Groton Areas Kyle Gerlach and Trent Traphagen were chosen as Assistant Coaches of the Year by the South Dakota Basketball Coaches Association. Gerlach is the assistant boys coach and Traphagen is the assistant girls coach.

Tietz selected as MVP of Class A at shootout

The three-class shootout was held Saturday in Salem with the Class A boys beating the Class AA boys, but then losing to the Class B boys. Lane Tietz was selected as the most valuable player for the Class A boys. In the Class A win over Class AA, Tietz had 17 points, 13 rebounds and seven assists. Tietz led the scoring in the Class A-AA game with 22 points and had nine rebounds. Class A defeated Class AA, 99-82, and Class B defeated Class A, 118-112.





Tietz named to Class A All-State First Team

Groton Area senior Lane Tietz was named to the first team of the Class A All-State team, voted on by the South Dakota Basketball Coaches Assocation.

Tietz averaged 21.2 points, 3.5 rebounds, and three assists per game. He also shot 38.5% from long range on the year. Tietz, who plans to play at Dakota State, was also the Class A boys Spirit of Su award recipient.

Groton Area Head Coach Brian Dolan, said, "It's been a privilege to coach Lane over the past 5 seasons. Being named to the South Dakota basketball coach association All-State team is a deserving honor. Lane has had an outstanding high school career and he has bright days ahead of him. We are excited to watch him the next 4 years at DSÚ!"

Others on the first team were Sioux Falls Christian junior forward Griffen Goodbary, Dakota Valley senior forward Jaxson Wingert, Sioux Valley senior forward/center Alec Squires, Hamlin junior guard Easton Neuendorf and Pine Ridge sophomore guard Marvin Richard III.

Spring is in the air with public works discussion

Garbage pickup may soon move back to streets throughout town. At Tuesday's City Council meeting, Mayor Scott Hanlon asked Public Works Coordinator Terry Herron if there was a timeframe to end the spring thaw garbage route.

Currently, residents need to bring their garbage to Railroad Avenue, Main Street, Sixth Street and Highway 37 for the Tuesday weekly pickup. Some areas of streets in town develop soft spots when the ground thaws in the spring.

There are some soft spots on Seventh Avenue near the Krause's development, Herron said.

That development includes houses on Seventh Avenue just east of Fourth Street.

Moving back to the normal garbage route is dependent on what the weather does, Herron said.

Hanlon said he would want to keep the spring thaw routes as long as possible to preserve the streets.

"All and all, everything is looking good," he said. "I guess thank goodness. I've talked to a lot of people, and everything is looking good."

Other signs that point to spring include discussion about upcoming public works projects, sump pumps running outside instead of into the sanitary sewer and street sweeping.

Wasterwater Superintendent Dwight Zerr discussed a sewer replacement project at Fourth Street and Second Avenue. The old lines have cracks and odd angles, and those lines need to be replaced.

"Those are the ones we've had trouble with before," he said.

The city will have to dig up portions of the street to replace the lines, but the project should be able to stay within the public works budget, he said.

City staff are also looking to clear a line near the ice skating rink that has landscape-type rocks causing issues in it. In addition, street sweeping has started in other cities.

'When it quits snowing, I'll start sweeping," Zerr said.

- Three more summer employees were hired at Tuesday's council meeting.
- o Claire Zbylut was hired as day baseball/softball coach at \$2,500 yearly plus \$50 for each year of service. Zbylut has one year of experience.
- o Dillon Abeln was hired as groundskeeper at \$11.20 per hour with an additional 25 cents for each year of service. Abeln has one year
- o Sydney Locke was hired as gatekeeper at \$11.20 per hour with an additional 25 cents for each year of service. This is Locke's first year.
- Groton code enforcer Dennis "Mike" Olson met with the City Council during executive session at Tuesday's meeting. No action was reported.
- The council approved a special event alcoholic beverage license for an event later this month. The Groton Area Fire Protection District requested the special event license for the Fireman's Fun Night, taking place April 20 at the Groton Fire Hall. While introducing the item to the council, Mayor Scott Hanlon said he doesn't think the city has ever had any problem from having alcohol at the event. The license was approved with a unanimous vote, "Thank you firemen for doing this," Hanlon said. "It's a fun event, and it's going to raise some money for the fire hall."
- Writing a bad check to the city will soon cost more. Senate Bill 38, approved in the state legislature in January, updates the fee businesses can charge people for a bad check from \$40 to \$60. Groton Finance Officer Douglas Heinrich asked the council if the city could increase the returned check fee to \$60, effective July 1. It doesn't happen very often, Heinrich said, but it's just another deterrent.


