,088. "We need to finance a sound district," she said.

"We're in a pickle," said Board Member Kara Pharis. Weismantel encouraged the general public to ask questions. "We welcome the opportunity to talk about it," he said. "Talk to the administration. Talk to a board member."

State funding formula is going to be reviewed by the state legislature this year. One of the things being considered is the teacher salaries where districts are getting money from the state but that money is not totally being used for teacher salaries and Schwan said that Governor Noem is questioning if that should continue. There will be different accountably in the works.

The Langford School District wants to engage in discussion for a co-op with Groton Area for football next year. The discussion started two years ago, but Langford is now looking more seriously about it. Options with Webster and Britton-Hecla are off the table. A coop with Langford Area would not change Groton Area's classification. The board agreed to proceed with talks. Langford is planning a community meeting in February.

The school van was stolen in Sioux Falls. Schwan said that they found the license plates. The kids belongings were not on the bus. "It could have been a lot worse," Schwan said.

The board set April 9 as the date for the school board election, if there is one. The terms of Marty Weismantel and Kara Pharis are up this year - they are three-year terms. The deadline to submit a petition is 5 p.m. on February 23. Petitions can be taken out January 27th.

There were a number of resignations approved: Anna Fuhrman as ag instruction at the end of the 2023-24 school year (husband has a new job and they will be moving to Watertown); Brittany Hubbard as oral interp advisor (no student interest in the program); Mike Nehls as head custodian effective February 2, 2024 (moving out to the Mobridge area to work for the Mobridge-Pollock school and also as a code enforcer for the City of Mobridge); and the retirement of Julie Milbrandt at the end of the 2023-24 school year.

The board approved a HVAC change order for about \$1,100 to add an additional swing door for filter change-out ease.

The 2024-25 school calendar was approved. Start date is Wednesday, Aug. 21. Final day is Wednesday, May 15 with graduation being held on Saturday, May 17.

Next school board meeting is set for Tuesday, Jan. 30, 7 p.m. - Paul Kosel