The biggest free agent move in Green Bay one of the best running backs in the NFL over the past few seasons. With the addition of Jacobs, the Packers released Aaron Jones (who signed a one-year deal in Minnesota). Green Bay also focused on upgrading the safety position, releasing three safeties (Rudy Ford, Jonathan Owens, and Darnell Savage) and signing one of the best free-agent safeties on the market (Xavier McKinney).

Chicago Bears


Thanks to last year's draft trade, the Chicago Bears own the Carolina Panther's first-round pick (first overall) in addition to their own pick (9th). With two top-10 draft picks, the Bears can change the direction of a franchise that has only made the playoffs seven times in the past 30 seasons.

All indications point to the Bears drafting quarterback Caleb Williams out of USC, one of the best QB prospects in recent memory. To make room, the Bears traded last year's starter, Justin Fields, to the Pittsburgh Steelers for a conditional 2025 sixth-round pick. To give Williams the best chance possible to succeed in a city that has never had a 4,000-yard passer, the Bears traded for wide receiver Keenan Allen and brought in running back D'Andre Swift through free agency. On the defensive side of the ball, the biggest move was re-signing cornerback Jaylon Johnson. The Bears also brought in safeties Kevin Byard and Jonathan Owens to replace recently released safety Eddie Jackson.



APPROVAL OF AGENDA: Commissioner Wiese moved to approve the agenda, seconded by Gage. All members present voting aye. Motion carried.

Special Malt Beverage License effective April 12-13, 2024. All members pres-

ent voting aye. Motion carried. BID NOTICE OF AWARD — WEED & PEST CHEMICALS: Time and place as advertised to open, read and consider sealed bids for furnishing of chemicals for the Brown County Weed & Pest Board for 2024. Bids were received from ADAPCO and Van Diest Supply Company. Commissioner Wiese moved to defer the recommendation to give Chris Hemen, Weed & Pest Supervisor time to review the bids and investigate some of the chemicals they are offering. Seconded by Gage. SPRAY LOGGER PURCHASE: Chris Hemen, Weed & Pest Supervisor asked the Commission to approve purchasing 3 Spray Loggers from SpraySync for \$12,325.00 to replace the current loggers because they are becoming outdated; Chris budgeted \$13,552.00 in his 2024 Budget. Chris thinks he may be able to save some money on the installation and training costs. Moved by Commissioner Wiese. seconded by Dennert to approve the purchase of the 3 Spray Loggers from SpraySync for \$12,325.00. All members present voting aye. Motion carried.

COMMUNITY HEALTH CON-

TRACT FOR 2024: Wade Huntington, Assistant Director of Operations with SD Department of Health met with the Commission this morning to discuss the Community Health Contract for 2024. Wade shared that this is to provide Public Health Services for residents in Brown County. They reorganized last fall so the staff is more focused on certain tasks, such as there is staff that only does WIC and not immunizations, where the Public Health Nurse handles the immunizations and other things such as pregnancy care program. Some differences in the Brown County contract versus others is that Brown County is paying to help offset the costs for nursing staff, rent and utilities of the building, where other counties provide space in the courthouse and clerical support. Commissioner Fjeldheim asked who else contributes and Wade stated that it is Brown County and the State. They do partner with Head families with resources; figuring 90% of the patients or majority are Brown County residents but anyone can use their services. Commissioner Sutton asked if there were any coops; Wade shared there is not, but some counties have no contract agreements. Commissioner Sutton thanked Wade for taking the time to meet with them and Wade responded they appreciate the ability to work together and the Commission can look over the FAQ provided and reach out if there anymore questions. Moved by Commissioner Fjeldheim, seconded by Wiese to approve and authorize Chairman Sutton to sign the Community Health Contract for 2024. All members present voting aye. Motion carried.







The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- · Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- · Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or

runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses
- · Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.



Dear EarthTalk: Which are the greenest toilet paper varieties? Sam Atkins, Poughkeepsie, NY

When thinking of ways to live a greener lifestyle, toilet paper isn't usually the first thing people think of, but the average American uses more than 50 pounds of tissue paper per year. Like other paper products, toilet paper is typically made from trees. As consumer demand grows, trees continue to be cut down at alarming rates. Between 1996 and 2015, loggers cut down around 28 million acres of woodland, an area roughly the size of the state of Ohio. Finding alternatives, or ways to cut down on paper use, is a great way to limit your impact on the environment.

As new companies emerge and come out with new toilet paper options, the Natural Re- about your commitment to saving the planet. sources Defense Council (NRDC) has come up with a system to grade how sustainable certain toilet and tissue paper brands are. The grades rank from A+ to F and account for a variety of factors like the percentage of recycled material used in the toilet paper. A grade of A+



The toilet paper you choose may just say a lot

means that the toilet paper was made entirely of recycled materials, used a chlorine-free bleaching process, and had the highest percentage of post-consumer recycled paper. Post-consumer recycled means that the recycled materials came from products that had reached the end of their life cycle and would have otherwise ended up in landfills. When going green it's also smart to look for "processed chlorine free" papers over bleached and "elemental chlorine free" papers, because the latter can emit cancer causing dioxins into the air and water when they are processed. Toilet paper brands that were awarded an A+ grade by the NRDC include 365 by Whole Foods Market, Green Forest, Natural Value and Trader Joe's.

A grade of A means that the paper brands contain 100% recycled material, but a lower percentage of post-consumer recycled paper. Some good A rated toilet papers include Seventh Generation Extra Soft & Strong, Who Gives a Crap, and Everspring. The B and B+ grade is typically reserved for the emerging market of bamboo-based paper brands. While bamboo is less environmentally friendly than recycled material, it is still greener than using pure forest fibers. The other catch is that the largest bamboo producers are in China, which does not have the best track record when it comes to environmental and labor rights. Amazon Aware and Caboo are both B rated bamboo toilet paper brands.

Paper brands with a grade of D or F rely entirely, or almost entirely, on forest fiber for their toilet paper. There is no recycled material used in their product. Most of the well-known toilet paper brands are rated D or F, including Charmin, Cottonelle, Angel Soft and Scott 1000.

More sustainable toilet paper is typically more expensive than the lower rated brands and not everyone can afford to change their lifestyle and buy more expensive products. However, there are other ways to live greener. One option is to simply reduce the use of toilet paper, paper towels and facial tissues. Use what you need, but avoid being excessive. "Joint replacement surgery: an individualized decision"

As a general internist who does primary care for adult and elderly patients, I talk to patients a lot about arthritis and joint



replacement surgery. This type of surgery, also known as arthroplasty, is one of the most common types of elective surgery done in the United States. Knees, hips, and shoulders are the most frequently done arthroplasties, and most of those surgeries are done for severe osteoarthritis.

Osteoarthritis, the most common type of arthritis, is due to wearand-tear of the joint, and becomes very common as we age. It often can cause debilitating pain and difficulty with function which, for some patients, warrants the intervention of surgery.

My patients often want to know when it is the right time for a joint replacement. Well, no x-ray or diagnostic test can tell us that. The decision to go ahead with arthroplasty is very much individualized to the patient. How severe are their symptoms? How risky is surgery for this particular patient? How much quality of life do they stand to gain from a successful arthroplasty?

While the orthopedic surgeon is the expert who patients should trust in talking about the risks and benefits of surgery itself, sometimes as a primary care provider who knows intricately my patient's medical history, general day-to-day life, and feelings about medical and surgical interventions, I can be helpful in guiding my patients facing this decision. Often I help nudge the reluctant patient who is suffering from severe arthritis toward choosing a surgery very likely to improve their quality of life. Rarely, I might help a patient with less to gain from a surgery reconsider its risk to benefit profile.

A couple years ago I surprised myself by encouraging my patient, then 95, to consider hip replacement surgery. I never thought I would urge a patient in their 90's to undergo elective surgery, but this particular patient was in excellent health and rendered unable to continue his beloved daily exercise because of his hip arthritis. The inability to exercise, for him, was a major problem for quality of life. He got his hip arthroplasty and enjoyed a couple more active years before his recent death.

So, if you are wondering whether you should go ahead with replacing that bothersome arthritic joint, there is no perfect formula that applies to everyone. But a primary care provider who knows you well can sure assist you in making the best decision for yourself.
